Christmas in Kano

Dust! Not something I spend much time thinking (or doing anything) about, but this could not be ignored. My family had arrived from hot, humid and often wet Lagos, where we had just purchased a sailing dinghy, to what seemed like another country, but was in fact Kano, an ancient walled city, the largest in Northern Nigeria and 700+ miles from the sea.

It was on a Christmas Day that my husband and I had met in Nigeria; Ian was working for Unilever on importation, distribution and manufacture, while I had been employed by Shell to teach in their production company school in Port Harcourt. Our first home was in Lagos. Like British expatriates everywhere, at Christmas we tried to maintain as many of our customs as possible. Being in a predominantly Muslim part of the country, we were not allowed to introduce Christian teaching in the Primary School, even at Christmas.

A concession was made, however, for Santa Claus. For many years he had arrived on a camel, but after the incident when he and the camel had parted company in an abrupt and somewhat undignified manner, a tractor and trailer were substituted.

The tradition of giving gifts to those with whom one did business persisted and we soon got used to our garden becoming home to an array of chickens, turkeys and on one occasion, a goat (our steward, Jimmy, would

despatch the turkeys by first giving them gin, "to relax them", he said.) Hmm..?

For decoration, a branch from a casuarina tree acted as a fir and with some plastic holly and a few baubles, gave a festive air. We had brought our piano north with us, so continued our custom of inviting families on Christmas Eve to sing carols, after which we all went along to St. George's, the little Anglican Church, for the midnight service.

But back to the dust. Northern Nigeria has 3 seasons: hot and dry with temperatures over 35 degrees, a short rainy season when, within a fortnight, a lawn appears where not a blade of grass had hitherto been seen and third the Harmattan. From December to March the wind blows down from the Sahara bringing dust so thick that it obscures the sun, lowering the temperature, but penetrating tightly

closed windows and doors; wiping down furniture and sweeping floors is a futile exercise. I found it a blessed relief from the torrid heat and at social gatherings over Christmas we enjoyed the novelty of standing around braziers in gardens or on patios, perhaps even wearing a sweater!

Sadly, I doubt that life for expats in Kano will be like that anymore. Terrorists have brought fear and division between Muslim and Christian, where none existed and where we had all lived peaceably side by side. Who knows if St. George's still exists? Only the dust is the same.

A brief history of St Peter's Hever

St Peter's Hever was founded in about 1122, the closing years of the reign of King Henry I, the fourth son of William the Conqueror. He was famous for dying of a surfeit of lampreys (or eels), and also for having only a daughter to succeed him - Matilda, who fought her cousin Stephen for the throne and triumphed when her son Henry II was crowned as undisputed king.

The shape of the church is Norman but much has changed within it over the years. The arches of the north aisle date from the 1200s and the main part followed in the mid 1300s. In 1419 the beautiful Margaret Cheyne was buried in the chancel, immortalised by her elegant brass (more about her in a later edition). In her time the tower with its soaring shingle spire was completed. It houses six bells, the two earliest from 1703, which ring out for services and celebrations. Then came the Bullen family who built the Bullen chapel with its Tudor fireplace and where Sir Thomas Bullen, Queen Anne's father, is buried. The architectural historian Sir Nikolaus Pevsner describes his brass as "one of the finest 16th century brasses anywhere". There is also a simple brass cross commemorating his son Henry who died in childhood.

Hever's most notable rector (so far!) was Nicholas Heath, here for a few years in 1531 whilst helping Cranmer translate the Bible into English and before he became the last catholic Archbishop of York. He was imprisoned in the Tower for refusing to take the oath of allegiance to Elizabeth I but she liked him enough not to execute him!

After the Tudors had departed from Hever the Waldegraves owned the castle and their tutor, William Todde who died in 1585, is remembered in a brass on the windowsill in the Chancel.

In 1621 Churchwardens Brooker and Lottenden emblazoned their names on their new pulpit together with the text "Fear God - Honour the King". If they were still around when Charles I was executed by Cromwell in 1649 they must have felt rather vulnerable, though the Waldegraves in the Castle, who had raised a regiment in support of the King, were more vulnerable still!

