Welcome to the December edition

We hope you have a good Christmas whatever that looks like in these strange times.

I have just finished reading "The Dig" by John Preston, an excellent historical novel about the excavation of the Sutton Hoo ship burial in 1939 (thanks for lending it to me, Sue Harvey). One of the miracles of the find (beautifully displayed in the British Museum and also on site by the National Trust) is that robbers hadn't emptied the big mound of its treasure in the 1,300 years it had lain buried there. Metal detecting had always seemed to me to be a threat to "proper" archaeology but I now know from watching the equally excellent and gently funny "The Detectorists" on BBC i-player, that they are a responsible, if rather obsessive, bunch.

It was a detectorist who found the Chiddingstone Hoard in 2016, a handful of ten beautiful Iron Age gold coins. They were made in Northern France in c60-50 BC by Celtic tribes who struck them to finance their fight against Caesar's invading armies. British Celts were involved in those battles and the gold coins were probably given as gifts as a sign of allegiance and buried in our valley, perhaps for safety or to ward off evil. They are not only "treasure" but also proof of Kent's involvement in the Gallic wars - imagine those warriors in small wooden boats crossing the channel to help fight the Romans. The coins are now beautifully displayed in the Eden Valley Museum in Edenbridge which managed to raise £13,000 to buy and display them.


He can talk a lot, when it suits him. Curiously, he really only mimics men. I believe this is because he sees them as competition. He bosses the dogs around, tells everyone that

Seven pork courses Christmas lunch

- an Englishman's view of the Romanian Christmas

I remember the first time Daryl spent Christmas with me in Romania. We were dating for a few months so of course he wanted to make a good impression. So was armed with patience, his incredible charm and smiles, but he was not expecting what followed.

In Romania we buy the Christmas tree as close to Christmas Day as possible and we keep it until Epiphany when it's the end of the 12 days of Christmas and a new beginning marked by Jesus's baptism. We decorate the tree only on Christmas Eve. Once the cakes for Christmas day are in the oven, we play and sing carols and bring out the boxes with decorations. We use the same ones every year and add just a few more new ones.

Santa Claus comes during the night, so we open presents in the morning, but this time we all went to church in the morning and kept the fun of sharing presents for when all my aunts and uncles joined us. Daryl was really keen to talk to everyone, so my brother thought to help him out. When he asked how to say 'nice to meet you' in Romanian, my brother taught him to say 'you have nice legs', so you can imagine the giggles and raised eyebrows they all had.

Christmas lunch was no less adventurous. Mum brought in the starters and encouraged Daryl to have second helpings. When he eventually felt that he had eaten plenty of the many pork cold starters, he asked me if he should leave some space for cake. Mum heard and said 'not before the next courses: pig legs in gelatine, the sour soup, the cabbage rolls, and the steak with pickles'. We all laughed and it remains known as the 'Seven pork courses' Christmas lunch.

Christmas at Chartwell

Chartwell, the former home of Sir Winston and Lady Clementine Churchill and their family, is of course a local as well as an international attraction and a comment from visitors, often heard there, is that it is such a homely family home.

That was undoubtedly so when the Churchill family lived there and that atmosphere clearly remains. It was Clementine Churchill who set about turning the house into a family home and her taste and style can still be seen and experienced much as it was at the time.



Of the Churchill children, their youngest daughter Mary, spent most of her childhood there and it must have been a wonderful place to grow up both playing as well as mixing with the famous people who visited Chartwell and a particularly magical place at Christmas, as you can hopefully see from the following anecdotes which come from her and others' memories of Christmas there. In winter, when snow permitted such as that of 1927/8, outside games would provide entertainment such

as skating on the lakes as well as tobogganing down the slopes at the rear of the house. The varying slopes there were said to provide various degrees of challenge to courageous riders and there are also stories of enough snow then to allow igloos and snowmen to be built.

Before Christmas presents would be hidden away from the children in a cupboard, near the nursery known as the' Genie's Cupboard' which was definitely out of bounds. The house would be decorated in a restrained way by the gardeners who would bring in bunches of ivy, holly and laurel to decorate the rooms and also hang a great bunch of mistletoe in the hall. A Christmas tree would also be brought in and decorated often with real candles. Perhaps predictably, one year, the tree caught light and was very quickly ablaze but the situation was saved by the quick and cool thinking of one of the party who grabbed a fire extinguisher.

