Welcome to the October Link

Welcome to the October Link. September was a busy month with Hever sprouting scarecrows everywhere (winners to be announced at the Residents Association's Scarecrow party on 29th) and the church Barn Dance stripping the willow late into the night. October sees the Halloween party and the Film Club begins on 1 November. Poppy is this month's pet of the month but Simon, our donkey Mr Tumble's new best friend, will be making an appearance soon.

The fruitfulness of the season brings out the apple recipe in me. This one is good for a pudding as well as a cake. For a 2lb loaf don't fill the cups and tablespoons more than about 3/4 full:

Stir and set aside: 4 cups sliced apples (Bramley or similarly tart), 5 tablespoons demerara sugar, 3 tablespoons cinnamon. Make a batter by combining 4 eggs, one cup sunflower oil, 1/4 cup orange juice, 1 tablespoon vanilla extract. Then stir in 2 cups caster sugar, 3 cups SR flour and 3 teaspoons of baking powder.

Pour 1/3 batter into a greased tin, layer in 1/2 the apples, 1/3 batter, 1/2 apples and finish off with the remaining batter. Bake for about 1 hr 15 at about 180 degrees.

Finally, don't forget the Link distributors' tea party in Hever Church on 13 October at 4pm. New supporters or interested subscribers are also very welcome.

profile: Gustavus Meade-Waldo

-the famous Hever ornithologist

The Meade-Waldo family owned Hever Castle from 1841 until it was bought by the Astors at the end of the century. Edmund Wakefield Meade-Waldo inherited the Castle in 1841 but had no love for Hever. He lived in the north of England until buying and restoring Stonewall Park, three miles from the Castle.

Hever became a working farm, being leased out to a series of tenant farmers. His grandson, Edmund Gustavus Bloomfield Meade-Waldo, who was born in 1855, became a famous ornithologist and conservationist.

Meade-Waldo was educated at Eton College (where his room was a menagerie of wild animals), and Magdalene College, Cambridge. He then spent his life managing the family's Stonewall Estate, as a Justice of the Peace for Kent and following his passion for ornithology (where would science be without rich self-funded men?).

He conducted fieldwork and collected birds in the Atlas Mountains of Morocco, the Canary Islands and Spain, the presumably-extinct Canary Islands oystercatcher *Haematopus meadewaldoi* being foremost among them. He was Vice-President of the British Ornithologists' Union in

1923 and was an active member of the Zoological Society of London, the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, the Society for the Protection of the Fauna of the Empire and the Society for the Establishment of Nature Reserves.

He is credited with the successful introduction of little owls to Kent, introducing 40 breeding birds to



Stonewall in 1879. They are now a common and unendangered species across the whole of Northern Europe. The British Ornithologists' Union comments that it was introduced from North Africa "by rich landowners who thought that the species would be a useful addition to our native avifauna". Fortunately they were right in that it seems to have filled a vacant niche and has not had a negative effect on native species.

Meade-Waldo's discovery of sandgrouse chick rearing behaviour in 1896 was for a long time discredited as fantasy. His acute observations noted male sandgrouse deliberately soaking their breast feathers in water and thus bringing water to his chicks in the nest. Sixty years later he was proved right.

and moved its head and neck from side to side in a peculiar manner". This sea serpent incident became famous and was not readily dismissed by sceptics because the observers were all prominent scientists.

Gustavus died in 1934 and is buried in Hever churchyard along with his wife Ada, a Commissioner in the Girl



In 1905 he accompanied the scientist James Lindsay, 26th Earl of Crawford and the naturalist Michael John Nicoll on their third voyage on Lindsay's yacht the Valhalla. Cruising off the Florida coast the men spotted a "large fin, or frill, sticking out of the water six feet in length" and then "A great neck rose out of the water in front of the frill

Guides Association. He is probably best known for his efforts to preserve the red kite in Wales – how proud he would be that once more there are red kites in the skies over Stonewall Park.

what I do

Paul Byrne and Jean Reader Eden Valley Museum House Manager and Deputy Manager

The roles of House Manager and Deputy are largely administrative to ensure the Museum can function. They are varied and very interesting roles which is lucky because whilst the planned working hours are 16 per week we find many more hours are taken up by the 'unofficial' tasks.

As with most volunteer-based organisations the roles also, unofficially, involve filling gaps where there is no volunteer available to help. Most important is managing the volunteer rota to ensure that we stay open. With a minimum of two stewards per shift we need to cover between 72 and 90 hours per month. We have a solid base of regular volunteers, some providing up to 10 hours a month but we don't have enough to fill all the slots, so we are proud that we have only closed the Museum once in the last year. We hold an annual coffee and cake morning for volunteers to show our gratitude as without them the community would not have a Museum.

