As the autumn took hold I noticed many busy bumblebees feeding on the nectar of late flowering plants.

They were probably the queens getting ready to hibernate, usually in loose soil, whilst the rest of the brood dies off. The bumblebee conservation trust tells us that of the 24 different species some remain active over winter, feeding on winter flowering plants such as mahonia and viburnum.

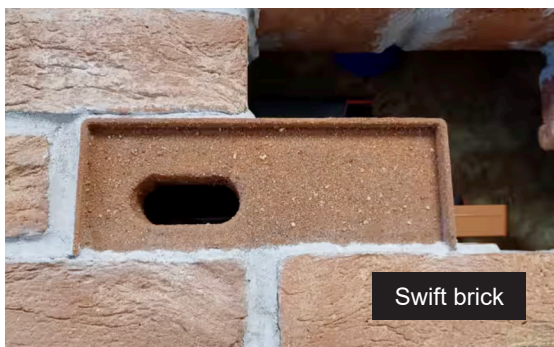


Construction industry entrepreneurs have produced just the thing not only for bees but also for swifts - a brick with bespoke nesting holes in it. You might have thought that less brick meant less cost - but no! A single stylish bee brick can set you back £35 and a swift brick £45 whereas a common or garden holey brick from B&Q is 79p. To be slightly fairer, swift-conservation.org promotes these bricks and most are carefully hollowed out so that the swifts can nest inside.

Honey Bees in Africa are rather better value because they make money for people in poor and remote communities where they are also an essential part of a healthy ecosystem. The charity Bees for Development runs projects in Uganda, Zanzibar, Ethiopia and Kyrgyzstan, for example training women and blind keepers whose honey sales will help to give them economic independence.

I have slowly recovered from the shock of discovering that there is nowhere to compost so-called biodegradable plastic bags locally and am busy preparing for the concert "Coronation" on 18th November. It celebrates all things regal in this coronation year and aims to be both lighthearted and beautiful - I hope to see you there!

our visit to Bough Beech water treatment works

The treatment works are nestled under the grassy dam at Bough Beech. Over the course of four hours they treat raw reservoir water and pump it out to our homes. Now read on.....

The reservoir was created in a clay valley capable of retaining water and Sutton and East Surrey Water rely on it for only 15% of customers' needs, the rest coming from boreholes in the chalk hills further north (these are less affected by drought meaning fewer hosepipe bans than in many areas).

Sue Hart remembers the construction: "I spent my childhood on a farm on Yorks Hill, so my 'playground' was directly affected by the works. I recall the removal of two Tudor farmhouses, one of which, "Bayleaf", was amongst the first buildings erected at the Weald & Downland Museum. Digging started in 1967 and as a child construction seemed forever! It closed the road to school adding several minutes to the school run but when the tunnels were being built under the road between the wildlife reserve and the reservoir we had huge fun running through, yelling and getting the echoes down the pipes. My father had permission to fly fish from a rowing boat and long summer evenings were spent on the water fishing for trout, but terrifying my mother because he couldn't swim and she worried we weren't strong enough to rescue him if he fell in! In January 1985 the lake completely froze over. Sadly that excitement only lasted a couple of days before it thawed."

The reservoir is the size of 250 football pitches and holds 10 billion litres of water. It is mainly filled from the Eden, pumped in during the late autumn and winter, which is why it is currently only 55% full. We walked the dam wall and then gantries over fast-flowing waterfalls and ominous looking sludge tanks to understand the fascinating process before being let loose in the children's education centre. SES wants children to grow up understanding that a seven minute shower uses an unacceptably staggering 60 litres of water against the national target for individual usage of 110 litres a day.

There is lots of information on the SES website. They are working on improving biodiversity round the reservoir and have been rewarded with sightings of otters. The wildlife oast is scheduled to reopen soon.

And so, to the challenge: cut your showering down to four minutes!

Thank you Paul Houlton

Paul stepped back last month as designer-in-chief of The Link and we are very grateful for all his impressive work since 2018. This

may have been his crowning glory but it was most certainly not the only glory
.. read on!

