# Easy delicious no knead overnight bread

For each 2 lb loaf tin:

#### 600g mixed bread flour

(I use 300g strong white, 200g wholemeal flour and 100g rye flour)

2 tsp salt

2 tsp quick yeast

a couple of handfuls of seeds, I use sunflower hearts, pumpkin seeds and chia seeds (optional)

500g (500ml) cold tap water

The night before baking put all the flour and seeds, if using, in a large mixing bowl together with the salt and yeast and add the water. Mix well just to the point when all the flour is incorporated in the sticky dough and you can't see any dry bits. This takes me less than 5 mins. Cover the bowl with a tea towel or clingfilm and leave in the kitchen. Ours is cool overnight, if you have an Aga I'd leave the dough in a cooler place.

The next morning (about 10 hours later) grease a 2 lb bread tin. Put a little oil on a board and spread it with your hands. Then with oily hands scoop up the dough. It will just hold together but be very sticky. Put on the oily board

and spread out the dough into a rough rectangle, roll up and spread again and repeat.

Then place in the tin and leave to rise. After about an hour put a tray in your oven\* and turn your oven on to its highest setting. As soon as its up to temperature slash the rising dough with a sharp knife, ideally serrated and pour some water onto the hot tray to create steam and put the bread in for 25 mins. Then turn the oven down, without opening it, to 180 degrees C\*\* for a further 20 mins. Remove from the oven, take out of the tin and tap the loaf to check it sounds hollow. Leave to cool on a rack.

\*I have a fan oven and I use the pan that came with it that hangs from grooves on either side of the oven. Then I put the oven rack on top. With conventional ovens you can just put the pan on the oven floor.

\*\*With a conventional oven set to 200 degrees C



# Litter pick on Good Friday

Hever village hall 9am – 12pm

Wear sensible clothes and boots and bring gloves. All other equipment (litter pickers, bags, bag hoops, high visibility jackets) provided.

#### The red-haired Dean

"He is of small stature, with red hair, sober in eating and drinking, and speaking little". This is a contemporary description of John Barlow who became Rector of Hever in 1525. John was born in Essex and began his university education at the new Corpus Christi college in Oxford in 1517, the same year that Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the church door in Wittenberg. After a few years as a fellow of Merton college he arrived in Hever, a condition of his appointment being a "first fruits" payment to the Pope of £15 (about £15,000 today).

As chaplain to Sir Thomas Boleyn, Viscount Rochford, John found himself in the midst of a fascinating family. It was not long before he was at the centre of Henry VIII's courtship of Anne and his attempts to divorce Catherine. Henry sent Barlow to Italy in 1527 as his personal courier to carry a message to the envoy sent to Rome to intercede with the Pope. The envoy, William Knight, wrote to Henry from Foglino. about 100 miles north of Rome:".....a chaplain of my Lord Rocheforte arrived here with yor Graces letters directed unto me, and in the same a minyute for your dispensation, newli conceived".

That mission failed and Barlow was sent on a second perilous mission to Italy the next year. Whilst the missions failed the Boleyns were pleased with John and wrote to Cardinal Wolsey asking him to give him the living at Sundridge which had become vacant. Wolsey made a mistake and offered Tonbridge causing Anne to write reproachfully: "I do trust your grace do

grant him Sondrig. And considering the pains that he hath taken, I do think that it shalbe very wel bestowed. And in so doing I reckyn my self much bound to your grace for al those that hath takyn pain in the kings matter. It shalbe my daily study to imagine al the ways that I can devise to do them service and pleasure."

John duly received the Sundridge living in 1528 and held it until the reign of Queen Mary whilst also being appointed as Dean of the college of Westbury-on- Trym near Bristol. His Channel-hopping continued for a few more years and he carried messages to George Boleyn who was Ambassador to France so his parish work would probably have been carried out by curates whose salaries he would have paid from his own income.

No one knows what John's views were about the break with Rome but there is evidence that he and his brother William, Bishop of St David's, both benefitted from Anne Boleyn's patronage as Marchioness of Pembroke and promoted her cause in return. His star did not wane with Anne's execution, by 1544 he was Dean of Worcester Cathedral, but it plummeted to earth when Queen Mary came to the throne in 1553. William was imprisoned. recanted his Protestant views and was released into exile and John disappeared from view - no one knows how his story ended.

