# The day I had my Covid vaccine

Saturday, 9th January, I was on my way to Sevenoaks for my assigned 8:35 slot for the Pfizer Covid-19 vaccine.

I made my way to the front entrance of the medical centre where I was met by two friendly masked young people, one of whom accompanied me inside and handed me over to another who was to check I was the person I was supposed to be. I was then shown to a room where I was questioned about my general wellbeing and whether I had at any time had a severe reaction to a medical procedure.

Everything being satisfactory I was led into a waiting room where two or three of us awaited our turn. When my turn came I was led into an inner room where I was to be vaccinated. Two women were there, one to do the vaccination, the other to assist. I was then taken along a passage to a room with chairs and people waiting for the required 15 minutes wait to ensure there were no adverse reactions. I was then shown through a glass door into a passage at the end of which was the back exit, and was told that I would find my son there with the car. Everything was well organised and there was always a friendly help to scoop me up and push me on to the next bit.

# A good news bird story

It does sound good in Latin. Sylvia dartfordiensis, the Dartford Warbler.

This little bird was first identified on Bexley Heath in April 1773 as an as-yet un-named breed by the ornithologist, John Latham, hence the name.

They were nearly wiped out during the cold winter of 1962/3 and were down to only 11 pairs. They hated the "Beast from the East" of 2018 too - but now all is well and this last mild winter has been popular with dartfordiensis.

The bird is resident in lowland heathland with gorse and heather, from Surrey west and in Suffolk but Kent's only home-named bird (is it?) is sadly no longer resident here.

# IN VINO CANTICA VERITAS

If you walk north east from Chiddingstone Hoath along the little lane past the lovely houses that make up the hamlet of Oakenden, it peters out into a footpath. After a fine view and a big field the thicket opens out into Harden vineyard. It grows "regent" grapes, a little known dark skinned variety originating from Germany and producing red wine.

More well known in Kent is the Bacchus grape, prolific in the Chapel Down vineyard in Tenterden, but by no means ruling the roost. The Kent Vineyards website shows 50 vineyards throughout the county producing a variety of wines and reminding us that buying English is no longer the patriotic but long-suffering act it once was.

I don't know where you can buy Harden's but Squerryes in Westerham has made a huge success of its sparkling wine. In 2004 a French champagne house visited the estate, then known only for its Grade I listed house, attracted by the terroir, chalk and greensand, which bore a striking similarity to the Côte des Blancs region of Champagne.

They did not strike a deal with the Warde family (who have been at Squerryes for eight generations) who then decided to go it alone and planted 35 hectares of grapes, Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier in 2006 and waited. In 2010


they took their first reserves and in 2016 their 2011 Brut won best English sparkling wine. You can buy it and also Westerham Brewery beer (whose spent brewer's grains feed the Squerryes dairy herd) in their shop/ restaurant at Beggars Lane just outside Westerham and in Waitrose. You might need to hurry as sales of sparkling wine are up 25% this year.

There is also a productive vineyard at Groombridge place and Sanden vineyard, also in Groombridge, sells its sparking white and rosé at Penshurst farmers market. Meopham valley vineyard has been going since 1991, producing a variety of still as well as the sparkling wine which this region seems to do so well, just like the Champagne region. But then of course the Roman's had got it right centuries ago when they introduced vines to Kent (which they called Cantica) in 43AD – and then the stuff turned out to be so good that they had to pass laws limiting English wine imports to Italy to protect the Italian producers.

Whoever mentioned Brexit?

PS The Harden's walk turns into a long circular walk via Penshurst or a shorter one via Blower's Hill and Salman's.




The clock at Holy Trinity church was built by B. L. Vulliamy, Clockmaker to the Queen, and has the inscription:

'Presented to the church of the Holy Trinity, Markbeech by John G Talbot Esq. in memory of the founder, May 1853'.

The mechanism is reached through a small door at the base of the clock tower, with a very narrow, spiral, stone staircase leading up, so a prerequisite for entering the clock room is an immunity from claustrophobia! Just a little bit of technical information: the clock is a tower clock with plate and spacer movement, a design popular in the early to middle nineteenth century.

