The Mapleton story part 1

Mapleton House lies at the southern end of Mapleton Road in the parish of Four Elms. Part of the house which stands today was built in 1878 by Samuel Henry Phillips as an addition to an estate which included a farm.

Samuel, born in 1838, was the son of Benjamin Phillips, who was a merchant in the city of London. The Phillips family were influential members of The Great Synagogue in London and were also great philanthropists. Benjamin became Lord Mayor of London in 1865. His younger son, George was Lord Mayor in 1897, Queen Victoria's Jubilee Year.

Samuel's mother was Rachel Faudel, and her brother Henry Faudel, also Jewish, was a businessman selling needles, embroidery patterns, sewing accessories, books and silverware. He lived in London but his country address was Mapleton Lodge, Westerham in 1861 though it is not the lodge that exists today.

Some time after Benjamin and Rachel were married, Benjamin joined Henry Faudel's enterprise and in 1861 Samuel and his younger brother, George were made partners in the business of Faudel and Phillips. There were great celebrations. Business was suspended for the day and the employees were given the day off. An excursion party of some sixty guests rattled across Blackfriars Bridge and on to Waterloo station and thence to

Hampton Court where entertainment was available for all from fishing and boating to tours of the house and pleasure gardens. In the afternoon they played a cricket match and at 5pm they all sat down for dinner at The Greyhound Hotel nearby.

Samuel was one of five siblings and in 1875 he married Sarah Georgina White. Her father was a cement maker and brickmaker and they were gentiles. Samuel's family did not appear to have a problem with that. Samuel continued to work closely with his father and brother. When his uncle, Henry Faudel died Samuel was given the property at Mapleton and decided to build a house there. It was to be a country retreat and was a very modest affair.

Samuel and his family spent most of their time in Wimpole Street in London and later in Grosvenor Street, the home of his late father, Benjamin. The house that Henry built was designed to be viewed at its best from the rear. The house gave onto parkland with a walled kitchen garden and displays of rhododendrons which Victorians seemed to be so fond of. There were extensive views of the surrounding countryside and a ha-ha was erected across the rear of the garden so that there was an uninterrupted view of the sheep in the adjoining field without the inconvenience of them getting into the garden. There was also a magnificent granite seat placed there which still survives.



Samuel's initials, SHP intertwined, were put on the front of the house and the new lodge. It was not until the 1880's that Henry was granted a coat of arms and allowed to style himself Faudel-Phillips.

Samuel and Georgina had four children – Rachel born 1876, Henrietta Norah, 1877, Ceril, 1880 and Henry, 1884. As children they saw little of their parents only being taken to the drawing room briefly each day, but their mother never failed to go upstairs to bid them goodnight, the nursery cat often sitting on the train of her gown. The girls were educated at home and Henry, the only son, went to Eton.

Georgina was a beauty and a fine needlewoman, but she was strict with her daughters and thoroughly spoilt her son.

In 1891 the Faudel-Phillips family were at Mapleton with their four children and 12 servants, including a French governess. The bailiff for the estate lived at Mapleton lodge with his daughter who was a dairymaid. His younger daughter was a servant in the main house. There were two grooms living above the stables. The coachman, Frederick Leggatt lived at Mapleton Cottage. His master must have thought a great deal of him as he left him a legacy of £200. The Head Gardener, Mr. King, lived at



White Post Cottage at the junction of Mapleton Road and Pootings.

We do not know how often the family visited Mapleton but they seemed to be involved in the local community attending shows and presenting prizes. Henry was also president of the Edenbridge Fat Stock Show and raised funds both for a new church and later a new vicarage. St.Paul's at Four Elms is the oldest concrete church in England.

A great traveller, Samuel was often on the continent and on Whit Sunday 1909 he died of pneumonia in Paris. He was buried at Holy Trinity Church, Crockham Hill. He left an estate of £321,000.

After his death his wife arranged for the village institute to be built in Four Elms in memory of her husband. Her son inherited Mapleton and made many changes. Georgina lived in London with her two unmarried daughters but in 1913 she died at the Earl's Court Hotel in Tunbridge Wells. Her body was conveyed to Crockham Hill where she was interred beside her husband.

a potted history of Markbeech part 1

As readers will know Markbeech (not Mark Beech, let alone Mark Beach) is a small village of about three hundred plus inhabitants in the High Weald of Kent, about thirty miles south of London.

