Letters of joy from girl and boy,
Receipted bills and invitations
To inspect new stock or to visit relations,
And applications for situations,
And timid lovers' declarations,
And gossip, gossip from all the nations,
News circumstantial, news financial,
Letters with holiday snaps to enlarge in,

Letters from uncles, cousins, and aunts,
Letters to Scotland from the South of France,
Letters of condolence to Highlands and Lowlands
Written on paper of every hue,
The pink, the violet, the white and the blue,

Clever, stupid, short and long,
The typed and the printed and the spelt all wrong....."

We are so lucky to have a station in Hever at all, and now it has more seats and another shelter (as negotiated between Hever Residents Association, the Parish Council and Network Rail). You can park at the station free for 30 minutes and if you want to buy a day "ticket" for £2.20 you need to use the website justpark.com. But check the slightly disappointing new timetable and remember that the last train home from London Bridge leaves at a decadent 9 pm!

what I do

The Spa Valley Railway runs heritage steam and diesel trains over five miles of line between Eridge and Tunbridge Wells. Since closure by British Rail in 1985 we have doggedly brought the railway back to life, repairing the life-expired infrastructure where possible and building new stations at Groombridge, High Rocks and Tunbridge Wells to replace the originals which were lost to what's laughingly called "development" back in the 80s/90s.

My own involvement started in 1991 as a 13 year old with my late father, changing a large number of rotten sleepers to make the line fit for passengers, and in 1997 we steamed back into Groombridge. There then followed a long and difficult period of negotiation, planning and accreditation to open the remaining two miles to Eridge; the last mile is on Network Rail infrastructure and was therefore subject to us clearing some much higher hurdles than we were accustomed to. The great day arrived in 2011, and since then we have been busy consolidating our financial position and improving our commercial offering. Like a garden though, the work is never finished, and there are still many projects requiring our attention.

It was once most young boys' dream at some stage to be an engine driver, and one that I'm thrilled to have fulfilled. With family, work and other responsibilities, my involvement in recent years has been necessarily reduced, but I still manage to contribute to various infrastructure projects. Last year

we completely relaid the track in the yard at Tunbridge Wells to allow bigger locomotives access to the engine shed, and we have also laid more sidings to make day to day operation much easier and reduce shunting costs. My 9 year old daughter and I also keep the paraffin lamps burning in the signals at Groombridge, and I still get to drive the steam train when time allows!

We are entirely volunteer-run, and always pleased to welcome new faces. So, if you think you might enjoy spending some of your free time constructively with like-minded people, our Volunteer Liaison Officer Paul Compton would be delighted to hear from you. There are opportunities from gardening and landscaping to catering, signalling and train crew. The safety-critical roles clearly all have a training element to them, but no matter your particular interest, you will certainly have fun. Armchair members are also very welcome – it's worth it for the magazine alone, never mind the privilege rate tickets!

Hever station and the Uckfield line

This month sees the 27th anniversary of the Cowden rail crash, an appropriate time to talk about the Uckfield line and Hever station.

The Oxted line as it was then called opened in 1884, relatively late in the history of Victorian railway development,





presumably because of the engineering challenge of digging a long tunnel under the North Downs. The branch from Hurst Green through Edenbridge and Hever was delayed another four years until the Markbeece tunnel, 1,342 yards long, was

completed. In its heyday our line was part of a network which carried travellers all over south east England and down to the coast. Although much curtailed, it survived the Beeching cuts of the 1960s, unlike the line at Hartfield which is now a grassy path, some say because Edenbridge was a convenient station for Churchill at Chartwell. However, the line was cut down to a single track from Cowden station south, with disastrous results two decades later. The Uckfield

branch has never been electrified and still runs on diesel meaning that it's trains cannot use the all-electric Victoria station and run to and from London Bridge once an hour (on average, less during the day).

There are many happy memories of Hever station although until the early 2000s the service was notoriously bad. Una Higgs's children, who were commuting to school in the late 50s remember the stationmaster, Len, very fondly. He kept a roaring fire in the waiting room so the children could warm up before they got on the train. Una remembers ringing Ken if the children were running a bit late

to check that they hadn't missed the train and Chris Brewer reports stories that it was not unusual for the Station Master to telephone his "favoured commuters" to warn them of the trains running late.

A dark episode was the Cowden rail crash on 15 October 1994, a head-on collision on the single track at Cowden. The train crash probably happened because the guard, who was inexpe-

rienced, persuaded the driver of the northbound train to let him drive on that day. The weather was foggy and the signal light possibly dimmed because of insects inside the lamp. Anyway, the fatal combination meant that the driver went through a red light and onto the single track into the path of an approaching train. The signalman could see what had happened but could not contact the driver because a project to fit a radio link had been cancelled. He watched helplessly and all he could do was call the emergency services to attend the inevitable accident. Five people died, the two drivers, one guard and two passengers, and 13 were injured. After the crash the necessary safety measures were introduced.

Jan and Gerry Ryan recall that the station mistress, Jenny, who was famous for practising the trumpet very loudly in the peace of her own station, had predicted this tragedy when the double track was removed. Jenny was the last station master/mistress before the station was sold.



