# Jane goes hopping!

Joan Varley, who is curating the forthcoming exhibition on 'Hopping' at the Eden Valley Museum, invited me to join her for a day of hop picking at Chantlers Hop Garden, Larkins Farm, Chiddingstone last year. I was delighted to accept the offer as I always relish a day in the open air doing something useful.

I used to live in London but spent many happy childhood Easter and Summer holidays on a farm in North Wales, during stays with my grandparents, where I dipped sheep, carried hay, sledged bracken off the hillside with horses and learnt to shear sheep by hand. I also enjoyed the old tradition of all the farmers in the valley going out to help their neighbours on big occasions like shearing and harvest and helping to carry the picnics to them in the sheds or fields. These were social events, fun and interesting, and now romantic memories.

So, on a bright but breezy day last September I looked forward to this

opportunity to experience an element of harvest time that I knew nothing about and with my camera in my pocket and the apron and gloves we were advised to bring, I felt correctly kitted out for the day ahead. I was not disappointed.

When we arrived, there were already many local people busy picking the hops into the 'Bins' or 'Cribs' so it was lovely to meet people I already knew and to find out that some of them had been volunteering for this harvest for many years. I also learnt about the 'green' harvest. This is the hand-picked hops that are brewed on the day they are picked to make Larkins 'Green Hop Best' beer. I loved the smell of the fresh hops which is surprisingly strong and discovered how they stain your hands! Bob Dockerty arrived with tea and biscuits at 11 am - there is nothing better than the tea break in the field even if the bits of plant flying around do get in your mug!

Bob Dockerty waited with the poke (sack), whilst the 'measurer' fills the bushel basket from the bin.

Traditionally pickers were paid 'by the bushel'. The chatter around the 'Hop bin' was enjoyable, not something you can enjoy stuck all alone on a tractor with a noisy machine bumping its way around a field for hours on end! No wonder the Londoners looked forward to their hop picking holidays. I'm tempted to suggest that reinventing this method of harvesting might benefit

quite a lot of them now because I came away from my harvest experience in the fields feeling invigorated, happy and fulfilled - and I had only been there for a morning!

Joan and I returned the next day, but down at the shed with the harvesting machine clattering away all morning. I had

volunteered to try my hand at filming the whole procedure for her to include in the exhibition. So, with my new, rather small, camera on video for the first time and with a last minute story board in my head - no lighting camera man, no director, no actors - I couldn't ask anyone to do anything twice because I didn't get the right shot - off I went, walking very slowly, filming every aspect of the whole procedure.

A big thank you to Bob Dockerty and all the participants for letting me record them.

### Peter Mendelssohn

The family would like to thank all who have sent flowers, letters, cards and messages all of which are so much appreciated and to extend their thanks to Wendy, Charles and the choir, Elly, Andrew and Jane for their contribution to what we felt to be a memorable and moving service.

### Tributes and memories of Peter Mendelssohn.

Peter was born and lived in London, spending some time in Bognor during the war, son of Clive, a stockbroker, then in the army, and Olive, and younger brother of John; he went to St Peter's School in Seaford and then on to Wellington after which he took articles with Barton Mayhew when he was top (of the country) in both the intermediate and final parts of his accountancy exams.

He then did his National Service, in the Tactical Airforce in West Germany where he was posted to the finance department, which he reportedly completely overhauled, and the Isle of Man. While in Germany he owned a new, convertible sports car the first of several much loved cars including a favourite Lancia.

He married his first wife, Jackie, in 1960 and they moved to Oxted during which time his three daughters were born; Gaie and Nicola recall happy family holidays which often included walking, an activity he enjoyed for much of his life.

Peter had a distinguished career in chartered accountancy becoming, as his former colleague Joss Nangle recalls, the youngest person at the age of 26 to be admitted to the partnership in the firm's history, before or since.


Peter served as the partner in charge of several significant clients including the Howard de Walden property interests, PA Management Consultants and AGB Research.

He was heavily involved in the 1971 merger with Turquand Youngs and in the late '70s with other firms, leading to the formation of Ernst and Whinney and then, on merging with Arthur Young, to the firm of Ernst and Young.

In Peter's day there was no in-house legal group, fully staffed compliance department or risk management group – these functions – in 1990 - being covered by Peter as a one man band; before he retired a lawyer, with whom he worked closely, was employed.

Peter and Penny married in 1984 on Grand National Day and came to live in Hever; they had a ready made family - three of Peter's daughters and two of Penny's - and thus started a long and happy family life with four grandchildren eventually coming along - none male! They all have most affectionate and happy memories of Peter as a generous, in all senses of the word, loving and beloved father, stepfather and grandfather epitomized by a quote from one of his stepdaughters: "I will never forget and always hold dearly the memory of Peter's kindness and generosity in wholeheartedly embracing his stepdaughters and granddaughters as part of the family" and from a granddaughter "He was a brilliant grandfather and I always looked forward to staying with him and Granny - he had endless patience and made me feel loved."

