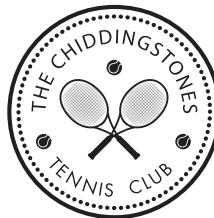

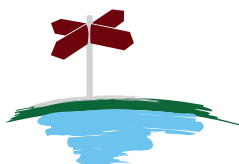

Local council elections - your chance to become a Parish councillor!

Sevenoaks District Council will be holding elections in May 2019. Hever Parish Council is also planning elections if seats on the council are contested. Would you like to get involved as a local Councillor?

We are encouraging residents who are passionate about their community - Four Elms, Hever and Markbeech - to stand for election. If you care about where you live and about your community you could make an excellent local councillor. No previous experience or specialist knowledge is required, just an interest in your local area, a desire to make a positive change and enough time. For example, at the last Parish Council meeting, the following decisions were made:

(1) To work with other groups to comment on a new planning application for 300 - 400 homes between Hever and Hartfield road.

(2) The budget for 2019 - 2020 was agreed. There will be a small REDUCTION in the HPC part of household council tax (by 7.4%) - thanks to careful spending & successfully obtaining grants for the Four Elms playground we were able to cut our spending slightly.

(3) The Council will work with English Rural Housing Association to identify any local affordable housing needs. There will be a parish wide housing needs survey coming to you soon... please do complete it. There have been several housing questionnaires recently but this one could enable the building

of affordable housing strictly reserved for local people - both those with families and those who are looking for somewhere smaller and easier to manage.

Hever Parish Council meets 6 times a year, usually at 7.30pm and meetings last approximately 2 hours. You would also get involved in particular projects that interest you, for example, planning or highways issues or improving our open spaces.

Getting elected

To stand for election to a local council you must:

- Be a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member State of the European Union (we don't know the situation post Brexit!!)
- Be at least 18 years old
- Be an elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months lived or worked in the parish or lived within three miles of the boundary.

If you would like further information please do contact me and/or **come along to the next council meeting on Tuesday 15 January at 7.30 in Markbeech Village Hall** to meet the councillors and see what we do. All members of the public are always welcome to attend.

Your district councillor Matthew Dickins provides some wise advice on how to apply for planning permission

The New Year has traditionally been a favourite time for people to place their home on the market and for house-hunters to renew their search for that perfect property. However instead of moving, many choose to apply for permission to enlarge, alter or completely rebuild.

Whilst in some places much can be done without planning consent, it's no surprise that many of those rights don't exist in a District which is 93% Green Belt – 100% in our villages – and 60% Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Those constraints, which are in no small part responsible for preserving the special character of our area, mean that one requires permission for most alterations – thus contributing to Sevenoaks District Council's Planning Department being the busiest in Kent, processing over two thousand applications a year.

I know it may not always seem it but the District Council approves the smallest proportion of applications in the county and has an enviable quality of decision making, as borne out in the high rate of decisions upheld at appeal.

Therefore the prospect of securing that much desired planning permission may seem pretty slim, and for those who find their dream scheme being turned down I know what a disappointment that can be, so I want to set out my number one piece of advice – and that is to seek advice.

First, contact the District Council for pre-application advice, even if your proposal has yet to be fully formed. The Council will be able to advise what restrictions are in place and what policies could affect your plans.

Seek the opinion of a professional too. Anyone may call themselves a planning consultant so obtain references and shop around as few have an intimate knowledge of our patch and the relevant protections. The best will provide frank advice, even if it is to their commercial detriment.

Take soundings from your neighbours. They will have an opportunity to make representations once you've applied, so ironing out issues beforehand is not just a matter of courtesy but can minimise objections. The same goes for the Parish Council they are consulted by the District Council.

These simple steps might seem obvious but they are all too often overlooked. So – if you have some home improvement in mind for 2019, investing that little time and money at the outset could save you a lot later on.

