Welcome to the December Link

One of the great pleasures of the peaceful Christmas break is long winter walks, there are so many around the parish. One of my favourites is the walk down the hill behind Markbeech Church, past Hole Cottage and on to Cowden station. The OS map app takes all the confusion (and some may say fun) out of finding new routes. I have noticed masses of interesting fungi around this year, I suppose the damp has made it a good year, I think the one below is the False Deathcap but it may be the real thing, it is hard to tell.

If you want to stay indoors, here is an easy recipe for mincemeat, good for pies, crumbles and cakes. You don't need to cook it, just mix the ingredients and put in sterilised jars:

Soak 250g of raisins and 375g of currants in 100ml of brandy for an hour or so. Then mix in the zest of a lemon and the juice of half, half a teaspoon of ground nutmeg, 250g shredded suet, a large grated bramley apple, 250g dark brown sugar and 85g of chopped mixed peel.

The misunderstood mushroom

These rather elegant mushrooms have appeared in the fields margins over the last month. Their distinctive feature

is that they are not what they seem.....

Known as the false death cap, or Citron Amanita, it is a basidiomycotic mushroom, one of many in the genus Amanita. It grows in silicate soil in the summer and autumn months. It bears a pale vellow or sometimes



white cap, with white stem, ring and volva. The top looks a bit like a cappuccino. Though it is not poisonous, its similarity to the lethal death cap (Amanita phalloides) means that it is unwise to use it in cooking. Also it doesn't taste of anything much.


Children's Christmas Cookery Event Tuesday 17th & Thursday 19th December 10am - 3.30pm



28 January 'A Scotland Yard Detective's Anecdotal Stories of Major Crimes'



Ken and Mavis Seale

Ken and Mavis Seale have lived in Hever a long time. He was born at Pigdown farm in the 20s and she came from Beckenham at the end of WW2 to work for what she calls "Kent War Ag". This involved farm work although she was deemed too small to do milking.

Ken was the third generation to work for the Castle farm. His grandfather had been a carter and his father the foreman. Sadly father was badly affected by malaria caught serving near Basra in WWI and died in his 60s. He was a keen bell ringer but Ken was put off by long waits outside the church as a child AND he didn't like the noise - so he stayed well away.

Mavis was unhappy at first as some of the girls were "a bit wild", but she enjoyed pruning apple trees and cycling up to Ide Hill to bale hay. Then one day she met Ken at the station and romance blossomed. He was working on the Castle farm and hadn't been called up because he had failed the medical. Also, as the last one left on the farm the Astors may have pulled strings to keep him. During the war they ploughed up the golf course to grow wheat and he served in the Civil Defence.

Then he got bronchitis and was sent inside to help the butler - and the regular Astor family refrain "ask Ken - he'll see to it!" was coined. The butler retired and the next one left soon after when he turned out to be rather too fond of a tipple - so Ken became

butler. He was also the driver and he and Mavis would regularly drive up to Tillypronie, the family's estate in Scotland, with the silver plate in the boot - a must for sociable summer holidays. One dinner celebrated the EEC and a hand-drawn menu survives.





the castle where they were served lunch, a commercial arrangement with the railway.

When the Astors sold Hever in the early 80s they made sure that the Seales were housed for life on the estate - a final gesture of thanks to a couple who had served them so well.

Staff numbers reduced greatly after the war and the Castle was left with "only" housekeeper, cook, ladies maid and butler. The staff had to work weekends although there was a day off in the week. Dinner was at 8 and when there were guests Ken would work until midnight (he was paid for the extra hours).

For a time the Seales lived in the Castle with their children and Mavis worked as a housekeeper. She particularly remembers cleaning the teas-mades in every room - at the time the height of luxury! Ken can't remember if he met the Queen - but they both remember that the Orient Express used to come through Hever Station on its way to the continent and the passengers would decamp to

Cecil Paynter

Extracts from Cecil Paynter's son Andrew's eulogy for his father, delivered at a Service of Thanksgiving on 15th October.

Dad was born in 1930, in Colombo, Sri Lanka (or Ceylon as he would always continue to call it), and he was in many ways a classic son of the "old Empire". He spent the first six years of his life in Ceylon, living near Kandy, where his father Pen, a former Cavalry officer, worked as a tea-taster.

Dad retained many vivid memories of his childhood in the Indian subcontinent. These included memories of trips to far away Kashmir, where his mother Cicely's family had a large carpet factory; as well as memories of the times he would ride in front of his mother on horseback to see elephants washed in the nearby river - led along the path by a pair of tame cheetahs that used to sleep at the end of his parents' bed!

He was very proud of his family heritage. The Paynters were in fact

Cornish, from Boskenna near Land's End, and although his grandfather had left Cornwall and settled in Somerset before Dad was born, you'd never have known it. Dad wore his Cornish middle names of Pendarves and de Camborne as badges of Cornish pride. When his parents returned to England from Ceylon in late 1936, the family soon moved to Little Gill in Spode Lane and so began Dad's lifelong affiliation with the village of Markbeech.

