what we do

It has been all change at the food bank in Edenbridge recently. In April, Julie Barry retired after 10 years running God's Hand Food Bank and a small team established Edenbridge Food Bank in partnership with the national charity, The Trussell Trust. Every Tuesday morning at Rickards Hall on Edenbridge High Street we hand out free food to those who are in genuine need, often due to loss of employment, benefits issues or family/health crisis

The ongoing generosity of local residents is greatly appreciated and as the full impact of the pandemic continues to emerge, the food bank hopes to be able to meet the everincreasing demand for temporary support. We aim not only to give food to those in need, but also to provide a listening ear and get to know our clients so that we can signpost them on to support organisations who may be able to help resolve the crisis which has led to them needing the food bank in the first place. For those who cannot come to collect food from Rickards Hall, perhaps due to ill health or transport difficulties, we deliver food to their homes.

All of our work is done within a Christian ethos as we strive towards the Trussell Trust long term goal of eliminating the injustice of food poverty in the UK and thereby ending the need for food banks. As the Trust says, "When one person goes hungry, our whole society is weaker...It's time to

work together to build a hunger free future."

We have a great team of volunteers, not only those who help at the food bank centre on Tuesday mornings, but also those who collect the food from supermarkets and sort, weigh and pack it up to distribute. We also have good links with a number of local agencies, such as Citizens Advice, schools, housing associations, social services and NHS teams, who then refer to us people who need help.

During the next stage of our development we need to establish a suitable food storage facility as we are currently relying on temporary arrangements. We are therefore looking to raise enough funds to build a long term storage solution. Jill Linden

-an appreciation by her son Matthew

Mum was born on 23 July 1936 to Sidney and Hilda Simms. She was an only child and with her Dad away a lot (he was a soldier in the Royal Army Medical Corps) Mum's early years were quite lonely. However, not long after the start of WW2 she and her Mum moved from Essex to Cornwall to live with relatives who were crab fishermen in Newquay. I loved hearing about the time there and how the place changed from fishing town and

holiday destination to a massive base for the Americans waiting for D Day.

It was during the war that Mum started her lifetime of correspondence, firstly writing to her father, away at the war, and then Aunty Vi and Aunty Elsie who both seemed a ubiquitous part of her early life.

Hardly a week went by without somebody in our house getting a letter or card from Mum, her letters were always full of life, upbeat and interesting and would often include something cut out of the papers that she thought you would like. It wasn't just her immediate family she wrote to, she had regular correspondence with people in America, Australia, Belgium, Germany, New Zealand as well as old and new friends in the UK.

Throughout her life, the most important things to Mum were her family, her friends, her community and her faith. I'm not sure when Mum started to go to church. I do know that when the family were reunited in London she went to All Souls Langham Place for a little while and then St Martin's in the Fields, where Mum and Dad were eventually married. The stories that Mum told about cosmopolitan London



in the 50's where fascinating and it must have been a big change from a small Cornish town.

Mum went to a grammar school (Highbury Hill I think) and her love of history and English literature grew there and she must have been a decent student because she ended up as head girl.

I think both the church and her school gave Mum an opportunity to meet with people from many backgrounds and cultures. Mum loved meeting new people, especially on her extensive travels with Dad and kept in contact with many of the people she met, inviting them back to Water Garden and then Peach House.

After leaving school Mum studied to be a librarian and went on to set up a scientific Library for the British Institute of Management. It was here she met Dad, or Mr Linden as he was supposed to be called. Apparently Dad was considered quite a catch being a former pilot and now senior designer. I know that Mum and Dad went on an early date to a pub in World's End and that she would often go to Dad's house in Carshalton on Saturdays after the football. I think there was quite a difference in the two families and Mum. enjoyed the hustle and bustle of 129 Robertsbridge Road.

Mum and Dad got married in St Martin's in the Fields and started a partnership that lasted over 60 years. Mum would often say how much Dad did for her and of course that's true but Mum was the strength behind Dad and she worked hard to make a fantastic, loving and nurturing family life for us all. As with every family there were difficult times, but Mum was the one who lead us through.

