# Welcome to the September Link

I remember the day, years ago, when a school friend gave me a handful of pods with a lovely exotic smell. The exciting thing was that you could burst them and the shiny black seeds popped satisfyingly and exploded into the garden. Soon our tiny London garden was overwhelmed by a thicket of beautiful pink Himalayan balsam - which my mother spent the next few years eradicating.

It has been illegal to plant balsam or introduce it into the wild since 1981 but the stable door was shut rather too late as it has been causing problems ever since it was introduced to Kew Gardens from Kashmir in 1839. Helen Pidd of the Guardian calls balsam "the playboy of the horticultural world" as few plants can spread their seeds like it; when ripe they can land up to 7m (23 feet) away. With each plant able to produce about 800 seeds, it can dominate an area after one season. It doesn't need much light and will grow in a wide range of habitats, shading out other plants, so when it dies back in autumn its destructive legacy lives on, leaving waterways bare and vulnerable to erosion. And this is all very true of the banks of the Eden at this time of year.

Many environmental charities, including the South East Rivers Trust, call for "balsam bashing" volunteers to fight back, and indeed the only good thing about Himalayan balsam, apart from its soothing name, is that it is satisfyingly easy to pull up by the roots. But don't touch it now because the seeds are ready to pop and you will probably help those wicked projectiles on their journey. Lie in wait until the spring and attack then.....

#### what I do

When I started beekeeping 11 years ago I knew nothing of the craft. But I'd always adored honey – especially those jars of thick granular perfumed honey with a white skim on top sent as emergency rations to my Sussex boarding school by my aunt Elizabeth in the 1950s. Elizabeth had learnt amateur beekeeping from her father, born in 1879. When she finally stopped beekeeping, after many years, all her old Edwardian equipment was consigned to a disused chicken shed.

In 1988, or thereabouts,
Elizabeth bequeathed this
equipment, some of it made
useless by the dreaded wax
moth, to her niece Carol. My
sister Carol, 11 years my senior,
likes nothing better than to
mend things and soon the old
hives and frames were firmed
up and repainted, scorched with
a blow-torch and once again made
ready for bees. Elizabeth passed on
her knowledge. 'The bees know best,

interfere as little as possible!'

Twenty years later, Carol, who lives next door to us down a farm lane on the outskirts of Brasted Chart, had become an accomplished meticulous beekeeper whose honey (like that of Elizabeth) has won prizes at the annual competition of our Westerham bee club. But now, in spring and late summer, she needed help lifting off the heavy frames of capped honey. Would I like to try my hand at beekeeping...?

And so it began.

In 2010 in dead of winter I drove to Hildenborough and took a start-to-finish evening course on basic beekeeping given by Master Beekeeper John Hendrie. I noted the finer points of bee anatomy, a catalogue of bee diseases, how bees produce wax, the gestation period of queens, drones and worker bees, the cycle of the bee year, how to make a brood and a honey frame, and much more – all of which I promptly forgot.



It was only when I started to examine brood frames and spotted eggs and larvae, and saw (and killed) my first wax moth, and had been stung a few times by disgruntled bees, and finally caught and marked (with blue nail varnish) a queen bee, and begun to go to summer meetings at the apiaries of other local beekeepers, and had helped out at the big bee tent at the South of England Show, that all of what John Hendrie had so meticulously explained began slowly to make sense.

The beekeeping practised by Carol and me is not particularly 'scientific' and is guided largely by the advice of our aunt. 'The bees usually sort themselves out' – as they've been doing for many millennia. This year, however, we've had the foresight to take on Chris, a mature and most promising apprentice. He now kindly undertakes much of the heavy lifting – and has introduced us to the mysteries of computer spread-sheet record-keeping.

# The Boleyns - a scandalous family

Hever Castle and, mainly, Penshurst Place feature in this new BBC2 mini-series aired in the second half of August and available on iPlayer. Penshurst is a popular location because of its extraordinarily well-preserved interiors and was also a set for Wolf Hall. It is said that Henry VIII used the house as a convenient spot from which to ride over to Hever whilst courting Anne. This was after he had conveniently executed its owner, the Duke of Buckingham, for treason in 1521 and taken possession of the



house. Penshurst went to Anne of Cleeves as part of the divorce settlement and then Edward VI gave it to Sir William Sidney his tutor whose family has been there ever since.

#### Hello folks and hello Snowy

How nice to meet you again through this forum, but now on a completely different subject – and yet still talking about nature.

We have the pleasure to read about

our neighbours' pets but I, unfortunately, do not have one and so make all the creatures that visit Rose Cottage my little pets (including the blackbirds that steal our strawberries and raspberries as soon as they are ripe). That was until we spotted a pure white, albino squirrel in the garden stealing unripe strawberries and then doing yoga on the shed roof, enjoying the few sunny days we had throughout spring and summer.