#### local heroes

#### Lieutenant General Sir Napier Crookenden KCB, DSO, OBE, DL



Napier Crookenden was a career soldier born in 1915, trained at Sandhurst and commissioned into the Cheshire Regiment in 1935. He was 24 when WW2 broke out and in 1943, having volunteered for parachute training, he served as a Brigade Major in the 6th Airlanding Brigade, planning to land soldiers in gliders on D Day near key bridges across the River Orne which flows through Caen, the city at the heart of the Normandy landings.

The gliders were duly despatched on 6 June 1944 in an audacious and

perilous exercise aimed at taking the Germans by surprise and capturing Benouville Bridge. They landed mainly on target but with some serious injury to soldiers who could not see where they were landing in the dark. The bridge was taken in a decisive victory during the bumpy and agonising progress to victory. The bridge was renamed Pegasus Bridge, the shoulder emblem of the Parachute Regiment. It is impossible to avoid recording that one of the Parachute battalions was led by the wonderfully named Lieutenant Colonel Pine-Coffin.

Napier Crookenden's part in the success was recognised with promotion to Commanding Officer of the 9th (Eastern and Home Counties) Parachute Battalion, leading his Regiment in a famous action at Merville and capturing a massive German gun battery, constructed of so much concrete that it was impervious to bombing, which was a great threat to troops landing on Sword Beach. He was in the thick of bitter fighting during the winter of 1944 called "the Battle of the Bulge", the last German offensive against the allied advance towards Germany. He then took part in the last great parachute operation of the war, the crossing of the Rhine. He was awarded a DSO (like his father before him) and was moved on to Israel to help maintain order during the dying days of the British mandate.

After the war he was Director of Operations during the Malayan Emergency. He was made Director of Land/Air Warfare at the Ministry of Defence in 1964 and was the last General Officer Commanding-in-Chief of Western Command from 1969. He served in Northern Ireland and, as he was very much a "soldier's general", made a point of going out on foot patrols on the Falls Road. He was knighted in 1970 and retired in 1972.

In retirement he and his wife moved to Four Elms and he became Colonel of the Cheshire Regiment. a trustee of the Imperial War Museum, lieutenant of the Tower of London, a notably successful chair of SSAFA (the Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmens' Families Association), Deputy Lieutenant for Kent and most importantly of all of course - a Churchwarden at Hever where he was very active and much loved. He also lectured on military history and wrote three books. Una Higgs remembers a trip to the D Day sites with him. They found Leo Marks'



poem "Yours" on the wall of the Pegasus café:

The life that I have Is all that I have And the life that I have Is yours.

The love that I have
Of the life that I have
Is yours and yours and yours.

A sleep I shall have A rest I shall have Yet death will be but a pause.

For the peace of my years In the long green grass Will be yours and yours and yours.

The poem was written for his girlfriend Ruth who had died in a plane crash in Canada but it had a second purpose as an encrypted message. Marks was head of the Code office of the Special Operations Executive in Baker Street (where Anne Greig and Paul Aronow's father also worked) and the poem was used to send coded

messages to agents in France, including Violette Szabo.

Napier Crookenden died in 2002 and there are memorial plaques to him in Chester Cathedral, the Tower of London and Hever Church.

### **Potholes**

Kent County Council, Highways Dept. is responsible for the 10,000 km of roads around Kent (not for motorways or trunk roads).

1.64 million people use these roads and almost 1,000,000 vehicles and usage has doubled in the last 25 years. KCC's website allows you to report a problem very easily: https://www.kent.gov.uk/roads-and-travel/report-a-problem

KCC says: "We are continuing to fix potholes as part of our £7.5 million Pothole Blitz. Since the beginning of the year, we've fixed over 26,000 potholes in response to over 14,000 received fault reports. You can let us know about any potholes via our online reporting tool, which will help us schedule repairs as quickly as possible.

We aim to make a permanent, quality repair by cutting out a small section of the road around the hole, clearing out the old material and filling it with new tarmac. If a road has lots of potholes we may need to complete a larger patch or resurface the whole section. For emergency potholes, we sometimes make an instant repair by quickly filling the hole. This is to make the road safe straight away whilst we schedule a full permanent repair to prevent potholes from forming in the future.

Following recent bad weather and flooding, we will be prioritising pothole and emergency repairs and reports of floods that are a risk to road users or property for the next few weeks."



# Hever Parish Council 🛶 Your Hersel Parish Council

Gatwick The Clerk attended a "roundtable" meeting regarding Gatwick Northern Runway Project. The current consultation is part of the process to bring the emergency runway into use. The runway is 2.5km long (the main runway is 3.3km). If brought into regular use, it would enable up to 70 movements of planes an hour, an increase of 74 million passengers per year. There would not be in increase in cargo flights. The plans have to include infrastructure such as improving the access from the M23 (Junction 9). The plans would lead to about 20,000 new jobs (8.000 on the airport site).

