Eat all the snacks. Life's too short to worry about that next vet weigh-in!!


Drink more water and remember to wash the floor with any that I slurp and spill. I think mum really likes it when I do that

old style stamps - the last few days



As the new King's head is sculpted into our postage stamps, be warned:

- Regular 1st and 2nd Class "everyday" stamps that feature just the profile of the late Queen Elizabeth will no longer be valid from 31 January.
- The new stamps are used in exactly the same way, but are very much larger and show a barcode.
- Non-barcoded Christmas and other special stamps with pictures on continue to be valid for postage.
- If you have old style stamps left after 31 January they will have to be sent in to the Royal Mail with a special "swap out" form completed - you will not be able to do this at a Post Office (which is a separate organisation).

Royal Mail introduced barcoded stamps in February, saying they would open up possibilities for "new innovative services." The long-term plan is that people will be able to watch videos (including Shaun the Sheep), find out information and send birthday messages to each other through the barcodes which can be scanned with the Royal Mail app. This is quite a change and analysts Mintel said it reflects how widespread smartphone ownership has become as well as people's familiarity with QR codes.

Stamps have changed little since the introduction of the Penny Black



in 1840 and the Handwritten Letter Appreciation Society (it slightly inconsistently has an email address on its website) would like to hold back this new tide. The Penny Black was the first adhesive stamp and for the first time the sender not the recipient paid for the postage. The number of letters sent had quadrupled by 1850 and the postal service became profitable; but 170 years later the number of letters sent has fallen from 20bn in 2005 to just 8bn, and falling, so Royal Mail (now a privately owned company) felt the need to do something radical.

Radical has been tried before - in 1964 Tony Benn the postmaster general proposed to remove the royal head from commemorative stamps but the Queen was having none of it. And so what feels like a struggle for survival continues, a sad thought when you

realise that British stamps, unlike those from every other country, do not say "United Kingdom" because when Rowland Hill invented them they were the only stamps in the world.

Is the postal system coming to a sticky end (the Guardian's joke not mine) - a first class stamp does after all now cost 95p.

We shall see.....

Did you know..... the first pillar boxes

Rowland Hill is famous for introducing the penny black stamp, but the other vital ingredient of the modern postal system, the pillar box, was invented by the novelist Anthony Trollope.

Before he retired to write full time Trollope had a successful career in the post office and was sent to the Channel Islands in 1851 to try to work out how to make the postal system work in rural areas where there were no post offices to deposit letters for their onward journey. He came up with the idea of a pillar box. After several iterations, including an ornate version by a manufacturer who failed to include a slot for the post in the design, the standard red

box we know today was born in 1874. Royal Mail estimates that there are over 100,000 boxes in the UK and many, many more across the world.



Margaret Cheyne

Fair Margaret

Joanna: I have long loved the brass of Margaret Cheyne in the chancel of St Peter's Hever but whenever I enquired about her, the answer was always "no

one knows"; it was not a name with local connections - so I asked an expert, local genealogist Lyn Layland from the Eden Valley Museum, for help. She found a lot and I asked her to tell us how she had done it (I have all her references if anyone would like them!).

Lyn: Researching medieval ancestors requires different searching skills from those used to find our more modern ancestors. However, if the person was of high birth, the opportunity to find reference to them is quite high.

As with all research, you start with what you know about the person, in this case Margaret died on the 23 August 1419 and she was the wife of William

CHEYNE. She was obviously a person with some wealth.

My first thought was to look at any local history which had already been researched but I drew a blank in the archives at the Eden Valley Museum. I then looked at the website theweald. org. According to Historic Hever-The Church by John EASTMAN, published in 1905, William CHEYNE owned the

property Syliards. His son was Lord Justice of the King's Bench in 1430. However, when I looked at Syliards (now Delaware) there was no reference to William CHEYNE.



An internet search for Margaret CHEYNE brought up a very interesting article written by Randolph Jones for Bygone Kent called 'Who was Margaret CHEYNE of Hever'. This gives a very thorough account of Margaret's life. He goes on to say that the arms displayed on Margaret's brass are those of the CHEYNE family. They first appear on the seal of Sir Thomas CHEYNE who died 1381.