Paul was destined to be a designer, born in Croydon he was always doodling and producing abstract drawings based on well known tunes, his other love being music. Someone who lived down the road was a "commercial artist" (ie producing posters and the like) and he thought to himself "what a wonderful way to earn a living. Art with a purpose". Although one art master told his father "your son will never be a commercial artist" the other, Geoffrey Dickinson, who became famous for his covers for Punch magazine, was more supportive.

After school Paul worked an informal apprenticeship in a commercial studio and then became publicity manager for a big company so he got to know what clients wanted as well as how to execute the design work, an important combination of skills. He then went freelance and, aged 19, married his first wife. Their daughter Andrea runs a successful design business in Paris where she lives with her family.

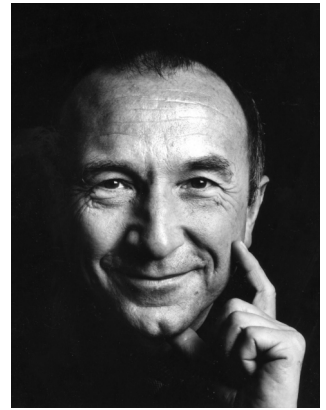
And so to the music. Paul played the clarinet and then moved on to the saxophone - partly because he was passionate about modern jazz and partly because sax players were always in demand. He played in bands

produced by Bill Wyman of the Rolling Stones, though being a modest man he wouldn't want to exaggerate

their success. They had a lot of fun, but gradually Paul fell out of love with the industry and, still in Croydon, set up Grand Design, the design company he ran with his wife, Charlotte Desorgher, for many years.

Paul met Charlotte through music. He had asked his friend, pianist and composer Peter Lawson, to teach him the piano and through his friend Simon he met Simon's sister Charlotte. Peter has since dedicated a string quartet to Paul and Charlotte called "the song of the common spotted orchid", a playful reference to Paul's proud proletarian roots.

Grand Design grew rapidly and started to win awards. They specialised in design work for not-for-profit organisations: corporate identities, annual reports and advertising campaigns for many housing associations, and the Alzheimer's Society to name but a few, often illustrated by Paul's own photographs (he also used these skills to teach photography in the One-to-one project on the Spitals Cross estate some years later). Paul credits Charlotte with



keeping up with the changes in technology from pen and ink designs and hot metal typesetting to fully computerised digital design.

Musical fun continued because brother Simon's band performed electro acoustic cabaret - Paul played the spoons in the William Tell overture, scored for motorbikes, dressed as the Lone Ranger and they performed Verdi on Black and Decker workmates. These performance skills proved very transferrable when Paul moved to Markbeech.

The journey south began in a camper van. Living above the shop, as they were, meant working too hard and so weekend trips out to Truggers Lane, hosted by friendly farmer Ted Witchell were a delight, doubly so when they found The Rock at the end of the lane!

After a while they left Croydon and rented Ann Greig's oast on Five Fields Lane in Four Elms for five years. They had a ball, often literally, as Ann liked nothing better than to throw a party. And the parties continued with Ann Roberts Cleeve, their new neighbour after they bought Lower Buckhurst in Markbeech 30 years ago.....

When Ann called to invite them for a drink she explained that Ann Greig had told her to take care of them and that they were very nice. They thought the same of both Anns. Paul says that deciding to buy a house finally spelt maturity for him and Charlotte, but this is debatable - she, a trained dancer, started running belly dancing classes and he wrote and performed songs in village hall fundraisers with his dear friend Andro Linklater. They featured lyrics such as rhyming Gribble (Hever's vicar at the time) with "quibble" and, when many would have been defeated by her surname, "Wendy Izod thought she'd surprise god"!!

Paul and Charlotte have an unwavering design ethos at home as well as at work: black, white and occasionally grey. White walls, black clothes and even black or white cars. Vera the cat wore the corporate colours but fluffy tabby Barney was a notable exception along with the excellent vegetables grown by Paul in his raised beds and the pork pies he made every year for the Christmas fair.

