



Welcome to the February Link

I am so enjoying the dark skeletons of the winter trees. If you have ever tried drawing one, you will know how hard it is to catch both the topography and the essence of a tree. I can of course do neither, but I have always thought that although David Hockney does not draw them precisely, he does get the spirit of these wonderful creatures. Another master is John Constable - "Late Constable" is open at the Royal Academy until 13 February and well worth a visit.

The forestresearch.gov.uk report for 2021 paints an encouraging picture. The UK is covered by 3.23 million hectares of woodland and 13,000 of those were planted in the last year, all predicted to sequester 5.7 million tonnes of carbon dioxide over their lifetime. The Woodland Trust is similarly upbeat, estimating that we now have as many trees as we did at the time

William the Conqueror counted the forests for his Domesday book.

And, surprisingly, the southeast of England hosts the lion's share of woodlands, 14.1% as opposed to 6.4% in Yorkshire and Humberside. This is partly because oak trees traditionally had so many uses in Kent, from shipbuilding to fuel for the many local iron-smelting furnaces, that they were left to grow. Furnace farm, off Roodlands Lane, is but one example of the name living on, together with the intriguing earthworks nearby which are the remains of a man-made pond controlling the flow of water, vital to the smelting process. And the cliffs near Bassett's Mill show signs of the iron ore which was readily available.

So forgive me if I glory in this time of year and don't want the spring to hurry along.

What I do

What inspired me to become a Professional Organiser? As I mused that question, I recalled a childhood camping

I was not the tidiest child, perhaps typical, stuff was

piled up on my bedroom floor, I'd hop, skip and jump over my belongings to get to bed. On my return, my mum and nan had moved me to a new bedroom with a cabin bed, and storage cupboards, shelves and a desk underneath. Whilst only 8 or 9 years old, the feeling of joy and wonder was cemented in my mind, my dolls, toys and games were visible, neatly arranged on shelves in baskets and containers. The room felt different, I loved it, I'd experienced first-hand the wonderful feeling when we create space in our homes. And this is what I help other people do today as my job, and I love it.

Over subsequent years family and friends needed help to declutter and organise their own homes, I never thought I would make this a job or that a career in London, helping corporate teams be more organised would add fuel to the fire. The

spark to me starting my business was two-fold: I met my husband and stopped working in London. We moved six times in just over two years; moving involves you

taking stock, noticing what you own and ideally keeping only what you need. After 5 rounds of this I became fascinated about why we all keep certain things and I got good at letting things go. I learned first-hand that decluttering takes practice and asking the right questions of ourselves.

Redundancy just before Covid hit allowed me time to reflect, to make a change and start my own business. I could put into practice what I'd been doing since I'd seen my childhood bedroom, helping people get organised. So I did, and I haven't looked back. Bedrooms, kitchens, lofts, sheds, paperwork and wardrobes, all tidied and decluttered, delight both me and my customers. I have the best job in the world and everyday takes me back to being 8 or 9!

Grange Park Opera

Grange Park Opera sits just 23 miles from London, by the Surrey Hills, and was founded in 1998 by Wasfi Kani CBE. Productions take place at the Theatre in the Woods, a five-tiered, 700-seat opera house on the estate of the 14th century West Horsley Place (where BBC's Ghosts is filmed).

Arrive early to wander in the historic walled gardens, champagne glass in hand, and a convivial atmosphere reigns: the city seems far away. A short walk

through the ancient orchard – passing a 300-year-old mulberry tree – takes you to the five-tier opera house.

The all-important part of the evening is the long interval. A three course meal with fine wines can be booked in the 14th century house. Or for a more bucolic approach, fling down your rug and picnic – or reserve a seat in a marquee.

directs The Excursions of Mr
Broucek (an opera about a

season showcases Grand Opera,
emotion, and strong casts.

We are looking to start a children's choir with the aim to perform at the 900 years celebration service at St Peter's Hever on Sunday 26 June and other occasional events.



This month Una Higgs celebrates both her hundredth birthday and 65 years living in Hever.



Una French was born in Edenbridge on 14 February 1922. She was the only child of John and Lillian who ran the shoe and ladieswear shop on the High Street in what was until recently the antiques centre. Her father had come originally from East Grinstead and her mother, a milliner, from Okehampton.

The shop did well over the 50 years her parents ran it from 1912 until 1962 when it closed on her father's retirement. Her father was able to buy a crystal radio and a three wheeler car, amongst the first in Edenbridge, which he loved. Every Sunday the three of them drove down to the seaside, parents in the front and little Una in the apex of the triangle behind. They were also able to buy a house in Stangrove Road.

After some years rather treading water at Miss Eades's school in Mill Hill, an aunt said to her parents "you can't leave her there" and so off Una went to Croydon High School. She had a wonderful time, developing her life-long love of music and nervously performing a Chopin waltz at a concert.

