Welcome to the March Link

Rarely have I witnessed such an exciting Spring.... cold, hurricanes and deluges - and still those delicate green shoots kept going until snowdrops, aconites, croci and tiny daffodils pushed, almost exploded, their way out of the ground. On a sunny day, even in the late morning, the shadows have been long, striping the ground like prison bars, but we are very much on the outside listening to the world waking up - buzzards calling and robins and various tits singing loudly, the latter not particularly tunefully.

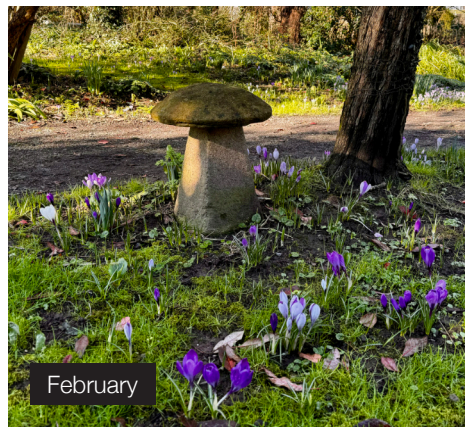
I managed to sit still long enough to do Big Garden Birdwatch at the end of January. Now known by the RSPB as "a stalwart of citizen science" this event is crucial to the understanding of current trends. Parakeets, Egyptian geese and egrets are all signifiers of the changing climate but many of the old favourites are still the most common in the garden, though sadly thrushes and hedge sparrows are amongst

the species in decline. In an article in the RSPB magazine, nature writer Dominic Couzens gives us the perfect excuse to leave the margins of our gardens untidy so that insects can thrive as food for nestlings. He also tells of the humble woodpigeon whose striking yellow eye has an unusual pupil which can both look down for food and outwards to spot danger. They are also the only native bird which can suck rather than scoop up fluid and, very rarely, they feed their young on milk produced in their crop.

Birds gladden the ear and chocolate the appetite the annual Easter egg hunt is on in Hever. Finally, do come to the last Film Club of the season on Friday 15th - Legally Blonde is such an uplifting film, very fitting for this optimistic time of year.

pet of the month

Kumala is a bearded dragon and was brought into our lives by our son. We returned from holiday to find a large, heated vivarium had appeared on our dining room table, inhabited by a most peculiar-looking creature – Kumala. She was rescued when her original owner was going abroad, so we don't know quite how old she is. Our son knew that I couldn't turn away a creature in need of a home, so I had to adapt to looking after a cold-blooded reptile, when warm-blooded furry creatures are my normal creatures of choice.

Kumala (the brand name of a South African wine!) consumes a mix of vegetation and live insects. She enjoys chasing crickets around her vivarium (a bit traumatic for a vegetarian to watch!) and eats a wide variety of greens and fruit. Bearded dragons have an innate desire to explore their environment, and Kumala loves to wander round the kitchen and to watch what's going on in the garden. She needs a little help to be able to peer over the bottom of the door, and happily climbs the dog's teddy to keep an eye on what he's up to. Kumala is surprisingly fleet of foot and her



wagging gait across the floor never ceases to amaze me.

One of Kumala's favourite places for a snooze is snuggled up to my neck, slipped underneath the collar of a jumper or shirt. She has certainly established a special place in my heart. Every so often Kumala's naturally calm mood is disrupted by her need to shed her skin. She becomes rather grumpy as the scales start to detach from her body in patches, and she certainly loses her sleek good looks for a while.

One of the most exciting parts of Kumala's life for me, has been her desire to lay eggs, albeit without a mate to fertilise them. Following some research, I installed a box full of sand into her vivarium, and her last egg-laying episode resulted in a clutch of some 20+ eggs.

desert island whisks

...which kitchen implement would you save from the waves?

This is my shortbread tin, a fixture in my kitchen since I inherited it, and the recipe, from my mother many years ago.

From this 28 x18cm (11x7in) tray have emerged hundreds of fingers of shortbread, a great favourite with all the family. Many boxes of it have accompanied our teenagers, returning to University after the holidays. When my children and grandchildren were small, they loved pricking the holes on the top and making a pattern round the edge with the tines of a fork.

