This is my second coffee maker, an elegant, retro designed machine which replaced the chunkier Gaggia which expired a few years ago, after many years of faithful service.

For a long time I have loved anything thing to do with 'proper' coffee, to the extent that Carol once bought me a barista course at the London School of Coffee. This dark brown powder, with its wonderful fragrance, has a rich history. Mark and his wife moved to Edenbridge in 1987 "because of squash" - he joined the Edenbridge leisure centre team at the bottom of the local league and ended up at the top! When. Mark took over the business he renamed it "JLM" after his children Jake, Lacie and

Molly, then it became M & M Walker. Mark really enjoys his work: he loves problem solving and making sure that everyone is happy; if they can't do a job themselves they know a trusted local person who can. He famously says not

to pay him until his solution has been shown to work.

Although Mark advertises in the Link (wise man!) much of his work comes by word of mouth and he is proud to say that he has only had three bad debts since 1993 - his mantra is that if you treat people fairly they will be fair back. His fairness extends to a customer's inevitable "and there's just one more thing" request if there's time, they will do

the extra job, but not at the expense of another customer.

Whilst retired from squash, Mark has no plans to retire from work which he balances with time on the golf course. Another few mantras: "Don't offer what you can't deliver", "don't take on work if it is too cold for the paint to dry" and "you are only as good as your last job". Most importantly of all: "Enjoy it. If you don't like it - don't do it". So true!

Margaret Cooke - a profile

Margaret Cooke retired from the latest in a long line of roles in education at the end of the Summer term when she stood down as co-chair of governors at Hever Primary School.

Through her work, most particularly as a hugely successful head of

Chiddingstone
Primary, she has been responsible for raising standards and enhancing the lives of very very many people in our district. As so many readers will know she is a true force for good with sidelines in rigour, mischief and humour.

Margaret started life in the Staffordshire potteries, the only child of Doris and Thomas Gilbert.

Independence came early as, from the age of 5, she frequently travelled on her own on the bus to visit her grandmother, the conductor being provided with a note to remind her when to get off. Her grandmother ran a general store selling everything from cabbages to nylon stockings and the sweetpeas her grandfather grew to supplement his income as a coal miner. Having attended several grammar

schools as the family moved around the country following her father's work, Margaret first planned to be a social worker. A day of work experience proved a real eye opener as she saw the reality of desperate, powerless poverty and she decided that she wanted to try to improve life chances through education instead.

Following a 4 year degree she first taught in Orpington adding to her salary





Margaret took time out of mainstream education to bring up their three sons, working on Saturdays for the probation service and restoring pine furniture in what we, at the Link, now call a side hustle. With her youngest at primary school Margaret returned to the chalk face working at Speldhurst, Edenbridge Middle School, as deputy head at Langton Green and then to

Chiddingstone as head, in 1993. Chiddingstone only had 50 children in mixed year groups but it was on its way to being a full primary. To attract and keep pupils through to year 6 Margaret and her team offered a rich and varied education for children enhanced by the sorts of activities more usually found in bigger schools like music, choir, tennis, horse riding, bird watching at lunchtime etc.

Chiddingstone soon expanded to 120 pupils. Ofsted's first inspection 3 years later found the school Very Good. The local authority would not enable further expansion to 7 forms while neighbouring schools still had spaces. After 10 years as head Margaret began working with KCC on a 2 year school improvement project to raise standards in 30 schools. When she returned Margaret and the governors decided to expand the school themselves and raised £70k for new classrooms. This seizing of the initiative and making things happen, drawing on the strengths and generosity of staff and parents, is key to Margaret's success. In the last three years at Chiddingstone she became a National Leader in Education and worked with St John's Sevenoaks to bring about its progression from 50 pupils to one form entry. By the time she left Chiddingstone it was graded Outstanding by Ofsted. Retirement saw a move from Truggers Lane to Salters Green but, very sadly, Paddy died in 2017. In the aftermath of

this huge loss, recognising the need to do something to keep herself sane, Margaret agreed to become Chair of Governors at Hever in 2018, After 5 hugely eventful years she has decided to call it guits and focus on her family, 6 grandchildren here and in New York, her terrier Billie, her garden and her myriad friends. There are even more of these now as she's been a really popular part of school life in Hever, as evidenced by the book of children's messages from the school, the olive tree from the PTA and the glass dish from the governors which were presented to her when she retired.

