Profile: Richard Bennett, Four Elms man and boy

Richard, Churchwarden of St Paul's Four Elms, grass cutter, fencing contractor and general good egg was born at White Post Cottage on the corner of Mapleton Road in December 1946.

He attended Four Elms County School, as the primary school was then called, and as an eight your old solemnly recorded in his autobiography "My Story" "in the house we have seven chairs, a wireless and an organ..."

Both Richard's father and grandfather were born and bred in Four Flms. His mother had moved there from Frant when her father died in WWI to a job at Holmwood as the silver maid, a housemaid entrusted to clean the silver. Her employer, Dr Whitehouse, was a coroner and the family transferred to their London house for two months every year whilst Harrods arrived to decorate two rooms. We do not know how many years it took to paint the whole of the house! Grandmother was the proud bearer of the Mother's Union banner at church and she always helped with the Sunday church teas. Young Richard was in the choir and remembers that the church was always full so that the better off families, including the Williamses at Boons Park, had their own named pews, disapproving rather

if an intruder sat in the wrong place. There was also an active chapel where his grandad played the organ.

Richard's parents were caretakers of the village hall and his father became caretaker of Mapleton House where Richard and his brother David grew up. The boys were lucky to meet the Penman family at Oak House Farm just down the road, Ant was a farmer with Barbara who was also a keen local historian. Richard remembers the joy of being allowed to play all over the farm with no regard for health and safety.

David left school to an engineering apprenticeship at Testers and when Richard's time came he didn't doubt for a minute that he would go to Oak House Farm. So on his 15th birthday, as soon as he was legally allowed to work, he walked up Mapleton Road to Ant - who was expecting him. Ant had decided to expand his herd and Richard was to help the other cow man, Eddie Mitchell, who was such an expert that the Germans had him milk their cows when he was a prisoner of war. There was no need for him to go to college - by the time Eddie retired he was milking 90 cows solo. With Richard's help Ant also farmed pigs and then sheep, in partnership with Holmwood as his sister had married Martin Whitehouse. After Oak House

Farm wound down and the Penmans retired Richard worked in Hartfield on huge tractors doing land drainage work and then he started his own business in 1985. He didn't look back, and now mows the grass at 43 places, including all three churches in the parish. He is always careful with the little grave of a child evacuee, who drowned in the Castle moat, outside the east window of Hever church. Her brother has just been buried next to



her.

Now 76 and thinking of cutting down on the fencing and hedge laying work a bit, Richard is a little nostalgic about the Four Elms now gone. There were lots of clubs including darts in the pub where he played for the British Legion team for many years, with trophies to prove it. As to shops - Mr Browning sold groceries opposite the pub, Allmans had their butcher's shop and on the crossroads Hanns stores sold

groceries and hardware. Heading towards Edenbridge, there was the post office, the garage run by Jack Mitchell and Smith's funeral directors and timber yard, coffins being a sideline of timber production. In their heyday there were Bennetts everywhere in the village - Uncle George helped farm turkeys for the Greenaways and had three kids; one, Henry, was a great cricketer. But it was time to leave, and Richard and his widowed mother moved to Edenbridge in 1989 where he was active in the Edenbridge Fuchsia and Pelargonium Society whose shows used to fill two halls with exhibits in the primary school.

Still very close to Four Elms, Richard became a Churchwarden 2018 where he carefully tends his family's many graves. I asked him if running his own business was hard and he was mystified, he never worries he says. Generous with his time to a fault, he is indeed a good example of how if you treat your customers well, they will reciprocate - he only remembers one potential bad debt, a man who after a few bounced cheques paid up cash when Richard started taking down the fence he had recently erected. The bank was then asked to check to see if the large notes handed over were genuine.....

what's new at the Eden Valley Museum?

There are plenty of new things to see at the Eden Valley's own social history museum, with two new displays this month, plus a Craft Fair on Saturday 29th April.

The first display celebrates 50 years of the town's Twinning relationship with Mont St Aignan in France, timed to coincide with a group visit from our French counterparts in May. Over the years there has been a rich variety of visits, with sports tours, gardening groups, and walking groups and even a cycle trip between the two towns. These events have generated a diversity of artefacts, gifts and photos, which will be on display until 1st July.

The second display, 'Royal Celebrations in the Eden Vallev' is timed to coincide with the Coronation, with a collection of memorabilia and photos celebrating Royal events right back to Queen Victoria's Jubilee. The past inhabitants of Edenbridge certainly knew how to put on a show, with processions, floats, fancy dress and every shop decked out with Union Jacks. The display also features a fascinating window into the 1950s with invoices detailing the planning for Hever village's 1953 celebration, complete with hire of 12 inch television for the villagers to watch.

Also new this year is a display telling the curious story of an interaction between Clementine Churchill and a communist vicar of Crockham Hill. The Craft Fair in the museum courtyard will feature folk music and ploughmans lunches as well as a variety of stalls. Look out for ads giving more details.

The 'Twin' plaque commemorating 20 years of twinning between Edenbridge and Mont St Aignan. It depicts Henry II and Thomas Becket. In 1176 the king built a church dedicated to Becket in Mont St Aignan in penance for his unwitting role in his murder.



The Hon Patrick Bowes Lyon and family, then resident at Skeynes Manor. In June 1911 they led the Edenbridge coronation procession. They could never have imagined that 112 years later would see the second descendant of their family become monarch. In 1923 Patrick's niece, Elizabeth Bowes Lyon, married Albert, Duke of York, later to become George VI. Their daughter succeeded him and the rest is history!

