

In memory of Mary Smith



Mary Smith, the much loved proprietor of Bradford's Household Store in Edenbridge High Street which closed a few years ago, sadly died in December. This is an extract from her son Stuart's eulogy at her funeral:

"Mum was born in 1947 in Four Elms. Her early years were spent with the family following her Dad, a Sergeant Major in the Royal Artillery, around various postings but they would always come back for Christmas and summer holidays. A few times they travelled down all theway from Edinburgh in a motorbike and sidecar, her father, my Grandad riding the bike with my Granny, Sheila, Mary and Pat the dog all in the sidecar!

After four years, they returned to Four Elms to stay and got a house in 1 Styles Cottages. Mum went to Four Elms Primary school and was a scorer for the cricket club next door. She was also an avid player of Stoolball (a cricket-like game for those of you not familiar) which she absolutely adored. It was whilst scoring a cricket game at the grand of age of 13, that she met my Dad.

When Dad decided to leave home and go to sea at 16, Mum decided (quite understandably) she didn't want to be stuck attached to a boy who was possibly gone for up to six months at a time, and so she dumped him and went out with other people. Unfortunately for her every time Dad was home on leave, he used to turnup to Gran and Grandad's and much to Mum's annoyance, because they liked him, she kept finding he was well.... there!

Eventually that tactic obviously worked though. After school Mum joined a local estate agents, Powell and Partners, a place she worked for the vast majority of her working life. After Dad left the sea and Helen and I came along, we lived in Edenbridge. We were aware that we didn't have a great deal of money as kids but it's only when you grow up that you appreciate some of the things Mum did – Mum took a job cleaning in the evenings.

After the Estate Agents closed, Mum didn't want to be idle and so took a job working in Bradfords Household Store. Some years after that she was made aware that Bradfords were looking to sell that shop which would have meant her and her good friends would be out of a job: her response, buy the business! Still keeping the Bradford's name, but wholly her business.

Looking back it takes some amazing guts to buy a small business with the risk that entails. Every now and again there'd be the odd difficult customer who would demand to see the manager; knowing Mum as I do, she'd love responding to this. Whether she actually went out the back to "get him" and then came back out, I don't know, I can certainly imagine her doing that.

In later years she was overjoyed to become a Nanny to Thomas and Daniel, and just a year ago a Granny to Ellie. She was in short an amazing Granny, whether it be making Victoria sponges with the boys or on the floor with Ellie encouraging her to crawl.

Mum was absolute resolute that she wanted to die at home. She hated hospitals and discharged herself more often than they let her out. When she had her first heart attack six years ago, the Consultant told her that she was stressing him out and that he kept looking out the window and expecting to see her sprinting across the car park!

I spoke to Mum the night before she died, she said she was feeling better and looking forward to Christmas shopping at the weekend. So as much as it's a shock for everyone,this is the way it had to be.

No pain, no suffering and absolutely no hospitals!

Hever Parish Council

Hever Parish Council (made up of 10 volunteer local Councillors) - next meeting is 20th March 7.30pm Four Elms village hall - do come along!

The planning committee has been studying Sevenoaks District Council's local plan (with proposals for a medical centre on the Four Elms road) and a last minute proposal by a landowner and agent for 450 houses between the Hartfield and Hever Roads. We have been working closely with Hever Residents Association on this. Our priority is to support, if at all possible. affordable homes for local people - we are considering sites across the parish with English Rural Housing Association. Many young residents tell us that they want to stay in the area but need a realistically sized and affordable property and those who wish to downsize also wish to stay locally and are desperate for 2 – 3 bedroomed homes. Watch this space!

The good news, is that the Council have agreed a proposed budget for 2019 -2020 which will see a REDUCTION in the parish council part of your Council Tax bill of ~7%. This is down to our careful spending and raising lots of grant money to help pay for the new playground at Four Elms. Have you been to see it yet? Do go, there is something for every age!

As the weather turns colder, please see www.kent.gov.uk/roads-and-travel/whatwe-look-after/winter-service to see the routes that are gritted and location of salt bins.