We nicknamed him 'Snowy'. Although annoyed that we probably would not have any strawberries – which proved to be true – we were delighted with such a rare view. Then we discovered that Snowy wasn't really 'our' pet, he was also visiting St. Nicholas Cottage and probably Bayleaf Hall as well, and who knows who else. Thus, between Jane and myself we thought Snowy was a village pet and should feature in The Link.

Albinism is a rare condition, apparently only one in 100,000 squirrels are born albino: completely white fur, and pink/red eyes. And yet more than 200 have been spotted in southern England

including Sussex, Kent, Surrey and London (Michael Howie, Evening Standard 24 January 2021). We spotted Snowy back in early Spring, but the latest news about albino squirrels in Kent came as recently as early Summer (Megan Carr, Kent Online 24 June 2021).



Now, personally, I don't believe the one spotted back in June in Walderslade is the same animal hence this question: Are albino squirrels less rare than we think them to be, or is the grey squirrel population growing so fast that we are spotting those 'rarities' more often?

It is a valid question because the white fur of an albino squirrel makes them more vulnerable to predators - and we have spotted loads of these over Hever recently, such as red kites and buzzards.

Yet Snowy is doing very well indeed in Hever, thank you very much! He hasn't visit Rose Cottage for weeks – no more strawberries available you see? But it is constantly spotted, and photographed, in St. Nicholas Cottage: he feeds on nuts, does some gym and stretches – to keep himself fit, obviously – and has so much self-confidence he performs for the camera.

# Before and after

the latest successful rescue by the Friends of St Peter's

# I wonder what Hever church looked like before the Victorians had a go at it?


In their devoted but rather arrogant way they raised the floor level in the chancel, making Thomas Bullen look as if he was sinking, and whitewashed the walls, thus destroying forever any remaining traces of wall paintings. Or so it seemed...... luckily the Victorians left us a tiny ancient gem of a wall painting amidst a sea of new bright white distemper.

As with all old churches, unpeeling the layers of the historical onion is difficult. This thirteenth century church followed the medieval fashion and displayed bright latin texts all over its walls but, in time, the rectors started, or were pushed into, making texts more accessible to their congregations which meant that the old paintings were covered with something more modern. It was once thought that our fragment had been painted in the 1530s in a translation by the thenrector Nicholas Heath but the restorer believes the text to be near that of the great King James Bible of 1611. Contrary to the view of the church guide, the text is rather more fearsome than "man cannot live by bread alone" and warns against money lending. It is from Ezekiel 18:13 and says [erased words in square brackets]:

[Hath given] forth upon [usury, and hath ta]ken increase: [shall he then live? he sh]all not live: he [hath done all t]hese abominations; [he shall surely die by death; his blood shall be upon him]

Hard on the heels of the painting came the splendid pulpit, erected on the south wall of the nave. It's provenance is inscribed on it: "Fear God, Honer the Kg. Anthony Brooker Henry Lottenden Churchwardens 1621". All very well, but ten years or less after the painting was finished, Anthony and Henry plonked the pulpit in front of it, obscuring our fragment for 270 years, and saving its life. Back to 1894 - the pulpit was moved to its present location and there it was! Victorian abominations have their uses.





More than 100 years later, the time had come to restore the painting which Thomas Organ of Arte Conservation says is "secco" (paint on dry plaster) as opposed to fresco (painting into damp plaster) and a little powdery but in a stable condition. They cleaned off the dirt, stabilised the paint, injected grout into some gaps and produced a fine result. What isn't explained is how the pulpit could have fitted onto the south wall between the window and the door which used to lead to the priest's opening above the rood screen, the available gap seems impossibly narrow but perhaps after the screen, which separated the nave and the chancel, was taken down no one minded that the door didn't open. A mystery yet to be solved.

# **Hever Parish Council**



The council resumes its regular meetings in September after the summer break. The next meeting is in Markbeech Village Hall at 7.30pm on 7 September, preceded by the planning committee meeting at 7. Everyone is welcome.

The Council's main activity over the summer has been to conclude its public consultation into the proposed affordable housing development behind the garden centre in Four Elms. Although there was much interest from potential tenants, the majority of the community was against the scheme and so it will not proceed. Future proposals may gain support as the objective is to provide affordable housing ring-fenced for local people and, meanwhile, if you are looking for somewhere to live do contact Alison at English Rural Housing Association (Alison.thompson@englishrural.org.uk) as she may be able to help.

A minority of the very vocal opposition to the scheme made allegations against council members which were distressing and unfair and Parish Council chair, John Hodson writes as follows:

"In light of what happened in relation to the Affordable Housing proposal in Four Elms I thought it would be appropriate to share the article sent out in July by The National Association of Local Councils. "Civility and respect should be at the heart of public life and good governance is fundamental to ensuring an effective and well-functioning democracy at all levels.

The intimidation, abuse, bullying and harassment of councillors, professional officers and staff, in person or online, is totally unacceptable; whether that is by councillors, professional officers, staff or members of the public.