Membership administration is next highest on the list. The museum currently has 229 members made up of family, individual and corporate. The annual membership fees are an important stream of revenue and chasing payments and ensuring

details are updated, gift aid claimed and membership data kept secure can take up significant time.

It is very busy behind the scenes at the Museum, with rare quiet moments. There are always projects underway for the next year's exhibitions, suppliers to handle, logistics to plan, posters and leaflets to distribute and DIY to do.

Although we are generously supported by local organisations, every year we have to find significant funds through our own fundraising. We do this via various events such as expert talks, out-reach sessions and approaching local and national organisations for donations and grants, without it we could not keep open, let alone run our wide ranging and varied exhibitions.

We produce the Museum newsletter for our members twice a year which during production provides a time of reflection on just what a busy year we have had.

By the time January comes around all in the Museum get a chance to relax as we close from around December 21st to the first Wednesday in February.

The museum, which covers the whole of the Eden Valley and is well worth a visit, is at 72 High Street, Edenbridge (www.evmt.org.uk)

Hever Parish Council

Hever Parish Council is in the process of setting its plans and budget for 2020 – 2021. We want to hear your views!

What is a parish council?

A Parish Council will always attempt to make balanced, informed decisions, where it has statutory powers and duties to act, based on the differing needs of the whole community. Town and Parish Councils have a range of responsibilities including:

- representing local community interests, for example by commenting on planning applications
- supporting local organisations and activities, for example with grants
- providing amenities such as allotments, bus shelters
- control of litter, recreational grounds and playing fields and children's play areas
- looking after green spaces

Parish Councils have the power to raise money through taxation (the precept). The precept is the Parish Council's share of the Council Tax, which is collected by the District Council on their behalf. A Parish Council must hold at least four meetings a year, are an essential part of the structure of local democracy and have a vital role in acting on behalf of the communities they represent.

In addition to our regular work and costs of parish life – emptying dog bins, looking after green spaces, considering and responding to

planning and licensing applications (an increasing number of these), planning enforcement, flytipping – we also take much care in responding to consultations on everything from Gatwick to recycling, rural bus services to open spaces to medical centres, District and neighbouring Local Plans, all of which will impact on us as residents. We work with community and residents groups and continue to work with KCC Highways on any and every improvement that can realistically be made in the parish. We have been proud to also support local groups with grants and support the local film club, fund free family fun days over the Summer, bulk refuse collections, local litter picks (thanks to all the volunteers) and local Christmas events.

We depend on and appreciate local interest and input into the issues that the Council should be focusing on, we exist to serve the residents, that's you! Please continue to tell us what concerns you and what you think our priorities should be for 2020...email me, Charlotte Cole, the clerk (clerk@hever.org), come to a meeting or speak to your local councillor (see the website for a list of who we are). The dates of all our meetings are on the website hever.org, Facebook and the four noticeboards (at Hever station, the Hever parish field, Markbeech bus shelter and the Four Elms bus shelter). The next meeting is Thursday 21st November 7.30pm at Hever village hall. See www.hever.org for the Agenda.

The icing on the cake (quite literally) was a decorating masterclass held in school by a professional cake designer, teaching the children how to ice and decorate cakes.

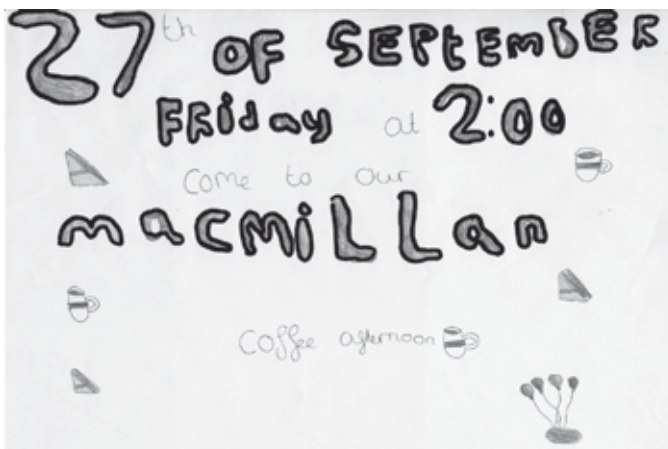

‘Teach Yourself Farsi’, a couple of Agatha Christies and a travelogue. What do they have in common? They’ve replaced the hitherto staple of my commute: The Today Programme. Stale tales of Brexit have been replaced with murder mysteries and thoughts of foreign climes. It’s made the drive much more jolly!

