Horrible Histories are performing the Terrible Tudors and Howard Brenton's excellent play "Anne Boleyn" focuses on Anne not as

pet of the month

Most people are completely mystified as to why we keep rheas, as they are neither cuddly pets nor considered edible.

Our first rhea came from Penshurst vineyard, where there was once a “pet area” with all sorts of animals from wallabies to ducks and geese. Being in the wine trade, we had a good connection with the family and adopted Schnapps. She had been hand raised and was affectionate and very endearing. We acquired a mate for her, whom we named Damien, because of his mischievous nature. Schnapps was with us for over 20 years and all our current rheas, (we now have 15) are descended from her.

Rheas originate in the grasslands of South America. They are part of the ratite family, related to ostriches and emus. They are hardy birds needing no protection from inclement weather. Unlike ostriches, rheas are rarely aggressive except in the spring mating season. The males spend a lot of time chasing each other round the field and tussling with their beaks locked together. They also emit a curious booming call. They are polygamous and, unusually, in the animal kingdom, it is the males who make the nests, incubate the eggs and raise the chicks, with no assistance from the females. Sadly, very few chicks survive as they are predated, presumably by foxes. Rheas are mainly grazing vegetarians,

although they appear to eat anything. Damien once gobbled up a golf ball. We called our vet, who could barely contain his laughter and advised us to take no action. On the whole, they prefer broad leaved plants. Over the years they have completely cleared our field of docks, thistle and nettles. A useful way of weeding without herbicide, but perhaps not so good for biodiversity.

They are contained with ordinary stock fencing, which works well until the fence is damaged or a gate left open, when they will depart with alacrity. As they can run with extraordinary speed, they are very difficult to herd back. One of our rheas lived wild near Markbeech for several years startling many a walker and horse rider. Rheas are certainly not renowned for their intelligence, but their grace and speed is extraordinary. Every now and again all our flock will spurt into action, racing around the field in all directions wings outstretched. Their entertainment value is high!

What I do

What I do at Hever Castle

I joined the Castle Team in 1983, the same year that the Astors sold it to Mr and Mrs John Guthrie. With the help of many of the staff who worked for the Astors and a new Managing Director, one Bob Pullin, the Guthries turned the whole place into a fully commercial operation.

Refreshments were provided in a massive Tea-Tent, which was a very high marquee and during its opening hours the highest part of the top was always full of sparrows, all hoping to steal any bread or cake crumbs dropped by careless diners. The birds kept up a constant chatter, which certainly added to the informal atmosphere.

Hever Castle has been the backdrop for many filmed television advertisements, and on one occasion NatWest filmed a whole series utilising various venues around the grounds. In those days How Green Nursery had a retail outlet at the castle and the crew bought up the entire stock for use as props. After filming had finished, it was all returned – the sales lady said it was the best day's trading she had ever done!

We in-house Room Stewards, had a very strict dress code, summed up as band-box elegance. We females were only allowed trousers if they were part of a trouser-suit, and skirts had to be

below-the-knee at least. Our behaviour was also strictly regulated, and we were not allowed to initiate conversations with visitors unless it was absolutely necessary. We had to wait for them to speak to us first. This resulted in us hovering near visitors, smiling like mad and looking hopeful, especially if they were giving each other mis-information!

Gavin Astor had a Secretary, and she stayed on as Mr. Pullin's Secretary after the Astors left. Her name was Pat Humphreys, and I'm sure many locals will remember her – she was a larger than life character, and was very prominent in village affairs.

In October 1987 the south east of England was hit by what came to be known as The Hurricane. The gardens at Hever Castle had been designed and created 80 years earlier, by William Waldorf Astor, and were just reaching their most glorious maturity. Overnight much of it was destroyed, with huge trees reduced to so much firewood, and paths and flowerbeds obliterated by debris. Our Head Gardener, Kurt Stahr, walked through the devastation in absolute silence, but with tears running down his face. I was able to make it in to work the next morning, the only Steward to do so but it was immediately obvious that there was no possibility of opening that day or for the rest of the season. It was with a heavy heart that I made my way home again.