Last year the couple decided it was time for a new chapter - Paul has Parkinson's and their lovely new flat in East Grinstead is just what was wanted

So thanks for everything Paul!

One of our aims as a Parish Council is to engage with the local community and to keep residents informed. Communication is key so why not sign up to the Hever Information email by messaging clerk@hever.org. The website www.hever.org, has an array of information, latest news and links to local groups too. The Hever Parish Council Facebook page is also populated with updates, such as local road closures, help and support available, consultations, community events and other essential information. If there are other items you feel would benefit the community please do let me know.

You will be aware of concerns over the future of pollinating insects. Recently Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) and Buglife conducted a survey and reported a 64% decline in flying insects from 2004-2022, and the decline seems even higher for Kent. The causes could be habitat loss, development and intensive farming; use of pesticides; pollution of soil, air and water and the impact of climate change.

On a local scale what positive measures can we all take?

- We can adopt flower-rich grasslands, hedgerows and wooded areas with specific thought for the needs of pollinators, with flowers across the seasons, as well as scrub and rough grassland for nesting and hibernation.
- Pledge to put areas of grassland each year into campaigns such as Plantlife's No Mow May and Let it Bloom June. Kent's Plan Bee, through its Facebook page, has run a No Mow May pledge campaign across Kent for the last 2 years with 100s of organisations and individuals responding.

- Reduce, or even stop, the use of chemicals and pesticides and adopt alternative approaches to controlling weeds and garden pests.

You should all be aware of the latest Gatwick consultation and I hope many members of the community lodged their comments. Hever PC has objected to the application to create a full time second runway. There is great concern that it will result in a huge increase in air traffic over the parish with all the associated pollution. GACC (Gatwick Area Conservation Campaign) have useful information on the application and how to add to your comments <https://www.gacc.org.uk/>

With the schools now back our MP, Tom Tugendhat, is carrying out the Annual School Bus Survey. If you have a child that uses the service, please complete the survey so areas that need improvement can be highlighted including issues such as; overcrowding, timings, delays etc. See <https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/2023schoolbussurvey>

News from Four Elms Primary

We have had an incredibly busy first term here at Four Elms. I would like to welcome our new families who started with us in September. Our new reception cohort have settled in well and are enjoying school life. If you are looking for a school place for your child for the next academic year, please do get in touch to organise a place at one of our open events or a private tour.

Our pupils have been engaging in our outdoor education programme already this year. Key stage 2 have had the opportunity to visit Bore Place. Bore Place received funding to provide the opportunity for local schools to visit six times a year as part of their curriculum and we are fortunate to be one of the schools involved in this. Class three learnt all about milk products during their visit and enjoyed visiting the farm and making/sampling different types of butter. Class Four learnt about a balanced diet and made delicious flapjacks. Their favourite part was visiting the calves and providing them with water!

Each class have also had the opportunity this term to visit the farm at Seal CE Primary School, an Academy within the Trust, where they were able to meet the animals, learn about the five freedoms and understand more about the biology of particular animals.

Elsewhere in the school, the children have been engaged in their first learning experiences of the year. Class 3 have just finished their Viking experience which ended with them joining up with

other schools in the Academy for a quiz. The event was made even more enjoyable by being dressed as Vikings! Class 2 have been inspired by the book 'Dear Earth' and have created letters about how climate change is affecting food chains. Class 1's first experience has been about learning school rules and their rights as a child – we are so proud of them!

Class 4 have begun a new experience which is focusing on the Ancient Greeks and democracy. They are making comparisons between democracies back in Ancient Greece compared to now, which has provoked many debates!

our rector's thoughts

I'm writing this article as we see the situation in Gaza and Israel going from worse to worse and await a probable invasion of this crowded enclave that has suffered so much.

Thousands have been killed and wounded on both sides.

Across the world and even on our own streets there have been pro-Palestinian demonstrations, which in some cases appear to be rejoicing at the deaths and abductions of Jewish civilians. There have even been murders of Jews outside of Israel. Small wonder that the UK Israeli ambassador, Tzipi Hotovely, has said that Jews are 'facing things the world hasn't seen since the Second World War.'

