what we do

We are Martin and Sarah Bissex and have lived in Hever for sixteen years. We have our own architectural metalwork company based in Lingfield. We formed our business in 1998, so 2023 will be our 25th anniversary.

Martin learnt the trade from his father and upon leaving school joined his company in 1981. Forty-two years later and his enthusiasm and enjoyment of metalworking has not diminished. Sarah worked for NatWest bank and left to join Martin in the business in 2001.

Working with your hands and creating bespoke metal items is very rewarding and it is amazing to see the start and then to finish the process. We always invite and encourage our customers to visit the workshop and see their metalwork being fabricated. This gives them an insight into how their project actually progresses to the finished article and gives them much enjoyment in being allowed 'behind the scenes'.

Our usual work consists of manufacturing gates, railings, handrails and staircases in mild steel. Sometimes we receive unusual requests for items such as:

- Manufacturing the underframe skirt for a Chelsea Flower Show promotional dress; there is a photograph of this on our website under the gallery section.
- Building a mud brick forming machine press for Africa to help the customer make his own bricks for a housing project.

- An Indian wedding Mandap
 which consists of a four-way arch
 manufactured from round hollow tube
 with decorative metal leaves welded on
 for decoration. It was so tall and wide we
 had to take all of the pieces outside to
 erect it. This was then transported by our
 customer to London Hilton Hotel.
- A bespoke wine room display and storage system manufactured from 5mm diameter rods, cut and welded to make the shelving. Sarah had to cut overall 1km of this rod into the correct lengths and Martin welded them together. A real team effort.

The majority of our customers are long term, often starting with recommendations from previous customers. Also, being in the modern age of technology, our website features our completed projects and Blogspot and features raw metal to finished project articles to show how it all happens. Our hobbies include gardening for wildlife, attending car and traction engine steam shows, birdwatching and volunteering at Bough Beech Centre which is managed by Bore Place.



Rediscovering Hever Castle

A Tale of Two Hevers

In January 2023, Hever Castle announced that it had been working for several years on a project to discover more about the history of the castle and the many people who had lived between its striking, crenellated walls. Working with the architectural historian, Professor Simon Thurley, this project aimed to confirm when Hever Castle was built, by whom, and how it had evolved.

The task was unenviable, considering how contradictory previous findings had been. However, his groundbreaking research has uncovered a plethora of hitherto unaccounted-for documentary evidence and given us the most comprehensive understanding of Hever Castle's history to date. Most excitingly for the village, Thurley has been able to reassert not only the importance of Hever Castle but also the significance of the manor that shared so much of its history: Hever Brocas.

Tradition had long been that William de Hever had built Hever Castle in the early 1270s, an inference drawn from a license to crenellate a manor at Hever granted by King Henry III on 17th January 1271. However, King Richard II issued a second license to fortify some 112 years later, in 1383. This second license had long been

a thorn in the side of historians who claimed that both licenses applied to Hever Castle when John Goodall, Anthony Emery, and Nicolaus Pevsner all argued that, stylistically, it dated to the latter of these two dates. Through meticulous archival research, Thurley concluded that Hever Castle was built in 1383.

Hever Brocas

The key to disentangling the two manors of Hever was a prominent landowner named Stephen de Pencester, Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, for thirty-two years between 1267-1299. Through examining land ownership. Thurley could assert that the manor of Hever Brocas, located less than a mile from the castle, had descended from de Pencester and that it was Brocas that had been granted a license to crenellate in 1271. De Pencester had died without a male heir, and his manor at Hever passed to John de Lynchpole, who granted it to Ralph de Hever and his wife. Hawise. Their son, Thomas, was given free warren at Hever in 1331. Hever Brocas passed through Thomas' daughter. Margaret, to John Brocas, the owner in 1378. When John died without issue, his lands passed to Joan: a descendant of Ralph de Hever, Joan married Nicolas Weston, and their manor was granted to Sir Reynold de Cobham. Upon Reynold's estate inheritance, this manor was first called 'Hever Brocas'.

Hever Cobham

The lands where Hever Castle (originally named Hever Cobham) was built were also owned by Stephen de Pencester, and they passed through another scion of the Cobham family. Stephen's daughter, Joan, had inherited her mother's dower lands which included lands at Hever. Joan had married Henry Cobham of Randall, and their son, Stephen de Cobham, baron of Rundall (d.1322), held 'land, a message, and rents at Hever'. Thurley traced these lands through Stephen's son, John (d.1362); his son Thomas (d.1393-4); and thence to Thomas' brother, John de Cobham of Devonshire. Accordingly, he was granted a license to crenellate 'Hever Cobham' in 1383.

de Hever

The de Hevers were undoubtedly a part of this story. Thurley established that the de Hevers had a manor at Hever by 1200 and that an earlier William de Hever, son of Walter, had granted the Church of St Peter to Combwell Abbey. Williams's heirs confirmed this grant in 1220. Later, in 1268, the Priory presented another Walter de Hever (son of Lord Ralph de Hever) with the church's living. Walter's son, William, became a prominent figure, being a custodian of both Canterbury and Arundel Castle. It is likely Ralph de Hever, who inherited Hever Brocas, was a relation of William. Where the original manor that the de Hever family occupied from 1200 was located remains, for now, a mystery. It is a challenge, however, that the curatorial team of Hever remains determined to solve.