Peter retired in 1998 but continued to use his professional skills making a valuable contribution to a number of local charities and organisations. These included the Scotts Project Trust, where he was a trustee and treasurer, Hever PCC and later the Benefice, and with Abbeyfield and EVTS for which



he was both trustee and treasurer. Jill Scott described him as having a great understanding of both residents and students, of chairing the Staff Committee meetings kindly but firmly, being instrumental in the running of the project's residential care home, the inception of the Day centre and with the start up of two Supported Living Houses.

Roy Cunington, chair of the Abbeyfield Trust remembers that "Peter always

knew exactly what had to be done in any situation" and Bridget Harris, coordinator of the Transport Service describes him as bringing City standards to a country town.

Despite declining health Peter was able to spend his last years happily at home with much care from Penny (and their helper Sharon) with the daughters generously helping out. He continued to enjoy life with bridge an important part; he was in a men's four (as well as others) and a highlight was when it was Paul Aronow's turn to give him a lift – in his Porsche! It seems that on getting in Peter would relax, smile and suggest to Paul that they go to Brighton!

As Joss Nangle, who was articled to him as he (Peter) had been to his father says "I am sure that I do not speak only for myself when I say that I am thankful to have known him and proud to have been able to call him my friend" and, from a bridge partner "Indeed he never seemed to lose the happy knack of providing more than his fair share of aces for his partner. This was very appropriate; in a pack of people Peter was the ace".

Peter was a beloved and loved husband, father, stepfather and grandfather to Penny, Gaie, Nicola, Anna, Frances, Diny, Annie, Natalie, Niamh and Ella; his presence will be missed by many but still remain in their hearts.



### **Rachel Dixon**

Rachel was born in southern India, in the hill station Kodai Kanal where her father Rupert Penn was a teacher and clergyman. She had two brothers, Michael and Barry with whom she shared adventures – escaping from cobra snakes to buffalo.

The family returned to England to be closer to the children's schools, and younger sister Gill was born. They moved to Surrey just in time for the war to start. The Battle of Britain was acted out overhead and more than a few smoking wrecks of Messerschmitts and Dorniers were to be inspected by the boys. One of these was at nearby Gincox farm, owned then by the Dixons. Harold Dixon (later to become her father-in-law) and Rupert were

ARP wardens together. Rachel bicycled everywhere, a favourite route would be to Prettymans to visit best friend Margaret, who some years later married Barry. A V1 bomb landed close to their garden at Beech Cottage, causing the roof to lift off the walls. By a miracle, however, the said roof landed exactly where it had been before, only trapping bedroom curtains between the timbers. Rachel was subsequently evacuated with Gill in hand.

Rachel was an exceptional scholar, excelling at languages and finishing her schooling with a scholarship at Cheltenham Ladies College and a place



at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford. Best friend at Cheltenham was a Canadian, Rosemary Bridgman, who then went on to marry Uncle Michael. You're seeing a pattern here of her finding very suitable partners for her brothers.

Rachel's first job after leaving Oxford was as a modern languages teacher at West Heath, in Sevenoaks. Gill was a student there and enjoyed challenging her big sister in French lessons. Adventure beckoned, however, and Rachel moved to Canada to base herself with Michael and Rosemary. She taught French between skiing, hiking and all the other delights Vancouver Island provided.

Back home in England, she started a job a Barclays in the City doing economic research for the Dominions, Colonies and Overseas department. At an Oxted dance she met Nick, a dashing ex RAF fighter pilot. A winning raffle ticket number was called. Both had the same number so eagerly went forward. However, it was Rachel who had the right colour, not Nick. Rachel won the prize, but Nick won Rachel.

Nick's work took him around the country and in later years, around the world. Ed was born in Preston, but David arrived while they were living here in Four Elms. A short interlude followed in East Farndon, Northamptonshire where Rachel ran a boarding dog kennels.

They returned south to Toys Hill. Claire was born there soon after in Tile Cottage, with help from Dr Andrew Russell. Dr Russell worked hard in later years to reduce the impact of Rachel's replacement hip surgery.

After a break to have the three children. Rachel returned to the classroom, here at Four Elms. She worked part time, supporting children with their reading. There must still be people in this parish whose first steps with books were guided by Rachel. She remained connected to Four Elms School bevond retirement age, becoming a longstanding Chair of Governors. She was an active member of the Mother's Union and for decades helped run the Four Elms Fete. Started by her father, the fete has ever since been raising funds for St Paul's and the school. Rachel was on the committee,

collected bottles for the bottle stall raffle and carried the basket with Miss Mays' beautifully dressed dolls, asking you to guess their names. How many have taken part and won some of those prizes?

Rachel was a talented musician. At Oxford she played for her college, and she continued to play the church organ at St Paul's for many years. The annual Christmas Carol Singing around the village was organised by Rachel for decades, while her legs were still strong enough to ascend and descend the gradients to the front doors of Toys Hill neighbours.

