a tribute to Dr Brian Milner

Large numbers of friends and family gathered at Markbeech Village Hall on 15th January, to celebrate the life of Doctor Milner who died on 6 December. Brian was born in Yorkshire in 1935, moving to Bristol a few years later, so that, said his father, he and his brother would never have to work down the mines. He needn't have worried as both his sons went on to qualify as doctors. GP training was at Tetbury where Brian was introduced to life at a cottage hospital which he very much liked. After training he got a job doing anaesthetic work, then paediatrics in Cheltenham where he met staff nurse Linda Smith.

Linda tells us more: "Once we qualified as an SRN, matron would offer a job. The girl in front of me was offered Cheltenham; now had she said yes, well my life would've been a very different story, but she said no, and matron offered it to me. On my first day, I was introduced to a voung doctor. Brian Milner. When, after about two weeks, the sister in charge left suddenly I found myself in charge of a children and babies ward which was rather daunting. Among my jobs would be to do the daily rounds with Doctor Milner. which I found equally terrifying. It was hard to keep up with him so I dared ask him if he could help with the nappies. He was very cooperative, and on we went. Little did I know that in a few years time we would be changing the nappies of our own children!

After about six weeks, it was time for him to leave; he was going to Edenbridge in Kent to be a GP/anaesthetist, the job he had always wanted. On his last day he came onto the ward to look at a patient and then left; quite soon after he came back again to another child and then left again... it was when he came back a third time I wondered what he was up to! Then he asked me if I was off that



evening and would I like to go to the pictures with him. I replied yes, and there began our romance." They were married in 1964 and the move to Bannisters Barn in Markbeech was in 1965... the older locals remembered the cows going in and out of the shed it had once been. There followed 60 happy years with Milners' five children Guy, Will, Alistair, Ben and Kate.

Brian greatly enjoyed work as a GP and also at the cottage hospital in Edenbridge where he anaesthetised for several well know London based surgeons including Sir John Peel, the Queen's gynaecologist. Guy says: "Dad spent 37 years as a GP in Edenbridge. From the view at home, the day to day looked fine, the weekend and nights 'on call' were something else though and it was often busy at weekends. Dad would go out, see patients at home then call in from a phone box to pick up the next messages from mum. When he got home it wasn't unusual for him to have to turn around and go out again. This drove mum a bit mad sometimes, she might have

just made lunch .. He'd mumble a few words of appeasement and head off.

Meanwhile Dad transformed that garden over the years. He spent endless time out there, the results are that big beautiful garden which we had to play in as kids, as did the grandchildren. Looking at the garden now you can hardly believe it was the work of one man especially when you consider how much time he also spent with his Lancia cars.

There were lots of Lancias, I'm sure we counted 9 at one point, they were very cool cars and we got to drive a few. The last one dad owned, which has been sitting in the garage is currently being restored.... Once as a family of seven Dad drove us all to Italy in his big handsome midnight blue Flaminia saloon which had at some point belonged to the Dean of Naples university. We were there for a big Lancia Club celebration, 100 years since the birth of Vincenzo Lancia ...Dad was in his element and I think that car won a prize."

His son Will remembers: "'Dr Milner's son aren't you?' said PC Boyden of the Edenbridge Constabulary when he pulled me over on my motorbike age 17 for various misdemeanours. 'Your Dad's a pillar of the Community! And you're letting him down' he said! A bit harsh, I thought at the time, for doing 50 in a 30! But its something I've reflected on many times over the years: what it means to be Dr Milner's son. It had its perks - I'm not sure I didn't use it as a chat up line one day when out and about in

Edenbridge in my teens. At my first Saturday job at the age of 15 down at Moore's fruit and veg shop in Edenbridge, Dad dropped me off for what I thought was an interview, but as soon as I walked in Alan Moore gave me a big smile and said 'You're Dr Milner's son right? When can you start?' Such was the warmth I received over the next couple of years working in Edenbridge amongst the community, just on the grounds of being his son."

Guy continues: "Mum has been the biggest beneficiary of Dad's care. As usual with Dad, this is best understood by looking at what he did rather what he said. We're talking decades of commitment here, Dad was looking after Mum on his own until he was well into his eighties (Linda has MS and is in a wheelchair)." Kate adds: "So for us five kids and 10 grandchildren, we have been very lucky to have had Brian Milner as our Dad and Grandad. He has spent his life looking after us, after his patients, and of course, after Mum. So all that's left to say is thanks Dad, for everything you have done for us all."

And his grandson tops it off with a poem in rhyming couplets - here is an excerpt:

"Even if I was being a menace, he'd never tell me off

He'd patch up our wounds and cure us of our coughs

He always had time for us, and we were lucky he was there

To find a grandad like this, is surely very rare".

Linda Milner and her family would like to thank so very much all her family and friends who sent their condolences following the death of her husband Brian, father to their 5 children and grandfather to their 10 grand children, friend to many and doctor to many more.

The Whibley story

Prominent in Hever churchyard is a stone which tells a sad family story, though exactly what the story was is just a guess. The inscription which crams itself into all the available space says:

"Here rest the bodies of Arthur, fourth son of Richard Whibley and Elizabeth Sarah his wife of New House Farm in this parish, born October 18, 1849 deceased January 21, 1851 and of Harriet Mary their eldest daughter born December 13, 1844 deceased February 6th 1851- may they rise again into life eternal Amen

This stone in affectionate remembrance was placed here by their grandfather David Whibley of Delaware House shortly after their parents sailed for Australia with their five surviving children Edward Thomas David Emily Walter James."

Could their grandfather not count his numerous grandchildren or which of the sons had two names?



