

memories

Brenda Hillman's memories of teaching at Hever School in the 1950s

In September 1950, Grace Goble and I began our days at Hever. It was her first headship and my first teaching post. We were the only full time teachers although we did have an art teacher visiting for an afternoon a week which allowed Miss Goble to do some paperwork. We followed Miss Brown and Miss Gardiner who moved from Mark Beech when that school closed on St Swithins Day 1945.



The building was T shaped, the junior classroom faced the road and the infant room and hall was at the back. There was a wood and glass screen between the two which could be drawn back to give a large room for special occasions like the Christmas party. In each angle of the T was a cloakroom, one entrance labelled Boys and the other Girls. To the rear was a small kitchen and the rather basic lavatories were in the playground which was divided so that boys and girls could play separately. There were coke fires

in the classrooms but there was no heating in the cloakrooms or the kitchen.

The old air raid shelter stood unused and it was wonderful to see the lovely library it had become when I visited the school a few years ago.

We had only two classes with roughly 60 children in all, so the third room served as a hall for meals, indoor p.e. and a place to listen to the BBC radio music and movement programmes. Equipment was fairly basic as wartime shortages were still being felt. I taught the 5 – 7 year olds and Miss Goble had the older children.

School milk came in a small churn from the castle dairy and our first job was to pour the children's milk into mugs on a table in the corner of the hall and cover them with a clean tea towel. School meals came in heated containers from the school kitchen in Edenbridge. Mrs Staplehurst came in to help serve them and to wash up.

Amos Boakes ,who lived in Brooke Cottage, was the caretaker. He called Miss Goble "that guvness" and me "that young guvness". He lit the coke fires in the morning in the winter and came to clean in the evening.

To begin with Miss Goble and I arrived on our cycles, she from her rooms at Brocas and me from the bottom of Marlpit Hill. Later I discovered that the school coach which collected the schoolchildren was garaged in Swan Lane so the

driver would pick me up en route. This was a great help, especially when it was raining or snowing and I think that he was glad to have another adult on the coach.



He picked up children from various points up Stick Hill and went on to Cowden, then on to Horseshoe Green and Mark Beech and down Uckfield Lane, picking up children of all ages en route. The under elevens got off at the school and the rest went on to Edenbridge Secondary School.

Apart from the children on the bus pupils came mainly from farms, castle families or Hever Warren. The children at the Warren were in care for various reasons so their home lives were vastly different from the locals so it made for quite a challenge to meet the needs of all.

On Monday mornings there was dinner money to collect and National Savings Stamps sold. Many children would bring sixpence a week to buy a stamp which could be converted to a savings certificate at the post office when they had 30.

The Rector came in to take assembly at least once a week after which he would spend time with each class. He used to tell them jokes and funny stories which must have been very welcome light relief for the children before they had to get back to the three Rs.

In the summer parents and children were invited to sports day and tea in the rectory garden. At Christmas time there was a party at the school. The food for this came from the baker in Penshurst and the children enjoyed every scrap as there was still rationing on some items.

In spite of the shortages and challenges I was very happy at Hever and when I met up with my fellow students at college reunions I realised how lucky I was but I thought that the time for a move was coming. My brother had been in the navy for a few years and had seen foreign parts.

Travel was not easy in those days and I knew that the army and the navy had schools in all sorts of interesting places so I thought that a complete change would be the answer so I applied and off I went. Although I had dreams of being sent to Malta or Ceylon I was offered a posting to Germany where I ended up teaching at a school at RAF Bruggen on the German/ Dutch border with many happy memories of my four years at Hever.

tributes to Pat Humphreys

The church was full of family and friends for Pat's funeral in November at St Peter's. Her nephew Rory paid tribute:

"Pat as she is known to many is Aunt Pat to her eight nephews and nieces, 15 great nephews and nieces, four (and soon to be more), great, great nephews and nieces

Born in 1928 Aunt Pat was the third of three girls, Betty, Anne and Pat who lived a comfortable but somewhat isolated life in County Cork. She was home schooled by her mother and raised by maids. Through childhood and adolescence the girls were together singing, dancing, schooling, playing tennis (the family game). Their bond was deep.