As her co-chair for the last two and a half years I would like to say what a very great pleasure it has been to work with Margaret. I checked the minutes to see when this journey started and am pleased to see that the governors thought I would "compliment" her – how right they were! She's a life enhancer. You can't walk anywhere within a 10 mile radius of Hever without bumping into at least one person she has taught or helped in some way. I look forward to many more walks and lunches. Cheers Margaret.

high speed homes!

Since November last year BT
Openreach has been installing fibre
cabling to premises in the Hever area
with 01342 telephone numbers served
by BT's Cowden exchange. But it has
taken 2 years and a lot of hard work to
get to this point!

In early 2021 Hever resident Amanda Johnson got so fed up with her poor internet connection that she set up a project with BT to get much faster speeds to her house and adjoining properties. Amanda joined forces with fellow neighbour Megan Andrews with additional support from me. Unlike some 'fibre' contracts, which still use the old slower copper cable to the house which limits the available speeds, Full Fibre supplies a fibre cable right into

your premises, enabling speeds of up to 1 Gigabyte per second. With more and more services being supplied over the internet, and more people working from home, high speeds are becoming as essential as basic utilities like water and electricity. It is estimated that property prices are improved by such provision.

So, Amanda's project covered approx. 80 properties and almost all are now fully connected and enjoying the benefits. It has been a complex and often frustrating journey recruiting householders to apply for government grants and liaising with Openreach on the roll out. But the main objective seems to have been achieved, much higher internet speeds without costing householders anything for the installation! Well done Amanda and team!

our rector's thoughts

I hope you've all been able to enjoy the summer holidays. Nearly forty years ago, Susie and I went on holiday to Turkey. We stayed in a rather run down hotel where we met a young married Turkish couple and struck up a friendship despite a considerable language barrier. The couple invited us to stay overnight in their flat in Istanbul, took us on a memorable tour of the city including a slap up meal refusing all our offers to pay. It was an unforgettable example of Eastern hospitality.

Susie and I have always enjoyed giving and receiving hospitality. We love eating with our friends and neighbours and more recently in the Three Spires. There is something very special about sharing a meal with others – we all eat and drink and there is something almost sacramental about eating together. It is no surprise that our chief act of worship is a symbolic meal, the Holy Communion, when we remember the events of Easter each Sunday.

Jesus had many meals, often with those who were not welcome. Hence his being referred to as a glutton, drunkard and friend of sinners (Matthew 11:19). Mindful of this, I will be preaching on the meals Jesus had throughout September and October, building up to Sunday 29th October, which will be designated 'Hospitality Sunday'. On that day, we'll have a simple said communion and I'll invite us all to use this Sunday to offer hospitality to someone. We may then

repeat this on other fifth Sundays in future.

Of course, not all of us have the wherewithal, facilities, skills and energy to 'entertain'. But hospitality and welcome is not the same as entertaining, which often has a lot to do with reciprocating invitations. I remember once visiting an old lady who was close to death. But she rallied and the next time I saw her she asked me – from her bed – to join her in a glass of Rose with cheese crackers. It was a wonderful example of hospitality offered by someone facing huge challenges. All of us can invite someone over for a cup of tea, join someone for a dog walk or visit a coffee shop.

The painting 'The Light of the World' by the pre-Raphaelite painter, Holman Hunt hangs in Keble College Oxford and depicts Jesus knocking on a door surrounded by thorns. Underneath are the words of Jesus from Revelation 3:20 "Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me". It's about welcoming Jesus into lives and has the picture of a meal. So when we offer hospitality, we might even encounter Jesus, who can be the unseen guest at any meal.

Edenbridge Community First Responders

Edenbridge CFR group was founded a number of years ago, in conjunction with South East Coast Ambulance service, to provide Basic Life Support first aid to members of the community. We are a registered charity made up of volunteers, that have been trained by Secamb to provide support to the local ambulance service. Edenbridge and surrounding villages are in somewhat of a black-spot in terms of distance from the nearest Hospital A&E, it is therefore important to be able to provide time-critical life saving treatment to people who suddenly fall ill.

