
# A tribute to Martin Lambie-Nairn

Martin was a resident of Haxted and, with his wife Cordelia, a regular visitor to the Henry VIII. As his Guardian obituarist, Nick Sunderland, said he was also a graphic designer who transformed the world of broadcast branding and co-created Spitting Image.

Even though Martin's name will not have been familiar to millions of audiences all over the world, his ground-breaking work in the fields of television and broadcast design will certainly have touched, entertained and inspired them. Especially his branding work for Channel 4 and the BBC. His idents were so hugely popular they even received fan mail for their wit and originality.

Martin, who died on Christmas morning at the age of 75, was an early adopter of computer animation, which he used to create the bold and colourful 'animated blocks' identity for the launch of Channel 4 in 1982. From then, he and his design agency, went on to reinvent and create the visual identities for a host of TV channels and brands around the world. These included the iconic BBC One and BBC Two television 'idents' (an industry term used to describe a moving logo shown to identify a TV channel between programmes) such as BBC 1's floating globe balloon and BBC 2's witty, dramatic or beautiful "2"s, as well as the oxygen bubbles identity

for mobile phone network O2. It was as important to him to bring wit and beauty into people's lives as it was to differentiate the brand that he was working for.



In the wider world of television, Martin was also credited with the co-creation of Spitting Image in 1981 with John Lloyd, Roger Law and Peter Fluck and was pleased to see the show return to British screens in 2020. Sharp eyed viewers will have seen in the closings credit that the show was "from an original lunch with Martin Lambie-Nairn."

Born in London on the 5th August 1945, the son of a tax inspector

and an accountant, his prodigious talent would not have been predicted but after attending Canterbury College of Art, now the University for the Creative Arts he began his career in television at the BBC and then moved to London Weekend Television and ITN where he developed the on-screen graphics for the Apollo space missions and later the design for ITN's corporate logo as well as the title sequence for News at Ten.

In 1990, Martin became consultant creative director for the overall BBC brand, a position he was to hold for 12 years. In 1999 he worked alongside the television and radio composer David Lowe to launch yet another category-defining identity, this time for BBC News. The aim was to capture the brand's strength and reputation as a world class global news organisation. The work is still used on air and online today.

In later years, Martin continued to work on a range of major national and international branding projects including the rebrand of the Royal Opera House in 2011, the launch identity for the UK's leading biomedical research centre, The Francis Crick Institute in 2016, the creative development of the HSBC brand in 2018 and the rebrand of BT in 2019. He also oversaw the Blue Peter competition to design the official emblem for the Queen's diamond jubilee.

Martin was appointed a Royal Designer for Industry in 2012 and was a Fellow of the Royal Television Society. His work received numerous accolades including the Prince Philip Design Prize, a Gold D&AD for his work for Channel 4 and a BAFTA for his work for BBC2. The company was also awarded the Queen's Award for Export in 1995.

Always keen to encourage the next generation of designers and creative talent, he was a Visiting Professor at the Faculty of Art, Architecture and Design at the University of Lincoln where he held an Honorary Doctor of Arts. He also held an Honorary Doctor of Arts from the University of Northampton.

# Coronavirus at the Castle



#### Duncan Leslie, Chief Executive of Hever Castle, writes about their experience of the pandemic.

The last year has been a difficult one for us, just as it has for most, other than subscription TV channels, some take-aways and, of course, Amazon – to name a few!

We started 2020 with really poor weather which suppressed our visitor numbers and then coronavirus hit. Initially numbers fell away, particularly schools, as people were concerned and then, of course, the first lockdown happened. This was devastating. The team here work very hard planning events going forward and suddenly we were

having to cancel things left, right and centre. Once we got over that initial shock, a degree of stoicism kicked in and I think, particularly for the resident staff, Hever Castle with no aeroplanes and no people, meant we privileged few felt extraordinarily lucky – particularly with the kind weather.

The maintenance team continued to work as, alas, the castle doesn't stop needing attention just because it's closed. The gardeners went down to a skeleton crew, as did the greenkeepers on the Golf Course and most other people were furloughed.

