

# pets of the month

When we moved to Hever six years ago it was always our plan to keep chickens. The thought of them waddling around the garden and, as a bonus, popping out fresh breakfast every morning made us smile. After researching what happens to commercial laying hens when their production drops, we decided to go down the "rehome/ rescue" route. Our hens come from a non profit charity - Fresh Start for Hens, allowing them to live out a normal chicken retirement when otherwise they would be culled at only about a year old.

Upon collection they generally don't look their best with a shortage of feathers and many bald bits. They have been kept in barns with constant artificial lighting to promote

laying, so to see them flourish within weeks and enjoy the outdoors is a lovely sight.

In the early days we have to pop them to bed in their coop to protect them from foxes. Within three days they've got the hang of putting themselves to bed and out of danger as the natural light falls. Within five days they will follow you everywhere on hearing the tin rattle with corn. Chickens are exceptionally bright.

We also acquired Merlyn, our cockerel, who does a first class



job of keeping his flock happy and in line. Merlyn can generally be heard cock-a-doodle-doing with his neighbouring competition.

A story of twin spoons.

I have now inherited both of the family's wonderful cake mixing spoons and I would certainly want one of them with me on that desert island. The first was my Welsh Grandma's and eventually I gained my mother's as well. Both spoons have stirred Christmas cakes, birthday cakes and puddings so much that they have both worn away doing all those miles round the mixing bowls. They are very well balanced and comfortable to use and the holes are ideal for keeping air in the mixture. The curve seems just right for scraping down all bowls and of course the left-over mixture that sticks in all the holes just has to be licked off as a cook's treat or passed over to a waiting child.

Early in my life mv mother started making speciality Christmas cakes. Long before Jane Asher became famous for her creations. we had a church or a mushroom or if there wasn't time a



spectacularly decorated square or round cake; and the special spoon was always on call to mix that big bowl of heavy fruit cake mixture. Another favourite recipe was the rich chocolate mixture both my grandmother and my mother always had for their birthday cakes.



Who manufactured these 9 inch long spoons? I had a look on the back of the handle. 'Homesneeda' – sounds American! ERA SILVER – an internet search brings up 'A dark grey marble quarried in northern Greece', I don't think so. Ah: Patent No. 18879. The British Library only hold patents up to 1899 so I was diverted to a Swedish website at which point I gave up.

### robins

Robins really are a Christmas bird, that is because during the winter there are more robins around than in the summer.

British robins are largely sedentary, and most do not move more than 5km. Whilst some UK robins, mostly females, will cross the Channel to spend their winters in warmer climes. in some cases as far south as southern Spain and Portugal, the resident birds are not left alone. Continental birds pass through Kent on their passage further south and our resident birds are joined by immigrants from Scandinavia. continental Europe and Russia, which come to the UK to avoid the severe winters there. These visiting birds are generally paler in colour and are less 'tame' than UK birds. This is likely to be because in their home countries they are woodland birds and have less contact with humans.

Much research has been carried out into the lives of robins and it has revealed that they are one of the few UK species that sing all year round. Both males and females sing to declare and defend their own individual territories outside the breeding



season, and their songs are more or less identical.

Around Christmas-time, robins begin to explore other robins' territories in the hope of finding a mate. The majority will have paired up by mid-January and the females will stop their territorial singing. However, the males will continue to sing to declare the 'ownership' of what has now become a joint future breeding territory; one which they will fight to the death to defend - in some populations, up to 10% of adult mortality is accounted for by territorial disputes.



On occasions, robins will sing long into the night. They are often the earliest birds to start the dawn chorus and one of the last to stop in the evening.

# **Bradfords**

Bradfords is an Edenbridge institution and one of the tiny handful of "old" businesses left in the High Street. I spoke to Sarah Bradford, third generation of the Bradford dynasty, about their Aladdin's cave of a shop.....

The shop first opened south of the Eden river in 1960. The proprietors

were Edenbridge man Reg Bradford and his brother in law Bert Edwards and they sold electricals televisions, radios and record players. Tim Higgs remembers going to buy from their stock of records and that Mr Edwards was a lovely man. Then, as now, if they didn't have an item they would "get it in for you" promptly. In 1968 they moved to

larger premises at 98 High Street, taking over Cheal's, the hardware business, which is where they are today. Sadly disaster struck later that year when the river flooded to a depth of 5 feet, and also inundating Hever Castle. Bradfords saw their ruined stock floating away down the river towards Tonbridge..... it took months to recover and a big effort to re-stock for Christmas. In 1969 Honour's, their neighbouring seed merchant and horticultural business, closed and so Bradfords started to stock pet food and garden essentials - and the cornucopia of offerings we have today was complete!