However, Aunt Pat had the courage in 1952 to leave Ireland and go alone to London. Her father had died and she knew if she wanted an independent life she had to leave traditional Ireland including the Cork Opera and her dream to be a professional singer.

All her life she was self sufficient with a resilience inherited from her prisoner of war father. In London she found a bedsit and job as a secretary. Aunt Pat made regular trips to see her family and whatever the journey she arrived with open arms, a big smile, eager to talk and advise. In the 1960s she got a car and her dogs, Nicky and later Rusty accompanied her. Before Facebook, Aunt Pat was our Facebook page,

a fount of information on the latest family developments wherever in the world we were."

Lord Astor also spoke:

"In preparing my family's recollections of the greatly loved Pat Humphreys, I spent much of my time laughing. Pat loved to laugh, and made all those around her laugh too.

Pat adored Hever and her job. She was employed as secretary to my father in the summer of 1963. She worked happily for my family for 20 years, and afterwards for the Guthries, and was involved in every aspect of running and maintaining the castle and estate. Pat organised most of the functions, one of the highlights being the Christmas party. And who can forget the wonderful Christmas tree in the hall which she helped my mother decorate?

She was also the best person to have on hand in an emergency, which was put to the test after the flood of 1968. It was a terrifying time for all concerned, with the frantic rescuing of people and valuables. But she kept calm and organised throughout, as well as lifting everyone's spirits. Pat loved the Hever shoot, a great dog lover, she picked up with a yellow Labrador, called Copper, once or twice standing next to the Queen with her dog.

When Hever played host to Richard Burton for the filming of Anne of 1,000 Days I remember her telling me, with a twinkle in her eye, that word got out that Elizabeth Taylor was sunbathing topless and some of the estate men surreptitiously sloped off to have a peep! She also told of the lunch in the Tudor Suite with Princess Grace and the Monaco Gardening Club.

I particularly remember enjoying her wonderful chortle when recalling the day a delivery van got lost and ended up driving over a newly seeded lawn in front of my father - very angry - with two large dogs and, having been cutting down trees, an axe in his hand. The terrified driver left in a flurry of wheel spins.



Not only was Pat the doyenne of the estate office, she also did so much for Hever village. She was a Governor of Hever School and started the Hever Bullen Women's Institute evenings. She was also a pretty formidable member of

the church choir. Everyone knew when she was there, singing in full voice!

Pat represented the staff at the funeral of my father in Scotland. In her typically loyal and caring way, she wrote an account of it, and sent a copy to everyone she knew would want to have a first-hand report. And today, we attend her farewell with great love and gratitude.

A neighbour writes:

"Coming into the community 30 years or so ago we knew no one. We were fortunate in being introduced to people who became dear and close friends. who helped us to integrate into the life of these small villages. Pat Humphreys was one of those rare people, with a full and busy life, who nevertheless committed herself to the service of others. Always on the lookout for newcomers she would issue invitations. to lunch or dinner and offer whatever help she could to help them with their new life here. Thank you Pat I will always be grateful for your input in my life and all the love and laughter we shared along the way."

Rory concludes:

"Aunt Pat would want to thank the many friends who have been such a support to her over the course of her long life. To thank you for being here with her today. If I could phone her again today "Hallo Aunt Pat how are you?" She would answer as she always did "Oh Rory, I am very lucky, I have everything I need."

Sevenoaks council news

Council Tax is a big bill these days and although the District Council's element is only about ten percent of it – or £215 for the average household – that's still large enough to be felt in the pocket before adding the County Council, Police & Crime Commissioner, Parish Council and Fire & Rescue Service's demands into the mix.