Little did Brooker and Lottenden know that they would save the church's only glimpse of wall painting from destruction: a fearsome fragment from Ezekiel, painted in about 1615, was discovered behind it when the pulpit was moved during the major Victorian restoration of 1894.

The Bullen chapel also houses memorials to the Meade-Waldo family, the next owners of the Castle. Colonel Edmund introduced the Little Owl from Morocco in 1874. Happily it proved to be a benign new arrival, a bit like the parakeets we see today - look for the owl in the Meade-Waldo window in the north aisle. The Meade-Waldos preferred their mansion at Stonewall Park to Hever and rented out the castle. There is also a very sad memorial in the north aisle to their last-in-line who died on active service on Palestine in 1946 and from whose death his parents never recovered.

Most of the stained glass is Victorian, the East Window was installed in memory of the Charringtons, the brewing family, who lived in How Green

House and the south wall of the nave is to the eminent engineer Sir Frederick Bramwell who died in 1903 and is buried in the churchyard. The large painting in the chancel is of Christ before Caiaphas by Reuben Sayers (1815-1888), his paintings feature in a number of public art galleries. The painting in the north aisle is "After the School of Tintoretto".

And then came the World Wars. The "vernacular" wrought iron tower screen was forged by the local blacksmith John Harrington whose son Edgar died at Passchendaele in 1917; and other WW1 dead are commemorated on plaques on the walls and in the roll of honour. In the churchyard are the war graves of two Yarrow boys, also of How Green House, Peter who died aged 19 in the HMS Hood disaster in 1941 and Gordon, who was in the RAF and died in the same year aged 24. Spare a thought also for the Boer war and "Shoeing Smith" Alfred Nicholls of the XII Royal Lancers who died in South Africa in 1899 - his plaque is near the entrance to the vestry.

The Astors came to Hever in 1903 and there is a memorial window in the north aisle to the first Viscount Astor, and one in the Bullen Chapel in memory of Lord Gavin Astor who sold the Castle and its estate in the early 1980s and died in 1984 - St Peter holding the keys to heaven features prominently. And finally...there is a window in the north aisle to Peter Dinnis, young farmer from Delaware who died tragically young in 1974 aged 24.

The church has seen much joy and celebration too. Indeed it has seen so much, for so long, come and see it for yourself at the concert on 3 December....

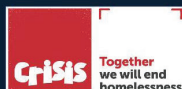

News from Hever Primary School

Hever Primary School has thoroughly enjoyed embedding its values of Love, Respect and Wisdom during this Autumn term. One may think that within a school the value of Wisdom comes as par for the course, which it does, we are proud of how our pupils focus in lessons, their achievement in tests and how they are enjoying our newly revived curriculum. We have also been working on the wider aspects of Wisdom. We all know the phrase 'a wise old owl', but wisdom can come from simple acts made every day like making the wisest choice, choosing the best path, reacting with understanding, seeking guidance from 3000-year-old Proverbs and making food choices to live a healthy life. Our sports coach is passionate about developing pupils' understanding of healthy lifestyles and many children have explained to me why this is important for them. They understand the science of calorie retention, burn rates during exercise and what happens when we overload on sugary items. I look back at my own education and reflect on how the focus has changed dramatically over the years and how our approach now has led to wise young 'owls' making life choices for the better.

What I have found remarkable at Hever, is that when Wisdom is being developed within our pupils, the other values develop naturally too. A 'love' for sports and exercise with the wisdom of why. When looking at Black History Month, our pupils gained

a deeper respect and love for each other. Our school staff facilitated many conversations to raise awareness of the diverse world that we live in and how wonderful this diversity is. Our pupils developed sympathy for those affected by prejudice and a passion to make sure these mistakes and maltreatment never happen again. What a powerful generation they can be, fuelled with these emotions and knowledge, making wiser choices to create a world of love and respect for all.

Our school values were once again shown during our week focusing on Remembrance. At the service I attended these words were read: Live in harmony with each other. Don't be too proud to enjoy the company of ordinary people. And don't think you know it all. Never pay back evil with more evil. Do things in such a way that everyone can see you are honourable. Do all that you can to live in peace with everyone. (Romans 12:15-21)

It struck me that this is exactly the message we give the pupils at Hever, in everyday scenarios, be it on the playground, in the classroom or when socialising online. At a grassroots level we are proud to be guiding our pupils to be 'happy and proud to succeed', not just as wise academics, but as wise citizens of tomorrow who are equipped to make a change.