It has been lovely seeing the children's enthusiasm as they returned to school after the Christmas break ready for new texts and new topics.

Reception started their Starry Night topic by learning about nocturnal animals and people who work at night, including the emergency services. This was supported by a visit from a police officer this week and next week they will experience the Space Dome (a mobile planetarium) to inspire their learning about the planets.

Year One and Year Two discovered a mysterious purple and gold egg in the wildlife area last week. Their investigations have led to them to conclude it is a dragon egg and they have been imagining what it would be like to have secret dragons in the classroom, linked to their new text The Dragon Machine by Helen Ward.



Year Three and Year Four experienced a fascinating Rocks Workshop to launch their Rock, Relics and Rumbles topic. The children were shown how to categorize various rocks based on their appearance and simple physical properties, using



scientific equipment. They learned about the processes involved in the formation of different rocks and fossils, supporting their understanding of geological concepts.

You probably read about Rev. Simon's son Joshua in last month's Link, who has been in Antarctica. Joshua will be coming in to share his experiences with our Year Five and Year Six children to bring to life their Frozen Kingdom topic where they are learning about the incredibly beautiful but often hostile territories of the coldest parts of our planet.

We have also had great excitement taking all our key stage two children to the West End last week to see Matilda the Musical. The children thoroughly enjoyed spotting all the landmarks on our journey up and the show was amazing! We are very grateful to our PTA for subsidising this event to enable all the children to share in this experience.

our rector's thoughts

There are two very different festivals that coincide on 14th February this year. As in every year, it is Valentine's Day but this year it is also Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday marks the start of Lent. At the service people come forward to be marked with the sign of the cross in ash often made from burning of palm crosses from the previous year. These words are said: God our Father: you created us from the dust of the earth: grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our penitence & a symbol of our mortality; for it is by your grace alone that we receive eternal life in Jesus Christ our Saviour.... Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

It is a reminder that we are not in control and that we are mortal. As Lent progresses towards Easter, the atmosphere of the season darkens and our bible readings begin to anticipate Christ's suffering and the Cross. In contrast, Valentine's Day is a celebration of romantic love. The origin of Valentine's Day is rather patchy. St. Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who was martyred around 270AD. Legend has it that St. Valentine signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and healed from blindness. That doesn't sound much like romantic love!

But maybe it is fitting that these two festivals coincide because they are both about love. Ash Wednesday is about love because it looks to Easter and Jesus' death on the cross. Paul writes in Romans 5:8 God demonstrates his own love for us

in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Through Jesus' self-giving love something happens in our hearts that brings us to love God in response and Ash Wednesday and the disciplines of Lent could be a starting point.

We've very recently held our 'Foundations for Marriage' preparation course which is offered to all couples who are getting married in any of our three churches. It's a fun and practical course designed to help build strong marriages and to celebrate love as we do on Valentine's Day. St.Paul writes: Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her (Ephesians 5:25). Maybe this provides the link between Valentine's Day, Ash Wednesday and the Cross. In the Bible and the Wedding service, marriage is seen as a picture or visual aid of the love between Christ and His people, A love which is shown in sacrifice.

God bless and may we all experience the love of God as we approach Lent and Faster.

Now in her 87th year but still looking much younger, mum has had a settled year and is happy at Bourne Wood Manor where she lives in a hotel-like room on the dementia floor with other residents. There is a great team of carers who know Gill and her sense of humour well. There is always plenty going on with exercise classes, music, quizzes and games. Mum enjoys sitting in the fresh air and sunshine, enjoying the birds and the flowers in the lovely gardens. Her family visit frequently and in November her daughter Joanna and her husband were over from America. Also her brother David and his wife visited from America. Mum still knows who they all are and loves hearing the family news.

gardening

The month of February is like Marmite – love it or hate it.

As a gardener and nature lover, personally I love it. It is the month when normally all tidying of leaf debris has been done and the garden is naked. All the structure is in its full glory, there to see. You notice the beautiful barks of stunning trees like Prunus Serrula Tibetica and the white barks of the Betulas and don't forget the beautiful catkins on Corylus avellana Contorta and Garry elliptica plus many others. Love it or loathe it, ivy in all its forms looks stunning and makes wonderful winter homes for bats, insects, and small mammals, and what a treat the berries are for many birds and insects.

You may be fooled into thinking February is a quiet month, but it is not. Wrap up and get out there. Cut down any grasses which you may have left for the birds to feed on the seed heads. Divide Snowdrops whilst in the green. Prune any winter flowering shrubs. Now is the time that I heavily prune my buddleias and start on my roses. If you have not done your fruit trees, this is the last

month, but not plum trees, save that for mid-summer to avoid silver leaf. I also give them some fertiliser and wood fire ash as a boost for fruit production later. Late summer flowering Clematis can be cut back to 30cm. If you haven't already removed the leaves of Hellebores, do it now so you can see those shy beautiful blooms, and if you're lucky enough to grow Epimediums, cut all the leaves away in preparation for the most delicate flowers to come.

Take this naked time to walk round your garden and see if anything needs moving and, if the ground is not frozen, do it whilst the shrub or plant is dormant. Remember to have fleece ready to cover the flower buds of camelias and magnolias if a frost is expected, it's a shame to wait all year and then Jack comes and it's all over.

Remember to check greenhouses regularly for any plants with decaying leaves and do give small amounts of water, not to Cacti or Succulents though, wait until March and then only a drizzle. I start early seed sowing now of chilli, tomatoes, peppers, my sweet peas and some annuals. I also take any cuttings I can get from Salvias, Fuchsias and Pelargoniums.

The highlight for me this month is the return of my Kingfishers. I wait in anticipation that once again they will come and nest for their 10th year.