The village of Markbeech; the church; the Falconhurst Cricket Club; the Royal British Legion; endless gatherings in the Village Hall and all the other aspects of local community, were in many ways what defined Dad.

He played his first game of cricket for Falconhurst in 1941 and took a keen interest in the Club long after he hung up his boots. He was Chairman of the local branch of the Royal British Legion for some 25 years and was a Churchwarden and Treasurer of the church for a similar length of time. And Rookery Cottage, into which Mum and Dad moved in 1965 (having married in 1961) was a happy family home, always buzzing with visitors or committee meetings of one sort or other.

After Wellington College, he attended

the nearby Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst, following in his father's footsteps. He went on to enjoy a rewarding life as a young Officer in the Kings 3rd Hussars cavalry regiment and as an airborne specialist with the North Somerset Yeomanry. Dad was proud, yet modest, about his military career, but his Parachute wings, and



tie, and his Regimental swords said enough. The Army gave him huge joy and many lifelong friends. Not to mention countless stories!



Dad was a very proud member of The Vintners Company, which he joined in 1957, and he served as Master of that livery company in 1993/4. He never missed an opportunity to enjoy the rather fine lunches and dinners that were a happy adjunct to Court business and the many charitable causes that were part of his life as a Vintner.

And in addition to his love of wine, how Dad loved his food! Michael and I were brought up with the regular wartime refrain "waste not want not, pick it up and eat it". And that's exactly what Dad did. He loved fine food but he wasn't at all fussy! In his retirement years he moved into the

kitchen, often as head chef, doubtless to appease Mum given the regularity that he would invite people to supper without much consultation! He would slave for hours producing canapes, and starters in particular. And he loved making the most of anything he could find in the cupboard!

At the heart of everything, was Dad's love of good company. He loved having family and friends around him, and it was genuinely impossible to be in his company at home without him offering you something. He was lucky to be able to live life to the full for the vast majority of his years. And when walking became more difficult he never really complained. "I am just pretending", he used to say. In life, Dad's glass was always half full. Never half empty.

He will be much missed - but we will never forget him! He enriched the lives of all of us and was a loving and loyal husband to Fiona for 58 years.

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas, or so goes the festive classic. That certainly holds true in our shops and high streets. And it does here too, with the Hever Christmas Fair last month, Markbeech Bazaar up next, and Cowden Christmas Fayre following hot on its heels. It's also the case at the District Council.

First is a long-standing and muchloved festive gesture of goodwill: free parking in the Council's car parks and on-street on the weekends of 14/15th and 21st/22nd December, meaning there's no charge to park in Westerham, Sevenoaks or Swanley.

The Christmas cheer needn't end with shopping locally. Consider grabbing a bite to eat somewhere new. We've got some truly fantastic places to eat in the District. But some are better than others. And when going out with friends and family, it's worth taking a moment to check the hygiene rating of your destination of choice. Review websites tell you about taste, presentation and service but they can't tell you about the areas behind the scenes, where the Council's inspectors go - whether the place adheres to national standards of food hygiene, condition of facilities and management. That's why it's important to check those things using the Food Standards Agency website, app or sticker.

Come Christmas Day, I'm conscious one of the most heated debates surrounds what you can and cannot

recycle. Well, perhaps not! However a handy video has been created to help explain what can go in your clear sack and what to do with the rest. Do take a look at www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/festivewaste.

All importantly, none of us want food festering a fortnight, so everyone will continue to receive our unique-in-Kent weekly rubbish and recycling collection, though your collection day may change – keep an eye out in the Winter 2019 edition of InShape, arriving soon, for the dates.

And finally, come Twelfth Night, what to do with your tree? The Council provides an easy way of disposing of your Christmas tree free of charge from the kerbside, regardless of whether you subscribe to their popular garden waste collection service. It should save you a trip to the tip – not to mention the hassle of removing all those needles from your car. Again, more information will be in the forthcoming InShape.

We may well see one another at one of the carol services or other events but if not, may I take this opportunity to wish you a very happy Christmas? As ever, do get in touch if there's anything with which I might be able to assist.

My name was Granola but I am now called Coco. I am 14 months old, I think. One minute I was with my mum and then I am living on the streets of Wales trying to fend for my little self. I ended up in the dog pound with lots of friends. The whisper was that we would be "put to sleep", the others told me it was not a good thing.

Luckily a van came and took a whole load of us to an animal rescue charity in Edenbridge called Last Chance. They were very nice to me and gave me a thing called a chip, but not the kind you eat. I liked it there but I was very lonely at night. A lovely family adopted me but sadly their daughter was allergic to my fur so I had to go back to Last Chance.

After some time I found my forever home. I am very happy again but I had another HUGE hurdle to get through. It seems that when I was really young I suffered a trauma and this left a large mass under my elbow. It meant that the inside bone of my leg stopped growing but the outside still grew. I now have a really wonky leg, which is probably what put some people off adopting me. The lovely vet at Last Chance found a dog bone doctor who could fix my leg with plates, if it was not done asap I would have trouble walking and a lot of pain as I grew older.