A few years later I was on duty at the Castle entrance, and had gone to

the Staff Room to make tea. When I arrived back, I learnt that some of the miniature paintings had been stolen. I immediately closed the Castle gates but it was too late; the thief had already made his getaway. It transpired that one of the staff had thought it odd that a young man on his own had bought a Castle-and-Gardens ticket, and then left half an hour later. She had managed to remember part of his vehicle registration number. On the strength of this, the Police were able to identify him! They recovered some of the miniatures, but they were the least valuable ones. The real prize, a portrait of Mary Queen of Scots, painted when she was about eighteen, and with a lock of her hair, still retaining its red tint, in the back of it, was not there. It still saddens me that I will never see it again.

One summer, the Guthries went to Rome on holiday, and came back full of enthusiasm for the beautiful fountains there. They were very keen to install

something similar at the Castle. Bob Pullin suggested that a water feature could take the form of a maze, which would be interactive rather than just visually pleasing.

The water maze takes the form of large stepping stones set in a shallow lake, leading from the edge to a tower in the centre. Some of the stepping stones produce a jet of water when trodden on, and his idea was that no-one would want to get wet, so participants would try to avoid these. Local residents were invited to the grand opening which took place on a hot summer day. Poor Mr. Pullin was mortified when the children gleefully jumped up and down on the 'spiked' stones, getting soaked in the process. He shouted 'Stop them, someone stop them!' But of course no-one did.

Today the water maze is hugely popular, and on the strength of that alone many annual passes are sold.

electric blues

So Storm Eunice arrived as predicted and knocked out a fair bit of power on Friday 18th February. What we hadn't expected was that by Thursday 24th a large number of neighbours would still be without electricity. Those without included our neighbour Una, famously just 100, the Henry VIII, Hever church and school and a large number of other households, including many vulnerable people.

As the days wore on, every deadline given by UK Power Networks for the restoration of the service passed without good news, freezers started to thaw, houses got very cold and we were all worried. It turns out that UKPN will pay for people to go to a hotel (not an easy option when you have a young baby and the hotel has to evict you halfway through your stay because of pre-bookings) and also a £50 allowance after 48 hours for each day without power, but that's a poor substitute. Eventually after much campaigning, including slots on Radio Kent and with help from our excellently active MP, Tom Tugendhat, UKPN agreed to provide a small generator for Una. They had been reluctant because it turned out that they only had 500 for use across the whole county and these were all

in use in medically critical situations to support life. Una's was coming down from London.....

Just at that moment a team of specialists arrived from the Cambridge area, took one look at a pole, climbed up it and found that a trip switch had tripped! The explanation for the patchy problem is that our electricity runs in three phases, two of the phases were still going and servicing 2/3 of the

houses but the third had just suffered a simple trip of a switch. Six days later, and with a flick of the wrist, all was back on - in the middle of a candlelit funeral in the church.



Everyone is delighted but of course upset that the simple solution had not been discovered sooner. The silver lining is that the community did a lot of self-help and there were many kindnesses. We benefited from a delicious apple and blackberry crumble from our neighbour's melting freezer. Sadly as we go to print a large swathe of Hever suffered the after effects for weeks more with phone and internet down until mid-March. Hopefully some lessons have been learned from the chaos.

chicken kyiv

Chicken Kyiv (with thanks to Felicity Cloake, Prue Leith and Thomasina Miers for recipe inspiration)

Makes 2

2 skinless chicken breasts
50g salted butter, at room temperature
2 garlic cloves, crushed
2 tbsp parsley and 1 tbsp tarragon, finely chopped OR 15g of wild garlic leaves washed, patted dry and finely sliced
Zest from ½ lemon
3 tbsp flour(seasoned)
2 beaten eggs
4 tbsp breadcrumbs, ideally Panko (seasoned)

