Welcome to the October Link

I have been walking under oaks, dark green, and darkening more before they gently surrender to autumn orange: once I start to count how many shades of green I can see. I lose count, there are so many. I am also enjoying crunching over acorns and beech masts and watching fat squirrels running away. Talking of orange. gentle greens and browns were suddenly interrupted by this extraordinary chicken of the woods bracket fungus, which I almost mistook for a Belisha beacon.

Local news includes that Edenbridge post office is still closing on 2 November but there is some hope that another retailer will open up instead. Do book your visit to the water treatment works and please put the "Coronation" concert on 18th November in your diary (see the adverts for details).

Turning to my regular focus, some might say fixation on the environment (and good wine), I read that some producers have decided to stop using foil capsules round their corks because they serve no purpose and are a terrible waste. Also, I have bought a water-saving showerhead which is proving very satisfactory. More troubling is that blister packs from pills don't recycle in ordinary facilities or in chemists (Superdrug used to take them, but have stopped) because

they are made from mixed materials which cannot be separated out. Nitrogen has been much in the news with the introduction of the ULEZ zone. A manifestation of its effect round here is that the emissions encourage thug plants such as cow parsley to grow on verges, smothering native species.

And finally, Kent Wildlife Trust are celebrating the first birthday of the first bison to be born wild in the UK for thousands of years. She is part of an award winning project to re-wild an ancient woodland near Canterbury and the results have been astonishing. The bison are a nature-based solution to woodland management and their natural behaviours shape the landscape, making it more resilient to climate change and opening up the thicket to a wide variety of plant and bird species. Very exciting!

desert island whisks

When Joanna asked if I would write this piece, I considered which kitchen item I find most invaluable. away I thought of Bake-O-Glide, it's definitely not the most exciting of items I have to admit but for me, it is invaluable. For those of you who haven't come across it and put simply, it is a non-stick, reusable sheet. You can buy it in a roll to be cut to vour preference or pre-cut in various shapes and sizes to fit a wide variety of tins and trays. It is suitable for all manner of cooking from baking, roasting and frying to microwaving and can be used instead of foil, baking parchment or silicone sheets. It really is completely non-stick! I often roll out fondant icing or pastry for pies on a sheet, thus avoiding the tricky transfer, which



would previously have involved pastry precariously being draped over a rolling pin. It is easy to clean with water or popped in the dishwasher. Apparently, Nigella Lawson "couldn't live without it", I wouldn't go that far myself but it really is fantastic stuff.

Given that rather mundane choice. Joanna conceded that I could select a second item. for which I have a nostalgic fondness, my late mother's Mouli Baby. Now vintage, it hangs in my kitchen above the Rayburn. The red wooden handle is faded and cracked but brings back childhood memories of my mother's kitchen. Oddly I do not remember her using it and I only use it myself at this time of year, to make pumpkin pie. Not a dessert I had growing up but my sister-in-Law is American so I make one for her every year, around Thanksgiving, to remind her of home. The Mouli puree's the cooked flesh of the squash into a perfect velvety texture. For this recipe I would always use a Kabocha, Acorn, Crown Prince or Butternut squash, as they are far more flavoursome than the 'Halloween' variety.

Margaret Bates and Bletchley Park

Margaret Bates's story of growing up in Bletchley, near Milton Keynes, during the second world war is one of a bucolic life playing tennis on the family tennis court with her sisters, interwoven with a growing awareness that SOMETHING VERY IMPORTANT was happening just yards down the road.



Margaret was 12 when the war started and she had lived in Bletchlev all of her short life. She remembers Neville Chamberlain announcing on the radio that "we are at war with Germany" and the family immediately expected German planes and bombs overhead. Instead of an air-raid shelter, they had a cellar with basement halfwindows and so hung blankets over them to protect against gas and reinforced the ceiling. But soon the three sisters realised they were more frightened of the frogs in the basement than of potential bombs and as the war wore on they did not go downstairs much.