Many of our regular contractors, including our caterers, and some of

our tenants have had it very tough this year. Hever Health (up at the golf club, highly recommended), a relatively new business, and the Henry VIII, another tenant of the Estate, has also felt the full force of this awful virus.

We were very excited to open in June but it was, however, somewhat disappointing. Fortunately we already had a booking system and it wasn't too difficult to change it so that everybody coming had to pre-book to limit numbers. The problem we had is that most who visited in June were annual passholders so the income we received was less than 20% of normal whilst the income for weddings and events was zero. Also some of our annual passholders booked a visit every day but only turned up on one of them, thereby precluding other visitors - on a bad day we had over 40% no-shows! An appeal had some success in reducing the problem.

July and August were better although we were still some way off normal but the Astor Wing/accommodation was particularly successful with 99% occupancy with people just desperate to get away and the feedback was that the team managed visitors and safety very well which was great to hear.

September and October were better still and our numbers were above the 5 year average. November was our best ever. This heralded the start of our Christmas opening and Coronavirus forced us to re-think everything we did and so we came up with a new system which allowed us to get visitors in safely without too many at any one time.

The loss the castle has made this year is not surprisingly a record, but thankfully because of the hard work of the employees I believe it was significantly smaller than it might otherwise have been.

As I write this, much of the team are furloughed again and we have been cancelling accommodation all winter long and, increasingly, weddings and other events too - some might well be delayed two years! Despite all this the team have stayed positive and are working hard to ensure that, as soon as we are able, visitors will be warmly welcomed and there will be much to see. We opened on the 10th February for people that live locally to take exercise. You should see lots of snow drops and later on tulips and daffodils.

PS We also have had two film crews recently – one a company filming a period drama, the other a BBC docudrama about the Boleyn family.



# Pied Wagtails, Motacilla alba

Pied wagtails are always a joy to see. They are small birds, immediately recognisable by the jaunty bounce of their long tails and their immaculate black and white evening dress attire.

They are unfussy about where they live, being found across Britain in areas from remote mountain moors, to low-lying wetland and city centres. I read recently that they are an almost exclusively British bird, although some are found along the channel coast in Europe.

They prefer to nest in stony crevices and frequently make use of buildings, tucking into any nooks and gaps under eaves. They used to nest by our front door, but one morning, as I was watching, a sparrow hawk flicked past my shoulder and snatched one away. They have not been back to nest since then.

They tend to rear two clutches of four to six chicks each season. Their diet mainly consists of insects. In winter evenings, they gather together to form roosts in great numbers, very often in city centres. Apparently, there is one in the grounds of Buckingham Palace. One evening walking out of Victoria Place in Tunbridge Wells, I became aware of the chittering of birds and looking up, saw that the branches of the trees above were filled with talkative

wagtails, the inspiration for this etching.

Why do they wag their tails? There are many theories about this, ranging from scaring off predators to bringing out insects to eat. I have not yet found a convincing explanation!

# Cyril Skinner an appreciation by his son Nigel

Cyril was was born in 1924 to Gwendolyn and Herbert at Roodlands and was an only child until Mary was born in 1937. He went to the Miss Eades School in Edenbridge, where he met Una Higgs who was a friend for life. He was born to be a farmer, or in his own words, bred for cheap labour. He spent much of his spare time helping his parents out on the farm as a youngster. He later went to Judd School in Tonbridge and left at 15 as war broke out.

War was a great adventure for Dad as he recounted many times. When there was a dog fight above, he would stand in an open field to get the best view. All the old boys would take cover and say "get under the trailer ya silly young bugger, ya get ya self killed" as the bullets kicked up the dust but Dad took no notice.

At night, during the air raids, he would refuse to go into the cellar with the rest of the family, reasoning that if the house was hit he didn't want to get buried. So he either slept in his room at the top of the house, or probably went out in the garden to get a closer look. Several bombs landed nearby sometimes blowing out windows and knocking off roof tiles. He made a fine collection of bullets and anything else that either fell off or was thrown out of a plane



during these events. I remember he once told Tom and I that he applied to join the RAF. We often muse that it was a good job they turned him down because we more than likely wouldn't be here today if farming hadn't been considered an essential service. A few years later he joined the Observer Corps and spent many nights, after milking, searching the sky's at Delaware near Hever for enemy planes. And this interest stayed with him for the rest of his life. In fact there were not many planes crossing the sky that he couldn't identify.

