This is the month of spiders. I reached down to pick up the stuffing from a dismembered dog toy and it dissolved in my hand.

It was the tangled web of a long legged spinner, not the usual beautiful symmetrical Halloween construction elegantly looped on the long grass, but more like cotton wool. The next day, the field and hedges were covered with little woven hammocks glittering with dew and carefully constructed to catch a falling fly.

So, several types of web in the space of yards such is the extraordinary diversity of our arachnid friends. I see that there are over 650 species of spiders in the UK. What I cannot discover is why the same very large spider appears in my kitchen sink every morning. At least I think it is the same spider. Very clever beekeepers mark a queen bee with nail varnish to identify her, and if I had any I would do the same, but meanwhile I am guessing that he, and he

probably is a he, is a house spider looking for a mate. This is a non-poisonous breed which can grow to a diameter of 8 cm. They build funnel webs which are less glamorous than the Halloween type but effective at catching prey and, being closely woven, a lot of dust as well.

The Natural History Museum says that spiders are not particularly happy inside centrally heated homes and the kindest thing you can do is to trap them "gently and with respect" and put them outside. I have been encouraging the friend in my sink towards self-help but he seems quite happy with my levels of respect.

Get creative!

Following our coverage of local trains in October we received this note from Andrew Izod and the photo below showing the Orient Express at Hever Station in 1984 from Jane Higgs. Many thanks both.

October's editorial reminded me of the minor walk-on part I played on that fateful Saturday. At that time, I was a Special Constable in the Kent Special Constabulary. I first heard about the crash on the radio news and rang Sevenoaks Police Station to report my availability. I received no call in the next hour and decided to 'put myself on duty' and proceeded to the crash site, in uniform.

By the time I reached the scene the area was littered with the abandoned cars of Her Majesty's Press Corps with numerous individuals wandering in the lane with enormous brick-sized mobile phones pressed to their ears. The mobile network was in its infancy, especially in Mark Beech, where there was a positive black hole.

I joined my Regular colleagues and our principal task was keeping spectators and the press away from the scene. It wasn't long before a major problem of communicating with the outside world

became apparent for both the authorities and the press alike. The only landline to the station was split between the station office and the coin operated public phone in the booking hall. Stymied by the lack of a mobile signal, the reporters resorted to feeding the coin box to file their

copy, until such time that the box was full, which disabled that option. I think that police and Kent Fire Brigade had to climb Blowers Hill to establish a radio link, which was equally unreliable in the valleys.

The KFB worked on under arc lights all night but were refreshed by the resourcefulness of the WRVS and fish and chips brought up from Edenbridge. By the next day the metal trackway was craned into place and thereafter the salvage operation took place. All the wreckage and including the complete carriages was taken on transporters up Blowers Hill and via Cow Lane.

As a result of the comms problems Kent Constabulary issued all duty Superintendents with Vauxhall 4x4 SUVs equipped with adequate radio capacity. Following the Official Enquiry an effective radio system between track controllers (signallers) and drivers was introduced as witnessed by the aerials mounted at the ends of the Mark Beech/Cowden tunnel and the Signal Passed At Danger sign was placed 50yds south of Hever Station downline before the start of the single track section.

THE BEAUTIFUL SWEET PEA

It always gives me great pleasure when visitors to our garden seem as delighted as I am by the rows of sweet peas. Their colours and their scent are superb. Quite a few people say they find them difficult to grow. I don't have any particular secret except I always buy the seeds from a grower from Stafford who displays his prize flowers at the Chelsea Flower Show.

The seeds are sown into small pots in October in an unheated potting shed. When they are about two inches tall, they are put into a cold frame. The cold frame has a concrete base as this prevents mice and slugs eating them. We plant out in early spring when all frost has passed, pinching out the top two or three sprouts. This encourages them to grow straighter. The reason for the early sowing is to give the plants good strong roots which will

produce better flowers. They are planted in a sunny spot (we do face south) in a good composted soil with a frame and string to tie them into. The first blooms are always the best but keep cutting and more will come.

I did say I didn't have a particular secret – I do. His name is Nick and he has been gardening for us for many years.

Hever Parish Council were given an exclusive opportunity to buy the Four Elms village pond. At the last council meeting. held on 7th September, members voted in favour of the purchase and following a fundraising exercise and thanks to the generosity of community spirited inhabitants and businesses, we have now raised enough money for the purchase to go ahead. Any surplus funds collected will

be used for maintenance and the slightly areater ongoing running costs. As a result the council now owns the freehold of the pond (over which we had previously had a tenancy agreement) and the banks behind and to the west which were not part of the previous tenancy.

Four Elms is widely known for the crossroads at the centre of the village and the pond is the principle feature and focal point. It offers a tranquil area for locals to walk or sit, in addition to being a popular fishing spot. It is a picturesque open space, that is a natural conservation area and rich in heritage. As a result of the kindness of donors, ownership of this beautiful asset has now been captured permanently for the parish.

Any help with management and policing issues by locals would be gratefully appreciated. A working party of people is being organized to clear weeds/debris from the inlet and outlet feeds in early November and the council will be most grateful of community involvement.

We would like to thank all who contributed to this venture.

district council news

Car tyres serve as a good metaphor for councils. They generally appear much of a muchness and are an expense we'd rather do without. But we concede they perform a necessary function, with some making for a smoother experience than others.

The motoring cognoscenti in our midst are probably greater in number than local government anoraks. Yet I am still willing to bet the number of readers who would be champing at the bit to engage in animated conversation about styrenebutadiene are as few as those for whom the thought of Section 31 grants sets the heart racing. This need not be the case, though, for, as devotees of this column know, Sevenoaks District Council is a hotbed of innovation. With revolution better reserved for tyres than political institutions, we at Sevenoaks favour evolution. In that spirit of progressive improvement there have been a few developments, on which I wanted to take this opportunity to provide an update.