Vegetable oil, to fry

- Mix the butter, garlic, lemon zest and herbs thoroughly with some black pepper. Form into a sausage, and wrap tightly in greaseproof paper and chill.
- With a sharp knife open up each chicken breast like a book. Put them between sheets of wet greaseproof paper and, with a rolling pin, beat until about 0.5cm thick, being careful not to create any holes. Season both sides well.
- Place half the butter near one edge of the first chicken breast and begin rolling the meat up around it, tucking in the

ends as you go. You can make a little mix of egg and flour as glue to help. Roll into a tight sausage wrap with greaseproof or clingfilm, repeat and freeze for 2 hours.

- Put the flour, eggs and breadcrumbs into 3 shallow dishes then roll the frozen Kyivs in each in that order, then for a second time, carefully, in the eggs and crumbs. Put in the fridge to defrost, which should take about an hour.
- Now decide if you are going to deep or shallow fry. If deep preheat the oven to 150C. Otherwise 180C (160C fan)/ gas 4.
- For deep, heat the oil in a large deep pan or fryer to 160C, or until a crumb of bread turns golden in about 15 seconds. Gently lower the first Kyiv in. Cook it for 8 minutes, turning if not fully submerged then drain on kitchen paper and put in the oven to keep warm while you cook the next.
- For shallow pour 1cm vegetable oil into a large frying pan on a medium heat. When it's hot enough for the crumb sizzle, cook the chicken for two to three minutes a side until golden and

crisp, probably in two batches so as not to crowd the pan. Transfer to a baking dish or tray and bake for a final 15 minutes to finish cooking.

and biscuits to sustain us. If you are unable to get there for 9.00am but would still like to participate then please turn up at the Hall Car Park any time during the morning.

Please bring your own thick gloves and strong footwear is recommended.

Also if you have a warning triangle in your car then please bring it along to assist with traffic calming.

Swathe and Visibility Cuts

Kent County Council has reviewed swathe and visibility cuts across the county to take into account highway safety as a priority coupled with biodiversity. Across the Parish we are planning to have swathe & visibility cuts at the end of April/beginning of May and then again at end of September/beginning of October plus a visibility cut at the end of July.

Due to the damage caused by Storm Eunice the day before, the refuse freighter failed to arrive. Apologies



to those who were expecting it. I am pleased to say it will be with us on Saturday 26th March, see the diary on the back for details.

Road Safety and Road Damage

We have had concerns raised from parishioners regarding road safety, in particular the junctions of Roodlands Lane onto Bough Beech Road and Bough Beech Road and Bull Lane. HPC have informed Kent Highways of this and proposed a 30mph speed limit in the built up boundary of Four Elms Village. KCC Highways will review this.

The recent roadworks that led to closure of the main Hartfield Road caused traffic to take detours around the narrow back lanes which resulted in much damage to the verges in New House Farm Lane. HPC will request restoration work and, in the future if diversions are required, to improve planning and provide clearer diversion signage.

Vladimir Ilyich Lenin, the first ruler of Soviet Russia wrote "There are decades where nothing happens; and there are weeks where decades happen". As I write this article and hear the news in Ukraine it seems sadly too true. There has been a paradigm shift for the whole of Europe referred to by the new German Chancellor Olaf Scholz announcing Germany's intention to rearm. The words of Graham Kendrick's song 'the clouds are gathering' written in 1988 just before the fall of the Berlin Wall, seem strangely prophetic:

*O Lord, over the nations now where
is the dove of peace? Her wings are
broken*

*O Lord, while precious children starve,
the tools of war increase - their bread
is stolen*

There is a dread in 'doom scrolling' through the news each day and we feel powerless. Yet we've seen an explosion of generosity including at our service for the Ukraine on 6th March and people are registering to house Ukrainian refugees. The world has changed suddenly.