I had the operation in July but sadly I got an infection and I had to have another expensive operation to remove a plate. I now have to rest for four weeks which I really can't do as I am still young and full of beans. I am so very happy with my new family, even though I have been through lots of surgery and pain. I still visit my friends at Last Chance and they do dressings and x-rays to help with the cost of this all.

I will have to have one more operation to remove the other plate at some point and my owners are looking to find a way to raise £1000 so that we don't have to ask for any more help from Last Chance. They are having a Jumble Sale in Hever Village Hall on Sat 30th November from 12 - 3, please come if you can.

I hope to see you around Hever. You will know me because I have a bandage on my leg. Please remember there are lots of dogs just like me at Last Chance looking for a nice loving home.

November already!?

It has definitely started to feel like winter at Hever School. The leaves are falling, students are completing many reading and academic tasks around pumpkins and apples, and students are dressing in many more layers, (even thermals during Forest School).

In the lead up to Remembrance Day, Hever School sold poppies and raised money towards the Poppy Appeal. The school took part in a Remembrance service at the war memorial at St Peter's Church and were impeccable during the two minute silence. The sound of a lone bugler, (from Edenbridge Town Band) played the Last Post, surely one of the most distinctive sounds in the world. charged with the memory of generations of the fallen. It was then followed by few moments of silent prayer and by the sounding of Reveille, the first call of the day, to signify man's rebirth into eternal life.

The service was led beautifully by Reverend Wendy Izod and Year 6 children. Prior to the service, the Year 6 children studied the origins of Remembrance Day and created stunningly-heartfelt poems in honour of those who have died for their country in the First World War and all wars since.

Year 5 students are working hard with their reading and comprehension in class, using their journals to capture the moments from their books that they feel they could 'magpie' and use in their writing. They have also been studying improper fractions in great detail in maths and simplifying them in order to convert them to mixed numbers.

Children have also learnt about how plastic waste travels into the world's oceans. More specifically they have been looking at our accountability as residents of an inland town, and whether we are as culpable as those who live near the coast. The children have tracked the journey of plastic from Hever to the sea, working hard to identify rivers and describe this journey using the 8 points of a compass. Our Eco - School Ambassadors (Charlie, Tobi, Ava and Mia) have been presenting the ideas of Chestnut class this week at their meeting at Sevenoaks School, Our class initiatives to support our journey towards gaining Eco-School accreditation are now identified as: Using plastics positively in the school environment including the production of eco-bricks

● Growing fruit and vegetables to become more self-sufficient and promote healthy eating. ● Saving water by educating the younger students of Hever to turn off the taps. With their business brains activated... Chestnut class have seen an opportunity. They are planning a Christmas gift shop to help turn recycling into positive and desirable Christmas gifts.

Reception children visited the Bridges Centre Dandelion Cafe in Edenbridge for an Inter-generation creative workshop with older adults. The enthusiasm and creativity of the Acorns brought joy to the session and really encouraged the older adults to have a go and join in. The children have also been very engaged during their time in the Forest, climbing, building dens and learning how to make a fire.

gardening news

from Willerby Landscapes

Many of us will go out and buy a houseplant or two over the festive period eg. a Poinsettia or a Christmas cactus (Schlumbergia) so we asked our head gardener, Des Smith, what do we need to do to keep them looking their best.

Buy from a good source

"The first and most important thing is to purchase your plant from a good source, a nursery or garden centre where it has not been in contact with frost and has been watered correctly.

Secondly, check the plant through for damage or pests and fungal rots, there is no point taking on a hospital case.

Thirdly, on getting the plant home, don't rush to put it in its desired position straight away. Gradually get it accustomed to your centrally heated dark and dry home.

Remember, where it has been grown it has had the best of everything, good light, perfect stable temperature and the right amount of moisture. Start by giving the plant as much light as possible, as a sudden lack of light will cause leaf and flower drop. A draft proof window sill is ideal, then bring the plant into the room at night if you close the curtains.

Finally, water little and often as most of these winter flowering house plants have their origins in dry areas around the world, so are quite used to thriving on neglect. Once the season is over, let the plant dry out slowly for a month or so then if you have the will, it is quite easy with a cut down, feed and water, to grow it on again for next year.

Chilli Plant

I am regularly asked if you can overwinter Chili and the simple answer is yes!
Take off any remaining fruit and all the leaves. You want to leave the chilli plant bare so that it just has its original "Y" shape. Replenishing the potting mix helps as a new mix delivers fresh nutrients and removes any bad insects that might be present.

Look for available spots to store your Chilli plants either in a warm conservatory, basement or spare room. The indoor temperature for hibernating chilli peppers is between 15 to 20 degrees centigrade and never below 10 degrees. Water your chilli plants when the soil gets dry and put them back outside when the temperatures consistently stays above 10 degrees centigrade and the threat of frost has passed and with careful plant husbandry you should be enjoying the "heat" in the summer."






