Welcome to the March Link

...and as the year marches on I am greatly enjoying the geometric, clipped hedgerows which stand to attention waiting for the unruly spring leaves to start sprouting and distorting their shape.

I keep looking at a dead tree in my field which, before reading Isabella Tree's book Wilding I would have wanted to cut down and tidy away. Now, as it sprouts remarkable fungi, I know to let it decline gently because of its great value. The notable mycologist Roger Phillips died at the end of last year, remembered by the Guardian as a David Attenborough of the

mushroom world and the guru of the foraging movement. When he wasn't teaching his neighbours how to slow cook a ham in compost he was writing about mushrooms.

There is literally a fungus for every occasion and the one on my dead tree is enjoying the decay. The British Mycological Society informs me that fungi are called 'decomposers' because they can break down dead animals and plants.

They are also good recyclers because the nutrients they release

by breaking down the dead organisms go back into the soil. I have looked through my 365 page mushroom book, 6 different types to a page, and I haven't really got a clue what it is but I think it isn't a midnight disco or a bog bell; it is probably a bracket mushroom called a polypore.... but I will have to leave it there.

So I don't even need to think about cutting the tree down as it will be gone in time, pausing only perhaps to make a good hiding place for a hedgehog. I very much hope so.

What I do

I set up How Green Market Garden in 2021 after being inspired by the growing number of small-scale farmers providing







nutritious, seasonal food for their local communities. To my mind, the most healthy and environmentally friendly diet is one that is organic, seasonal and locally produced and I really wanted to become part of the local food movement.

I set about converting the first field block

into twenty 15m long beds using the no-dig method championed by Charles Dowding. This method of growing produces far fewer weeds whilst the soil and its helpful soil organisms (such as the fine threads of mycorrhizal fungi which help plants to find nutrients and moisture) remain undisturbed. Not to mention the added bonus of less back-breaking digging in the Kent clay.

It was a difficult start to the 2021 season with a cold spring and some late frosts, which meant everything took a while to get going. But nature did its thing and soon the field was abundant with summer vegetables and the tomato plants in the polytunnel were producing more beautiful fruit than we could pick. I started to deliver veg boxes locally, had a weekly delivery to supply Ide Hill Community Shop and took part in some pop-up markets at Hooper's Farm in Marsh Green.

This year I will be doubling my growing space, adding a wider range of vegetables and some soft fruits, and hopefully eggs (bird flu permitting). I am also going to be working with Hever School to develop their vegetable garden so the children can experience the rewards of growing and eating their own food.

news from the General Synod

I am Jane Rosam, I live in Hever and am training to be a Licensed Lay minister.

General Synod is the national assembly of the Church of England. It considers and approves legislation affecting the Church, debates matters of national and international importance and approves the annual budget for the work of the Church at national level.I was elected to serve for five years last November. I stood for election because I am passionate about opening up the church to inclusion for all, making it relevant in contemporary society and hopefully during my term there will be motions about Living in Love and Faith. The General Synod meets three times a year in November, February and July. Both meetings so far have been at Church House in Westminster but July is held in York. The sittings are spread over three or four long days according to the agenda and it would be guite difficult to describe a typical day as most seem to be anything but!

We receive the Agenda and accompanying papers about 10 days before each sitting and these require a lot of reading as some of the individual reports can be up to 88 pages long. Luckily these are now sent in electronic format to an app and through this app we can communicate directly with the Synod support staff.

General Synod is large. It currently has 467 members in total and this includes the Houses of Bishops, Clergy and Laity. We all have a number (I am 389) and in all our dealings we identify ourselves by Name, number and Diocese. This includes the Archbishop of Canterbury who unsurprisingly is number 001. Church House has large circular debating chamber that many are familiar with, plus also myriad smaller rooms, chambers, floors and staircases. It is very easy to get completely lost and disorientated and legend has it that some inexperienced members have entered via the wrong door and found themselves next to the Archbishops on the platform, livestreamed on TV.

forgotten grandees

...the Bramwell family in Four Elms and Hever

As I was sitting in Hever Church the other day I looked again at the familiar stained glass window in the South aisle and wondered why and who the figure with an anvil was.



I read that the window was in memory of Sir Frederick Bramwell who died in 1903 and that the window depicts St. Dunstan on the left and Tubal-Cain on the right. It was made by Burlison & Grylls in 1906. St Dunstan was the patron saint of goldsmiths, silversmiths, blacksmiths and bellringers and Tubal-Cain is mentioned in the Bible, in Genesis 4:22, and is


known a the first blacksmith and Sir Frederick was President of both the Institutions of Civil and Mechanical Engineers, President of the Royal Society of Arts and a member of the Goldsmiths company, not a strong connection, but understandable. The Bramwell story in fact begins with Frederick's brother, George Bramwell, first (and last) Baron Bramwell of Hever (1808-1892). He was a legal star who sat in the Court of Appeal and was responsible for a number of key developments in the law notably the rule in Rylands v Fletcher which modernised the law of tort and which students still learn about to this day. Say "Rylands and Fletcher" to almost any lawyer and they will say "Ah, ves!", there are very few cases which get this level of recognition.