Whilst they carried gas masks everywhere, their tranquility was mainly undisturbed. Only once was there a brush with the law.... the family was in the habit of making cocoa at 10pm every night which involved opening their larder and turning on the light which then shone out through the ventilation grille into the darkness. A local reported a spy signalling to the enemy every night on the dot of 10 - and the police arrived..... as Margaret's father knew them well (for entirely lawful reasons) no one was arrested and in future the cocoa was reached for in the dark

Meanwhile the enigma-codebreaking Bletchley Park House was there in the village, hiding it's work in plain sight. There were no road blocks, no barbed wire and no marching soldiers, just huts in which sister Joan worked but would not say what she was up to. As the war went on, though, more and more radio masts appeared and the operatives started to complain about being interrupted by the church bells.

In addition, Margaret's family had to make space in their home for billeted personnel, including a Major-General who helped to get Joan her job, but who never spilt any beans about his work. The billets were known as Guinea-pigs as the government paid a guinea's rent on their behalf. The large family struggled to feed their guests (and their wayward dog Mick) and were grateful to their chickens

for eggs and to neighbours for unrationed honey and rabbits. They also had to cope without their much-loved maid Eileen who left to work in a munitions factory and never returned.

And Alan Turing was just a hop down the road, busy breaking codes. The Enigma was a type of enciphering machine used by the German armed forces to send messages securely. Although Polish mathematicians had worked out how to read Eniama messages, the Germans increased its security at the outbreak of war by changing the cipher system daily making the task of understanding the code even more difficult. Turing and his fellow code-breaker Gordon Welchman built a machine known as the Bombe which helped to significantly reduce the work of the code-breakers. From mid-1940, a number of German Air Force codes were being read at Bletchlev and the intelligence gained from them was helping the war effort. Had they known, the family would have been pleased because tragedy struck when their much-loved only cousin and hero, Leslie, a flight engineer was shot down over the channel. He had escaped France once at Dunkirk but this time he was buried there, aged just 21 and only recently engaged to be married.

Margaret and her twin, Liz, left school aged 17 in 1944. They were not allowed to join the services until the age of seventeen-and-a-half and so joined the Red Cross as volunteers (VADs) in a slightly chaotic convalescent home (a former finishing school). Some of their patients were former prisoners of war who had become ill from being over-fed too suddenly when released. This, and a motivational visit from Douglas Bader, inspired Margaret to take up a career in nursing.

Bletchlev Park is now a museum worthy of the code-breakers to whom it pays tribute - it is open daily and you can find out more from its excellent website - www. bletchleypark.org.uk. There are plenty of films and books about the goingson there, notably "The Imitation Game" and Betty Webb's recent book "No more secrets", the true story of the only woman to have worked during the Second World War as a code-breaker at both Bletchlev Park and the Pentagon, All testament to the important and mysterious activities which Margaret witnessed so near - but yet so far.

above our little rural ward.

There is an application currently being considered to bring the northern runway into regular use so that flight numbers can be increased. Clearly this will have a significant impact on the Ward and the District Council will be asked to make representations to the Inspectorate in November/December. You can make vour own comments too and I would encourage you to do so! https:// infrastructure.planninginspectorate.gov. uk/projects/south-east/gatwick-airportnorthern-runway/. Please visit the inspectorate's website and register to comment. You can do this until the 29th October. I will also be registering as the ward councillor as well as contributing to Sevenoaks District Council's official response.

On a lighter note, I was delighted to see everyone's competition entries to the Hever Horticultural show. I was most impressed by the blooms and produce grown by all of you. It was a wonderfully well organised event, we are very fortunate to have such an active and friendly community.

The Gatwick expansion consultation is currently open for comment and will close on 29th October. If the expansion were to go ahead, it would have a sizeable impact on living in the area. Hever Parish Council will be lodging an objection to the application and the significant damage and impact it will have on the Parish and beyond. The objection will focus on the impact, namely noise and pollutants, on HPC residents and on the immediate environment around us being AONB, the potential impact on housing, employment and infrastructure as well as the wider environmental considerations. our rector's thoughts

There's an old story about a church family who had invited the vicar for a meal. Wanting to impress their guest, they asked their young child to say grace. But the child steadfastly refused repeated requests. So the mother said: 'Just say what Daddy said at breakfast this morning'. With a mischievous smirk, the child said: 'O Lord, we've got the awful vicar coming for dinner!'

