Allmans butchers

As so many of us know, Allman's butchers in Edenbridge High Street is a class act and one we would like to celebrate this month.



Terry Allman opened the Edenbridge shop, in what had been Skinners' butchers, in 1987. His parents had met in Charcott during the war when his father, a Wilmslow butcher, had been posted to Red Leaf barracks in Penshurst and his mother, a butcher's daughter from Bromley, was visiting relatives. They bought the Four Elms butchers shop in 1949 and when meat came off the ration in 1954 they reopened the abattoir behind the shop which the family has run ever since.

Very sadly, Terry died in 2012 but the shop in Edenbridge continues to thrive as a family business with Terry's son Jimmy, a fifth generation butcher, at the helm. Self promotion is not a family strength so it may not be obvious to the passer by that all the meat is free range, the lamb from Penshurst and Chiddingstone, the beef from local farms in Haxted and Underriver and chicken and pork from Suffolk. Their most popular products are home made sausages and chipolatas - they make about 200lbs a week.

Blackwoods Cheese Company

will be raising their shutter door from 9am – 2pm every Saturday from October 24th – December 12th at Bore Place. The doorstop pop up will feature a range of local cheese, wines from England and abroad, beer, organic veg, provisions and their award winning raw milk soft cheeses.

Throughout the pandemic Allman's have continued to open and to deliver to those who were unable to get about. They have seen a welcome upturn in younger shoppers in recent months who keep them on their toes asking for more unusual cuts like bavette steaks and chicken's feet. Naturally they are happy to accommodate such requests and meet more traditional demands. We are very lucky to have a first rate butchers in the town and one staffed by friendly, skilful people to boot.

Congratulations Ian!

Congratulations Ian Yarnold OBE

The citation for the Order of the British Empire, says: "THE QUEEN has been graciously pleased, on the occasion of the Celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday, to give orders for the following appointments to the Most Excellent Order of the British

Empire". On the list is lan Charles Yarnold, Head, International Vehicle Standards, Department for Transport, for services to Transport and Engineering. What a surprise when he opened an email in June to find an award - then he had to keep it secret until a few weeks ago.

lan was brought up on a farm on top of

the north downs. From an early age he was good at fixing things and when he left school at 16, keen to get on with something practical, he completed a four-year apprenticeship in Farningham as a car mechanic.

After a while he moved on to more demanding vehicles and eventually to a large truck haulage company in Erith. He enjoyed the work but it was hard, physical and dirty and one day he had a lightbulb moment watching a much older mechanic struggling across the yard, bent and dejected. Was this the future? Ian thought not,

so he found a job at the Ministry of Transport as a vehicle examiner. This was to be the start of a very successful civil service career.

By 1984 he had married Mandy and they were living in Sevenoaks, on his patch as an MOT inspector was the garage at Horseshoe Green and John Surtees in Edenbridge. His

> talents did not go unnoticed because, aged 35, he became the first person the Ministry had ever allowed to take day release to study. He was, in those days, an unusually mature student and he emerged from Southbank University with an engineering degree. The studying had been hard work and he acknowledges Mandy's great support

along with their sons Charles and Sam.

lan's career has been dedicated to improving public safety in some way, often on an international stage with regular journeys to Brussels and the UN in Geneva. As an engineer he was well placed to promote not only the UK's safety record but also its innovative technical achievements. From 1992 his work in the vehicle emissions team involved grappling global warming, black smoke and carbon dioxide, nitrogen dioxide and particulates. In 1999 he was

promoted to oversee the vehicle technology research programme, and thence to head the crash avoidance technology team. He led big projects developing speed limiters for trucks and crash test dummies, that involved the odd cadaver.

He also worked on braking and tyres, travelling all over the world he remembers standing on the Toyota test track at the foot of Mount Fuji. He is proud that whilst road deaths in 1988 were 5,000, by 2010 the number had dropped to 1,700. Improvements in vehicles, rather than Tufty and the Green Cross Code are the single biggest contributor to this success.

Meanwhile, he and Mandy found a plot of land on Stick Hill and another dream came true – they built their own home - it took three years and literally with much blood, sweat and heavy lifting. They have also been loyal supporters of St Peter's Hever, lan sitting as the local representative on the Deanery synod for years.

In 2005 Ian was promoted to Head of vehicle safety, heading up a department of around 30 people, then in 2011 to Divisional manager, a role he created, combining environmental and safety roles. The VW emissions crisis in 2015 made the division change track and focus again on emissions and to develop the increased scrutiny that is now commonplace. And so we come to automation, or driverless cars in plain English. Political interest in

automation had taken off in the early 2010s and Ian has been massively involved in their development - they sound dangerous but 85 % of accidents are due to driver error - and so these cars have both safety and environmental benefits and can be used by people who would otherwise be housebound. Other projects include working on the implications of Brexit for the automotive sector and dealing with the many implications of the Covid lockdown. Usually a regular on the 7am from Hever, Ian has discovered the joys of working from home under the "new-normal" and the convenience of armchair meetings with Geneva using Zoom.