Perhaps – unwilling as I am to subscribe to Audible, and not yet entirely sold on podcasts – audio books had just passed me by. Read on, though, if you have yet to give them a go.

This month’s column had been going to be dedicated to something else entirely. That was until the other day when on the radio a lady spoke of free audio books from the library. Within minutes I’d downloaded my first whodunit!

Libraries undoubtedly present remarkable opportunities for learning. However there are downsides too: travel; opening hours; stock availability; and those plastic covers which merely reinforce one’s fears about the two pages stuck together a third of the way through.

Public libraries both in the UK and abroad have been undergoing something of an identity crisis for a couple of decades. Various

innovations have been tried to better meet the needs and expectations of their constituency. Incorporating coffee shops, community spaces and start-up hubs to name a few. But no one model has stood out.

What it transpires has taken off have been loans of works on e-readers, like a Kindle, and audio books. Both readily accessible from the comfort of one’s home by downloading an app called Libby onto your Apple, Android or Windows device. Magazines and newspapers are also available for free with another app.

As you’ll have seen, in this column I try to shy away from topics outside my remit. As your District Councillor, writing about libraries, a County Council function, is akin to a fireman holding forth about the ambulance service. Nonetheless, this free and convenient resource seemed worthy of promotion and praise.

Susie and I have enjoyed our time with you since May hugely and your welcome has been tremendous – thank you so much! We live in uncertain times. Politically, we watch and wonder at what is going on; locally, there is uncertainty surrounding the future of rural parishes in the Deanery – the report I have been writing will hopefully contribute positively to this.

I've interviewed about fifty people and had numerous ad hoc conversations. It's been wonderful how positively and kindly you've worked with me. We continue to welcome all who wish to enter our beautiful Church and while "things" may have been stolen the heart of the Church is in good repair. We remain a place for all, for worship, for quiet private contemplation and to enjoy the craftsmanship of the late Victorian Arts and Crafts period.

On a happier note, a gentleman from Guernsey made a passing visit to St. Paul's Church telling us that as a boy of 10, in 1946, he pumped the organ. It was a delight to hear him reminisce on days past and a pleasure to welcome him back. As we enter October let us all enjoy "the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness" so beautifully penned, 200 years ago, by John Keats and not forgetting the conker month either.

It's all in the preparation

As autumn sets in sometimes we feel like putting the garden to bed and heading indoors, but maybe you could be tempted otherwise.

October is upon us, the warmth of the sun is fading, it's a wonderful time to reflect but also to prepare. There is much to do to be ready for next year and a little work now will get you ahead and lead to well performing plants.

It is time to take stock of what has done well this year and what has not and to consider the plant combinations in your borders, this month is good for moving plants and adding any new plants.

Divide herbaceous perennials that have grown happily for a few years and have now filled their space. By dividing into new plants you can pot them up or plant straight away into a new area, the soil is warm and the roots will establish over winter providing good healthy plants for next year. Free plants are always welcome!

Autumn sowing is suitable for annuals that tolerate frost. Some of these annuals can be sown directly in the ground, and will withstand most frosts. Others are not quite so robust – they can be direct sown, but covered with cloches or horticultural fleece when frost is forecast.

Alternatively, they can be sown in pots and kept frost-free over winter. I love to sow forget-me-nots, sweet peas and other hardy annuals to give an early show in spring.

Tidying the garden by clearing some leaves and pruning out dead wood is well worth the effort and a final trim on hedging to keep a crisp edge helps give definition to the garden.

Keep the late flowering plants such as dahlias and roses going by continuing to dead head, as soon as the plants set seed they will stop flowering.

Weed and tidy through your beds and leave everything to die slowly allowing wildlife to enjoy your garden as much as you do whilst finding shelter and food.

Planning for the next season is the fun part and we now have to look forward to Winter, thinking of bulbs from January with winter aconites to tulips and alliums for the Spring border. Adding other winter flowering plants such as Hellebores and Christmas box will give your garden a seasonal boost. The best bit about this, is that it can be done indoors, so do enjoy browsing through those catalogues!

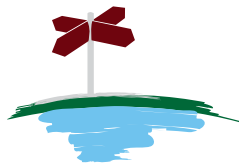

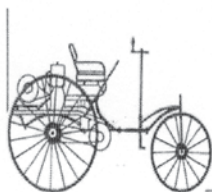