Chris Brewer writes:

Before the station was sold off by British Railways Board in 1990, it comprised the station building and station master's house. Local residents told me that it was purchased by Bernard McHugh who owned a building company specializing in railway services. He was passionate about railways. He modernized and combined the properties with the intention to make the station a training facility for the railway industry but this did not happen.

My company DPL had been operating from The Old Grange since 1994 and needed more accommodation leading to our leasing the buildings and land from BM in 2000 and then the directors buying it in 2003.

We needed more space and so embarked in around 2008 upon the purchase of a railway carriage to site in the goods yard. I viewed the carriage, shortly after it came out of service in Croydon but it was taken to a Ministry of Defence site in Essex for all the asbestos to be removed. Then the task of bringing it

by road to Hever Station was highly specialized operation. The roads are so narrow and the corners so tight but only slight damage done was to Andrew and Elspeth Russell's field gate. It was a delivery attracting many railway enthusiasts. The carriage now adapted and networked to the station buildings is still in use but old leather travelling cases, umbrellas, bowler and top hats remain!

DPL moved to larger premises in 2018 and from 2019 although in the same ownership the station operates as the Hever Business Centre.

Jane More writes about her station memories as a neighbour of the station for many years.

“On a warm Sunday afternoon in late summer 1976 we parked at Hever Station and couldn't believe our luck! We would shortly move into “The Old Farmhouse” a few minutes walk away - where our family of five were to live for 23 happy years. The station was very important with it's hourly service to East Croydon - just in case Bryan was unable to go by car - or for trips to London. At that time Mr. and Mrs. Green lived in the Station House and we would get to know Len from Cowden who, as Una Higgs has said, was so helpful to everyone. At one time there had been large sidings at the station used for transporting goods to Hever Castle. One afternoon in the early 1980's word went round that the Orient Express

would be sitting in the station during the afternoon whilst the passengers visited the castle and so some very excited children rushed home from St. Andrews Convent School to see the unusual sight.


Whilst in our garden we could always keep track of the time, being reminded by either the “up” or “down” trains which usually ran on time. A quick walk with neighbours' dogs would be known as “over the station” where you could cross over the bridge and up the path where violets and primroses grew on the banks, and later delicious wild strawberries. We then passed Mrs. and Mrs. Hutchison's bungalow and the house owned at one time by Mrs. and Mrs. Maynard. On one occasion our much loved and very nosey ginger cat managed to get

himself shut into a room above the garage there. After hours of searching we heard his plaintive cries and once he was released he led the way home confidently running over the railway bridge - tail held high. I guess he was more familiar with the station than we imagined!

In the mid-1990's the short length of straight, flat road leading to the station made an ideal place for driving practice when our daughter was learning to drive! One important memory about the station is the fact that many unlucky passengers did not realise that when coming from Victoria the train divided at Oxted, one part going to East Grinstead and the other to Uckfield, passing through Hever station on its way.

On numerous occasions there would be a knock on our front door and an anxious passenger would tell us they had found themselves on the wrong part of the train by mistake, often in the dark with no lights and, of course in those days there were no mobile phones. Bryan would then take them in the car to their intended destination - once going as far south as Eastbourne! I wonder if this still happens today?

On that first afternoon as we parked at the station we met a lady who was to become a good friend and neighbour - Mrs. Lily Phillips. She lived in one of the two cottages opposite Sandfield Farm and shared her home with a lovely gentleman called "Henry" who had been a butler in a large house where they had both worked. Lily's lovely

and lively dog, "Susie", was one of the dogs who regularly took me around the station! Next door to Lily and Henry lived Emily and Howard Hatcher who had previously run "Chippens Bank" - a guest house for retired actors. Emily was a brilliant cook. On that memorable and obviously busy Sunday afternoon we also met Mr. Figgitt and his wife who at that time lived in Sandfield Bungalow. Mr.Figgitt was the gardener for Mr. Alan Russell at Sandfield Farm and I think his wife worked in the house.

Sandfield Farm is, of course, now the home of Dr. Andrew Russell and his

wife, Elspeth. For several years when they went on holiday I was entrusted with looking after their dogs, "Lucy" a black labrador; and "Mint", a lively Jack Russell. One day I came home to find an exciting-looking parcel and on opening it I found a beautiful water colour painted by Dr. Russell. The note accompanying it said it was a thank-you for looking after "Lucy" and "Mint" over many years. It was, appropriately, a view of The Old Farmhouse from Hever Station and it hangs on our sitting room wall as a happy reminder of our years at Hever and of its very special station.



It has been a very busy few months for me as I settle into the role of Clerk and Responsible Finance Officer. There has been so much to learn, I had very little idea of the variety of things a Parish Council has to do and also gets involved in. It is certainly a very varied job.

Our first meeting back after the summer break had good attendance by members of the public who were particularly interested in the item about Four Elms Pond which the Council, already the leaseholder, is hoping to buy for the community. All our Agendas and Minutes are available on the website and the next meeting is on the 2nd November in Hever Village Hall at 7.30 with a planning meeting beforehand at 7pm.