Have you noticed a public footpath in the Parish that is blocked, overgrown, needs maintenance or has a misleading sign? Did you know you can report any public footpath issues on the Kent County Council website, just search for Public Rights of Way Map

Given the recent wet weather here is some useful information on preparing for severe weather and flooding:

- Regularly check road or surface water drains are not blocked near where you live. If they are, use the KCC website tool "Report a Problem on a road" to get it cleared
- If there are any water courses that are blocked, or partially blocked with rubbish or weeds, report it to the Environment Agency via email enquiries@environment-agency.gov.uk or telephone 03708 506506.
- The Kent Prepared website offers advice on how you can protect your home or business, including a 'Personal Flood Plan' template and links to Environment Agency documents.
- Register to Floodline to receive the latest information for your area during a flood by calling 03459 881188.

from the rector

A few years ago my wife and I went to a restaurant in London called 'Dans le Noir'. It was a very strange experience as one eats in complete darkness! The idea is to help us re-evaluate our taste and other senses. I'm afraid we just found the whole experience very weird and unnerving.

Light and darkness are at the heart of Christmas: daylight is short and all around there are Christmas lights and candles. It is a wonderful and magical time. Indeed light is a powerful symbol of hope whereas darkness has the idea of fear for children, hidden crimes and problems for travellers. We speak of 'light at the end of the tunnel' and maybe, with the economic and other global problems, it's what we are looking for.

The opening of St John's gospel is read at services at Christmas. It is a poem which speaks of God in Jesus coming to the earth: what we call 'the incarnation'. We read: *In him (Jesus) was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it...The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.*

Notwithstanding all the good things for which we are thankful, especially in the peaceful and beautiful place in which we live, it isn't hard to conclude that there is a lot of darkness in the

world – we see the events in Ukraine and across the world, the cost of living crisis hitting the weakest hardest and our struggle to make progress in saving the planet from climate change. The pre-Raphaelite artist Holman Hunt's painting 'the Light of the World' depicts Jesus holding a lamp and knocking at a door covered in brambles. At the foot are the words from Revelation 3:20 *Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear My voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with Me.* It's the invitation to us all that comes each year at Christmas. Are we willing to invite Jesus into our lives and to experience his transforming love this Christmas. Do come to any of our services and find out more.

Another year has flown by and we are now well into autumn. Our great oaks seem reluctant to give up their leaves, maybe due to the extreme heat and dryness of the summer they are now making up for lost time.

Many of the fruits & plants that struggled through the dry period are recovering, in particular bush fruits that seemed destined to produce a poor crop of berries have plumped up and sweetened in this period. We have had a bumper crop of raspberries which fortunately freeze very well. If you know what you are doing September and October have produced a fantastic crop of mushrooms this year which can be dried or frozen for use later in the year.

The summer drought led to us losing a number of established shrubs throughout the garden leaving gaps in the flower beds, time now to think about replanting maybe with more drought resistant plants. A good garden centre can give you advice in this department. Now that the ground has softened this is an opportunity to plant out those spring bulbs directly in the ground or in pots to give you a blast of cheerful colour in the coming spring months.

This list of jobs in the garden at this time of year is long but reaps benefits in the long run. In particular pruning back roses to protect them from strong winter winds and to cut out dead shoots and congested growth to encourage strong new growth in the spring time. Remember to prune with a clean angled cut using sharp secateurs.

With global warming to the fore we still need to consider frost protection for some of our less hardy plants, that might be as simple as putting pots in a sheltered corner or covering in fleece, but may mean putting them into a greenhouse or shed.

We have been successful in recycling tubers such as begonias and re-growing them in the spring. Simply lift them before the first real frosts remove, foliage and loose soil, wrap them in newspaper and store in a dry frost free shed. Plant them out in pots in March either on an indoor windowsill or in a heated greenhouse and they will soon be sprouting up again for planting out once we are frost free. Last year we had an 80% success rate.

Wishing you all a joyful time in your gardens till the buds of spring reappear.