It has two gear chains, the running gear which controls the time shown on the clock face, and the chiming gear which ensures the clock chimes correctly on the hour. The clock 'motor' is a set of weights on a wire and pulley. As the weights fall, they operate the escapement and the large pendulum, which produces the well known tick-tock sound. When the weights reach the bottom of their movement they need to be wound back up for the clock to continue.



Originally, the weights were wound by hand but now an electric motor does this automatically. If there is a power cut, the clock will continue until the weights reach their lower limit, and then the clock will stop and the time must be reset. There is also an electric switch which controls the chiming mechanism. The bell itself is in a separate area above the clock room, reached by a wooden ladder.

My involvement started after some casual conversations with the Talbot family, offering to occasionally check the clock and adjust it as necessary.

My career was in engineering and I have always had an interest in mechanical devices, particularly those based on old technology, so was quite happy to take on the role, previously undertaken by, among others, Len Linden and Andro Linklater. The clock is serviced annually by the London Clock Company and so the role of 'clock keeper' is making small adjustments as necessary. The movement has a small dial and pointer showing the time and a lever which has to be turned to make the adjustments.

I go up the tower about once a month with my iPhone, which has a digital clock, and use that to reset the time if needed. Twice a year, at the equinoxes, the time has to be moved back or forward an hour. The adjusting lever must only be moved anti-clockwise so, in October, when the clocks go back, the clock must



be moved forward 11 hours, which is 66 chimes and could be a bit irritating for those living very close to the clock. I have now discovered that the chiming lever can be uncoupled while the clock is adjusted, so that the bell does not ring.

From late medieval times clock keepers had an important role, as church and town clocks were the main way of keeping communities informed of the passage of time.

That is not the case now but I think it is important to help, in a small way, to keep this lovely piece of engineering heritage 'up to scratch'.

Hever Parish Council last met on 7th January 2021. The budget has been set to ensure that key services are maintained whilst not imposing any increased financial burden on residents, the parish council part of the council tax will reduce slightly for 2021 – 2022 which is important to do in these financially difficult times for everyone.

Hever Parish Council are required (by Sevenoaks District Council) to undertake a Housing needs survey every 5 years. This was done (independently) in 2018. You may remember getting a survey in the post. It was also advertised widely (on all noticeboards, Link magazine, Facebook, plastic banners etc.). We have been considering the responses to that survey and investigating possible solutions to the issues raised, namely the lack of affordable housing to rent, particularly smaller properties, for local people. There is only one site in the parish that is available for consideration (everything else was either not in a suitable location or landowner chose not to).

As the January edition of this magazine had to be printed before Christmas and therefore before the council meeting I could not give

you the dates of the meetings in this magazine any earlier although they have been widely advertised elsewhere. There will be Zoom meetings on Tuesday 26th January 3-5pm and Saturday 30th January 4 – 6pm at which the Clerk and Councillors will be present to answer any questions. There are also many opportunities for locals to be able to comment on the proposals (online survey, by email, leaflets delivered to households in Four Elms etc.).

Please note this is a consultation and opportunity to ask questions NOT a planning application. This is because the parish council want your views. The parish council won't own the land or housing or have any financial interest or risk in the scheme whatsoever.

Please see lots of information on www.hever.org and advise the Clerk if you need any assistance in submitting comments etc. The deadline for comments is 14th February.

### our rector's thoughts

I was having my eyes tested some years ago and the Muslim optician asked me: 'Do you fast?'. We know that fasting during Ramadan is one of the pillars of Islam and I remember being in Egypt watching a boatman breaking his fast as the sun set with dates in water.

Jesus said 'When' not 'If you fast', because fasting was then a weekly discipline. It seems to be less observed in the church today except perhaps during Lent which starts on 17th February and lasts the forty days up to Easter matching the forty days during which Jesus fasted in the desert.

Fasting is back in fashion. We have 'dry January' to encourage sobriety after the supposed excesses of Christmas and there are health programmes like 'intermittent fasting'.