We read repeated reports of terrorist assailants shouting 'Allahu akbar' (God is great) as they carry out murderous atrocities, as if to claim God's support for what they are doing. Most world religions proclaim that God is great, as do Christians and we sing songs and hymns about this. It makes sense because, if there is a God, then by definition, he, she or it is great. But Christians also proclaim that 'God is love' (1 John 4:16).

We are approaching the season of Remembrance when we look back at the horrors of two World Wars and the many conflicts since as well as those happening today. How can we make sense of a God who is both great and loving faced with so much human suffering, especially of the innocents?

One of the traditional hymns sung at Remembrance 'O valiant hearts' is based on a war poem by Sir Stanhope Arkwright and has these words:

*Long years ago, as earth lay dark and still,
Rose a loud cry upon a lonely hill,
While in the frailty of our human clay,
Christ, our Redeemer, passed the self-same way.*

*Still stands His Cross from that dread hour to this,
Like some bright star above the dark abyss;
Still, through the veil, the Victor's pitying eyes
Look down to bless our lesser Calvaries.*

Someone said: *Suffering is not a question that demands an answer; it is not a problem that demands a solution; it is a mystery which demands a presence.* The Christian message is that God shows his love for us in Christ; God himself suffered on the cross for us and so knows our pain. Christ weeps over the present situation as he wept over Jerusalem recorded in Luke 19:41-47 and we weep too.

As we remember and grieve for the situation in Gaza and Israel, let's pray for peace in the world and especially in the land where our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the Prince of Peace, once walked.

As we enter November the nights draw in and there's a nip in the air.

Bonfire night and Autumn walks crunching through the fallen leaves. All this hardly conjures up images of spending time in the garden! Truth is Autumn is one of the best times to be planting in the garden.

The ground is still warm and with moisture in the soil after another dry Summer all makes for great root production. As plants become dormant above ground, beneath the soil growth continues. The principle of getting down a full healthy root system in the Autumn will be advantageous come the Spring when the plants come out of dormancy. The plants will have the ability to take up optimum nutrients & water thus leading to strong healthy growth.

The urge to 'impulse' buy plants in full flower is probably installed in all of us – I'm also guilty of this when visiting plant fairs! Autumn is a great time to plant loose bulbs such as Alliums, Tulips, Narcissus and a huge variety of other flowering bulbs – this is a much more cost-effective way of achieving an amazing Spring display – just look out for the squirrels!

If you are thinking of planting trees, large shrubs or hedging, Autumn is also the best time to plant. Nurseries offer field grown root-ball and bare-root plants that can be a fraction of the price to containerised examples. It's worth considering adding mycorrhizal fungi to the hole dug for the plant – this can aid the plant in establishing quickly & boost healthy growth. You may think there's not many plants that give much interest in November – you'll be wrong! Here's some of the winners our garden designer customers turn to:

- *Nandina domestica* 'Obsessed' – a compact, evergreen shrub. Foliage turns bright red in cooler weather.
- *Mahonia* 'Soft Caress' & 'Volcano' – recent introductions with spike-less foliage. Very tactile with a blaze of yellow or burnt orange flowers.
- *Cornus* (Dogwoods) – In cold weather the bark of these plants turn amazing colours - recommended varieties are 'Midwinter Fire' (orange) & 'Baton Rouge' (red)
- *Skimmia japonica* – great in the border or container with flowers that last for months – try 'Rubella' (red), 'Kew Green' or 'Nymans' (female & produces berries)

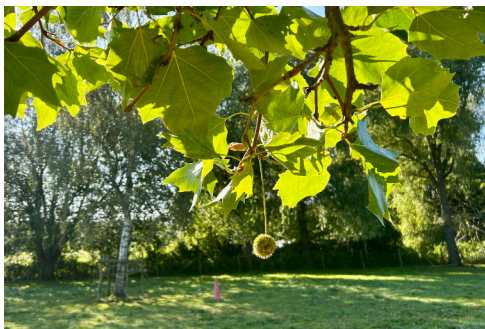