Inquisition Post Mortems were held from the 13th century to around 1660 by the Crown when a tenant-in-chief died. The purpose of these inquests was to discover what property the deceased held from the Crown. The website 'Mapping the Medieval Countryside' holds digital editions from 1236 to 1509 and this is where I found Margaret CHEYNE. The Inquisition told me about her land and property in Lincolnshire and York. I learnt that she had married three times, first to William MOUBRAY with whom she had a daughter Eleanor and a grandson called William INGLEBY, secondly to a man named DALYNGRYGGE with whom she had a son Richard and lastly to William CHEYNE. I then turned to A Genealogical and Heraldic History of the Extinct and Dormant Baronetcies by John Burke and found the INGLEBY'S pedigree.

But I still could not find any explanation of why Margaret was buried with a monumental brass in Hever Church.

A search for Margaret CHAMOND gave her biography and a reference to Sussex Archaeological Society's 1848 publication including a chapter on 'Bodiam and its Lords'. This gives a comprehensive lineage for Margaret CHAMOND and her marriage to Walter DALYNGRUGE together with the pedigree of the LEWKENOR family into which Phillipa (the daughter of Margaret and Walter) married.

There are many books written on Medieval Ancestors but the one I find the most useful is Magna Carta Ancestry. A search for CHAMOND and LEWKNOR brought up references to Phillipe [Phillipa] DALLINGRIDGE, Margaret's daughter.

I hope this goes some way to solve the mystery of Margaret CHEYNE, but why she chose Hever for her final resting place, and why none of her family appear to have joined her there, needs further research.

Gill Meller's braised celeriac stew

SERVES 4-6

Ingredients

- 1 medium celeriac
- 1 litre vegetable stock
- 50ml olive oil
- 2 medium leeks, washed, trimmed and cut into 1cm rounds
- 1 onion, halved and thinly sliced
- 1 x 400g tin of cannellini beans, drained
- 4 cloves of garlic, peeled and thinly sliced
- 100g orzo pasta (or other small pasta)
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 bunch of parsley, leaves picked and chopped
- ½ bunch fresh thyme leaves, picked
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper



Method

- Slice away the skin of the celeriac and cut the flesh up into 3-4 cm cubes.
- Place a shallow casserole for which you have a lid over a medium heat.
 Add the olive oil, the sliced onion, garlic and a little salt and pepper.
 Cook, stirring regularly for 6-8 minutes.
- Now, add the celeriac, bay and thyme leaves and continue to cook for a further 10 minutes, stirring regularly so nothing sticks or catches.
- Pour in the vegetable stock and add the leeks and beans. Stir well, turn down the heat and put the lid on. Cook gently together for 25-30 minutes, stirring once or twice. Now add the orzo pasta, replace the lid and continue cooking for a further 20 minutes
- If the vegetables look a little dry at any point, add a dash more stock or water.
- Stir in the parsley and season to taste. Allow the dish to sit for 10 minutes before serving.
- It's delicious with a generous grating of hard aged cheese e.g. Parmesan, and a crisp dressed green salad on the side.

concert review



Out of the darkness – a concert of words and music at St Peter's Hever

A concert that opens with birdsong and closes with Jerusalem is not short on ambition. To celebrate the 900th anniversary of Hever church and evoke the essence of that extraordinary passage of time was the aspiration and one achieved by myriad talents with great aplomb.

The church was candlelit for the medieval opening reading, in Latin, of St Peter's story. What followed was uplifting, enlightening and moving from Hildegard von Bingen's wonderfully

rendered O Virtus Sapientie, through Geoffrey Chaucer's words to Thomas Tallis' music brought to life by six extraordinary recorders.

After the interval the cerebral tone dropped a notch to Edward Lear and Flanders & Swann although the spirits were tempered by recollections of the World Wars. This concert was a triumph of imagination, talent and artistic excellence. I am confident that despite my friendship with the impresario who brought all these people together, this view was shared by all who were present.

Dudley was born in 1936 in the Red House in Hever to Agnes and George. His parents lived in half of the house and Ken Seale and his parents lived in the other half. He was the youngest of seven children. He and his friends had the run of Hever Castle grounds because his mother and father worked at the castle and at the castle farm. His father was an experienced thatcher of hay and straw stacks.

He lived at the Red House until he was 21. He deferred his national service to complete his engineering apprenticeship and then served 2 years in Germany.