When a 999 call is received if an ambulance crew is nearby they will be directed immediately to the patient, however, sometimes the NHS & Ambulance services are enormously stretched and there are not always resources in the vicinity. In this situation a CFR member will be dispatched to the patient in order to provide crucial first aid in advance of the ambulance arrival. Examples of conditions that are considered time-critical include; Cardiac Arrest, Anaphylactic shock, Strokes & Choking. Without immediate trained medical intervention, these can all be fatal.

The CFR group have installed, and currently maintain, 11 defibs in Edenbridge & surrounding villages. In most cases, we have raised funds to finance the purchase of these defibrillators and the temperature controlled boxes that house them. our wildlife garden

As I write, the females from the Common Pipistrelle maternity bat roost will be searching out the male bats for mating and then moving on to their winter roost. We have a colony of about 130 females, most of these will have one baby each so it becomes very busy in August. They fly out at dusk to catch 3,000 midges a night each, mainly using our wood to hunt in. We are lucky to stand and watch their aerial displays. We keep records of our bird, insect and mammal sightings. These are sent weekly to the British Trust for Ornithology Garden Birdwatch and we therefore have a good record of our garden wildlife trends, and know that

the bats return almost on the same date every year, give or take a day.

Part of our garden consists of lawn, which is left unmown providing an important year-round habitat for insects, butterflies, ants' nests, crickets, grasshoppers and a rough layer of bottom grass as cover for the field voles who are predated on by the tawny owls.

Our woodland area is managed for wildlife by having cut paths to walk through, but all other areas have a good understory of leaves, ivy, brambles and vegetation. We always recycle any cut wood by making log piles, stick piles and general compost piles. The stick piles are loved by the wrens who use them every year to nest

in. We keep the rides wide and natural by the hedgerow and this provides nettles for the butterflies to lay eggs upon. We often see damselflies and dragonflies hunting this area. Our pond has been a great success, great crested newts, smooth newts and dragonfly larvae call this home; we even had a kingfisher visit to see what he could catch for lunch.

We have made an extra effort when it comes to bees because they are in decline due to changes in land use, habitat loss, disease, pesticides, farming practices, pollution, climate change and invasive non-native plants



and animal species. We have around twenty-five solitary bee nest boxes, these provide a safe environment for them to thrive in. These friendly bees are safe around children and pets as they are non-swarming and rarely sting. Nearly all of the nest holes are full of laid eggs which will hatch next spring. The adults and their offspring will use the

same nest again thus building up the numbers of solitary bees visiting our garden each year. The boxes need to be placed in a sheltered site which catches the full sun. For the bumble bees and honeybees, we leave patches of clover growing on the lawn and only choose bee friendly plants though they have plenty of wild plants to forage too. We also have a tree bumblebee nest in a lacewing box this year, they can be aggressive if you venture too close to them, so we respect their space.

European hornets are large social wasps; at present we have a nest being built in the wall cavity which we will not destroy as hornets are not very common in the UK and are a protected species in Germany. Many pest control websites state how dangerous they are if they sting but we have lived alongside hornet nests for years now without threat and have watched their full life cycle from nest building to break down at the end, when they will remove partly formed larvae from the nest and drop them outside to die once the food

source has depleted. They catch wasps, spiders and the queens may supplement their diet with tree sap and windfall fruit. Gentle giants compared to wasps who will sting you at every given opportunity.

We have also undertaken dormice surveying by placing twenty numbered boxes around the wood and checking on them occasionally for any signs such as nest building or eaten hazelnuts. Unfortunately, we have never found any signs, but we live in hope as it would be fantastic to give these declining small mammals a safe home with us. Meanwhile some of our other more unusual visitors include a short-eared owl, woodcock, a deer that slept on the doorstep during the snowy weather, a weasel and a family of pygmy shrews who ran along in a line holding on to each other's tails to ensure that the smaller ones didn't get lost.

We feel that it is important to preserve and respect the wildlife that we live alongside as our gardens and land are their final safe havens.