He met my mother Vivian in the mid fifties. She was working as a landgirl on a nearby farm and Dad would take squirrels he had shot for their ferrets to eat. I don't know how many squirrels it took to win her but they married in the late fifties and sooner or later Tom and I were born.

Dad would often take us to Biggin Hill for the air shows, and most times treat us all to a flight in some old museum piece. After he sold most of the farm in the late seventies he and Mum embarked on his second love in life, travel. They travelled pretty much to the four corners of the earth. Dad in particular wanted to visit as many countries as he could, sometimes changing the whole itinerary when he realised the trip dipped into a country they had visited before. I think they managed to notch up about a hundred and thirty countries, before Mum died in

2004. Dad continued to travel, this time going with Mary, sometimes revisiting old ground or trying out something new.

With Shirley, Sam and I living next door and looking after him, with increased frequency as time went on, Dad was able to live at home for the rest of his time. He maintained some social life and enjoyed his garden until his death on 22 January at the age of 97.

By its very nature, Bridges is a Community Café and we will continue to serve the public with good quality, freshly prepared and locally sourced food and drinks. This is a given! But more than this we look forward to welcoming back the mental health support groups which hire our premises, including Reachout, Bridges Dandelion Café, and Creative Minds. A new venture will be to open BRIDGES as a 'Place of Welcome' on Friday afternoons with a new team of volunteers, possibly also operating alongside being a collection point for our local Foodbank. We will offer hospitality, friendship and signposting in addition to the practical help provided by the foodbank. www. placesofwelcome.org.uk

We also hope to bring face to face debt/money management advice to Edenbridge in cooperation with other organisations e.g. Citizens Advice, West Kent Debt Advice and Kent Savers Credit Union This project will aim to reduce stress on those who can only access this advice at present via public transport, or who have no current access to online services.

Naturally, none of this can be done without PEOPLE! These projects will only succeed if I am joined by volunteers who have a desire to help others and share their talents, ability and experience with those who need it. #### district council news

The other day a newspaper bore a cartoon in which two dogs are in a garden. In front of them, a hole. Beside them, a bone. One dog, looking up from a newspaper carrying the headline 'Landfill Tax' remarks to the other, 'It'll be a lot cheaper hiding the bone up a tree!'

The sketch accompanied a piece on the findings of the National Audit Office. '700% landfill tax rise sees surge in fly-tipping,' it proclaimed. You will not be surprised to learn that the Auditor General's report was rather more nuanced. Nevertheless, fly-tipping seemed a good a topic this month what with the press coverage, time having flown since I last wrote on it, and perfectly reasonably being asked the other day, 'Why is there fly-tipping?'

With limited space this will be a bit of a whistle-stop update, but let's give it a go!

The starting point is that a ban on activity doesn't of course result in its cessation. A more nuanced approach is required, which tackles the fly-tippers' motivation, creates deterrents, ensures satisfactory tools for enforcement, and recognises the importance of education too. Therefore, we're trying to play our part on all those strands in addition to the work of Sevenoaks District Council's fly-tipping investigation team, which remains the only one in the county.

First, the motivation. It's money. People wish to avoid the cost of safe and legal disposal of waste. Criminals serve the market and make money, illegally

dumping waste. What, therefore, are these costs? The Landfill Tax is one. A noble idea, however, one that the aforementioned report suggested has increased fly-tipping. Fees at the dump cannot have helped either. That's why when it was proposed they be introduced in Kent, I advocated the projected surplus be ringfenced for fly-tipping enforcement.

Second, deterrents. The fines issued by the courts are far too low. A few hundred pounds is not uncommon. So, Sevenoaks has been working with the Magistrates Association on securing higher penalties.