So many local people have shared some part of the last 40 years of Mum's life from Orchard Close to Water Garden House and then Peach House. They know how much the community at Markbeech meant to her and how many really good friends she had here. She always spoke to me so happily of her involvement with the church and how much she enjoyed being part of Hever School working in the library there.

It was an honour and pleasure to be with Mum during the last weeks of her life, even in that difficult period when Mum was in a lot of pain she never complained about her misfortunes. All the carers, nurses and other people that came to help her were amazed at her spirit and determination to be happy, and by being like that she made all our lives better.

She represented her faith in a determined way without being overpowering and I think represented all that is good about Christianity. Mum is at rest now, a deserved and much needed rest. She was the kindest, toughest, most supportive and bravest person I know and I will miss her but I am blessed to have known her and am a better person for it.

Terry Cook

Terry Cook, who died in April, lived in Hever for nearly 70 years. This is a tribute by his family.

Terry John Cook was born on the 4th July 1933 in Camberwell, London. His start in life was a hard one, affected by poverty and parental difficulties. So much so that while still very young both he and his sister Pam were taken

into the permanent care of Barnardo's. Life there was still extremely tough, and he and his sister were often separated. Despite these difficulties, Terry was described in his Barnardo's records as a happy-go-lucky little boy, very honest, and very intelligent and in these early years he learned to be resilient, independent, sensible and strong-minded.

Although life was hard,
Terry had many fond and
vivid memories of this time.
He would often relate how,
whilst living with his first
foster family at Caterham,
he watched the dogfights
high above his head during
the Battle of Britain. He
remembered seeing endless
lines of tanks and other
vehicles filling the roads

around Caterham, ready for D-Day. And most of all he liked to relate how a Doodlebug landed nearby, destroying the windows in the house, and blowing all the feathers off the canary in its cage. Sadly, it did not survive.

Terry was sent to naval college as ex-Barnardo's boys were expected to join the Navy, but Terry was having none of it, and set his heart on joining the army. After leaving school at the age of 14 in 1947, Terry moved to a foster family at How Green in Hever and worked on the farm there until he was 18 when he joined the 8th King's Royal Irish Hussars, a tank regiment. He trained at Catterick and



after the toughness of his upbringing found it easy to adapt to army life. He was determined to make something of himself and passed every exam, quickly attaining the rank of Sergeant, and then became a tank commander.

Terry always said that being assigned the responsibility for a 52 tonne Centurion tank, at that time the most advanced in the world, was one of the proudest moments of his life.

His regiment was posted to Germany to patrol the Russian border, and this was to be the most memorable period of his life. The job sometimes involved covert foot patrols into Russian territory and Terry and his colleagues were told, whatever you do, do not get caught. However, on one occasion the patrol was cut off by Russian soldiers. A skirmish ensued, and although his patrol eventually reached safety, Terry was injured in the leg by shrapnel.

During his time in the army, Terry both attended the Queen's coronation parade, and stood only a few feet from iconic figures such as Field Marshall Montgomery, and General Eisenhower. Indeed, when Prince Philip inspected the regiment, it was Terry who was chosen to give him a ride in a Centurion tank!

After three years Terry left the army and moved back to Hever, where he was to stay for the rest of his life. He entered into village life wholeheartedly, playing village cricket, and was captain of Hever football team for many years until the age of 36. He joined the engineering firm Ailsa Craig in Edenbridge, and stayed there until retirement, rising quickly from machine operator to factory manager, where he was in charge of a large workforce who respected his work ethic and fairness. He married a local girl, Janet,

in 1959 and Terry acquired through her the parents he never had. They had two sons, Graham and Martin, of whom he was very proud and although they sadly eventually divorced they remained on good terms, and for many years Terry helped to look after Janet's mother.