The Consultation document (over a 1000 pages) will be out soon and now is the time to engage. The Secretary of State is expected to make a decision late in 2022. Hever Parish Council is part of the High Weald Councils Aviation Action group and the 3 HPC Councillors who attend this on vour behalf will consider our response carefully http://www.hwcaaq.org/ For more information see www.gatwickairport.com/community If you have views on this, please attend a parish council meeting, email the Clerk (clerk@hever.org) or comment on Facebook (Hever Parish Council).

**Licensing** The Clerk now receives updates electronically from the Licensing Authority (Sevenoaks District Council) on any new or amended licensing applications in our parish and will list these at every Council meeting.

Four Elms pond Excess aquatic plants are to be removed from the pond soon, these will have to "rest" on a part of the bank to allow the bugs to crawl back into the water, so if the area is a little unsightly for a while, please bear with us.

**Bus shelters** The Clerk received happy news that the refurbished Four Elms bus shelter (which was a salmon pink colour previously) with its new green bench and enlarged perspex window is much appreciated by users. Watch this space for new, covered, accessible, magnetic noticeboards for all the bus shelters in the parish. They are a vast improvement and no more injured thumbs trying to post notices on them. ## schooltime

#### news from Hever

In a climate of uncertainty and change we are doing all we can to keep everyone safe and well. While the school has closed following government guidelines we will continue to care for vulnerable children and those whose parents are key workers.

This week Acorn class has been practising using their phonics sounds for reading and writing. They are learning how to write a short sentence. Acorns have been trying so hard with their reading and parents and carers have been supporting learning at home. In Maths they have been learning about pairs and working out how many pairs of socks different animals would need! They are also using numbers in their roleplay and shapes in construction. It has been an extremely muddy few weeks out in the forest! This week children built a rain shelter and huddled underneath it to drink hot chocolate and they created little rafts for the stream.

Elderberry have been growing cress to conduct an investigation into what plants need to grow, deciding what to change in their variables. The children have been working hard on their multiplication and division skills, using arrays and making equal groups through sharing.

Elm Class have been deepening their understanding of non-fiction explanation text, the children worked collaboratively

to create a new food for robot dogs, with a new brand name and catchy slogan. Also this week the children have designed their own experiments based around the scientific principles of the 'fair test' and their understanding of the factors needed for healthy plant growth. They spent time discussing their thoughts regarding the control of variables, before settling on one which they wanted to explore.

Willow Class, over the last two weeks, have written some amazing pieces about the book, 'The Iron Man' by Ted Hughes. The children were asked to explore the language and style of the Iron Man before creating their own descriptions and then writing a prologue in the style of Hughes.

We have had another fantastic week of learning in Chestnut class this week. The children have worked hard to complete their biographies on Claude Monet and moved onto planning a missing poster, based on an accident with a group of explorers in an Avalanche. Inspiration for this was seen from a disappearance reported in Scotland last week.

Last Thursday, our teachers and pupils had a great time celebrating World Book Day. A lot of fun and exciting activities took place. The children were thrilled to hear the news that Michael Rosen, the famous children's author, is coming to visit us in November! We are all looking forward to hearing his inspirational words!

#### news from Four Elms

#### Rights respecting

Recently, the whole school has been focusing on raising awareness about disabilities as part of 'The right to be treated fairly'.

Class One have created an audio book for those who are visually impaired which was shared with a member of the local community who is visually impaired. They provided feedback and the children will respond to this before sharing their audio book with a larger audience of visually impaired people. When visiting the school, the lady stated that the children "were lovely and had great questions" and also commented that it is wonderful that we are raising awareness of disability as a school.

Class Two have learnt a great deal of sign language and have created a video of key phrases and words. They have been visiting other local primary schools to share their learning in the hope this will also inspire other schools to become more inclusive and learn sign language.

Class Three have been learning about hidden disabilities and how our local Waitrose can support people with these. This term they will have a visit from a representative from Waitrose Head Office, to present their ideas and, once approved, they will share these ideas with our local Waitrose in Edenbridge.

Class Four's goal is to raise awareness of accessibility for people with physical disabilities. So far, they have tested out our school and field environment to identify how wheelchair accessible this is. They will be writing letters to the local community to raise awareness of the impact of an accessible environment.