We are busy planning for Summer supporting the annual litter pick over Easter and working with Neverworld festival (Hever) to ensure that any disruption to locals is kept to a minimum. Perhaps you are a local musician, entertainer, builder or food producer or looking for some holiday work - do get in contact with them it would be great for the festival to support lots of local businesses. We have been assured that this will be the only festival on the site during the year.

Sevenoaks council news

Forty years ago precisely, Britain was in the grip of 'The Winter of Discontent'.

The image of rubbish piled high in Leicester Square is perhaps that which has become most associated with the period. There the waste remained for just under a month.

Fast forward to the present day and headlines are being made once again: "Monthly bin collections in Welsh county."

It is a rather indulgent comparison. The two, besides both being real examples, are unrelated bar one important detail – waste sitting uncollected for a month. Not a situation in which you or I would wish to find ourselves, particularly given it's reported families in the second have resorted to paying up to £450 a year for extra collections.

It is a laboured line but no less important: Sevenoaks District Council is the only authority in Kent which has maintained weekly rubbish and recycling collections. In no other part of the county, or much of the country, is everything collected every week.

I am proud to have been the councillor who has maintained and overseen this unique service these past three and a half years. But I am even more proud of the team who make it a reality, week in and week out. Having been out with the crews, I can attest to what hard work it is.

So, once collected, what happens to the waste? Less than two percent goes to landfill, meaning approximately ninety-eight percent is either recycled via Kent County Council or reused to produce energy.

That's a tremendous achievement, particularly as just five years ago the landfill rate stood at over twenty percent. But we still need to make further progress. Not only does taking care to minimise waste and recycle save the environment, the more 'green' the method of disposal the more it keeps pounds in the pocket, saving money for you and me, our friends and our neighbours.

Despite rarely featuring in careers advice, waste – or 'resource' in industry terms – is an exciting world in which fortunes are made and cutting-edge technology employed.

news from How Green Nursery

February can be a very uncertain month here at the nursery from a weather perspective. We've had years where the weather has been settled and spring-like kick starting the gardening season early. We've had other years where easterly winds have brought snow and ice, gardeners taking solace in the warmth of an open fire and a good seed catalogue! Either way we're busy preparing for the manic weeks ahead. The nursery is creaking at the seams with potted bulbs, perennials, grasses, herbs, alpines and now trees and shrubs, all waiting to burst into life with the onset of spring.

Throughout February we take delivery of bare root perennials, a laborious job as we have to pot them by hand and not through our high-tech potting machine. Thousands of summer annual seeds are sown for local authority bedding contracts and cuttings for patio plants are potted.

Over two acres of greenhouses and tunnels have their annual clean. An important job to get rid of algae and dirt thus increasing light levels to the plants within. 2019 will be the seventh year in a row that we have grown for the prestigious Chelsea Flower Show. The 'World Cup' of horticulture tests garden designer, ILandscaper and grower to the limit. It is imperative we supply the plants in peak condition for the garden to be in with a shout for a lucrative medal. A tough ask when

News from Falconhurst

Mid winter on the farm. not a snowflake in sight, and all is calm. The cows are housed day and night during the dark months, some prefer deep straw beds; others a firmer sandy one. They choose; not us. The sand is good for prevention of mastitis and is comfy to lie on (remember the beach) but not all cows agree. Milk production is good and steady. Our cows are a mix of good, all round grass loving animals - not so huge that they can hardly reach the ground - and are fed almost 100% natural, herby organic grass grown around Markbeech, the balance being a little organic cake to entice them into the parlour.

We have pedigree Friesians (they are the small black & white ones) and Jerseys, Norwegian Reds, an Ayrshire or two and Holstein Friesians (big and ugly black & white ones). There are decisions to be made about re-seeding fields in the spring; fields to be re-fenced; processing our own delicious milk and cheese making. We must look to a future where farmers will not be rewarded by simply owning land but rewarded for how they manage it. And that is good for us all.

In the office we are midst planning for the future: a new parlour for the cows (with viewing parlour for the public); new calf sheds for the young, and, of course, our much talked about Farm Shop at Falconhurst.

Building works cannot begin until any prospective bat families have finished with the building, but then it will be full steam ahead and we will look forward to selling you the most delicious produce we can source. Watch this space for a grand opening date!




