First, the global whale population is larger than it has been since 1500 and 9 out of 14 humpback populations are no longer endangered. Polio has been almost wiped out since 1990, HIV/AIDS has reduced by 40% and rabies by 43%. The vast majority of the world's population has access to safe drinking water, 0.7 billion people do not have access, a shockingly large figure, but 6.7 billion do. 52% of the world now lives in a democracy, up from 37% in 1985 and global literacy has increased from 70% in 1980 to 87%.



I take great pleasure in serving our local communities and supporting businesses. Living in Bough Beech means I can fill a gap in rural travel for local people and visitors and offer affordable rates. In December my eldest daughter joins me so we can have two cars on the road.

A Tribute To Bryan Walters

By his daughters, Katherine & Joey

When we asked Dad to remind us where he was born, he replied 'in bed I think, certainly at a very early age'. That about summed up what had become groaningly known as a grandad joke in which he took great pride.

Dad was in fact born to a loving family in Kingston Upon Thames and lived the early part of his life in New Maldon with his sisters, Ruth and Moira, to whom he was very close.

He had a few vivid memories of his childhood, the earliest being having his tonsils out in his kitchen - which horrified us all. The war was another of course. He recalled the detailed contours of the bomb shelter in his garden and spoke proudly of how his father had cleverly rebuilt it in their sitting room.

When Bryan was 14 his parents and two sisters went to live in Penang for 4 years, as his father needed the security of work after the war. Dad remained in school in England apparently showing promise academically, despite a recently unearthed latin report that read 'He has a good brain but is reluctant to use it!'. It wasn't easy for him living that far from his family and one of his most treasured childhood memories, was being reunited with them 18 months later, on an

adventurous trip to Penang during the summer holidays.

Typically, he made good use of his education and studied PPE at University College Oxford where he enjoyed several happy years of hard work and mischief in equal measure.



He delayed his national service until after university and trained in the Royal Artillery, Being deemed officer material the real snag came when during a drill he turned the wrong way. The officer in charge demanded 'are you deaf?', at which he innocently replied 'yes sir'!! After being hauled off for punishment they realised that he was, indeed, partially deaf which put an end to any exciting posts and he was relegated to the army Service Corp serving in Egypt and Northern Cyprus.

On returning he met our mother Virginia and so began the most rewarding chapter of his life. They met through a great friend, Tony Toller. Dad shared Tony's London flat and Mum and her sister were living next door. Dad had considered Mum to be 'out

of his league' until to his surprise, she turned up at his door asking for (would you believe it) a cup of sugar! Luckily, Dad wasn't wearing a shirt at the time and so all his years of rugby and his seemingly wasted army training, paid off in that moment!

They married in 1958 and set up home in Westerham. Although Dad had become a technical wiz in the newly emerging field of computers, an opportunity arose to buy a small, local, lampshade manufacturing business, Fenella Lampshades. Our parents grew this to a successful business, supplying London retailers such as Habitat and Heals, whilst providing employment for Dad's parents, his sister and a good number of locals. Outside work our parents' creative teamwork also flourished in Westerham's Amateur Dramatics Society, where they helped to design, build and decorate the sets.

We have no doubt, however, that Dad's proudest creative project was as a father to what he would rather embarrassingly refer to as 'his two gorgeous daughters'. We have many happy childhood memories of his humour and playfulness, big family gatherings he hosted with enthusiasm and wonderful holidays driving through France and Spain.

Dad's retirement began in 1996, soon after they moved to their much loved home in Markbeech, where they thoughtfully renovated a derelict farmhouse and created a beautiful garden.

Our parents loved being part of the community, enjoying 10 happy years together until, very sadly, our mother died aged 68. This was when Dad's inner strength really came to the fore and he grasped his widowhood with courage and purpose, aided greatly by becoming a proud grandfather to Joey's children, Sam and Luke, and supported by us both.

Over the next 15 years he rebuilt his life, giving his time to local community initiatives, embarking on ambitious DIY projects and setting creative tasks for the Edenbridge Children's charity, '121'. He made a point of rewarding himself regularly with a nice pint of Harvey's in the local pub with friends.

Mostly, however, he cherished his time with Katherine, particularly his Sunday walks around Hever Castle Lake and precious time with Joey and his Grandson's in Kent and Scotland.

Dad's long term health and vitality was a gift to us all and it was only in the last couple of years that his age began to show. But there was no stopping his zest for life, the quality of which was much enhanced by Katherine's devotion to his care.