At Christmas the children would have stockings to open and then it was off to church before returning for presents before lunch. The dining room became the focus of Christmas day with a large lunch for all those attending, the food often supplemented by gifts from generous admirers of Sir Winston, particularly in early post war years when rationing was still in force and food otherwise in short supply. After lunch there would be conversation around the table often with Sir Winston in his

element in reciting verse or stories. The dining room also made an ideal place for the children's Christmas plays with the stage area behind the curtains which could be drawn across the room.

Underlying all of the Christmas festivities there were often the affairs of state, ever present in Sir Winston's mind, with a secretary often on hand to take dictation.

The National Trust always looks to decorate the house at Christmas in a sympathetic way to represent it as the house would have been in pre-war years. The house is usually open on the three weekends in the run up to Christmas but check on the National Trust website beforehand if you are thinking of visiting.

Being a steward at Chartwell is always a pleasurably rewarding and social experience and perhaps more so at Christmas as families with children visit to experience the house decorated as it would have been in period. Volunteering opportunities need not necessarily involve being at Chartwell though, which is something to consider under current restrictions, for example the Collections Research Team is able to work remotely. If you are interested in volunteering opportunities at Chartwell then take a look at the National Trust website or email chartwell@nationaltrust.org.uk and someone will be able to help.

A 1950's Childhood Remembered

I grew up on a farm in County Armagh... Ireland's 'apple county' where my father grew apples and bred pigs. Our farmhouse was very old. My father was the fourth generation of the family to live there. No central heating in those days but fireplaces in every room including the bedrooms. Lavering was the key to keeping warm! We burnt peat in the fires and that smell was guite wonderful. My mother always seemed to be cooking and she baked all her own bread. Everything was delivered to the door and you got to know which days it would be the baker, butcher, groceries or fishmonger. We even had lemonade delivered!

Every now and then my mummy would disappear for a while and I would be sent to an aunt's house. When I got home there would be a Moses basket lined in either pink or blue and a new brother or sister for me....I don't ever remember her looking pregnant! I was the eldest of seven children. Life was always spent outdoors. Picking wild flowers, making dens, camping, just coming inside to eat and then off again. Our bicycles had belonged to my aunties who'd grown up on the farm and were quite challenging to learn on but that was my only means of transport to either the local shop, choir practice, Girl Guides, or The Girls Friendly Society ... far too big but I managed.



School was a small country primary school with just two teachers but a very happy place. I have an abiding memory of having to drink school milk that had gone off slightly in the warm weather...no fridge in those days and I still hate milk! The picture is of me (bottom right) in the school shop.

Sundays were always the same. Church, lunch, Sunday School, afternoon tea then evening service. Our family pew was right at the front by the pulpit so you had to behave! I absolutely loved Sunday School and my teacher Miss Florence Martin. She was a wonderful Christian human being, she ran the Mothers Union and sang in the choir and I

often wonder how she managed to do everything at home as well as being involved in our church. I kept in touch with her until she died.

Christmas time was magical in our home as I truly believed in Father Christmas and can remember vividly the doll's crib I had seen in a store with mummy appearing on Christmas morning and I can also remember the shock of discovering in an old tea chest the very things I had asked Santa for....my two older cousins had been right about him not existing after all! Another year I had dolls clothes knitted by an aunt on her newly acquired knitting machine. Stockings with tangerines in paper and shiny chocolate coins were also a treat to look forward to. My mother was always up at the crack of dawn to get the turkey in the oven. As a farmer Christmas day was no different to any other for daddy but, my goodness, he loved it and all its traditions and between them they made it special for all of us.

COVID

Hever Parish Council, working with Sevenoaks District Council, continue to offer a service for those who may be shielding to assist with urgent food or medicine supplies. Please contact clerk@hever.org or SDC (who can offer further services) through their website or by calling 01732 227000.

LOCAL NEWS

Hever parish field is having a new pedestrian (buggy / dog friendly) gate installed at the gap near the school entrance.

The dog waste bin near by was knocked over and will be relocated inside the parish field to increase its visibility to dog walkers. All the dog waste bins in the parish are emptied weekly by SDC, a service the parish council pays for.

Four Elms recreation ground (behind the primary school) – we are looking at some eco-friendly matting options to path the route from the gate to the rear of the school – to make it more pleasant for those walking to the playground or accessing the rear of the school (as part of the covid procedures for pedestrian flow).

TREES

Kent County Council manages both the publicly maintainable highway and the recorded public rights of way and access land within the county. Most trees in rural areas are the responsibility of private landowners. If a private tree is causing a risk to pedestrians or road users, we ask that the owner take appropriate action to mitigate this risk. Landowners and managers have a duty of care to manage trees under their responsibility. Therefore, if you are responsible for trees it is important to have a management plan in place and to have your trees regularly inspected by a competent person.