#### Positive relationships and antibullying programme

The whole school has signed up to a fun five-week programme delivered by the West Kent Community Youth Services Team. The programme focuses on positive relationships, empathy and self-esteem, to help the children understand the importance of kindness and teamwork.

#### **Sport Relief**

Sport Relief is a fundraising event run by Comic Relief that harnesses the power of sport to raise money and transform lives. In exchange for a donation to the charity, all the children were able to come to school dressed in either sporty clothes or as a sports star.

During the afternoon, the Rights
Respecting Ambassadors ran some
fun sports activities for each class with
prizes for the winners, bringing the
whole school community together to
get active and have fun. It helped the
children to understand that their own
school can make a real difference to
people's lives.

# **Extract for Easter Day**

from the Church of England Live Lent booklet

#### **Rest and Restoration**

Supposing him to be the gardener, Mary said to Jesus, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him."

Read John 20.11-18

#### Reflection

Genesis 2 begins by describing the Seventh Day - the Sabbath, when God rested from the work of creation. But by Genesis 3 we encounter Adam and Eve's disobediance and the tragic consequences of human sin. As Ruth Valerio writes in her conclusion to Saying Yes to Life:

"The rest of the Bible is then the story of how God works to bring restoration: to put back to rights what has gone wrong and bring about the Sabbath rest that has been promised."

Adam and Eve turn away from God in a garden, and it is in a garden that Mary Magdalene first encounters the risen Jesus. For Christians, the First Day becomes the new Sabbath, a day not only of rest but of resurrection and restoration.

Our faith in the risen Jesus gives us hope of a future when creation will be set free in the age to come. But this hope also strengthens us to live in the world as it is - a world where there is great suffering, a world which we are called to serve and to sustain.

#### Action

What will you take forward from all that you have learned and done during Lent?

How might your prayer, your actions and your giving, change to reflect your care for God's creation?

#### **Prayer**

Now let the heavens be joyful, And earth her song begin! The round world keep high triumph, And all that is therein; Let all things seen and unseen Their notes of gladness blend, For Christ the Lord hath risen, Our joy that hath no end.

#### gardening

Blunts Brook is a 10 Acre wildlife haven where a plantaholic lives. Alleluia the sun has got its hat on and on a positive front the beautiful spring flowers came early and have lasted longer. We must all be behind in the garden, but not to worry, seasons always have a way of catching up.

Due to my vegetable plot being soggy and stodgy, I started certain vegetables off in the greenhouse (onions, garlic, broad beans, leek, sprouts) which are now screaming "get me in the soil". I put my compost (home produced) on in November so now it only needs a rake to get a finer tilth where I am directly sowing seed. I don't put compost where carrots and parsnips are to be sown. Vegetable seed I would normally sow directly into the ground at the beginning of March, but this year it will be the end of March/beginning of April. These are parsnip, radish, spinach, beetroot and lettuce, with carrots at the end of the month.

In February my potatoes took up residence in the porch for chitting and will be planted out this month. Remember when sowing vegetables/salad leaves do fortnightly sowings to stop it all arriving at the same time. I start other vegetables in the greenhouse in late March/April – tomatoes, peppers, cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli etc. then plant out end of April/May.

The beginning of April is when I tackle my herbaceous borders, chopping back, lifting and dividing. Hardy annuals get sown once the bed is cleared and composted. Put labels in where you have sown seed. Now is a good time to plant any summer flowering bulbs. Also, this month is when I repot all my fuchsias & pelargoniums and get most of my cuttings from plants in the greenhouse and outside. Although most of the pruning had been done in March, this month I prune the fig tree, cut down the dogwoods and chop back the penstemon/fuchsias and early flowering shrubs. Remember to continually tie in the clematis and honeysuckles, as they romp away.

Roses and shrubs get their annual feed this month and don't forget your houseplants. Containers get a top dressing of compost and slow release granules. April is the best month to take a look at your lawns and do any reseeding. Remember to protect anything fragile from late frost with fleece.

I love this month and the excitement it brings. Our bluebell wood is beginning to come to life and our wildlife has taken up residence. Our Barn Owl (Snowball) has been in her box since November and the Tawny Owl is now in hers and she is starting to lay. Beautiful Mr Kingfisher is once again fishing and Mrs is sitting. The kestrels are unhappy as their box has Snowball in it, but we have put up another for them. The mandarin duck is not settled in yet but has checked out her box.

Happy gardening to you all and a very happy Easter.