For Christians, the events of Easter mark a defining and changing moment in history. A solitary man dies on a cross in an obscure part of the Roman Empire. His followers are scattered and the women lay his body in a borrowed tomb. Three days later there are reports of the body missing and Jesus seen alive. His followers are transformed and rapidly a new movement is born. Today about 2.4 billion people call themselves

Christians. Something happened that Easter weekend, which transformed history - even more profoundly than what is happening today.

Could the old story be true? What relevance has it for geopolitical events in the 21st Century? In 2016, religious leaders were asked by the Times to comment on the events of Easter. Canon Andrew Wingfield Digby, the former chaplain to the England cricket team, wrote: *'There are three problems in the world that even the greatest political leaders cannot deal with: evil, suffering and death. The Easter message speaks to all three: Evil flees when faced with the love and power of Jesus, Suffering is made sense of only at the Cross of Jesus. Death is defeated only by the Resurrection of Jesus. If people don't think that is relevant they must be living on a different planet to me.'*

Do join us to worship God at this special time of the year. I'm always ready to talk and pray with anyone disturbed by these world events or for any other reason. Our churches are open for private prayer during the daytime and in Hever we have a prayer space dedicated to prayers for Ukraine.

God bless you all this Easter

Gradually more is happening in our villages as the Covid restrictions have eased but now our thoughts are diverted to the hideous war in Ukraine. I have dear friends in central Kyiv, and every day I check Nika's FaceBook feed to see that they are OK. She is posting beautiful, uplifting images of sunlight on fine buildings, the intricately decorated interior of the cathedral with shafts of light pouring through it, of cacti on her windowsill and of her cat sunbathing on a table. By the cactus she has written: "among many other things, I'm full of fury these days, so I'd rather stay quiet for a while, so as not incidentally to hurt someone dear, loving and well-meaning in general, we are as ok as is humanly possible in this shitty situation - and I love you all no less than ever thank you for being there for us, dearest friends."

She doesn't talk of escaping although they have sent their 17 year old daughter away to Lviv, and I believe they intend to stay come what may. She is an adventurous, hugely intelligent woman, who went to college in America and has worked as a journalist, and is so like many of my friends in the media here, liberal and proactive. Her husband is a successful designer and art director. It is simply unimaginable that their life has changed so radically in a few weeks, and makes it very clear that we should never ignore the fact that even here everything could change. We need always to cherish our way of life, and make sure that we hold the most important things closest. Apart from donating to the Ukrainian cause,

or helping refugees there is little we can do but pray, and pray hard for Putin to come to his senses and withdraw.

Here we are looking ahead to Easter and the renewal it brings. Markbeech is hosting the Palm Sunday procession and service this year, which will be starting out from by the Falconhurst Farm Shop, and going up Church Walk, to Holy Trinity. We have donkeys, 'palm' fronds and music and look forward to meeting you there at 9.45am (check the diary). The service will continue in the churchyard and be family friendly so we hope the donkeys can stay. Wear good footwear and we pray for good weather!

All the other services are in the diary, and lots happens in Holy Week, including the very quiet and contemplative services of compline in each church which I particularly love.

St Peter's – Burial place of Thomas Boleyn and Henry Boleyn

Thomas Boleyn, Earl of Wiltshire and Ormond, father of Queen Anne Boleyn and grandfather of Queen Elizabeth I, is buried at St Peter's Church and his resting place can still be seen today.



His tomb is topped with a magnificent memorial brass, considered one of the finest surviving memorial brasses in England. It depicts him dressed in the full robes and insignia of a Knight of the Garter, including the badge on his left breast and garter

around his left knee. Thomas's head is resting on a helmet surmounted by his daughter Anne Boleyn's falcon badge, while his feet are on a griffin. The inscription on his tomb reads:

"Here lieth Sir Thomas Bullen, Knight of the Order of the Garter, Erle of Wilscher and Erle or Ormunde, which decessed the 12th dai of Marche in the iere of our Lorde 1538."