SOUTHEAST WATER

With the arrival of chillier weather, South East Water is asking customers to carry out a winter MOT on their homes and those of elderly family, friends, and neighbours to avoid burst water pipes this winter.

Pipes burst when exposed to extreme cold such as in attics and outside buildings. Garden taps also need protecting against the cold. The company is also highlighting its Priority Services Register and special tariffs to help vulnerable customers and those in financial difficulties. Please call 0800 952 4000.

our rector's thoughts

This month Jane Rosam is writing her final contribution to news from the pews as she has recently stood down as St.Peter's Hever churchwarden to pursue her theological studies for 'licensed lay ministry'. I am extremely grateful to Jane for her consistent, faithful and tireless service as churchwarden over the past six years and for her support and welcome when I first arrived on the scene last year. I am particularly grateful for her wisdom and collaborative approach as I and the wardens have worked to ensure we continue to 'do church' during the various lockdowns and Covid restrictions. Thank you Jane!

As I write this we're all wondering what Christmas is going to be like. It will certainly be different and as the church in the Three Spires, we're determined Christmas is not going to be cancelled! But do check as services may be subject to last minute change. For some it may be uniquely difficult if separated from family and friends, suffering illness or financial shock and I know we'll all keep a look out for any in special need. Do let me know if I or the church can do anything.

One thing that won't change will be the watching of films on the TV. Perhaps we'll have some of the Narnia films based on the books by CS Lewis. I read the books as a child, but didn't realise they contained such a strong allegory with Aslan being the Christ figure. Lewis held academic posts at both Oxford

and Cambridge and, as well as creating Narnia, he wrote on poetry, medieval literature, science fiction and Christian theology. He was not always a Christian and experienced a conversion in 1929 recorded in Surprised by Joy.

One of the first Christian books I read, shortly after my own conversion as a teenager, was Mere Christianity, adapted from a series of Radio broadcasts given by Lewis. In the book, Lewis says of Jesus: God has landed in disguise on this enemy occupied world in human form. He was talking about Christmas and the 'incarnation'. God himself, in Jesus, became a human being and lived among us. He was and is Emmanuel, a Hebrew word which means 'God with us'.

Lewis made the obvious point that Christianity, if false, is of no importance, and if true, of infinite importance. The only thing it cannot be is moderately important. Worth bearing in mind as we hear the age old story again this Christmas. Perhaps we'll have more time this year to reflect on what it means. What could be more important than that?

I wish you all a very joyful and peaceful Christmas.

landscape gardening

It's not all about landscaping

You would be forgiven if you thought that Willerby Landscapes, which is based in Four Elms, and one of the UKs leading commercial hard and soft landscapers was just about installing landscapes such as the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park and Europe's highest public park the Sky Garden on the 32nd floor of 20 Fenchurch St London, to name a few.

What is not largely known is in addition to installing prestigious landscapes and roof gardens, behind the scenes Willerby Landscapes is a UK leader in technical developments to support its business. By the nature of its business, the landscaping industry has lagged behind many other industries in the use of technology and more recently this has proved to be the case where the number of roof garden installation in London has increased along with Health & Safety concerns for the operatives and public when lifting materials high onto the roofs of commercial and residential buildings.

When Willerby won the tender to install the 300m roof garden on Google's new UK headquarters, it had been working on a fresh approach to lifting items on to the rooftop. "One of the ways the tender was adjudicated was on innovation," says Matt Ainscow, Operation Director for Willerby. "Google isn't just interested in best price but also in best quality. It wants to see people build things in new ways. So, we

developed a new lifting system to get the soils and materials up to the roof which involved developing a smartphone App for the operatives to use to check the safety of the bespoke lifting bag which lifts the materials. On scanning the specific barcode for the bag, the App will inform the user the current status of the bag. It will state that the bag was OK or Rejected at its last scan during the journey of the bag to the location.

The key factor is that the named App, Willerby BagChecker, is real-time process for both front-end operative users scanning a barcode and backend administrative and Health & Safety management user. Having an environmental advantage, the developed lifting bags are reusable. This presents a need to ensure that the bags are commissionable at every lift and comply to LOLER regulations for Health & Safety lifting operations. Consideration has also been given on the situation and operative management for checking the condition of the bags, before, during and after the lift.

So clearly for Willerby Landscapes there is more to just installing beautiful landscapes, there are opportunities to improve safety and to meeting client expectations by innovative thinking and the use of technology to meet these aims.