Reg's son Paul joined the business in 1971, at first as a



television service engineer, and in 1985 they re-located the homewares up the road to Bradfords Household where Aniseed takeaway is now. The manager was loyal Bradfordian Helen Kemp until 2004 when Mary Smith bought the branch which she ran for 10 years until she retired and the shop closed in 2014. When we first moved in we were delighted by Mary's shop



and bought many items we almost needed!!

In 1987 Euronics. an electrical buving group which enabled its members to buy stock at competitive

rates. The electrical side moved to its own premises, the site now occupied by Lidl, in 2005. It moved back "home" in 2016/17 and that back part of the shop is now run by South Point Electricals, though the staff have not changed.

After a long career Reg retired in 1992 and Paul took over the running of the business, which, today, is all back under one roof after the pet food section had a (relatively) brief spell in a nearby annex.

The secret of their success? Their staff - friendly, willing to help, knowledgeable and loval, not least Helen Chilcott who has worked there for 34 years since the age of 18! They try to keep competitive and are part of a buying group called Home Hardware which gives them buying power. Paul is very much still in charge but Sarah works in the shop now, combining that with bringing up a young family. She and her father were proud to stay open over lockdown to help and give back to

townspeople who had so lovally supported them over the years. Essential pet food and other products were handed out from the door or delivered by long-serving Bradfords joined delivery driver John Kemp.

> Bradfords prides itself on stocking quality products which cannot be found elsewhere in Edenbridge and on saving customers from having to tangle with internet shopping. verv valuable to older shoppers in particular. New home owners are welcome because a flurry of DIY needs will inevitably result. Pet owners and those battling seasonal problems such as wasps beat their way to the door as bees to a honey





pot and wild bird seed flies off the shelf. Christmas is now upon us and the best-selling seasonal stock includes bird seed, firelighters, candles, socks, stocking filler toys and of course useful things like secateurs (you can never have too many!)..... Well done Bradfords - here's to another 60 years!



As Christmas fast approaches I appreciate it's a busy time for all of us, however I would strongly urge you to take a little time over the festive season to comment on the Sevenoaks 2040 Local Plan.


Indicated on the map there are two sites I believe are of concern bordering our ward. The Sevenacre Farm site was subject to an application that I considered previously at Development Control committee. After careful consideration. I deemed it to be inappropriate development within the greenbelt which opposed the view of our officers. Our decision to reject this application was later appealed and I'm pleased to say after I accompanied the Secretary of State's inspectorate on a site visit, my initial view was upheld. However the same site is now indicated as appropriate in the Local plan? It's my belief that as the main coach and tourist approach to Hever Castle we should all make our views clear in the coming consultation.

Consultation will run from 27th November 2023 - 9th January 2024. It's only with your views clearly stated that I have the ammunition to continue robustly protecting our ward from the negative effects of inappropriate development, so please, please! make your comments heard. On a lighter note I would like to thank all those who have contacted me in support of a community bus service relinking us to Sevenoaks. I am determined to succeed with this project so watch this space.

Armistice was marked with a bang at the castle which I was honoured to attended on Saturday as well as Sunday's act of remembrance in Hever churchyard. Big well done to Joanna for delivering such an informative monologue.

With the festive season upon us, please see below for some free ways to dispose of your real Christmas tree:

#### Option 1 – Sevenoaks District Council's Garden Waste collection service (for permit holders only)

If you hold a Garden Waste collection permit, simply place the tree in or next to your green bin and it will be picked up on your usual collection days throughout January. Trees with a trunk of up to 90mm (3.5") in diameter can be collected.

#### Option 2 - Take your tree to a local collection point

Take your tree to one of the District Council's collection points, at the dates and times listed below. SDC can take trees with a trunk of up to 90mm (3.5") in diameter.