Dad was an exceptional person, a wonderful father, grandfather and quintessential gentleman.

We couldn't have asked for more.


John Hodson is retiring as chair of Hever Parish Council this month, we thank him for all he has done and wish him well.

With his wife, Christina, John moved to Little Chittenden from London 48 years ago to give their young family a rural start in life. At first they didn't meet many people because they had set out to lead the self-sufficient "Good life" with their own house cow, chickens etc to sustain them. But they soon got to know the local farmers when the cow was not straightforward, and made friends at Edenbridge church and teaching Sunday school in Spitals Cross. Self sufficiency slowly faded out......

One of John's first community activities was as a volunteer, clearing the Four Elms pond for the millennium. The

pond was so overgrown with marsh and trees you couldn't even tell it was there and the community set about opening it up. Sevenoaks District Council contributed £20,000 to the cost and John helped with other local fundraising turning the pond into the beautiful spot it is today.

John really started to get involved locally when he retired in 2004. Before that, having graduated from Oxford (PPE like Bryan Walters!), his successful but all-consuming career in the City as chief executive and chairman of Singer's bank meant that he hardly saw his home in daylight. Retirement was literally a new dawn, viewed not from a train but from his garden at Little Chittenden where he and Christina would hold so many fund-raising events. And he was of course snapped up by the Parish Council.



Once in the Council, John saw how important it was to do something about the dangerous crossroads by the pond and when he became vice chair, the new Council chair, Ann Cleeve, supported him and John Southworth in their campaign to wake Kent County Council up to the dangers of this fatal accident black spot. John was outraged to discover that plans had been sitting in an in-tray untouched for two years

whilst those who shouted louder elsewhere were getting attention. This soon changed! A great deal of work was done at the crossroads which has helped significantly.

When he became chair John introduced a policy of slightly increasing the precept to enable the Council to get things done for the community. The council is small, its reach is very local and most of the infrastructure of the area is the responsibility of either the county or the district, but he was proud that the Council could do something for Four Elms residents waiting for the bus in the rain by providing a fine new bus shelter. The fete has benefited from new storage and the Four Elms playground has been totally refurbished. In Hever, school safety was improved by a footpath across the parish field, the outdoor gym and goalposts and, for the whole parish, the Queen's 90th birthday party at the Castle.

With limited resources it is difficult to get involved in that many projects but under John's leadership Hever has been an active member of the campaign to keep Gatwick Airport's expansion in check and the planning committee has worked conscientiously, if not always successfully, to make sure that Sevenoaks District Council makes the right planning decisions.

An enduring frustration, which not even John could fix, has been that local government law is quite oppressive and makes the bureaucracy which the Council has to navigate disproportionate to its size. There is also the difficulty of balancing the competing interests of the three quite different villages which make up the parish. But there have been no Jackie Weaver moments and John has presided over a friendly, informal council with much laughter along the way. Who would have thought that discussing the location of defibrillators and rubbish bins could be quite as entertaining!

John is not exactly leaving the scene in that he, with Christina, remains actively involved in the fete, he is Treasurer of the Parochial Church Council and chair of the Great Stone Bridge Trust in Edenbridge. He is also proud father of three, grandfather of eight and a good neighbour without portfolio, helping out wherever he can. No doubt the garden at Little Chittenden will continue to host fundraisers for the church and other good causes - and most importantly of all, he remains a gold star delivery driver for The Link!

Angela Haydon, who has lived in Four Elms since 1986 and has had a long career in business management will be Chair-elect at this month's PC meeting – we wish her well too!

From Anne Allan, now living in Cornwall

I was saddened to read of the passing of Ann Greig. I have known her for 63 years.

My family moved to Knowlands in Five Fields Lane in 1935 and I well remember that during the Second World War there were guinea fowl in the big oak tree and they were good watch dogs! squeaking loudly at aeroplanes. They learnt which ones were friendly and ours and which were German and trouble. When Ann first came to the area in the late 50s she lived in a rented flat and hoped to live locally. It was my mother who helped

her find Owls Court, pretty much opposite Knowlands.

I remember one occasion when Ann should have picked up my two for school but she phoned early to say she was not well and could I take hers. When I got there, there were others and I had 2 in the front and 5 in the back of a MINI! No seat belts then! One of her sons, Peter, became a farmer. He moved down to Devon where he founded Pipers Farm and now supplies traditionally reared food across the country.