Over the coming years, we will be re-curating Hever Castle so that it can better encompass the thrilling findings of Professor Thurley. From showcasing original timbers dating to 1383 to conveying a richer understanding of the three (perhaps four!) Tudor monarchs who owned the castle, we will shine a new light onto the castle's importance to history. In doing so, we will also highlight the importance of the village of Hever's place in history.

Veteran trees and their fantastic fungi

I was puzzled and impressed to see Professor Lynne Boddy on Winterwatch studiously boring into healthy young trees to insert a rotting agent which would hasten their transformation into veteran trees.

A veteran tree is an old, though not necessarily ancient, tree, which is beginning to decline. The problem is that there are not enough veteran trees around because there has not been consistent planting across the decades, and so she needs to create a few more.

These trees, with their nooks and crannies, are brilliant for nesting and for bugs of all kinds, hedgehogs hide in their shelter - and fungi thrive. There are around 15,000 species of fungi

in the UK, all working hard to release nutrients into the soil and provide water for their hosts. The professor says that they are quite simply the keystone of life in our ecosystem.

A common variety of bracket fungus which grows on both living and dead trees is the Turkeytail. At first sight it is quite beige but look closely and you will see a gentle rainbow. I came across the King Alfred's cake fungus on a dead tree recently. This is named for its similarity to the famous burnt cake - but it has also been used as tinder, a natural fire lighter, for thousands of years.

And then there are the fungi which look as if an artist has wrapped the dying tree with a beautiful installation - here it is, possibly, Turkeytail again,



this time looking rather subtle. But many can be suppurating red or sickly yellow (Chicken of the woods). Vital but sometimes sinister.

The bottom line, according to the professor, is that death is the beginning of life. Love your dead trees, don't clear them away and let the beasts, bugs and fungi thrive!

our rector's thoughts

I read an article recently in the Times, which suggested we British need to learn to brag better in order to get on at work. This is from Meredith Fineman's book: 'Brag better – master the art of self-promotion' in which she says: The ideal employee should be able to brag with the confidence of Muhammad Ali but the grace of Darcey Bussell. So, has the old Christian virtue of humility had its day? Isn't humility low self-esteem and doesn't that lead to a raft of mental health issues?

CS Lewis summed it up well when he said: Humility is not thinking less of vourself, but thinking of vourself less. Indeed, to counter Fineman, there is plenty of literature on leadership extolling the virtues of humility. John Adair in his book 'Great Leaders' writes this 'We are not accustomed to thinking of leaders as servants. We tend to emphasise position rather than responsibility. Leaders in our society are paid more than others...leadership stands for power and dominance over others. That is not unlike the pattern of leadership that Jesus saw...in his day...Jesus... altered for all time the moral climate of leadership.'

St. Paul quotes an ancient Christian hymn when he urges us to have the

same mindset as Christ, Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant...And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death— even death on a cross! (Philippians 2:6-8).

If we think about it, the leaders we really respect and admire are often the most humble. Our dear late Queen was described as 'the epitome of humility and service' built on her strong and consistent Christian faith. As we look forward to the coronation of our King on 6th May, we are reminded that this takes place in the form of a service of Christian worship. During the service, and hopefully away from the TV cameras, the King will be stripped of his regalia and anointed by the Archbishop. It is a sign that he is a servant under God – the servant King, who serves a greater King.

This Lent, let's reflect on these words of Christ: whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant...For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. (Mark 10:43 & 45)

gardening

Saturday 1st April is not only April Fool's Day but also the Hever Horticultural Society's Spring Show held in Hever Village Hall.

So now we are in the season of Spring and soon the daylight will be longer and we will be able to tend our gardens until late. Then roll into bed exhausted! But not yet, a few more months to go! We can look forward to plants and trees coming back to life after having had their roots

immersed in cold, wet soil and having the blossom torn by the winds. Isn't Nature miraculous? How insects, animals and plants hibernate and know when to come to 'life' when the weather is less brutal. We then see small green leaves appear and start to take over and then the glorious blossom. What perfect colours. It is amazing how even the smallest of

bulbs produce a lovely flower of perfect size and colour. How many of us really appreciate what nature is achieving deep underground.