Third, enforcement. Some of this is a matter of prioritisation of resources in other organisations, so we do what we can to bump it up the agenda. But there are a few practical issues too on which the District Council has worked by designing a new, simpler and more easily enforced licensing regime for waste carriers. Legislation is required so we've engaged the District's MPs.

Finally, education. Only using approved waste carriers is a legal duty for us all. That's why I repeatedly stress the importance of asking to see the paperwork of any contractor removing waste. From leaves to rubble, the requirement is the same. Deprive the criminals of their customers and they will go and find another, more rewarding, activity.

#### The Ocean Project



### our rector's thoughts

I heard someone say that' the vaccine prevents hospitalisation and death'; so it's great that it's being rolled out so rapidly. Strictly, of course, the vaccine prevents death from the Coronavirus and only postpones the inevitably of death itself.

The statistics on deaths from Covid make grim reading and with at least one funeral a month, I am continually confronted by it. Another tragedy is that fact that in the current pandemic many die in hospital without their loved ones present to comfort them and hold a hand.

When I was ordained, the Bishop told the congregation that one of the priest's jobs is 'to prepare the dying for their death' and from time to time I have had the privilege of doing so. But if we're fit and well and we've had the jab, then preparing for our death isn't perhaps something we think about beyond maybe having made a Will.

Despite the prospect of dying unaccompanied in a Covid ward, Christians have always found comfort in believing that they are not abandoned when they die. Martin Luther preached a sermon in which he said: No Christian should doubt that they are not alone. They can be certain that a great army of eyes are

upon them: first, the eyes of God and of Christ himself, then also the eyes of ... all Christians.

Facing our own mortality, we may look for reassurance that we are not abandoned. This is exactly what we are given because Jesus has walked this path before us as we will celebrate this as we approach Easter. Jesus died and, having conquered death when he rose again on Easter day, will be waiting to welcome us on the other side. These words of Jesus when he comforted his followers are often read at funerals: 'My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2-3)

Whether or not we believe this, we need something to hold onto as we make the final journey that we all will one day. Maybe one of the lessons of the pandemic is to be prepared, to look at this life in the light of the fact it won't last for ever and strangely to find it can have a greater meaning when we see it in the light of Christ. Then death, like birth, might be a gateway to something even greater. God bless you all

(Once the boiler room for the church heating) Unprecedented rain and an ageing pump have caused flooding again. So, actually, in some areas life does go on as usual!!

### gardening

The unknown mood of the month of March will soon be arriving, nearing the months of Spring when snowdrops, daffodils and tulips will be growing and bringing their gorgeous colours. We can't welcome her enough and look forward to a peaceful Spring and Summer.

The seed and bulb catalogues are still arriving on the door mat tempting us to buy more, and they do! Now we have packets of seeds spread on the table. Some old favourites and some new varieties. The question is, if they all produce the number of seedling as advertised, will we have sufficient room to plant them? There must be space somewhere! What about planting some up and giving seedlings to your neighbours who perhaps won't sow sufficient seeds this year?

I am trying to grow sweet peas this year. This will be the third year I have made the effort, the last two having been disastrous, although the instructions on the back of the packet say 'easy'. If I am not successful this year the wigwam will be used to support a different plant next year!

Last year I had success with cuttings of Penstemons, so this year I am trying Penstemon Beloved Bells multi-coloured flowers. I was very fortunate to be given a gardening voucher, so what a wonderful way to spend lockdown choosing plants and seeds.

I have been reading a very interesting and instructive article by Alan Titchmarsh who considers ways of being a thrifty gardener. Without his permission, I will pass some of the ideas onto you. "Another way to keep your spade shining is to rub it with crumpled-up kitchen foil. Then buff it up with an oily rag."

Alan was given this tip from the great plantsman, Roy Lancaster: He gave Alan Titchmarsh an old sawnoff dessert spoon. He had sawn off half the bowl of an old spoon and hammered the remaining half of the spoon flat, drilled a hole at the top of the handle and added a hanging loop. Apparently this is the best spade cleaner ever as its skims off wet or dry mud like a dream. Thank you, Mr Titchmarsh for your assistance.