But then the war took hold and "everything changed" for young Una who, rather than be evacuated with the school, left and got a job in the local tax office until she discovered that she wanted to teach. She loved her training in Hampton and worked for a time in Tunbridge Wells until, during a production of The Letter by Somerset Maughan with the Edenbridge Players, she met Douglas Higgs!

Douglas was a star and she just a bit part player, but love blossomed and they were married in 1950, a very happy marriage which endured for 50 years. At first they lived in Edenbridge where he ran a number of shops, including the well-known Higgs carpets in Edenbridge and Oxted. Douglas had an interest in property development and one day he took Una to look at a decrepit house on the edge of Hever at Brocas. It had been converted into flats, left empty since the war and was full of dry rot. As she walked round she told him "I could live here" - and so, undaunted, Douglas started the restoration. Thus began 65 years in Hever.

They moved into Brocas in 1957 with four small children and big ambitions. Una developed a passion for gardening (she remembers the backbreaking work of planting her first hedge) and with that and the children she was busy. Hever was a friendly place and she joined the horticultural society and the WI. As soon as the Rector, Jack Collins ("a dear man"), found out that Una's three youngest could sing, he enlisted them into the choir which struggled to find members - then as now - and so the Higgs family singers (Una joining them in time) were a real asset to the church and beyond. Una was indeed a proud mother of Tim. Jessica and Sarah, and also of Trevor who took on the carpet shop and ran it successfully for years. She now enjoys ten grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Una says that Douglas was a wonderful man and a fine husband who, as well as juggling his various businesses, always supported her and found time to run a local Abbeyfield house for old people. Together they founded the Edenbridge Forge singers which is still going today. They also had many exciting holidays, driving their caravan all over Eastern Europe, with an enduring interest in Czechoslovakia. Latterly, when Douglas was on dialysis, Una did the driving with the dialysis kit in the back!

In the early 80s Douglas and Una ingeniously converted Brocas farmhouse vertically, her son Tim and

his wife Jane living at the front and they at the back. When Douglas sadly died in 2002 Una started her project to convert the Brocas cow byre into a home and we were lucky enough to buy Hever Brocas from her in 2006.



Never be without a dog says Una. She will not mind me saying that she is quite small and it must have been amusing to see her out with her dogs, the first a German Shepherd and then two enormous Bernese mountain dogs. In 2009 she downsized in dogs, and much-loved King Charles spaniel, Charlie, arrived.

I asked what she loves about Hever and she says that it is the peace, Edenbridge had been a busy town when she left it 65 years ago and in Hever you can go out into the garden and experience only tranquility. Of course I also had to ask the other question - what is the secret of a long life? The answer is always to keep busy and, once committed, do the thing wholeheartedly - and never feel sorry for yourself. Happy birthday Una!

miscellany in February

Number 1: Desmond Tutu



Archbishop Desmond Tutu died at the end of December. Here are a couple of brilliant Tutu quotes:

"Enemies are always friends waiting to be made."

"If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality."

"Do your little bit of good where you are. It's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world".

Number 2: Charity giving

CAF estimates that 1.6 million fewer people gave to charity in 2020. Demos says that it is unsurprising that around one in 10 charities and community

organisations believe they will be forced to close within a year.

There are a number of possible reasons for this drop in income.

First, social distancing has decimated traditional fundraising channels –
Hever church for example lost its quiz, barn dance and Carol supper – the Royal British Legion estimates it will fall millions of pounds short of its Poppy Appeal target as door to door collections were cancelled for the first time in its history.



- Second, with the economy perceived as slowing down, people will donate less to charity
- Third, charity retail income has fallen dramatically, as charity shops have had to close. The Charity Retail Association estimates that during the first national lockdown shops lost around £285m in customer sales

 Finally, the nature of donations seems to have shifted – towards NHS support charities and away from non-Covid-19 related causes such as medical research funding.

The Government has recognised this challenging time by providing a £750 million package of funding for charities.

Number 3: Frogs etc

Frogs do not hibernate. Amphibians are ectothermic creatures which cannot generate body heat. They are therefore very dependent on environmental conditions as they need to remain moist and avoid their blood freezing. If it freezes the crystals can hurt them, but their blood contains a high level of glucose which is a natural anti-freeze.



Instead of hibernating they enter a period of "brumation", a time of low metabolic function and activity, their hearts can even stop beating. Although not fully asleep, they are less active during the colder weather, seeking sheltered places in burrows, under compost heaps and sometimes in ponds where they are protected from severe conditions.

Number 4: Bird feeders

The RSPB say that wild birds are vulnerable to infections picked up in birds feeders and that we should wash them with disinfectant once a week - my goodness that's a hard one!

Hugh Mackay Baillie Scott

a notable local hero



Once bitten by Blackwell house on Windermere, you are forever smitten; it is my dream home from the wonderful situation right down to the window fittings.