Terry retired in 1998 and was able to enjoy many more happy years at his beloved Parsons Croft in Hever. He took great pride in keeping his garden looking nice, growing flowers and vegetables, and tending to the lawn. A familiar figure around the country lanes, he would often walk many miles a day in all weathers.

Holidays were spent in Cornwall or Devon with his son Martin, but he also visited America several times; a welcome adventure. In 2014 Terry received the unexpected cancer diagnosis which he fought bravely recovering from several difficult operations and always saying "I won't let this beat me". Sadly, he also developed dementia, and this led to his passing on 1st April.

Terry always felt extremely lucky to live where he did. He loved being able to look out of the window across the fields to the North Downs, to see the trees blowing in the wind, and to hear the birds singing every day. He also greatly appreciated all of his wonderful neighbours, who did so much to support him and Martin with many acts of generosity and kindness.

news from Four Elms

This month we'd like to give you an indepth update on our Rights Respecting School Award journey and what it means to our school. In 2020, Four Elms Primary achieved Silver status and now we are hoping to be awarded the highest status of Gold.

So what is a 'Rights Respecting School'? The Award puts children's rights at the heart of schools. UNICEF works with schools to create safe and inspiring places to learn, where children are respected, their talents are nurtured and they are able to thrive. The Award embeds these values in daily school life and gives children the best chance to lead happy, healthy lives and to be responsible, active citizens. Over 1.6 million children in the UK go to a Rights Respecting School and nearly 5,000 schools in the UK are working through the Award.

At Four Elms, through our engaging and creative curriculum, we teach children about their rights under the UN Convention on the Rights of a Child. Those rights are based on what a child needs to survive, grow, participate and fulfil their potential. Pupils learn about their rights by putting them into practice every day. We provide opportunities for children to exercise their rights and to be social activists.

Being a Rights Respecting School has allowed us to create an environment which is respectful, nurturing and safe. The children are involved in a curriculum which allows them to have ownership, to have a voice and to be engaged in purposeful learning.

Below is a summary of just some of the things we do at school to support children's rights:

- Each classroom has a class charter and a playground charter created by the children. These outline specific rights that the children have agreed to respect inside and outside of the classroom.
- Teachers and pupils refer to their rights regularly during the day.
- There are weekly assemblies focused on teaching children about the rights of a child.
- Restorative justice is used to help pupils talk through and solve issues e.g., friendship disputes.
- Each class has an appointed member of the 'Justice League' who help classmates to use restorative justice to solve very minor disagreements.
- Pupils are taught about fairness, equity and dignity.
- Children play an active role in their learning through self-evaluation and reflection.
- Each class has Rights Respecting Ambassadors who make up the School Council which meets weekly.
- Each class has a pupil voice box for the sharing of ideas.
- Children take part in campaigns based on their rights and the rights of others.
- We use questionnaires and surveys to ask children about their views and opinions.

As stated by Unicef: 'The difference that a Rights Respecting School makes goes beyond the school gates, making a positive impact on the whole community'.

district council news

Last month, Her Majesty set out the Government's legislative programme for the year ahead. Thirty-one Bills were outlined; I wish to focus here on three.

Having recently held elections, starting with the Electoral Integrity Bill seems appropriate. This has garnered attention for seeking the introduction of photo ID to vote. The proposals are not new (they were included in both the 2019 manifesto on which the Government was elected as well as the Queen's Speech of the same year) but I include it because it will place on you as well as the District Council new responsibilities. In the case of identification, it will fall to the former to issue such documents free of charge to those currently without.

The second is the Environment Bill. Carried over from the last Parliamentary Session, it is in this that the nationwide standardisation of rubbish and recycling collections, about which I wrote two vears ago, is contained. With recent months seeing the Bill progress line by line through Committee Stage in the Commons – in addition to the release of a further round of consultation documents for which much of the detail was reserved - we're beginning to be able to fully assess its implications. Preserving everything every week collections is our priority since enjoying no complicated collection calendars. no food festering a fortnight, and a simple, environmentally friendly service are hallmarks of the Sevenoaks District which everyone I know wishes to see maintained.