At home Rachel found busy relaxation working the hillside garden. The vegetable patch always had priority; being part of the war-time generation, growing her own fruit and vegetables was a natural expectation. Rachel loved the views from Tile Cottage out over the Weald of Kent, taking in the subtleties of the weather and the ever-changing colours and activities of the seasons. A love of animals also remained a focus through her life. From wartime rides through this parish, to visits by Claire's Labradors in the last months of her life. she loved the companionship of her four-legged friends.

Rachel passed through her last years with her characteristic stoic, uncomplaining patience. To the end there was a smile and a greeting for everyone who was looking after her. The family would like to thank all the friends and neighbours who have sent kind words following their bereavement. They have been a great comfort.


The football club held a Football presentation day to raise money for the team. There were parents v kids matches, cakes, BBQ, music and awards for the players.

As John wrote in the introduction to last month's Link, I was re-elected as the District Councillor for Cowden and our three villages.

It has been an immense privilege to have carried out this role for the past four years, and it is a great honour to have been returned once again. I will continue to do my utmost to serve you and our community.

I've always said we're incredibly lucky here. Enjoying beautiful countryside, good facilities and active village life, there's certainly lots to preserve. Change can, though, be a good thing. But it can also bring with it challenges and it is those with which much of the more out of sight work of councillors at all levels is concerned.

For example, there are proposals to create a national standardised bin collection which could see you and me paying more, the introduction of complicated collection calendars, and an end to our simple two sacks every week approach - needless to say, I'm fighting that! Similarly, the introduction of burdensome new rules for doggy day care establishments last year has seen the closure of some well-liked. convenient and affordable providers. Reform of the planning rules too invariably casts a shadow over our landscapes and relations with neighbours.

All three of these, and more, see the District Council, and I as your representative on it, having to reconcile the steady trickle of new laws, rules and regulation with what is best for our community. Always these are well-intentioned (seeking to improve recycling, animal welfare and the affordability of housing, in those cases) but the reality seems never to quite match the vision.

That is why the most useful element of my work is hearing from you, so I know what really is working, and what isn't. John along with the rest of our Parish Councillors, Peter as our County Councillor and Tom as our MP, and I work as a team. Sometimes we can't help but sometimes we, or someone we know, can. And in either case your feedback informs decisions locally and nationally, which helps defend and improve our corner of Kent.

So thank you once again for all the support you have kindly shown and do please continue to let me know where things could do with improvement and, of course, where things seem about right.

### news from How Green Nursery

With the madness of Chelsea out of the way for another year (as we go to press, we have just loaded and delivered our plants to the 'Donkeys Matter' artisan garden!), we look forward to hopefully a good summer weather wise! June here on the nursery is a cracking month with the majority of our herbaceous perennial stocks bursting into life.

Here at How Green we specialise in new herbaceous introductions. Plant breeding has come on in leaps and bounds in recent years. There are some cracking new introductions. Here are some of the ones we offer.

**Salvia Amethyst Lips** – a new variety similar to Hot Lips but with a purple and white bicolour flower

Nepeta Purrisian Blue – lovely compact habit that doesn't flop with strong dark flower stems

**Delphinium New Millenium series** – a range of Delphiniums with very strong stems that do not need staking!

**Lupin Westcountry Hybrids** – a range of cutting raised Lupins, strong in habit/ flowering and seen at Chelsea the last couple of years

**Astrantia Sparkling Stars** – fantastic large flowered variety with sparkly stamens!

**Eryngium Big Blue** – as the name suggests, fantastic large flowers held on sturdy stems

**Geranium Lilac Ice** – new lilac flowered Rozanne

Persicaria Chocolate Dragon – fantastic hardy foliage plant

What interests us the most as commercial growers are the new plants that are breed with disease resistance. Firstly we do not want to be using chemicals to treat a problem for the environment's sake and for the bee and insect populations. Spraying can also be a costly procedure. A prime example of this is a new range of Monarda (Bee balm). The old varieties can suffer terribly from mildew, but the new range are mildew resistant. The plants themselves don't look much different than what's come before them, but they withstood a long hot summer last year, ideal conditions for mildew.

Plant habit can also be improved by plant breeders. Another great example is Geranium Azure Rush. They have taken the RHS plant of the century, Geranium Rozanne and made it more compact! Geranium Rozanne can get a bit scrawny in a border and not suited to a small garden environment. Geranium Azure Rush still has the lovely big sky blue flowers that flower for months, but with a lovely mound forming habit.

From a novelty prospective Salvia Amethyst Lips is flying out at the moment! Launching at Chelsea this year, it is very similar to Hot Lips, but with a purple and white flower. Great long flowering hardy perennial – good in containers as well as the ground.

Come and see for yourself some of the new plants we have to offer at our next public open weekend June 8th & 9th!