This can prevent councils from functioning effectively, councillors from representing local people, discourage people from getting involved including standing for election, and undermine public confidence and trust in local democracy."

Your council is made up of local people giving their time freely to help the best they can to improve our local communities. The council needs your support and perhaps you may even consider offering your services!

If you disagree with what the council does or proposes then make your views known but don't attack the council members personally."

#### district council news

The starting pistol has been fired on the annual budget setting process at the District Council! A curious exercise, you might think, given the much-vaunted ten-year budget – still unique in local government. However, whilst that provides stability and a degree of certainty, the world continues to change, as the past eighteen months have so dramatically shown. Knowledge of our financial position in 2031/32 allows us the freedom to worry less about the day to day, and, instead, to focus on the strategic and longer term.

The theme of last year's budget was, unsurprisingly, survival. Twelve months earlier one of the tasks I set colleagues, in my capacity as Portfolio Holder for Finance & Investment, was to consider marginal gains, the concept – popularised in elite sport – that small improvements in every aspect of an organisation's performance adds up to significant change.

This year the topic is risk.

Broadly speaking we practise risk management every day of our lives, driving a car being the most common example. In business too – nothing ventured, nothing gained. Still, in our public bodies and general outlook, it's something with which we remain uncomfortable as a country. Indeed, when we refer to a proposition as being risky, the implication is it should be avoided. What's interesting is that this is born not of either an academic or applied understanding of risk, rather a cultural aversion.

Although opportunities carry with them risk – and embracing risk can present opportunities – what is vital is not that they be avoided but that we approach them properly. After all that is, in no small part, the difference between investment and speculation. Nevertheless, it is the case that in an age in which decision makers and commentators alike so often make judgements based on how something makes us feel, it requires a degree of clinical analysis of data and evidence with which few are comfortable or even conversant. Sevenoaks District. Council has a long history of judiciously applying these principles.

I've written and spoken before about threats to the status quo. It seems to me important that rather than adopting a head in the sand approach, we should approach them with an open and curious mind so they can be better understood and informed action taken.

That's what we've done in the past – most significantly when we were the first council to become independent of government grant, having concluded the risk of not acting was greater than the risk of changing tack – it's an approach praised by our auditors, and it's the only sure way of ensuring your District Council remains fit in the face of flux to serve us all for decades to come.

The TV series Jeremy Clarkson's Farm seems to have gone down well, even with farmers. Notwithstanding Clarkson's reputation from Top Gear, this series seems to have portrayed him as a quieter, more thoughtful student, who makes a lot of mistakes. Moreover, the series has brought us all face to face with the huge challenges faced by modern day farmers to whom we owe so much especially as we emerge from the pandemic.

We recognise that, as with nature, it is God who provides the growth. So if you are someone who prays, please include this in your prayers.

### gardening

# It's incredible to think it's September already - this year has flown by in a flash! Before we know it, it will be Christmas!

September can be a fantastic month in the gardening calender. Late season can really be spectacular and offer a riot of colours. Spring and early Summer is predominantly tonal shades of pinks, blues, purples and white. Late Summer is all about the other end of the spectrum including oranges, yellows and reds. Long flowering herbaceous perennials, shrubs and trees for Autumn foliage and ornamental grasses for height and movement extend a garden's interest.

This can all be seen in the plants we are growing for the first ever Chelsea Flower Show to be held in September. Usually taking place in late May, the world's premium garden show has been delayed due to the pandemic. We're very excited to be involved and we'll see a totally different show with some fantastic planting. We're growing for a Sussex based garden designer, Naomi Ferret-Cohen and her 'Finding Our Way' garden. It's a tribute to the NHS and all their amazing work during the pandemic.

Here are some of our recommendations for some stunning late season interest as will be seen in the above garden.

**Rudbeckia herbstonne** - a majestic golden-yellow perennial that can grow up to 2m. Back of border, full sun.

**Dahlia David Howard** - burnt orange flowers above dark foliage. All Dahlias are fantastic through to the first frosts.

**Panicum Squaw** - ornamental grass up to 1.5m. A frothy haze of purple seed heads and foliage turns red/oranges in Autumn **Salvia Black n Blue** - A fantastic, majestic half-hardy variety up to 1.8m. Dark blue flowers with black calyx.

**Pennisetum Hameln** - great grass with a mass of large oat coloured bottle-brush seed heads. A tough, reliable selection, this gives interest throughout Autumn.

#### Erigeron karvinskianus Lavender Lady

- a new introduction of Mexican Fleabane that flowers from May-October. There aren't too many plants that give this length of flowering - no dead heading required!



Unfortunately we have no plans for a September public open weekend meaning it will be two years without one. However we will be offering a pop-up shop at the nursery following on from our popular event in July. Dates to be announced. We are delighted to announce that 2022 will be our 40th anniversary as a family business - we hope to bring to you lots of exciting events - watch this space!