And third is the Planning Bill, with the reforms highlighted in October's Link not having disappeared.

A little over a decade ago, it became apparent that as the country balanced its books, local government would see its funding removed. The risks arising from inaction outweighed those from action, so the Council chose the latter and applied itself to forging a new path. Sevenoaks consequently became the first authority independent of government grant, hence it finds itself today in a position of stability and strength in a sector characterised by cuts and concern.

As creatures of statute, used by government as delivery bodies, councils are heavily exposed to the whims of Westminster. Still, by acknowledging such challenges with positivity, patience, and an open mind we can realise opportunities. It is that approach we will continue to follow and apply to these and other Bills as well as anything else that may be sent to try us.


The plan is to have one main service each month at 10.00am. The first Sunday in the month will be at Four Elms, the second at Markbeech and the third at Hever. The fourth Sunday will be a short Family service with an 8.00am said Holy Communion. We will also start an Evening service, which will vary in style, usually on the first Sunday in the month at 6.00pm. All these services will rotate around the churches. We will continue to hold Forest church at Hever on the second Sunday in the month at 4.00pm in the summer and 3.00pm in the winter. We will also continue with our Zoom Evening prayer at 6.00pm on Thursdays but from July we will hold one of these in person followed by refreshments.

These arrangements may vary slightly due to festivals and special times of the year as in the past. None of this is set in stone but I hope we can see how it goes. Nor does it mean that we don't continue to honour the character, tradition and distinctiveness of each of our churches. So I encourage you all to feel able to attend churches outside your own parish and to continue to show the mutual love, generosity and support that has been evident during the pandemic.

King David writes in Psalm 133: How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity and Jesus prayed for all believers that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. (John 17:21). We're still waiting for that prayer to be fulfilled completely; but perhaps the Three Spires can be an answer to that prayer and an example of that unity.

So do come and worship with us – you can be assured of a warm welcome. God bless you all

gardening

Now we are in June, the beginning of Summer. Long lazy warm days with the gardens looking a picture after our hard labours in a cold dry Spring. Hopefully by now we will be allowed to mix with family and friends without fearing Covid.

The plants I ordered online during lockdown, having time to scan the different websites, have started arriving. Now where do I put them? The small greenhouse is full to bursting and as the weather is so unpredictable, frosts most nights, I dare not put plants outside. Hopefully friends and neighbours will come to the rescue when the plants are large enough to go to a new home.

Plants I have received are perennial Gerbers Garvinea (see photo below) in glowing orange, yellow and purple. It will be interesting to see if these survive in our climate as I have only seen them in bunches of flowers sold at supermarkets. Agastache 'Crazy Fortune' has green and white delicate foliage with purple tall bottle brush spikes. These will be planted in front of Geum Total Tangerine. Another purchase was Philotheca Myoporoides 'Gin and Tonic' The perfume is supposed to be the fragrance of gin and tonic – not so tasty! In another article, I said, that after two unsuccessful years trying to grow

sweetpeas, this will be my last attempt. How true! Small plants have been planted around a wigwam, neatly tied in and raring to go. But no! After extremely high winds one day and night, the wigwam was transported to another part of the garden. The plants survived sitting neatly in a ring, but no support. So will I make another attempt to overcome the 'sweet pea problem' and start re-planting? Yes, of course!

I imagine in the near future we will be planting more seeds to ensure we grow the vegetables and flowers we want, as buying from nurseries will become harder as importing plants will be more difficult and obviously more expensive.

Have you thought of a colour scheme for the hanging baskets and window boxes this year? I am planning on planting a window box with a few of the very colourful Heucheras. They produce so many colour combinations from bright yellow to orange, red and even mahogany.

The hedgerows are beginning to come into flower and the lanes are full of lovely white cow parsley. We have so much to look forward to - enjoy!