It's the season of Harvest festivals and the focus is rightly on giving thanks for our food and all the many good things we enjoy. But what about the old tradition of saying grace before a meal? When Susie and I got married and set up home, we agreed that we would always give thanks before every meal including regardless of who was with us. I remember the time we did this when we invited my boss over for a meal – it wasn't a problem!

The Bible is full of injunctions to give thanks. St.Paul writes: give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus (1 Thessalonians 5:18) and our chief act of worship is a symbolic meal, the Holy Communion, also known as 'The Eucharist', the Greek word for thanksgiving.

The writer GK Chesterton was a literary and literal heavyweight! He enjoyed his food, but also celebrated so much more in his life; he said: 'You say grace before meals. I say grace before the concert and the opera...before I open a book, and grace before sketching, painting, swimming....' etc! It is said

- If you've got a nice garden, invite some families over who lack space
- Come to church early to be on the door to welcome people

When we do any of these, let's pause for a moment and maybe use King David's prayer from thousands of years ago: Everything comes from you, and we have given you only what comes from your hand (1 Chronicles 29:14).

gardening

Norman Greenaway is our local dahlia and vegetable champion.

Over the years he has won many prizes and from 1986 he has carried off the Hever Rose and Horticultural Society's Russell cup for dahlias in an incredible run, broken only three times in nearly forty years! The cup was donated to the Society by Alan Russell, father of Dr Andrew of Sandfield Farm.

Norman was born in Marsh Green to a family of gardeners who ran several allotments in order to feed their six sons. Gardening was in his blood, reinforced by a spell working in Hever Castle's "Pleasure Gardens" after he left school and later, after a time in the engineering firm Flexible Drive and Tool on Hever Road, as Groundsman for Edenbridge Council. When he married Jenny in 1970 and they moved to their present home in Pigdown Lane, her parents gave him some dahlia tubers. This was the beginning of his special skill although Norman's showing career only began years later when he had to give up an early passion for cricket when his knees started to let him down. In fact his brother David had already shown dahlias in competitions when he worked for Fred Groombridge at Hever Warren: he won the Russell cup for Fred twice, in 1969 and 1970. But



Norman's prowess soon put that record in the shade.

This year, as well as winning at Hever for dahlias and other classes. Norman won firsts at the Edenbridge and Oxted show for his basket of dahlias and also for tomatoes and beetroot. The Hartfield show saw him triumph again, winning a silver salver for his dahlias and a medal for the most points in the show. One of the joys of dahlias is that they come in so many sizes, shapes and colours. Those with spiky petals are "cacti", the puff ball is a "ball", when they are more open they are "decorative" and, my favourite, those with broader petals are "water lily"; the urge to grow more types can be hard to resist.

And behind the razzmatazz of the shows Norman really loves his garden which he tends with a precious 50 year old hoe and his grandfather's 100 year old spade. With the support of Jenny, they love to have vases of dahlias in the

house, beetroot ready for their son when he calls (he works at How Green Nursery) and, most of all, lashings of runner beans melting in the mouth straight from the garden. Jenny freezes their tomatoes uncooked and makes soup and other tomato dishes successfully when needed.

Over the years Norman has learnt that growing dahlias needn't be that labour intensive. Generally, although it it good to cut the plants back as they die off, the tubers, do not need mulching to protect them from frost unless it is very cold. If there are two shoots on a tuber it is good to divide them, but it is not vital; with a little benign neglect one can still grow to the size of a dinner plate. And compost does pretty well even if you do not turn it. Norman's maxims are: "Learn from your mistakes" and "There's always a job in the garden". How true! Good luck for next year Norman!