So imagine my excitement when I found out that it's architect, Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott, was buried in the cemetery at Edenbridge.

The distinctive memorial is on the roadside edge of the old burial-ground, first erected for his wife Florence Kate Nash. A descendant of the Regency fop Beau Nash and the daughter of a doctor, she was born at sea off Ceylon and baptised in Madras in 1862. Florence married Baillie Scott in 1899 and they had two children.

Having started his career on the Isle of Man, Baille Scott moved to the south east and developed his own take on the arts and crafts style, believing strongly in the integrity of materials and the importance of architecture in nature.





Blackwell (now owned by the National Trust) is his masterpiece, but he designed over 300 houses over his career though, unlike Lutyens, none were notable public buildings so he is less well-known. His houses were of a traditional English nature, but with spacious and well-planned interiors suitable for modern life and his attention to detail was legendary. Many of his designs were taken from indigenous older houses in Kent, having large chimneys, steeply pitched roofs with old peg tiles, local handmade bricks, inglenook fireplaces and a wealth of oak joinery, so familiar in Kentish farmhouses.

He felt that much of the 1920s building style was of a "ready-made" nature with little regard for the occupants. He said:

"A study of all buildings, and especially the kind of buildings one finds in our villages, suggests that it is not only better than any modern building, but has some essential differences from it which sets it as a thing apart. The difference largely consists in the character of the workmanship which, like hand writing, conveys personality, instead of being a lifeless mechanical formula."

Florence died in Sevenoaks in 1939 which is probably why she came to the cemetery in Edenbridge and she was probably in Sevenoaks because her husband had been designing many houses on the Wilderness Estate and in the Sevenoaks area. The houses were built by the leading



Kentish builders G.E.Wallis and a member of that family married his daughter Enid.

Baillie Scott died in Brighton in 1945, two years after his son. The inscription on the back of his section of the Edenbridge memorial, very likely designed by him, says: "Nature he loved and next to nature art".

The text on Florence's section says: "Death is but crossing the world as friends do the sea, they live in one another still".

our rector's thoughts

February is the month of Valentine's Day. It's a wonderful time to celebrate love and romance as well as – hopefully – the end of Omicron!

We use the word 'love' in so many different ways: We love chocolate – we love (insert the football team you support) – I love my family – I love you – we make love.

The ancient Greeks had four words for love: Eros for romantic love, from which we get the word 'erotic'; Phileo for affection and friendship from which we get 'philanthropy'; Storge for love of the family or community; and Agape which is divine, self-giving love.

It is Agape which is translated as 'love' in St.Paul's famous passage on love from 1 Corinthians 13, so often read at weddings: If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship ... but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. The origin of Valentine's day is rather patchy. St. Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who was martyred around about 270AD. Legend has it that St. Valentine signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom

he had befriended and healed from blindness. That doesn't sound like much to do with love!

But in fact it has everything to do with love because it is at Easter that we see real love – agape – demonstrated in Jesus. Paul writes in Romans 5:8 God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Through Jesus' self- giving love something happens in our hearts that brings us to love God in response.

In fact many theologians see romantic love – Eros - as a picture of the love between us and God. There is this desire within us that which can get misdirected into things like pornography. But when properly directed, it brings peace, joy and fulfilment because this is how we are designed as human beings. St. Augustine wrote: You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

This year Valentine's Day is also the 100th Birthday of Una Higgs to whom we wish Many Happy Returns and Congratulations!

God bless and may we all experience the love of God as we approach Lent (starts on 2nd March) and Easter.

Well, it is the middle of January as I write this, and it will be the end of January when you read it, so who knows what the weather will be doing! The warmest New Year's Eve was followed by a much colder spell, and it is a truism that the start and end of the seasons seem more unpredictable. I had thought that the fruit from our apple and pear trees were long gone but, wandering aimlessly around the garden in December, I spotted the last Braeburn from one of our espaliered trees. It was half hidden by the foliage, large and very delicious! Now the fruit is definitely finished winter pruning is well under way.

As well as the seemingly endless winter tasks of raking, pruning and cleaning, we must not forget those activities which will bear fruit (in a manner of speaking) next year. I

saved last year's sweet pea seeds and have started them in pots in the greenhouse, and they are already a few centimetres tall. One of the different varieties I grew was Spanish Dancer, with pastel flowers and a lovely scent, so I am hoping for the same proliferation of colours this year. However, as

I could not be bothered to keep the seeds separate, it is going to be pot luck what I end up with.

I have only ever grown onions as

sets, usually Stuttgarter Giant and Red Baron, so this year I am trying Ailsa Craig from seed. They are sown in pots in January, so I am waiting eagerly to see how they germinate.

One positive was the launch of the 2022 Schedule and programme of events.