On some occasions I helped Ann run a stall at the Annual Summer Fete, always great fun – we had plenty of laughs.

One of my District Council responsibilities involves sitting on an advisory board of the High Weald Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, a body which has been tasked by the Government with the administration of a new scheme, the Farming in Protected Landscapes Grant. The programme pays for projects that benefit climate, nature, people or place. A recent discussion about the initiative prompted me to reflect on how blessed we are with those four categories, as well as how much the first will increasingly come to occupy our lives

Notwithstanding 'Plan B', we have seen in Markbeech a resurgence of events, be that at the Village Hall, Kentish Horse or Barn. In Four Elms, nature, people and place have coalesced around the pond. And in Hever, we are at the beginning of an exciting new chapter in the life of the Village Hall.



Tom Fort's 'The Village News' explores what qualities successful villages enjoy. It's worth a read. However, much is devoted to consideration of the tangible, whereas I would contend that the secret to a community's success is at least as much down to the intangible. Though the examples above are quite different in themselves, the principal ingredients in each have been energy, positivity and generosity of spirit. The application of time and talents. And the communion of people. Together these make more than the sum of the parts.

The book makes the case too for the importance of embracing necessary changes in order to preserve the status quo. This will be familiar to students of the English countryside who know the key to its success is its ability to evolve.

Authors of these pieces are obliged to look to the year ahead. As I do so, I am optimistic. It is all too easy to dwell on those things we might rather were different but to do so would be to miss how our villages continue to thrive and are laying firm foundations for their future.

I hope that you all had a good Christmas without too many late Covid cancellations.

In Christmas 2010, the presenters of Top Gear, tried to recreate the route that would have been taken by the three Wise men in travelling to Bethlehem. But instead of camels, they took three second-hand cars. They set out in the wrong direction, travelled from Iraq avoiding Bagdad and Mosul which were considered too dangerous, into Iran, through to Turkey, then to Syria, Jordan, and finally to Bethlehem.

In the church's calendar, the start of the New Year coincides with the season of 'Epiphany' which means showing or revealing. The revelation of the birth of Christ to the Wise men or Kings who were the first Gentiles to worship Jesus and had followed a star to find him.

We're fortunate to live in the countryside where there is less light pollution. So, on a clear night, we can enjoy star gazing. In the ancient world, the night sky was extremely important and the Wise men were astrologers looking for signs in the stars. Whilst we can't really know precisely what happened then, there is research that suggests evidence of an extraordinary astronomical conjunction of planets around the time of Christ's birth, which would have looked like an exceptionally bright star.

There are three very different kings in the Christmas story but they're not Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar! The three were: Herod. Jesus and the Wise Men. Herod. was of mixed ancestry paranoid about his position, disturbed to hear that a king had been born and so plotted to have Jesus done away with. The Bible account says that the Wise men were seeking one to be born, King of the Jews. But the king they found was not in a palace but born in a stable and laid in a feeding trough. Finally, the Kings arrive and worship offering their gifts, which in the 4th Century were described in this way: Sacred gifts of mystic meaning -Incense doth their God disclose - Gold the King of Kings proclaimeth – Myrhh his sepulchre foreshows.

I don't know how long the Top Gear team took to get to Bethlehem, but I'm sure it took the Wise men a lot longer – some have suggested it was a journey of about 500 miles lasting many months. They persevered in their search for Jesus and in the end found him.

As we go into 2022, I wonder what you are looking for – what are you seeking? I encourage you to make a priority to seek Jesus wherever he can be found. Then will be fulfilled the God's words through the prophet Jeremiah: You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart.

I have just peeped into my RHS Gardening Month by Month book telling us what to do. I really recommend this, it is full of good advice. It does largely depend on the weather but pruning shrubs, trees and climbers seems to be the order of the day. And it's not too late to plant spring bulbs.

This last year everything has grown so much due to the excessive amount of rain so I am getting the tree surgeon in early. The rhododendrons will have their dead wood cut out to hopefully increase their blooms. The climbing hydrangea on the house is overdue for its annual pruning and a host of other trees and shrubs need to be trimmed back. The Campsis on the other side of the house is also awaiting it's turn. My Acer Griseum is now displaying its glorious red flaky bark.

A reminder for February, the autumn raspberries need cutting down to the ground, but if you have done it already, don't worry! The experts will have already planted their sweet peas under cover. I enjoy browsing through the seed and plant catalogues.

A word on the history of my garden. It was planted about 60 years ago, or more. The cottage was originally