The first is that you'll be asked to present photographic identification. A passport, photographic driving licence, biometric immigration document or some concessionary travel passes will suffice. Whilst a move not without its critics, it does seem somewhat bizarre that the process of collecting a parcel has hitherto carried a greater degree of security than that of electing one's representatives. Should you not possess any of those forms of ID. a voter card - called a Voter Authority Certificate - may be requested free of charge by contacting Sevenoaks District Council by 25 April on 01732 227000.

The second change is that you will not find my name on the ballot paper. After some twelve happy years I shall be standing down from the District Council. It has been a privilege and pleasure to represent the finest four villages in the District. We all know it is the most beautiful corner of Kent but it is not views. location or amenities which make a community but people and in that I cannot believe that any of my colleagues have ever been as fortunate. The recent Community Litter Pick, kindly run by some of your Councillors, saw a beautiful sunny start to the day and each village had a great turnout of volunteers. A big thank you to all who helped, including District Councillor Matthew Dickins. See page 7 for an illustration of what was collected.

Please see the SDC website for more information on the 2023 Elections. Nominations close on 4th April with elections on 4th May. To vote everyone will need to show photo ID at polling stations. See Matthew's piece on page 12 for more.

County Councillor McArthur reported at the recent meeting that KCC had received some 8,000 queries regarding potholes, which is double the usual amount for this time of year. There had been 1,000 complaints regarding drainage problems since December, which is a considerable challenge for KCC. There have been accidents again at the Four Elms Crossroads. HPC have raised safety concerns with Kent Highways and await their plan of action. Speed limits throughout the parish have also been raised as a safety concern with KCC and are being looked into.

For those in receipt of the free travel passes, these are due for renewal soon and as they are all due to be renewed at the same time, holders are encouraged to



renew these as soon as possible to avoid delays.

Doorstep crime in Kent is on the rise with multiple reports to Trading Standards. Reports included pushy doorstep callers, poor quality and expensive work. If you need work on your home and garden use Trading Standards Checked. To report doorstep criminals, counterfeit, fake or illegal goods call the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111. Never agree to cold callers. Report to Kent Police on 101 - if they are aggressive dial 999.

A date for your diary – The Parish Assembly will be held at 7pm on Thursday 25th May 2023 in Markbeech Village Hall. Do come and join us for this free event. It will be an interesting and informative evening with speakers from a variety of areas. Refreshments will be provided and a good chance to meet your Councillors and neighbours from across the Parish. A free Family Fun Day has been arranged for Tuesday 15th August on Four Elms Field.

Finally, we would like to give our thanks and say farewell to our District Councillor, Matthew Dickins, who is moving on to pastures new soon.

our rector's thoughts

The Archbishop of Canterbury recently mentioned that he had been invited to do 'Thought for the Day' on Radio 4 for Good Friday some years ago, but his plan to talk about the crucifixion met with resistance: 'There's a bit too much Jesus in this' he was told by the BBC!

Unlike Christmas and Harvest, Easter can be difficult as at the centre is the cross, the symbol of the Christian faith. It might seem odd that an instrument of torture, which even the Romans eventually decided was too cruel and abolished it in the fourth century, has now become an item of jewellery or a cross on currant buns – now available all the year round!

Some years ago, I went to an artistic exhibition entilted 'Cross Purposes' at Mascalls Gallery near Paddock Wood. It included work by a number of well-known modern artists like Chagall, Spencer and Tracev Emin. Some of the works used the crucifixion to depict the horrors of human suffering during warfare and this has been brought home to us in the Ukraine war. At a more personal level, there are Chagall's windows at All Saints Church, Tudeley, which I visited last year. The central window was commissioned by Lady d'Avigdor Goldsmid in memory of her daughter, Sarah, who died in a boating accident and shows Sarah rising above the waves and ascending to Christ on the cross.

The thought of God in Christ suffering for the world is perhaps the most powerful response to the challenges Christians face when we see examples of terrible suffering so vividly brought into our living rooms each night on TV. Whilst modern artistic interpretations of the cross seem to focus on the suffering of the cross, the earliest Christian artists focused more on the victory and the triumph of the cross over evil. In the Mascalls Gallery exhibition, I was drawn to a rather different painting entitled 'Golden Crucifixion' in which behind the cross emerge the wings of a butterfly, the symbol of resurrection.

The message of Easter is one of hope, redemption and transformation - the possibility of a living relationship with Jesus who is alive and has conquered death. This has been the experience of Christians ever since that first Easter Sunday morning. So I'm looking forward to Easter Sunday morning and the traditional greeting: "Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!"

Finally, I want to thank Nicki Talbot for her long service as Church Warden at Holy Trinity Markbeech over ten years! I have much appreciated Nicki's good counsel over the past three years of my time in the Three Spires. Nicki is being succeeded by Lynnie Rowan.

God bless you all this Easter

Amazingly he put himself forward as a candidate for Priest in Charge of the Benefice and was taken on. He even offered to do this on a non-stipendary basis (that means free!). No sooner had he started work than the pandemic started. Arranging zoom/outdoor services and reaching people during this time was challenging.

However, it was the one thing that brought the three parishes closer and out of that, and Simon's adept management, I believe we have managed to work together better than ever before. Each church has its own tradition and I remain convinced of the importance of retaining individual styles of worship. We have been grateful that Simon is prepared to work with this as well as introduce us to new styles of worship.

I am looking forward now to 'going to church' rather than organising the church; singing in the choir and helping with the children's choir in family services. I'll miss working with Marielou – always a fun time to be had over a coffee arranging events – and welcome Lynnie Rowan who has been generous enough to take over as Churchwarden. Thank you all for your tremendous support over the years!