I have been asked to provide some seasonal gardening tips, a daunting task given the level of knowledge among gardeners in the area, so I have resorted to cribbing from the Royal Horticultural Society website. One suggestion is to make your own winter feed for garden birds. Our bird feeders are getting depleted very quickly, so I am making my own bird food 'balls', based on the RHS recipe. Gently melt some vegetable suet or lard in a pan and add a selection of bird seed, breadcrumbs, chopped peanuts and dried fruit. You need just enough suet to bind the mixture together. When it cools a little, spoon the mixture into containers. I am using 2" plastic flower pots, with string looped through the top and one of the bottom holes before the mixture is added, so that they hang horizontally. So far they have been pretty popular with our regular visitors; blue and marsh (willow?) tits, robins and nuthatches, among others.

A couple of other jobs (if not already done) are winter pruning of apple and pear trees and inspect Dahlia, Begonia and Canna tubers for rot or drying out, weather permitting, of course!

life on the farm

Antony Penman was born in Sydenham in 1919 and at the age of 16 left home to start as an apprentice farm hand at Squerryes Farm Westerham and then Scords Farm Toys Hill. He farmed Oak House Farm, Mapleton Road, Four Elms from 1938 until 1989. He and his wife Barbara then retired to How Green. Ant died in 2015. Richard Bennett worked with Ant on the farm from 1961 until 1989 and here he remembers life on the farm.

I was born in 1946 in White Post Cottage on the corner of Mapleton Road and Pootings Road, just down from Ant's farm. I had been around the farm from about the age of 8 with my brother who was five years older than me and Ant allowed us a great deal of freedom with the animals and let us drive the tractor across the fields which we loved.

When I was about to leave school aged 15 my dad asked me how I was planning to make a living and I said I thought I would work for Ant. On discovering that I hadn't mentioned this to Ant, Dad took me to see him to broach the subject. Ant said he had rather assumed that was what I was planning and that was why he had extended the dairy herd to provide enough income to pay me. Typical Ant, the most thoughtful of men. My starting pay in 1961 was £4 7s 6d for 40 hours a week plus 3/6 per hour overtime. Milking was my job once Eddie Mitchell retired. He had milked all his life, even as a POW in Germany! Milking was hard work, we produced about 150 gallons a day so that was 15 heavy churns to roll in and out of the parlour, all of which then needed cooling when they were full to reduce the heat of the milk. We did this using masses of water and it was a great saving of energy and water when the bulk tank arrived. That was refrigerated and held 300 gallons. A great innovation!

Officially there was only Ant and me so I helped out with everything although Barbara would muck in with any task bar the milking, she felt he had to draw the line somewhere! When Mrs Flint retired from farming at Holmwood Farm Ant bought some sheep which initially caused no end of trouble. Ant hadn't realised that sheep can't be confined with just a line of barbed wire like cattle. They were escape artists and in the early days we spent a lot of time retrieving them from neighbouring farms!

My Dad's health was poor and he only earned £8 per week in the 1970s. Mum used to clean three houses a day to try to make ends meet. Ant would often visit with a box of groceries to help us out. When Dad died Ant realised that Mum and I were in difficulty and offered us Eddie's old cottage on the farm. He even moved all our belongings with the tractor and trailer. So we lived on the farm from 1972 until 1989 when Ant packed up farming for good. Ant's kindness extended to his neighbours as

well. In the very hard winter of 1962/3 the milk lorry couldn't get to us or up the hill to Chartwell Farm where there was a big herd of Jersey cows, so every day for months Ant would go up the hill in his unheated tractor to collect their milk and put out their churns, with ours, on Pootings Road in the hope that the lorry could collect. The collection was vital as we didn't hold a stock of churns so we depended on the return of the empty ones to store the next lot of milk. When he wasn't out in the tractor Ant could be seen with his blow torch in hand, trying hard to keep the water flowing to the drinkers in the barn where all the cattle were housed.

I remember another bad winter when Ant was lambing at Holmwood. I was just finishing off the milking when it started to snow heavily. Ant came rushing to get me as there was suddenly so much snow on the ground that he was losing sight of the lambs in the whiteout and he needed help to dig them out and save them.

Thinking of Chartwell, one day we were summoned as Ant's cattle had strayed to the ornamental lake. Off we went with stakes and wire to make good the breach in the fence and round up the herd and I even caught a glimpse of Sir Winston painting in his garden. On another occasion we were up there with a tractor which had dodgy brakes. It set off alone into the lake! Ant calmly got in and backed the tractor out of the water.