The thing that makes him most proud is being an engineer in the civil service, not an economist or statistician, but a very niche role which has enabled him to play a crucial part in saving lives - making the politicians listen because he understands the difficult problems and also their solution.

If you see a lycra clad cyclist whizzing past you at the weekend, that could be lan, he is even known to cycle to work in Westminster. On the day he goes to the Palace for the investiture I hope he manages to contain his incredible energy long enough to take a taxi.

the Mapleton story part 2

Henry (known as Harry) Faudel-Phillips inherited Mapleton when his father died. He was the voungest child and only son. He had been educated at Eton and from there joined the army serving with the Royal Irish Lancers stationed in Ireland. He was Lieutenant Faudel-Phillips in 1904 when he met a much older woman and fell madly in love. He was twenty years old when he announced his engagement to Ellen Deane-Tanner who was nine vears his senior. His father refused permission but his mother took his side and he married on the 31st October, 1905 in Chelsea, London. Ellen had been born in Tipperary but had lived much of her life in England.

Ellen's older brother, William, had emigrated to America where he became an actor. He married a wealthy woman but left his wife and child in 1908. He changed his name to Desmond Taylor and starred in and directed over fifty films. In 1922 he was murdered in Los Angeles. The murder was never solved.

After their marriage Henry and Ellen rented Holmwood in Four Elms. When he inherited Mapleton four years later he decided to make some significant additions to his country house. He added a two-storey ballroom extension with a galleried landing. As a keen horseman he also built a stud and a stable block. In order to raise money for the work, he sold three of his late father's paintings – a Rembrandt (Head of

the Artist's Sister), a Sir Thomas Lawrence portrait and an Angelica Kauffman. Valuable then, they would have been worth a fortune today. Henry paid for the extensions and also bought a house on the French riviera near Grasse.

In 1912 Henry and his wife hosted a Conservative Party 'At Home' at Mapleton for about 200 guests. The Four Elms Gardening Society also hosted shows there. The couple were at Mapleton in March 1914 when Edenbridge experienced terrible floods. All the main roads were impassable with water 2-3 feet deep in places.

When war broke out in 1914 Henry re-enlisted and by the end of the war had reached the rank of Major. Four Elms and Edenbridge were very involved in the war effort. In 1915 soldiers were billeted in Edenbridge for three weeks. On 30th April there was a church parade. The town band played and they paraded in Stangrove Road, and after inspection marched to the parish church where the Rev. Wheatley of Four Elms gave the address. There was also a send-off smoking concert at Oddfellows Hall which was well attended. On Wednesday 2nd June the officers and men of the Royal Army Service Corps left the town. Several hundreds of townspeople accompanied the troops to the railway station and gave them a hearty send-off.

In 1916 a notice appeared in the local press encouraging the people of Four Elms to inform the government of the names and addresses of people who were eligible to serve in the forces. It looks like there was no hiding place. Many young men from Four Elms did enlist, and many made the ultimate sacrifice as the war memorial in St. Paul's testifies. In 1915, wounded soldiers were convalescing at Eden Hall and Marlpit Court. At the time there was a diptheria epidemic and many patients attended the Edenbridge Hospital. There were many deaths. It was a tragedy that those wounded in the theatre of war should die of diptheria when they returned home

After the war Henry and his wife moved to Marlowe in Buckinghamshire. Henry had become more and more involved

in equestrian pursuits and was the co-founder of The Pony Club, writing several books on the training, breaking and care of horses. He commentated



on the competition for The King's Cup at the International Horse Show at Olympia. He was also at the Islington Horse Show in 1936 with Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret, showing his knowledge and expertise to the young royals and photographed with them.

Ellen died in 1935. They did not have any children, but Harry was close to his niece, Ceril, the daughter of his sister Norah. In 1938 she married Prince Bira Birabongse of Siam who





was a renowned racing driver. Prince Bira was very rich and something of a playboy. He drove a Bentley and achieved much success. His father



was the subject of the film 'The King and I'. Bira and Ceril were eventually divorced but remained friends, Ceril lived until 2010 having published her autobiography, 'The Prince and I' in 1992.

In 1926 Harry put Mapleton up for sale and the Faudel-Phillips association with the house came to an end. However, when Henry died in 1971 at the age of 87 he was buried at Holy Trinity, Crockham Hill beside his parents. In the winter he can still see Mapleton from the churchyard.

Last year I started my Duke of Edinburgh Silver award. My school doesn't do the Bronze award, so I was thrown in at the deep end with a year of volunteering work. The criteria were very relaxed, simply saying it had to be an hour of unpaid work to help out other people and not businesses. I spent half the year working at the Oxfam shop in Edenbridge, an enjoyable if slightly hectic job.

