

## The parish in the Great War

- a personal journey of discovery

Whenever I sat in beautiful Four Elms Church I kept seeing the name "General Sir Henry Crichton Sclater" on the wall. I had never heard of him but I wondered whether he had a connection to World War 1. And did he! Through him I came to realise what a strong bond our area has with the Great War.

General Sclater lived at Holmwood and was given a full military funeral at Four Elms church in 1923. He was a right hand man of Kitchener, whom he had served in the Boer War. Unfortunately these old school generals failed to grasp the realities of modern warfare and were arguably responsible for the carnage at the start of the war. His wife, Dame Edith, has a less controversial story tirelessly working as she did running nursing homes for the wounded and consequently being made a Dame in her own right.

And she is not the only Dame in the Parish. Meriel Talbot from Markbeech was the first director of the women's land army, an important new force set up to rescue Britain from impending famine. She had a notable



public career and was made a Dame for her war work.

Meanwhile, in Hever, Lord Astor's Eldest son John Jacob lost a leg at the battle of Cambrai and was awarded the Legion d'Honneur. When he inherited he worked to create jobs at the Castle for ex-servicemen. A good number of castle staff had gone to war and the payroll (one of the few documents which survived the floods in 1958 and 68) records, for example "Oddman" Henry Perham "taken out of the mud on the Somme" suffering from bronchial pneumonia". I don't know if he survived, I think he did.

One plaque in Hever church makes me especially sad when I think of him so far from home. Edward Divall died a prisoner of war in April 1916 aged 26 after being captured by the Ottoman Turks after the fall of Kut-El-Amara, 100 miles south of Baghdad. The siege lasted for five months and 30,000 British and Indian troops died in defending the garrison. The 13,000 who were captured were marched to a prison camp in Aleppo and many, including Edward, died along the way. His name is on the Basra memorial in the desert.

Details of all the more than 40 fallen of Hever and Four Elms can be found on the website www.kentfallen.com and they are remembered on the war memorials. In fact more have been found as research continues. We remember them especially, but I also think about the men who were badly wounded, the families left behind who could no longer pay the rent (the Astors had a big problem about what to do with the families left behind in tied cottages) - and of course the less glorious victims of the 1918 flu epidemic which killed more people globally than the war itself.

There is so much to learn and write about and I know I have just scratched the surface, but I hope you will find this and also the exhibitions and concert interesting.

## Ankles at dawn - suffrage and work

When researching the role of women in 1918 I realised that there was one uniting theme - ankles. A woman's ankles had been holding her back for years because a respectable woman should never, ever show them ....

Edwardian women wore long skirts. This severely curtailed activity and created a lot of work for their servants - in the days when even middle class households had at least one maid. Hems got dirty as the streets were muddy so skirts constantly needed to be cleaned. It is no exaggeration to say that the sartorial demands of middle and upper class women made servants indispensable and entrenched the pre war structure of society.

Their ankles also held women back in the legal profession - the press speculated that a judge would have his head turned by the sight of a pretty ankle and so it just wasn't safe, or fair on male lawyers to let a woman practice.

Vera Brittain, famous for her book "Testament of Youth" wrote that:

"At bridge drives and other forms of social diversion Mrs. Pankhurst and her "screaming sisterhood" formed suitable subjects for that vocal variety of witch-burning in which teaparties so very often indulge.

I remember being taken to those tea-parties, my feet clad in the stout low-heeled walking shoes of pre-war scholastic convention and my youthful ankles decorously concealed by the tight folds of a skirt just twice the length of the one I wear now. I listened to the sweeping indictments of "those awful suffragettes" - in a critical silence, which became more silent and more critical as the time approached for a battle royal with a recalcitrant family for permission to go to college."

But then in 1914 came war and a sudden need for women to take over the jobs of men. Vera Brittain, who had made it to Oxford, left university to become a nurse and our own Dame Meriel Talbot was appointed by the government to be the first director of the newly formed Women's land army. Its objective was to help Britain grow more food given the drastic cuts in American wheat and New Zealand lamb supplies.

The land army did not become effective until the end of the war and probably made little difference agriculturally but a byproduct was the liberation of women from the constraints of long skirts with their new uniform of twill breeches and gaiters. At last they were physically free to take on a wide range of tasks outside the home - and their maids were free to join up too. One, Annie Edwards, approached the wife of the village priest for a reference only to be told "Do you know what it involves? You'll be dressed as a man, and I object to that - it's a disgrace to show your ankles!"

Dame Meriel herself does not seem to have been much of a feminist (unlike her neighbour Lucy Streatfeild, the first female factory inspector) and was much occupied with advising that women should continue to behave decorously even when dressed as a man in smock and breeches but nonetheless she was a living example of a new "career woman".

By the end the war, women over 28 had the vote and the first women solicitors were allowed to practice (although it took another 91 years for Lady Hale to be appointed as the first female judge in the Supreme Court) ....... and hemlines went up! The famous flappers of the 1920s had it all before them.

## **World War 1 Exhibitions**

The Link villages are busy planning events to mark the end of the Great War. These exhibitions are some of them....

#### **There But Not There**

In 2014 Penshurst had a brilliant idea for commemorating their war dead. Visitors to the church walked in to find silent silhouettes sitting in the pews of the church, each named for a fallen soldier. The "There but not there" project has now been rolled out nationally under the leadership of Penshurst's Martin Barraud.

"The poppies at the Tower of London captured the start of the national WWI commemoration –There But Not There will be the abiding concluding image." Patron of There But Not There, General the Lord Dannatt GCB, CBE, MC, DL.