He worked in Edenbridge as an engineer all his life for Bostitch making the machines that made the staples. He played football for Hever and cricket for Falconhurst. He also played snooker and golf at Villa Golf for several years. In later years he took up wood turning and

metal work as hobbies. He loved everything about nature and all wildlife in the countryside and the garden.

Dudley married Joyce in 1959 at Hever Church. They moved to Four Elms in 1963 where their two daughters, Susan and Sonya, were raised. He was a very proud father of Susan and Sonya, father in law to Chris and Bruce, granddad to Jessica and Harry and their other halves Paul and Chloe and great granddad to Poppy and Reggie. He was a wonderful man and a very a talented craftsman. He was funny and kind and hugely missed by all who knew him.

film yesterday. And is the string attached to my teabag compostable?

These are my daily agonies is it better to throw away rubbish which Kent then burns to make energy or recycle? Should I waste energy washing dirty tins, or, worse still. might I contaminate my recycling with something so bad that Sevenoaks rejects the whole sack? When my mountain of empty porridge oats canisters was joined by a little empty bouillon pot, the probably compostable last straw

did the trick, and I turned to Google!

The answer to many of my dilemmas

The answer to many of my dilemmas is that "it is complicated" and I am not alone in struggling with these issues; a comfort in itself. A cardboard canister with a foil lining and a metal bottom is theoretically recyclable but anything with a mix of components takes a lot of work to unravel and whilst it is worth detaching the metal disc at the bottom, the rest should be binned.

As for cotton string, well that is the tip of the pyramid tea bag.... in the past most tea bags had plastic in them to help their strength but, with Clipper leading the way, the ordinary square bags are usually now good to go into any compost. Guidance on more highfaluting bags such as Tea Pigs

says something like
"this will compost
in a well-maintained
compost heap"
- which actually
means that, like
"compostable"
plastic carrier bags,
the corn starch bags
and their elegant
strings will take ages
to break down in a
domestic bin.

I am now a proud subscriber to "everydayrecycler. com" and thanks to my co-editor I have discovered that quite a lot of plastic I would have thought

was bordering on troublesome can be recycled provided it is "PP5". Also, a new "plastic bag" called Natureflex is being introduced, made out of wood pulp which IS suitable for home composting. And there are several charities making sunglasses and watches from plastic reclaimed from the ocean. So all is not lost and we soldier on!

our rector's thoughts

I hope you all have had a joyful, Covid free and hopefully not too indulgent Christmas.

As we go into the New Year perhaps you've made some New Year resolutions. The trouble is keeping them isn't so easy - trying hard doesn't seem to work and, like the Christmas tree, our New Year resolutions are soon consigned to the scrap heap!

Last year Susie and I saw the charming film, 'Living'. It's set in 1950s London with bowler hats and the tea trollev at Fortnums. It stars Bill Nighy as Mr. Williams, a widower and a 'stiffly venerable' bureaucrat who spends his days processing planning applications for the London Council. This all changes when he learns he has terminal cancer. He resolves to add 'colour to his monochrome existence': he skips work, forms a platonic relationship with a former colleague and most importantly champions the efforts of a group of East End mums to build a children's playground on a bomb site. In doing so Williams finds genuine happiness. The film asks the profound question: what makes life meaningful? It seems this is what Williams finally finds - meaning.

An example of putting this into practice is the foodbank movement which is so needed at this time. I pay tribute to

all the work done by the Edenbridge foodbank at Rickards Hall as well as many other small acts of kindness in our communities, which bring to both the giver and the recipient joy and meaning. It reminds me of Mother Teresa's words: Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love.

However, putting this into practice isn't easy. Over 2,500 years ago, the Old Testament prophets recognised that more was needed than just trying hard to keep the Jewish Law. What was needed was a change of heart. The prophet Ezekiel wrote that God says: 'I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit in you...' (Ezekiel 36:26) This prophecy was fulfilled in the coming of Christ and the sending of his Holy Spirit that we might be changed from the inside out.

The Christian gospel is about making a new start. So, if we are to approach this New Year with the huge challenges we face with hope, let's shake off those post-Christmas blues and resolve to find out how, even in 2023, we can be part of fulfilling this ancient prophecy! I wish you all a very happy and safe New Year