You've no doubt seen new bins popping up in our villages. In her capacity as Cleaner & Greener Portfolio Holder, my District colleague and now our County Councillor, Margot McArthur, successfully secured funding to introduce new smart bins, which contain sensors that notify the council when they need emptying, thus both saving wasted trips, and the cost to you and me associated with that, but also ensuring a more reactive approach can be taken, with bins collected when they're full rather than awaiting collection on a rota basis.

Hot on the heels of the smart bins, another exciting change has been a move to a seven o'clock to seven o'clock operation, meaning you may now telephone the council outside traditional working hours.

A less recent initiative, though still largely unknown, was the launch of an online interactive planning policy map, showing the extent of conservation areas, tree preservation orders, listed buildings and the like. An invaluable resource for those submitting or commenting on planning applications: https://maps.sevenoaks.gov.uk/planning/

Speaking of planning applications, like many organisations the council is embracing hybrid working, which has seen members of the public who wish to address the Development Control Committee do so, if they so choose, from the comfort of their home via Zoom or telephone rather than make their way to Sevenoaks. Indeed, all committee meetings are now livestreamed on YouTube too. And those who tuned into the Cleaner & Greener Advisory Committee the other night will have heard the welcome news that the fly-tipping enforcement team I established a few years ago has now doubled in size.

As I say, evolution rather than revolution, but all I hope welcome news.

our rector's thoughts

One person who has just returned from furlough – this time to save the global cinema industry – is Daniel Craig aka James Bond in 'No time to die' which I have just seen. Judging from the packed cinema in Tunbridge Wells 'nobody does it better'!

The film has had rave reviews for the dazzling action sequences, breathtakingly beautiful cinematography, retraced images of Bond movies from the past, humour and a twist at the end.

Is Bond a parable of our times: good versus evil in the mould of St.George and the Dragon or just escapism led by a sexist, misogynist dinosaur? One commentator has said that Daniel Craig has 'given Bond a soul' and another that the film has 'emotional bite'. This Bond is wounded by betrayal and, set back by the death of Vesper from Casino Royale, he is wondering if he can trust again. Along this emotional roller coaster, we are asked to ponder how long a deep betraval may sink into our being and how hard it is to forgive. Bond's new love, Madeleine, challenges him to deal with his crippling failure to forgive and in a surprising scene past sins and hurts are written on pieces of paper and set alight to be released to the wind.

Bond's emotional journey is still tentative and, like us, he struggles to understand the bigger picture. But his attitude to women seems to have made a leap forward. The women

in this film are all highly competent and Bond emerges as very much a monogamous man dealing with women with more respect and a less casual approach.

I thoroughly enjoyed the film and it was a joy to be able to go out once more to the cinema, which gave me a sense of a return to normality. The film's title 'No time to die' befits it but I dare not say any more – spoiler alert!

November is a season of remembrance following on from All Souls at the end of October, through Guy Fawkes and Remembrance day itself. It reminds us that for many former generations, and even those service people more recently, this was their time to die to preserve the freedom we enjoy. One often suna Remembrance hymn is 'O valiant hearts' based on a war poem written by Sir John Stanhope Arkwright often set to music by Holst and Vaughan Williams. It looks back on the ultimate sacrifice so many made and reminds us that we follow a God who in Jesus has gone before us

Long years ago, as earth lay dark and still,

Rose a loud cry upon a lonely hill, While in the frailty of our human clay, Christ, our Redeemer, passed the self same way.

gardening

Emmetts Garden at Ide Hill is the product of a plantsman's passion. Frederick Lubbock bought the estate in 1890 as a home for his increasingly large family. He was a banker and scientist, brother of John, banker and politician, who campaigned for workers to have days off and was responsible for the Bill which gave us Bank Holidays.

At Emmetts Frederick was able to develop his much-loved garden. He was influenced by his friend William Robinson who was the leading horticultural author of the era, an advocate of the naturalistic style of gardening: "....the best laid out garden is that which is best fitted for its situation, soil and climate, and without much consideration as to any 'style'." The garden indeed embraces the surroundings with splendid views south across Ide Hill village and Bough Beech, apparently you can even see the South Downs on very clear days. The National Trust is working hard to restore the north garden to his original vision, like a mountain ridge with azaleas, iris siberica and kniphofia (red hot pokers). Towards the south garden are two beautiful Japanese/ Chinese cornus trees, a 'Wedding cake tree', Cornus

controversa 'Variegata' and the Szechuan strawberry, Emmetts Cornus kousa.

Today's gardeners remain true to Robinson's advice: "now that many beautiful trees and shrubs are coming to us from so many countries, the aim of true gardening is, so far from mutilating them, to develop their natural forms". A helping hand is useful at times, though, and volunteers are currently restoring the tulip meadow by improving the shallow soil structure by removing stones and adding compost to make it easier to plant the bulbs.

In 1906 the family ingeniously created a water supply for the garden using a hydraulic ram pump to drive it up hill from a pond many feet below using only the kinetic energy of flowing water. Pond and pump are still functioning and visible from the public footpath through Scords woods which follows the south edge of the grounds.

After the Lubbocks left, the garden was owned from 1927 by the equally passionate American Charles Boise – he created the rockery but filled in many of the ponds due his fear of malaria. Hard to imagine on a cold winter's day! Emmetts (the old English meaning is "ants") is open 7 days a week and is not currently running a booking system.