As well as calm he also had patience. He used to use a shandy barrow, an early hand operated seed broadcasting device which you wheeled up and down the field to distribute seed. Ant could sow a 10 acre field in a day. He would place a metal stake at the field edge and walk towards it to keep the distribution even. I remember going off to choir practice with my brother one summer evening while Ant was at



work with the barrow and when we came back he was still at it, in the semi darkness. At his request we stood with our bicycle lamps to help guide him as the rods were no longer visible.

We made about 10,000 bales of hay on the farm and the fields that Ant rented but we also needed straw for our animals so we would go bailing in neighbouring farms like Emmetts and Holmwood. The farmer would keep the grain and we bought the straw at a reduced rate. We'd pitchfork the bails onto the trailer and bring 100 home at a time.

Sometimes Ant grew oats which we would harvest with a binder and then stack until it was dry and ready for Jenkin Lewis from Swan Lane Farm to visit with his thresher. The sheaves were fed into the thresher and the grain would come through a chute and into one hundredweight sacks. No wonder Ant had a bad back in old age as he'd carry those sacks on his back up the steps to the granary.

They were good days and I will never forget Ant and his kindness.

“From the 20th October 2018 we moved all our production to the first plastic-free, unbleached and non GM (genetically modified) tea bags and we won't be going back!”

Clipper and also Duchy are leaders in the field but it turns out that many of the big names have been developing plastic-free alternatives over the last 12 months and that PG Tips is not far behind - you can track progress by other brands on Google. So this is good news and the future for our Rosy Lee and it's life as compost is indeed, and literally, rosy!

The Drake Oil Syndicate

Winter's here.....keep warm with Drake.....help your community.... Our three Churches benefit each year with a donation from Drake of some £500 plus towards their running costs. Our syndicate members enjoy excellent prices on their home heating costs.

What's Not To Like...So What Is Drake?

Some years ago my neighbour Campbell Simm had the idea of joining with a group of local friends to achieve better buying prices for domestic heating oil while at the same time negotiating a charity discount from the supplier which would provide funds to help support the local Edenbridge EHAS children's scheme together with our local churches.

Today the club has approximately 700 members and generates a charity pot of some £10,000 to £12,000 each year. At the moment I am captain of the ship.

Each quarter I check with a number of local oil suppliers and then agree with Certas energy that a supply price for the syndicate will be as close as possible to the second lowest price I can find. Syndicate members are then notified of this price and have to decide [without any obligation] whether they want a delivery on these terms. The deliveries take place over the next 2 weeks and Certas then credit the charity account with half pence per litre delivered.

At the end of the year the charity funds are then distributed with just under half going to Edenbridge charities and the rest split among the local churches with the amount determined by the number of members in each parish.

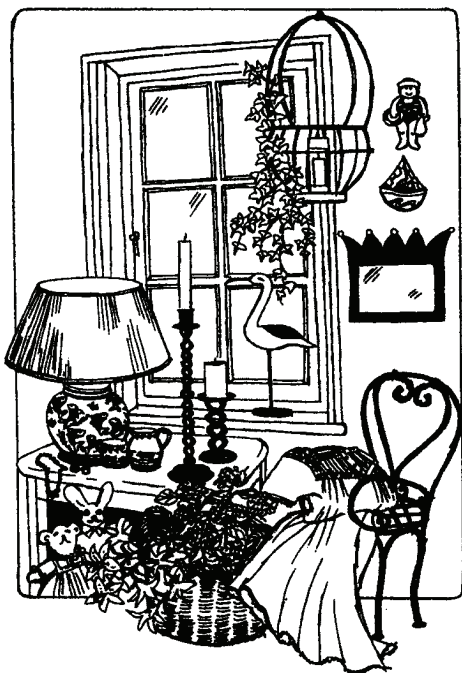

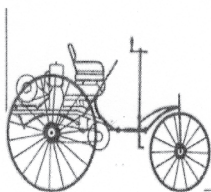