Edenbridge : Leisure Centre Car Park. Wellingtonia Way, TN8 5RE Thurs 11 & 18 Jan 9 – 9.45am

Four Elms : Layby by St Paul's Church, TN8 6NE Thurs 11 & 18 Jan 10 -10.45am

Hever : Recycling site. Hever Castle Car Park. Hever Road. TN8 7NH Fri 12 & 19 Jan 7.30 - 8.15am

#### Option 3 - Take your tree to a Household Waste Recycling Site

Take your tree to one of Kent County Council's Household Waste Recycling Sites (informally known as the tip or the dump). They will take larger trees that are too big for Sevenoaks District Council to collect. Visit www.kent.gov.uk/ recycling or call 03000 41 73 73 to book a slot.

### our rector's thoughts

As I write this, the conflict in Gaza and Israel seems to go from bad to worse. Thinking towards Christmas, the message of the angels '*Peace on earth and goodwill toward men*' rings hollow.

But it was ever thus. On 25<sup>th</sup> December 1914, during the First World War, while the Germans and the Allies faced each other across No Man's Land, someone began singing the carol 'Silent Night' and the soldiers on both sides joined in the song. Men who had spent weeks trying to kill each other climbed out of the trenches, exchanged souvenirs and cigarettes - they even played a game of football! Then on 26<sup>th</sup> December, they went back to their trenches once again to continue fighting.

Could that happen in Palestine? Peace in our world? Peace in our nation? Peace in our homes? We all want peace, so what's the problem?

In the New Testament, the apostle James writes: What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight....(James 4:1-2) As someone once said, "the heart of the human problem is the problem of the human heart".

In 2012, Susie and I went to Israel and visited Bethlehem, a Palestinian

administered town surrounded by a tall security barrier. The Church of the Nativity was over-crowded and manned by a bad-tempered priest. The centre of the town, known as 'Manger square', was full of tacky gift shops. I couldn't wait to get out. But then I realised that it was here, in all the mess of humanity, that at Christmas, God chose to enter our world with all its problems.

The true meaning of Christmas is this: the baby at Bethlehem was the one who came to sort it all out. In Jesus, God came right down into the mess of this world and grew up to suffer and die on our behalf. The way back to God is open because of Jesus. As Archbishop Justin Welby said launching an earlier year's Church of England Christmas campaign "The constant refrain of Christmas. in carols and readings, is that God is with us. In whatever situations you find yourself this Christmas, God is with you - you need only turn to him and ask to know his presence".

I hope this Christmas, as we continue to pray for peace in Palestine and across the world, you will be able to join with us and encounter Jesus, who is called Emmanuel, which means God with us.

# gardening

Geoff Davis and David Dutton were caught by the Hort 30 years ago, not long after they moved in as neighbours to Parsons Croft in Hever, and they have been on the committee ever since! The Society has benefited from their many skills over the years; both compete and Geoff has even beaten Norman Greenaway a couple of times in a dahlia class! Now the two have got together to make some suggestions for gardening in the Christmas season:



"Winter is upon us, and whilst not a lot is growing, there are still plenty of jobs to do. This year the leaves have hung on so there hasn't been too much raking, but once they fall it is time to clear and compost them or take them to the dump. Another idea is to tie them up in black plastic sacks and cover delicate plants with the bags as a sort of mobile mulch. Alternatively, delicate plants should be dug up, dried out and kept frost free, insulated in a cardboard box. You can over-winter geraniums if you pot them up and put them in a warm, light area - they may even flower again! During the early winter, clear the vegetable patch, turn over the soil, removing weeds and vegetable roots and sprinkle Jeyes fluid on the soil to kill mildew, mould et cetera.

Around the rest of the garden cut back perennials ready for sprouting again in the spring and since roses will have given their best throughout the summer, pruning will encourage strong new growth - prune a third in the winter, and then a third again in the spring. Once the garden has been put to bed, this is a good opportunity to plant spring flowering bulbs, such as snowdrops, daffodils, tulips and hyacinth but don't delay! During the winter, the lawn will stop growing, but if there is a prolonged mild spell, you might want to give it a high cut. Do not cut low as any frost will cause damage. Look after your grass by removing dead leaves. Then sit back and wait for the warmer spring days - happy gardening!"

Geoff adds that now is the time to install an automatic watering system which really helps with pots and hanging baskets in the summer. The photograph is of Geoff and the elegant Jay in front of his apple tree which produces three different types of apples every year, two eaters, and one cooker!