Historically the site of this settlement lay deep in the dense forest, mainly of oak and beech, which lay between east Kent and Hampshire, hence the later Germanic term Wald or Weald. Celtic peoples had lived in the area since time immemorial and in about 100-75 BC they built a hill fort, which was part of a defensive system of fortifications, covering west Kent from hostile incomers from the Continent. Dry Hill Fort was about two miles west of Markbeech and from it there was a track, which rose out of the valley of the Eden near Chiddingstone and part of which is the metalled road that passes today east/west through the village.

Not long after these events Britain was incorporated within the Roman Empire. The Romans penetrated the forest by a road from London to Lewes. This road passes about a mile west of Markbeech and was used to transport iron goods and grain and for communication generally. There are notable iron workings around Markbeech, especially near Horseshoe Green and at Pyle Gate, including a bloomery or furnace. We must assume that Romans visited Markbeech, although they have left no traces except the road and iron workings.

The Romans abandoned Britain in the first quarter of the fifth century and very soon after England, especially Kent, began to be invaded and settled by Germanic people from north-west Europe. Kent was occupied by people known as Jutes and they quickly established political and legal structures and created the kingdom of Kent. This state was eventually absorbed into Wessex and, then, England. All land technically belonged to the king but very soon settlements of tenants. known as manors, evolved. The main tenants provided warriors for the king and, thus, a quasi-feudal system began to develop.

One of the features of Jutish Kent was that the main settlements in west Kent were to the north and the forest area, such as Markbeech. were left to cattle grazers and for pigs, particularly in the autumn. The clearings in the forest were known as dens (hence for example Cowden and Pigdown Lane, originally Pigden, Claydene, Crippenden, etc.) and it is here that we find the etymology of Markbeech. Markbeech is a Jutish compound word meaning 'a beech tree on a boundary' in this case that between the manors of Cowden Lewisham and Hever Brocas, later the parishes of Cowden and Hever. Taking the present crossroads in the village, Cowden held the quadrant to the south-west and Hever the remainder, although where the Kentish Horse now stands was an enclave of another manor. Penshurst



Halimote, which was held by the Archbishop of Canterbury. No doubt at this point the Jutes observed a beech among the oaks and which marked the boundary. It is said that the beech in the graveyard is a successor tree. Another Jutish feature was the unique system of inheritance know as gavelkind, which lasted until the twentieth century. There is an example of gavelkind in Markbeech in the nineteenth century.

Gradually the forest was cleared to provide open grazing and land to cultivate crops although it was not until at least the thirteenth century that anything like the present topography was established. In 964 King Edgar I gave the royal manor of Lewisham, including its dens in the forest, to the Abbey of St. Peter and St. Paul at Ghent in Flanders.

This may have been a confirmation because there is evidence that in 918 this manor was given to the Abbey by Aelfryth, a daughter of King Aelfred and who was married to Baldwin II, Count of Flanders. St. Peter's lost control of the manor during the reign of the Danish kings, but it was restored by King Edward the Confessor in 1044. Thus Markbeech was within the manor of Cowden Lewisham until in 1402, when after several previous royal confiscations, the manor was sequestrated by Henry IV and his Parliament.

After many visicitudes and different tenants, the manor was given by the Crown in 1558 to Sir Edward and Dame Frances Waldegrave, in whose family it remained until, in the eighteenth century, it passed to the Mead-Waldo and Streatfeild families. Inventories compiled in 1281, 1336, 1343 and 1376 show how much sub-infeudation had occurred by the later Middle Ages.

One such was the bequest of Agnes de Montacute, a Sussex land-holder, to the Priory of Michelham. In 1414 the manor was transferred by Henry IV, despite protests from Ghent, to his newly-founded Carthusian priory at Sheen, Surrey until all ecclesiastical land was alienated to the Crown in the 1530's.

Obviously since the Norman Conquest Markbeech was involved in the evolution of a fully feudal society and bits of the area are delineated in Domesday. One very important tenant-in-chief, Richard Clare, the Conqueror's second cousin, who was the builder and custodian of Tonbridge Castle, held land just to the east of Markbeech at Newtye Hurst. There were now established several settlements and these included Bramsells, 'a miry place where there are brambles', which was held by Battle Abbey,

recently founded by William I on the site of the Battle of Hastings. In 1066 William passed very close to Markbeech in the course of his destructive march to London.

Apart from Domesday the first document naming a place in the area is for Old Buckhurst in 1232 and for Markbeech itself the first mention is in a lease agreement of 29 September, 1461. The oldest extant houses are Bramsells, Old Buckhurst and Wickens from the fifteenth century and Old Farm from the sixteenth. From the mid-fourteenth century vines began to disappear and they were replaced by hops and there were a number of hop gardens in Markbeech until the nineteenth century.