We were able to set up the Bulk Refuse Freighter again in August which was warmly welcomed by all. We have more dates scheduled in November, February and July so keep your eye out for the posters and www.hever.org for dates and times. There was also a Family Fun day in August at Four Elms field behind the school. The weather wasn't exactly warm, but not too wet either! These are organised and funded by SDC with help from Town and Parish Councils.

As I write this article I have received photographs of the new fencing around Four Elms pond. The Council provided this to enable the previous unsightly metal barriers to be taken away. I am sure you agree, it looks much better.



SDC have had 'smart' rubbish bins installed in all 3 villages. They include sensors that alert the Council when they need clearing and they hold more waste and so save money and cut out wasted journeys which will be friendlier to the environment.

We depend on and appreciate local interest and input into the issues that the Council should be focusing on. We exist to serve the residents so please continue to tell us what concerns you.

our rector's thoughts

If you look through the burials registers in our churches, they go back many, many years. Most striking is the number of infant deaths in the more distant past and even up until the Second World War. But after that, infant deaths become rare and in our current century the ages at death continue to rise. Of course, this is born out by the official statistics reflecting the impact of the NHS and the amazing improvement in public health and medical care.

So why are we holding a healing service in St.Peter's on 7th November and who is it for?

If you read the gospels, Jesus' ministry in Galilee is full of healings. In Luke 10 he sends out seventy two to 'heal the sick and proclaim that the Kingdom of God is near'. Ever since then, Christians have been at the centre of healing and care for the sick and were behind the foundation of many hospitals from the middle ages onwards.

There is no conflict between modern medicine and prayers for healing. Some of you may remember Burrswood, in Groombridge where I was for some years a trustee. It was a registered hospital and centre for healthcare and healing, which, when it existed, offered full person care – body, mind and spirit and was founded by Dorothy Kerin who had herself experienced a miraculous healing in 1912. Although rare, I myself have witnessed a few such

healings first-hand. I believe these are glimpses of the Kingdom of God which Jesus brings. In my experience, it is exceedingly rare for people to refuse an offer for prayer especially when they are unwell and the prayers placed on our prayer tree in St.Peter's are overwhelmingly for loved ones in need of healing.

Healing and wholeness services are part of the Anglican liturgy and you can read a detailed theological introduction at <https://www.churchofengland.org/prayer-and-worship/worship-texts-and-resources/common-worship/wholeness-and-healing/wholeness-and#mm067>

So who is our Healing service for? Well, everyone! I'm sure we all know someone who is unwell and in need of our prayers. The service will not put anyone 'on the spot' and I will invite everyone to come forward to the altar rail for anointing with oil and prayer for themselves or someone they know in need of God's presence and healing.

Such healing also may not be just physical or indeed mental. It includes emotional or 'inner healing', say, from hurts of the past as well as receiving forgiveness and the act of forgiving others which often opens the way to further healing and wholeness. This is so appropriate as we emerge from the pandemic; please come along at 6pm on 7th November in St.Peter's, Hever.

Redefining weeds

The definition of a weed seems to be hard to pin down and as a gardener working in several gardens, decisions on which plants are welcomed in or swiftly removed often boil down to a matter of personal taste or opinion.

I'm currently the WRAGS trainee at Falconhurst, which is a visual treat with borders brimming with colour and abundance. This is the style of garden I prefer, over one that is manicured to perfection. Nicola, the owner and head gardener allows certain 'weeds' to stay such as milk thistle, teasels, wild carrot, yarrow, fox gloves, forget me nots and Verbascum. This allows the garden to blend seamlessly with the ruggedness of the surrounding countryside. There are of course many weeds like bindweed, docks and nettles, which we remove before they completely take over. I still respect some of these less aesthetically attractive weeds.

I've been an advocate of herbal medicine most of my adult life as I believe plants can be powerful allies for our health and allow us to take healing into our own hands. Since completing a horticulture course at Hever Castle over the last year I have been lucky enough to get to know our native plants (or weeds) in much more detail. I have learnt that a plant's usage is often noted in its botanical name. Any plant that has officinale in the name has traditionally been used for medicine. These are a few of my favourites but once you start familiarising yourself with weeds it's amazing to discover how many of them are edible or medicinal.

For example, **Taraxum Officinale** is the **common dandelion**. The leaves and flowers are edible and rich in vitamins and minerals. This plant has been used for centuries as a herbal medicine to treat a wide range of conditions, including stomach and liver complaints.

Nettles, otherwise known as **Urtica dioica**, are the wild superfood we all have around us. It's important to harvest them in the Springtime when they are tender and full of fresh nutrients. Nettles have been traditionally used to treat hayfever, eczema and urinary tract infections amongst many other minor ailments. **Comfrey** or **Symphytum officinale**, is also known as knitbone for its ability to help heal sprains, swellings and bruises when applied topically as a poultice. Comfrey also benefits the garden enormously and can be made into



a natural liquid fertiliser saving the gardener money and avoiding the use of a synthetic substitute.

Next time you pop out to the garden, why not try and identify some weeds as you go? You never know, you might come across something useful. Though if you have any preexisting health conditions or you're pregnant it's always a good idea to check with a qualified medical herbalist before taking herbs.