Besides the Sevenoaks District continuing to stand out as the only part of Kent in which rubbish and recycling collections still take place every week, you wouldn't be alone if you were to struggle to call to mind what else you see for that money. In March, writing about the District Council's budget, I touched briefly on some of the other areas for which the authority has responsibility. But you would be forgiven were they not front of your mind. So over the course of the coming year I will take the opportunity to highlight a few more.

Whilst perhaps a few weeks late, I think it's worth reflecting on the role the District Council plays in the democratic process. Last month, up and down the country, thousands of council staff helped people register to vote in the General Election, processed nominations, printed poll cards, issued postal votes, and manned polling stations. Then, on Thursday 12th December, tens of millions of voters like you, me, our friends and our neighbours made the journey in the dry, rain or – further

north – snow to their polling station. In the confines of those little booths, be they in a pub or portacabin, castle or caravan, school or village hall, we placed a simple cross beside the name of a fellow citizen who was, it is probably safe to say, complete with imperfections of their own. Throughout that night and into the morning thousands more counted each vote, one by one, to establish the outcome.

There is something incredibly special that for whatever reason, with whatever reservations we may feel, and with whatever vision in mind, we enjoy in this country a system in which every citizen has a vote which allows them to say who they would like to see represent them and their interests. As flawed as some argue it to be, it is all the more precious when one considers how many people in the world are not afforded this most basic of rights.

At around a fiver a head, democracy has a financial cost. But I would contend it's actually priceless.

The result of an election may not be in a District Councillor's gift, however, if there is ever something with which I might be able to help, then please do get in touch.

It has been a busy run up to the end of term with our Hever Christingle Service, Christmas Bazaar, Christmas Jumper Day, Christmas Lunch, Pantomime visits, Nativities, Carols around the tree and Christmas Church Services.

Y4 also started their exciting journey on The Polar Express. They immersed themselves in the story. as well as watching clips from the film in order to produce a range of written work. These have included describing emotions in their own opening to the story and using figurative language to recreate the 'delicious' hot chocolate scene. Furthermore, they have used their reading skills to interpret character thoughts and emotions. Where did that go?! 2019 seemed to disappear in a flash! We hope you all had a lovely Christmas and we wish you all a happy and productive time in your gardens for 2020.

A quick look back at 2019 for us at How Green Nursery and we had a great year. We expanded our workforce, installed an all singing, dancing nursery management system that has made our business run more efficiently. Our three public open weekends were well attended with many plants finding new homes and heaps of tea and cake consumed! We grew for another successful Chelsea and we even hosted a sold-out film about the garden designer Piet Oudolf.

You'll see a running theme within our monthly posts, we are always flat out busy! January certainly is no exception. You would have thought it a quiet month but for a commercial nursery we are gearing ourselves up for a busy Spring.

One of our first jobs will be to pot up Snowdrops (Galanthus nivalis) from 'in the green' bulbs. They are much more reliable than Snowdrops bought as dry bulbs. We also have thousands of bare root perennials delivered that are also potted into containers. Come the end of the month the nursery will be at capacity.

Most people tend not to think about the garden in January, but there are plenty of plants to give Winter interest. We grow several varieties of Cornus (Dogwood) that give fantastic stem colour. Cornus alba 'Sibirica' have bright red stems as do 'Elegantissima' & 'Baton Rouge'. 'Flavarimea' has yellow stems and 'Midwinter Fire' & 'Winter Flame' bright orange. Stem colour becomes more intense as the weather becomes colder. We tend not to spend much time in our gardens in January, so plant in a position that can be seen from the house.

For an amazing vanilla scent you cannot beat Sarcococca, an evergreen shrub that come in several varieties. We stock 'confusa' and 'hookeriana Purple Stem'. Fully hardy and can take a shady position, grow near to the house to benefit from the delicious scent.

2020 certainly looks exciting as we pen these pages! We have made the decision not to grow for Chelsea Flower Show this year as we have won a major contract to grow for the next phase of planting at RHS Wisley in Surrey. The new 'Well Being Garden' has been designed by a major garden designer called Matt Keightley – we are delighted to be associated with this project.