Sevenoaks council news

For those so inclined, few pastimes over the last few months have proved quite so absorbing as keeping abreast of the Government's changes – and proposed changes – to planning rules. Such has been the volume of new policies and ideas that it has, at times, proved rather taxing for even the most devoted of followers.

Our neck of the woods is a product of its constraints and I know many readers take a keen interest in seeing those upheld. This month's column, therefore, is devoted to what has happened, and next month's will be to what is on the horizon, sticking in each case to that which is of the greatest relevance to the three villages in our Benefice.

Since March, pubs, restaurants and cafes have been allowed to provide a takeaway service, regardless of any restrictions against them previously doing so. This right runs for a year and has been not just broadly welcomed but something from which many of us have benefited too.

In July, the Business and Planning Bill received Royal Assent, allowing until next Spring the extension of planning permissions and listed building consents which had lapsed or are due to lapse between lockdown and the end of the year, as well as longer construction hours. For High Streets, such as Edenbridge, it has been made easier to acquire permits to place tables and chairs on the pavement, and to change the use of premises without the need for a planning application.

The beginning of August brought the Government's much-vaunted planning white paper, but, as I say, more on that next month. Meanwhile – and make sure you're sitting down for this – as of 31 August, regulations permit the addition of two additional storeys on existing houses, detached or in a terrace, to create new self-contained homes or additional living space. The height of bungalows may increase by one storey too.

Clearly, this last one is that which has the greatest potential negative impact on the landscape. As you would expect, there are some tests that need to be satisfied – not a lot, but a few. Likewise, not all areas are included – Conservation Areas and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty are exempt, thus excluding Markbeech and the centre of Hever. But that still leaves large swathes, including Four Elms, very much exposed.

Not one of the above, I hasten to add, is a change on which either I or the District Council has had any say but, as you know, I've always taken the view that whether good news or bad, it's important to share it so everyone knows where they stand – that's another way of saying I am merely the messenger, please don't shoot!

Planning news

From Sevenoaks District Council (the Planning Authority):

"Certain types of development, subject to some conditions, do not require full planning permission from us. These are called permitted developments. An Article 4 Direction can be used to remove specific permitted development rights. We have become aware of a piece of land that is being marketed north of Newhouse Farm Lane, Hever and it has been considered necessary to introduce an Article 4 Direction. It would be appreciated if you could encourage residents within your areas to make comment on this matter. https://www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/ info/20008/planning/523/article 4 directions - newhouse farm lane hever near edenbridge SDC have passed on information regarding this latest piece of land and the way it is being marketed to KCC Trading Standards." Hever Parish Council are in regular contact with SDC Planning on all planning matters, and will be considering the Newhouse Farm matter at the next meeting.

Finally, news from Sevenoaks District Seniors Action Forum:

"There seems to be a dearth of easy listening music on radio, so we were pleased to discover a new free radio station. Listeners can choose music from the 1930s/40s, 1950s, 1960s and 1970s 24 hours a day. our rector's thoughts

I'm delighted that we are now able to hold services in person, albeit still with heavy restrictions. Our service at Four Elms on 26th July was my first ever fully masked service and it did feel rather strange as well as challenging as my glasses steamed up!

Prior to the ruling at the end of July, there was much debate about the wearing of face masks. People felt it was infringing their liberty. They felt uncomfortable, embarrassed and significantly less able to communicate given the loss of facial expression. But now we are wearing face masks to protect each other and that includes in church.

Masks are necessary but difficult and they affect our relationships. We can feel it hides our personality. Indeed we say someone has 'put on a mask' to mean that they are hiding who they really are. Maybe, when we think about God, he may seem hidden from us, as if he too is wearing a mask. Wouldn't it be good if he could just reveal himself; all the more so when we're facing so many difficulties. Or perhaps we see God as a stern judge and want to hide away ourselves – even put on a mask before we approach him. The Bible talks about faces being 'veiled'.

For example, when Moses came down Mount Sinai after the giving of the Ten Commandments, it is written that he had to veil his face. He had been in God's presence and as a result his face shone so brightly that the people were afraid. The Christian gospel is that God has unmasked himself and revealed himself in Jesus. St.Paul says that when someone turns to Christ the veil is taken away 2 Corinthians 3:16. And this is the experience of many who become

Christians – me included; it is like the scales dropping from our eyes and so we can see clearly.

Can I encourage you all to wear the physical face masks as directed to help protect each other. But at the same time, have a think about what unseen masks we might be wearing. There is great freedom in feeling comfortable in our own skin and that often comes from knowing we are loved by others, by our family and friends and most of all by God, who has unmasked himself in Jesus.

Keep safe – keep well – keep praying