Then disaster struck, and lockdown was announced. At the time, my DofE volunteering was quite low on the list of things to worry about, however as we settled more into lockdown life. I needed to find somewhere new to volunteer The obvious choice seemed somewhere within walking distance. This began at my neighbour's farm, but when it was suggested that I could litter pick in the village, that became my new weekly work.

Litter picking has been very eye-opening for me. It's amazing how other people choose to spoil our environment by their laziness, especially in somewhere as naturally beautiful as Hever. It's always a surprise what random junk can be found along the side of the road,

ranging from plain crisp packets to a pair of muddied shoes tossed aside.

The planning committee have been working hard on the Government White paper on planning, which has received much press coverage in relation to the proposed reported "mutant" algorithm and the possible risks to local democracy, affordable housing and the Green Belt. We shall publish our full response on the hever.org website by the end of October. There are lots of different organisations considering these proposals representing many stakeholders / interested parties, for example the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England.

our rector's thoughts

I saw the following on social media: life expectancy is around 40 years longer than a century ago; for the first time ever less than 10% of the world's population live in absolute poverty; since 1950 the average IQ has increased by 20 points and for the first time in history more countries are democracies than dictatorships. The trouble is, with the threat of further restrictions in the face of rising Covid cases and the tone of the election in the USA this month, it's easy to feel things are just getting worse and worse. Anyway, one shouldn't believe everything you read on social media!

November is the month of Remembrance and we'll be holding acts of Remembrance in all three parishes. This year the focus has been on the Battle of Britain and the debt we owe to 'the Few' - in fact about 3,000 allied pilots who suffered about 500 losses. These were real sacrifices, of course, but the numbers in the First War are truly mind boggling. There were over a million casualties on all sides during the Somme campaign alone! One only has to look at the war memorials to see the large numbers from the Great War from such small rural communities.

The First World War was such a trauma that people of the time must have wondered what the world had come to. In the aftermath of the war WB Yeats wrote the following words from his poem 'The Second Coming'

Things fall apart; the centre cannot hold; mere anarchy is loosed upon the world.

the blood-dimmed tide is loosed, and everywhere the ceremony of innocence is drowned;

the best lack all conviction, while the worst are full of passionate intensity.

But for Christians we have a glorious future. A modern translation of St.Paul's words to the Romans goes like this: All around us we observe a pregnant creation. The difficult times of pain throughout the world are simply birth pangs...These sterile and barren bodies of ours are vearning for full deliverance. That is why waiting does not diminish us, any more than waiting diminishes a pregnant mother. We are enlarged in the waiting. We, of course, don't see what is enlarging us. But the longer we wait, the larger we become, and the more joyful our expectancy (Romans 8:22-25 The Message)

As the piece I read on social media said, 'our greatness is not in our past, it is in our future'. So how do we view the future in these troubling times? As we move into Advent at the end of the month, please join me in praying the final words in the Bible: Amen, come Lord Jesus. (Revelation 22:20)

Keep safe – keep well – keep praying God bless you all

Autumn- a busy time for the gardener.

Autumn is upon us, the garden has had a good soaking and it seems the last bursts of growth are happening. Now is a great time to get on with those jobs, dividing plants, organising the beds and planting out. Division of plants is one of the easiest ways of propagating and filling out your garden. You will notice over time herbaceous perennials stop performing so well and the beds get too full of solid root with no soil or space between for moisture to seep down and worms to move about so the natural system comes to a grinding halt, therefore the plants look overcrowded and are more likely to get pests and disease and can stride into space invading weaker plants.

It is best to do division as part of your regular maintenance, every three to four years dig up the plant and using a sharp spade, or two forks back to back divide in half, depending on how thick rooted it is. Alchemilla mollis needs a sharp spade and will happily settle into a new planting area and Asters will creep through

a whole border if you let them so again a sharp spade will do the job and it will definitely be back next year. Do not underestimate the determination of your plants and dig out and divide as much as you can especially if it is a border that has had little attention over the years. The perennials to be

more careful with are plants such as Hellebores which have the flower at the centre, you will need to tease them apart with a fork and they will naturally take their own roots with them. I use a Hori Hori knife if the plant is in less heavy soil and the roots are less dense.

Now you can redesign your borders and get planting. Fork through the soil and weed out any self sown plants not wanted, dig a suitable hole and firm in the plant and if rain is not forecast give them a light watering. If you have plants left over, divided or self sown you can pot them up to use at a later date. Having spares is always a good idea in case you lose anything over winter or donate to a grateful friend!

There is always plenty to do, so make a list and keep notes of where you move plants to and what else you may like to plant in the future and I hope the newly refreshed border will put a smile on your face.