My mother learned to bake shortbread as a teenager, at a Girls' Club in Glasgow, started by an enlightened churchman*, who, having established clubs for boys, believed that girls too should have their own. There was always shortbread in a tin at my family home, in case someone should call in for a cup of tea, and baking went into overdrive round about New Year. Then the shortbread would be supplemented by Christmas cake and another Scottish favourite, Black Bun.

Recipe:-

Heat oven to 180C, 160F, Gas 4

6 ozs salted butter (softened)
3 ozs caster sugar 8½ - 9ozs plain flour
1 oz rice flour

Sieve flours together. Cream butter and sugar. Add flours very slowly, a tablespoon at a time, beating thoroughly in between. Towards the end, knead until bowl is clean. Press into a well greased tin and mark with a fork. Turn down heat to 170C, 150F, Gas 3 and bake for approx. 35-40 mins until pale brown. Cut in the tin immediately, sprinkle some caster sugar over the top and leave to cool. It keeps well in an airtight tin.

what I do

My interest in animal welfare came about through a rather unusual pathway. I had pet rabbits as a child and my extended family had dogs, but I never had the ambition to become a vet or anything like that. It was whilst I was working in the Probation Service that I learnt about the role animals could play in rehabilitation of people and started working with Battersea Dogs and Cats Home on a prison pilot programme about responsible dog ownership. The programme was designed for young people to learn about animal welfare, but it did more than that, it also gave them a chance to train and rehabilitate dogs ready for rehoming. For many of the men we worked with, it was the first time they have ever had something that depended on them and showed them unconditional love. The dogs changed their lives. For the last 6.5 years I was a Board member at Battersea and was fortunate to see their work grow from strength to strength.

After a career in Probation and then the health and social care sector, I recently joined the RSPCA. The charity is huge, and this year celebrates its 200th anniversary. Its work spans not only the rescue and rehabilitation of cats and dogs and small furies but also equines, exotics and wildlife. There is much about the charity that I had no idea about which includes their work in prevention, education, advocacy and campaigning. It is a sad fact that whilst we call ourselves a nation of animal lovers our society is still addressing issues of serious cruelty, abuse and neglect of our animals at the hands of humans.

Rescue is my favourite breed though. I got Lolly, a Staffie, who was dumped with her puppy as she was now 'surplus to requirements'. She completely changed my

perceptions about the breed, and was just truly grateful to be fed! She didn't even know how to play when we got her. I then rescued Buddy, a Frenchie X Corgi who was allegedly a stray found on Clapham Common and the microchip number was a dead end. A complex little fella, but again I learnt so much about dog behaviour. Both my experiences have shown how much reward there is in rescuing for both the human and the dog.

Animal cruelty, abuse and neglect is a society wide issue, something the RSPCA cannot fix alone. It requires campaigning for law changes, pro-actively educating the public about good animal welfare and creating strong local communities to champion it. history of the surgery part 2

In 1968 the Edenbridge practices

amalgamated. Dr Morgan retired, and Dr Alan Owen Jones joined the new group. Dr Broadhead was succeeded by Tim Bayley (enthusiasms: sailing, flying microlights) in 1976, and Dr Hughes by Brian Spear (golf, gardening, walking and birding) in 1979, and, on the death of a young Dr Owen Jones, Brian Milner (Lancia cars, gardening) joined. The Russell, Shaw, Milner, Bayley and Spear team were unchanged until 1991 when Dr Shaw retired, replaced briefly by Sandra Williams and then by Mark Ilsley (marathon running, birding). To give you one glimpse of a, hopefully, bygone age I heard recently that on a visit to a sick boy in a large rural house, Dr Shaw spotted a rabbit on the lawn, on asking the mother handed him a shotgun, and John opened the window and dispatched the rabbit. The father ran up the stairs reportedly alarmed that the doctor had decided to put his son out of his misery!

Dr Russell retired in 1992, succeeded by me (Royal Army Medical Corps, running, gardening). Dr Russell's outstanding commitment to the practice, the Hospital and its League of Friends, and the community was recognised by the award of the MBE in 2009. In 1997, Dr Milner (the family planning specialist who had five children) retired, replaced by Kristina Kelly, the first long-term female doctor in the practice.