In those days the new calendar year didn't start until 25 March, Lady Day or the Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin, so that's why the brass inscription gives his date of death as 1538 and we say 1539. Thomas Boleyn was in his early sixties when he died at Hever Castle. His servant, Robert Cranwell, wrote to Thomas Cromwell the next day to give him news of his death:

"My good lord and master is dead. He made the end of a good Christian man."

Although two of his children, George Boleyn, Lord Rochford, and Queen Anne Boleyn, had been executed as traitors to the crown in May 1536, and Thomas had been stripped of his office of Lord Privy Seal in June 1536, Thomas had done his duty to his remaining family and his monarch, and had climbed his way back into royal favour, just as families like the Staffords and Howards had done before him. He had helped quash the Pilgrimage of Grace rebellion in late 1536 and was present at Prince Edward's baptism in October 1537. Historian Eric Ives describes how he diligently went to Order of the Garter functions, even lending Thomas Cromwell his chain and best Garter badge at one point, and he was back at court by January 1538.

In July 1538, three months after his wife's death, there were rumours that

“my lord of Wolshyre will marry lady Margaret Dowglas”. The marriage to Lady Margaret Douglas, King Henry VIII’s niece, never took place, but Thomas Boleyn must have been high in favour for it to be rumoured that he would marry her.

In April 1539, Henry VIII paid 16l. 13s. 4d. to his chaplain, William Franklyn, Dean of Windsor, “for certain oraisons, suffrages and masses to be said for the soul’s health of th’erle of Wilts, late deceased”, which is hard evidence that Thomas was back in favour at his death.

Thomas is not the only member of the Boleyn family to be buried at St Peter’s. Near to Thomas’s tomb is a small brass cross memorial which bears the inscription “Henry Bullayen the sone of the Thomas Bullayne”. Thomas and his wife, Elizabeth (née Howard), lost two children in childhood, Henry, the one buried at St Peter’s, and Thomas, who was laid to rest at St John the Baptist Church, Penshurst, in the Sidney Chapel, with a similar brass cross memorial. Although historian Alison Weir believes that Thomas the Younger may have lived into adulthood, Michael Harris of the Monumental Brass Society confirmed to me that the cross-shaped memorial brasses used for Thomas the Younger and Henry “are almost certainly to children.” This would tie in with the fact that neither Thomas nor Henry are mentioned in any court records.

Queen Anne Boleyn and George Boleyn, Lord Rochford, were laid to rest in the Chapel of St Peter ad Vincula, at the Tower of London, following their executions in May 1536. Their mother, Elizabeth Boleyn, Countess of Wiltshire and Ormond, was buried at St Mary’s Church, Lambeth, (now the Garden Museum) a traditional burial place for Howard women, when she died in April 1538

Claire Ridgway is the founder of the Anne Boleyn Files blog and Tudor Society, and the author of several Tudor history books, including *The Fall of Anne Boleyn: A Countdown*. She is presently working on a book on the social history of Hever Castle with castle supervisor, Dr Owen Emmerson.

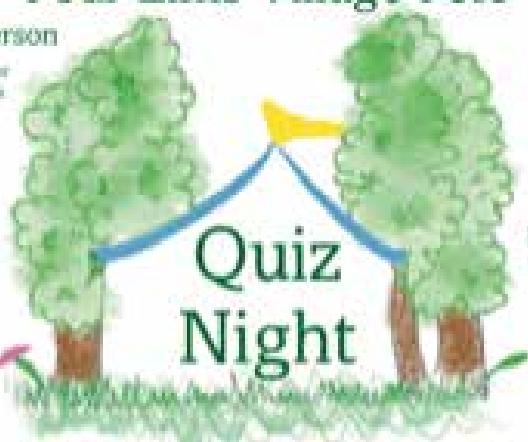

gardening