Ten silhouettes have come to Hever to mark our war dead, thanks to funding from the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust. Six have come to Markbeech as well. The fund makes awards to communities to enable them to come together to remember and to think about the Armed Forces Community today. The concert on 10 November will hopefully be an opportunity to do just that.

"Each one of the hundreds of thousands of white headstones in Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemeteries around the world reflect a gap left in a community or family somewhere else in the world. Those names that we pass daily, on local war memorials, or on rolls of honour on the walls of churches. railway stations and schools, were all someone's son, husband or father. This project is a brilliant reminder of the lives that were sacrificed for their countries, and the loss that was felt then, in places which are familiar to us all today. It is a great way to keep their stories alive." Victoria Wallace, Director General of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission

What is a Parish Council and what does it do? A parish council is an English civil local authority and the first tier of local government. There are 9.000 parish and town councils in England.

Hever Parish Council (Four Elms, Hever and Markbeech) is made up of 10 Councillors who live locally. They are voted into their posts by the electorate of the Parish, or co-opted, to form a Council which endeavours to make decisions in the interests of the local community. Councillors are not paid but volunteer their time to serve our villages.

The role of Clerk is to ensure that the Council as a whole conducts its business properly and to provide independent, objective and professional advice and support. The Clerk is employed (part time) and can be contacted on clerk@hever.org

Parish Council meetings are open to the public and the 'minutes' which record the business and decisions can be found on the Council's website. You can also read them on Facebook, www. hever.org or on the 4 noticeboards.

The Parish Council receives a 'Precept' (a calculation of money) from Sevenoaks District Council which SDC collects as part of your Council Tax and then transfers it to the parish / town council. With this money the Parish Council pays for many of the facilities that we enjoy as a community and for which it has responsibility. It may also choose to support local community groups / schemes with grants, so please apply if you are working with a good cause!

The Parish and Town councils in the county are often viewed as the part of government closest to the people. They are the only local government tier that represents residents at parish level. Similarly they advise the County and District authorities on the views of residents, and especially priorities for local investment.

District councils are responsible for local services including housing, local planning and refuse collection.

The County Council is responsible for strategic services such as highways, pathways, education, libraries, social services, strategic planning and refuse disposal. Landowners are responsible for maintaining Public Rights of Way that pass through their land.

All Parish Council meetings are open to the public. They are led by the Council's Chair and advised by a Clerk who is there to see that business is conducted within the law

You are always welcome to attend meetings – the next one is Wednesday 21st November 7.30pm Four Elms village hall.

Our children had a whizz-popping time celebrating Roald Dahl Day and classrooms were transformed to host Dahl-inspired activities. We encouraged them all to enter a poetry competition to win a golden ticket to the Roald Dahl museum.

Year 6 has been busy:

- it held its first debating club.
   Parents were invited to come to the presentations and we were all very impressed.
- The children are preparing for their trip to Seville and looking forward to experiencing this captivating city that conjures images of fanning senoritas, flamenco and sunny afternoons, helping to create enthusiastic learners and to develop positive attitudes to language learning

Year 2 had a special visitor and morphed into television journalists to find out more about a 'shady' character: The Dark. They used questions and statements and focussed on their punctuation to interview their visitor. For their Harvest celebration they created a play focussed on giving and thankfulness. They worked collaboratively to create their own harvest masterpiece.

Year 1 have been creating poetry based on the poem The Jellyfish by Michael Rosen and can now explain personification, metaphor and simile brilliantly. #### Country and gardening

## Exciting times lie ahead: there is a lot going on in November, not least the preparations for Christmas, particularly our Christmas Fair!

The garden is quiet, so are the trees, sleeping naked. Harvest is also gone and yet your garden may still have brassicas standing proud; swiss chard is colourful, slightly sweet, versatile and can be harvested all year round, as long as it hasn't decided to sprout and set seed. If this happens keep breaking the main stalk, otherwise it will be game over.

In November if colour fails to come to your garden, in Hever it will not fail to reach the sky. The dark nights will be illuminated with fireworks, which is always very exciting. But once all that is done and all excitement has past, no doubt the reality of winter will set in and our minds will turn to the last big event of 2018 – Christmas!

Decorations will surely get started in November. Christmas decorations are all about bringing nature inside our homes. In times gone by, the "greenery" would be found in those plants that keep their leaves through winter-time, such as mistletoe. Mistletoe is a hemi-parasitic plant; one reason to regard it as mysterious and magical. It would appear that the tree was still producing green leaves when it should be without any - the belief of the "sacred oak" – although very rarely does oak play host to mistletoe.

Mistletoe is a different host-dependent plant, believed to be a miraculous "parasite" that would not kill its host. Mistletoe does not kill because it takes water from the tree host but still produces its own carbohydrate from photosynthesis, and that is why its foliage is evergreen; thus the host survives.

Traditionally mistletoe was one of the most popular plants to bring inside as a Christmas decoration, a tradition possibly originating in Celtic pagan beliefs, from thousands of years ago. Druids used to climb a sacred oak that "miraculously" would keep bringing forth green leaves even during winter. The collected leaves would brew a drink, drunk to bring prosperity and fertility in the belief that bringing greenery indoors, would protect family and livestock, during the difficult winter months. The mistletoe tradition is far older than the Greek empire. So, there we are!

When our November celebrations and commemorations come to an end, our gardening jobs can wait, and our eyes will turn to Christmas: the Hever Christmas Fair, shopping to be done, cards to send, decorations to put up. Modern decorations may have changed, but we still aim to express our hope and happiness in this blessed season.