Fasting doesn't have to be about food and drink or giving up chocolate during Lent. In the past I have fasted from watching television and from social media. Even technology geeks in Silicon valley are fasting from technology once a week as a means of weaning themselves off dopamine, the chemical released in the brain from pleasurable activity! But with endless Zoom meetings and needing to keep in touch during the necessary lockdown, perhaps now is not the time for this type of fast.

Fasting doesn't have to be about giving things up either. Have a look at

the 40acts website (see 40acts.org. uk) which provides suggested acts of generosity to perform in Lent. During Covid, this might be a very good thing on top of all the existing acts of kindness which we've seen in our communities and more widely.

But is fasting about gritting our teeth and trying to do something either for our health or to prove to ourselves that we have will power?

Fasting in the Christian tradition is all about abstaining from something for a spiritual reason rather than an end in itself. Fasting is about humbling ourselves and realising we are not always in control. That is why the Lenten fast starts with Ash Wednesday, when our foreheads are signed with the cross in ash with these sombre words reminding us of our mortality: 'Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return'. Maybe Covid has reminded us of the fragility of life. Of course, we'll need to find an alternative way of doing Ash Wednesday safely this year!

Most importantly though, as the lockdown enforces a fast from activity, why not use this as a time to reflect on our lives and even to seek God? Through the prophet Jeremiah God says: You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart (Jeremiah 29:13).

Keep safe – keep well – keep praying God bless you all

### gardening

As I write we're in full lockdown, the pandemic is rife and the weather is awful. It might not be the start to 2021 we were hoping for, but there is hope. We have the vaccine rollout and a year ahead in the garden to plan for.

I love this time of year not only as a commercial grower but as a gardener myself. Plant catalogues drop onto the doormat and are always met with excitement! One such publication arrived this week from Avon Bulbs. It reminded me that there are many goodies we can plant to enhance our gardens in the month of February.

In recent years there has seen a huge rise in the popularity of Snowdrops (Galanthus). Comparable to the Victorian craze in Tulips, there are now hundreds of cultivars available. Snowdrops exchange hands for big money and the aforementioned catalogue contains single bulbs for as much as £90 each! To most a Snowdrop is a Snowdrop! To avid collectors they are looking for variants with green tipped petals, (Marjory Fish), yellow (Primrose Warburg), doubles (Miss Prissy) and even faces (Grumpy) to name a few!

Personally you cannot beat the common single, Galanthus nivalis en masse. We visited Welford Park in Berkshire last year to see swathes carpeting a five acre wood - a true spectacle! Although we can't go this year there are Snowdrops closer to home. Hever Castle in recent years has planted 90,000 Snowdrops throughout the grounds. From February 10th, enjoy

a socially distanced amble along their Snowdrop trail.

A brief wander around the nursery this week showed there is much more besides Snowdrops to brighten up the garden in February. One of my favourite Winter shrubs is currently in its pomp-Sarcococca confusa is evergreen with dark, glossy foliage with at first glance fairly inconspicuous white flowers along the stems. What sets this plant aside is the most amazing vanilla scent. Plant near the house to get the best benefits.

What also caught my eye was our batch of Cornus (Dogwood) A deciduous shrub, they have brightly coloured stems that intensify in colour with colder weather. Standout varieties include 'Baton Rogue' (red), flavaramea (yellow) and 'Midwinter Fire' (orange). Other shrubs notable for their stunning Winter foliage are Nandina and Leucothoe. Evergreen shrubs, they are at their best at this time of year with colour enhanced by cooler temperatures.

Despite a dreadful 2020, we as a business experienced a remarkable year. Our 38 year old family business can plan for 2021 with the importance of outside space and gardens ever more prevalent.

Unfortunately we regret to say there are no public open weekends planned for the early part of this year. Hopefully once the vaccination programme takes effect, we can welcome you later in the year.

Don't forget Go2 bus services if you are considering transport options, for instance, to the Sevenoaks Medical Centre for vaccinations. You can request a bus from a bus stop near you to the Fire Station in Sevenoaks which is next door to the Medical Centre. The bus should be at your chosen stop within 30 minutes. Fares vary but all adults pay £6.50 each way for any journey over 8 miles. To use the service you first need to register using the Go2 Sevenoaks app or by phoning 01732 463 964.