Although it may seem obvious now that if a landowner has dangerous substances on their land and this affects a neighbour, they will be liable. However, back in the nineteenth century Mr Fletcher lost his claim right through the lower courts. Only Lord George dissented and he was then vindicated and upheld by the House of Lords.

As Wikipedia says "Rylands v Fletcher [1868] UKHL 1 was a decision by the House of Lords which established a new area of English tort law. Rylands employed contractors to build a reservoir, playing no active role in its construction. When the

contractors discovered a series of old coal shafts improperly filled with debris, they chose to continue work rather than properly blocking them up. The result was that on 11 December 1860, shortly after being filled for the first time, Rylands' reservoir burst and

flooded a neighbouring mine, run by Fletcher, causing £937 worth of damage (equivalent to £86,500 in 2018). Fletcher brought a claim of negligence against Rylands,

through which the case eventually went to the Exchequer of Pleas. The majority ruled in favour of Rylands. Bramwell B, however, dissenting, argued that the claimant had the right to enjoy his land free of interference from water, and that as a result the defendant was guilty of trespass and the commissioning of a nuisance".

George lived in Holmwood in Four Elms. Holmwood was, and remains, a fine house set back from the road which later was home to General Sir Henry and Dame Edith Sclater during the First World War. The 1881 census records him living there aged 72 with his second wife Martha, 46, and a butler, lady's maid, cook,

kitchen maid and housemaid. The housemaids, Martha Malyan and Harriett Nicholls, were aged 17 and 18 and were from Edenbridge. All the servants are described as "single", as was expected in those days.

It seems that Frederick came to live at Holmwood too, perhaps after his brother's death in 1892. I do not know why George's only surviving child, Jane, did not inherit it; of course the title, Baron Bramwell of Hever, given to him when he retired, died with him. Frederick and his wife Harriett had three daughters, Eldred married Sir Victor Horsley a pioneer of neurosurgery and a social



reformer. They had three children, Siward, Oswald and Pamela (I tell you this mainly because I like the names). He volunteered for field surgery duty in Iraq during WW1 and died there of heatstroke aged only 59.

Frederick trained as an engineer and studied steam propulsion and constructed a locomotive for the Stockton and Darlington Railway before setting up his own business concentrating on legal and consultative work, for example advising the London water companies.

He became a leading expert witness in high profile court cases. George once joked that witnesses could be divided into four categories "liars, damned liars, expert witnesses and, of course, there's brother Fred".

Sir Frederick was knighted in 1881 and created a baron in 1889, four years before his death aged 85. He is buried in the churchyard at Hever, which is odd given that their local church, St Paul's Four Elms, was opened in 1881, but perhaps he was by then attached to Hever. I cannot find out where Lord George is buried.

We were pleased to arrange the Bulk Refuse Freighter which was well utilised with another date in the summer scheduled for 23rd July.

On the recycling front the guidelines are:

- Plastic Bottles Empty, rinse & squash. Put lids back on before recycling
- Travs & Punnets Remove film lid, absorbent layer & put these into general waste. Recycle the clean & empty tray or punnet
- Pots Empty & rinse Put lids back on before recycling.

You can also recycle carrier bags and other flexible wrappings at some local supermarkets. Please remember to always rinse the item clean before recycling it, otherwise it may contaminate the whole batch of recycling.

At the end of January, the rules for all types of road users were updated in The Highway Code to improve the

safety of people walking, cycling and riding horses. Did you know you are now required to give a cyclist at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) when overtaking them and when passing people riding horses giving them at least 2 metres (6.5 feet) of space, with the same rule applying to passing people walking in the road?

These rules effect all road users. There are changes in eight important areas:

- introducing a new hierarchy of road users
- crossing the road at junctions
- walking, cycling or riding in shared spaces
- positioning in the road when cycling
- overtaking when driving or cycling
- cycling at junctions
- people cycling, riding horses and driving horse-drawn vehicles on roundabouts
- parking, charging and leaving vehicles

district council news

This morning I was in Swanley. Although only fifteen miles separate us, the villages of Four Elms, Hever and Markbeech are likely as relatively unexplored to Swanley's residents as it is to most of us. Nevertheless, it is one of the four towns in the Sevenoaks District, rich in history, and is today a popular home for many commuters, falling as it now does within reach of London's Oyster. What took me to the District's northern most tip was the opening of the White Oak Leisure Centre, a £20m investment in the wellbeing of an area which has for too long been a poor relation to us in terms of its health inequalities.

As Sevenoaks District Council's Portfolio Holder for Finance & Investment, I've had the privilege of working on both this scheme and other initiatives designed to improve the provision of amenities across the patch. For example, we've nearly completed building a business hub for start-ups, and hope shortly to embark on two mixed use town centre developments. In West Kingsdown we're seeking to provide self-contained units of purpose built temporary accommodation, helping the homeless off the streets and into safe, affordable lodgings from which they can rebuild their lives. And closer to home, we've been able to provide much-needed parking in Sevenoaks, with investment in Edenbridge to follow shortly.

These are not just a matter of local government providing for those it

serves, nor one of moral responsibility, but an economic question too. Happy, healthy, stable populations draw less and contribute more to public services. Being able to look to the longer term, properties can be of a quality only rarely found in the private sector. Design and environmental standards can be of the highest order. And the vibrancy of our town centres can be safeguarded, benefitting all those within their catchment.

In the 2019 local elections, much was made of the phrase 'Bins not Brexit'. As you'd expect from a slogan, it doesn't quite capture the whole picture. But the essence was there. Local government is not about what takes place in Westminster. Nor, in fact is it all about bins. Rather it can and should be a catalyst for something more: improving wellbeing.

Usually I write about those things on our immediate doorstep. It's right that I do. Yet it's equally right that I let you know what else it is I get up to at the District Council since it is thanks to you that I have the immense privilege of not just representing Kent's finest corner but of playing a small part in bringing moments of joy, pride and dignity to our neighbours too.

our rector's thoughts

One consequence of the pandemic has been to postpone the celebration of Hever church's 900 years as a place of Christian worship. We're now making plans for a number of events later this year and as a centrepiece our service on St.Peter's day morning which is Sunday 26th June – watch out for details and any ideas to help us mark this historic occasion are welcome.

It's hard to imagine what changes may have taken place in worship over 900 vears in St.Peter's. There would have been the theatre of the Latin Mass during the medieval period with processions, mystery and colour. With the Reformation in the 16th Century, the improvement in literacy, and the availability of printed Bibles in the vernacular, the emphasis would have changed to the preaching of the Word necessitating seating in the form of wooden pews. The 19th Century saw the explosion in church building which brought into being our other two churches in Four Elms and Markbeech, and the writing of many hymns we sing today. More recently we've seen the growth of almost limitless choice which is reflected in the diversity of styles even in Analican churches with some bringing in increased informality and lay participation.

As one would expect there are many and varied references to worship in the Bible but very little guidance on the style or form. In the story of Jesus meeting the woman at the well, she asks him some detailed questions about where

to worship. Jesus replies:. God is spirit, and his worshippers must worship in the Spirit and in truth for they are the kind of worshippers the Father seeks (John 4:24). Perhaps this suggests that the most important thing is that we worship authentically. CS Lewis once said he was less concerned about 'high' and 'low' church and more concerned about deep church.

Variety brings challenges for rural churches as we try to have something for everyone whilst keeping the regular more traditional 10.00am services of Holy Communion each Sunday. We are using the Evening services to experiment: everything from Choral Evensong to this month a contemporary service assisted by a worship band from Eden Baptist church! After Easter, we will be introducing an additional quiet and contemplative service at 8am and also another Family service.

We all have different preferences and encounter God in different ways. I'm sure there is something you will find with us that helps you to worship. But do also think about trying something a bit different from the variety of worship in an Anglican context.

One thing I want to say very emphatically is that we welcome all whatever your background or belief to come and see – we even welcome dogs!

gardening

March is a very exciting month in the gardening calendar – it signifies the start of Spring and a month where our gardens begin to wake up!

That's also true to be said for our plants here at the nursery and our garden designer customers start to come out of hibernation!

Ordinarily, we would also be well under way with our growing for the Chelsea Flower Show, but we have made the difficult decision not to grow this year. We had plenty of enquiries, but we've decided to switch our growing to a peat-free compost (500,000 plants annually).

We've trialled peat-free for nearly 20 years without much success, but in the Summer of 2021 we had some fantastic results using a new product. However, topgrowth is slightly slower, so we didn't have the confidence in growing 'show quality' plants for Chelsea – we are looking to get a growing season under our belt before we can commit again next year.



This has all been part of a drive to improve our 'green' credentials as a business over the last few months. (Not forgetting our end-product is very environmentally friendly!) Here are our new changes:

Peat-free compost (mainly bark fibre in different grades, with little coir fibre); Recyclable, recycled pots; Recycled paper; Bark topping machine(adds a layer of bark to act as a mulch & save on water); Improved irrigation system – saving on water; Hand-made trolley jackets – stop the use of shrink-wrap plastic; New vehicles with low emission engines

Peat sales will be banned from garden centres from May 2024 but as of yet, there are no time frames for commercial horticulture – we're trail-blazing in our sector! This is important as peat bogs act as a carbon sink in the battle against climate change.

Here are some recommendations for plants for your garden this March:

Pulmonaria 'Shrimps on the Barbie' (Lungwort) New cultivar with deep pink flowers

Narcissus 'Rip Van Winkle' – intriguing double flowering cultivar

Daphne odora 'Marianni' – fantastic shrub with highly scented blooms Primula vulgaris – common Primrose – can't beat it!

Iris reticulata 'Katherine Hodgkin' – stunning intricate Iris (see picture)
We hope to bring you some exciting news on the return of our public open weekends very soon! Happy gardening!