Edenbridge Hospital remained a significant commitment, although this was reduced in 1988 when the operating lists were

stopped. The GPs continued to admit, manage and discharge the ward patients, who were all local, and to be responsible for the Minor Injuries Unit. This was never a lucrative role, for many years earning the practice £1 per bed per day. We finally deemed it unsafe for us to manage these hospital patients, many from out of area alongside our own increasingly busy GP work, and we withdrew in 2010 (being replaced by a full-time doctor, presumably on more than £16 per day).

The reduced Hospital commitment enabled some GPs to pursue other medical roles including GP training. Dr Bayley also did a weekly minor surgery session at EBH, handing this on to Dr Ilsley. Dr Spear took on a role performing endoscopies at the Kent and Sussex Hospital. After a long battle, Drs Bayley and Spear established the Dispensary in 1991, an important part of the practice ever since.

One of the joys of a modern practice is that it is a team delivering health care, and every

single person contributes. For some eg nurses, that is obvious; the receptionists (toughest job in primary care?), dispensers and the practice manager are prominent too, but the secretaries and the rest of the backroom staff are crucial, as indeed are the cleaners. Over the years there have been so many team members that it is difficult to single anyone out, but Nancy Talbot was a legend as practice manager for about 30 years from the start of the 60s ("Janet from Dr Finlay's Casebook", I am told); Eileen Connell was a much loved receptionist, famed for her warmth and kindness - less well known for winning Miss Telephone 1958, a London-wide GPO competition testing efficiency and elocution!

In the 70s and 80s every GP wanted to be a partner (ie own a share of the business). In the 90s, this was changing, perhaps because more young GPs were female and, still usually bearing the brunt of childcare etc, did not want the open-ended commitment that comes with partnership. When Dr Shaw retired, there were about 100 applicants for the post; six years later, only about a dozen applied for Dr Milner's place. As the decade wore on, general practice was a decreasingly popular career choice, linked to the onerous 24/7, 365 days a year on call commitment. Incidentally my most undeserving request for a night visit was a 4am invitation to check over the newly delivered babies of a pet gerbill! A "Co-op" system developed grouping practices which resulted in a smaller number of GPs on call covering a wider area and significantly reduced the number of nights worked. Edenbridge was one of the last practices in Kent to join, in about 2000 (and Dr Bayley opted out, continuing the 1/5 night rota for the practice's patients). In 2004 a new contract allowed GPs to opt out of night and

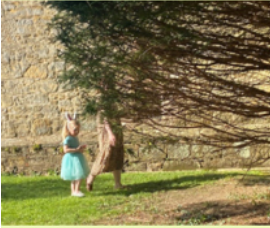
week-end care of their patients completely. This meant that GPs no longer had to live in the practice area to be available for night calls and increasingly they were no longer so embedded in the fabric of the community (which has good and bad points).

Drs Tara Garret, Kate Griffiths and Sophie Bagley came, and Drs Spear and Bayley retired in 2009 and 2011. They had both been GP trainers, as had Drs Russell and Shaw, and were collectively responsible for training over 30 young GPs. Their departure was emblematic of the change from most GPs being full-time and male, to a majority of younger GPs being part-time and female. This trend was further illustrated by the retirement in 2019-20 of full-timers Drs Morrison, Ilsley and Kelly. The profession has benefitted dramatically from the wider involvement of women in the workforce, as have the patients. The move towards part-time working has perhaps meant fresher doctors, with more ideas, but at some cost to continuity of care which many patients regret.

The surgery building at West View seemed increasingly inadequate to cope with the actual and planned population increase in the town. The Hospital was becoming dysfunctional with the few remaining in-patient beds under threat, and mostly occupied by out of area patients. In 2016, the GPs' warning that they might be unable to take on patients in the new St John's Way development sparked a discussion about the future of the surgery and the Hospital, leading ultimately to the new Edenbridge Memorial Health Centre, combining the GP services with most of the Hospital services, which opened on 27.11.23.

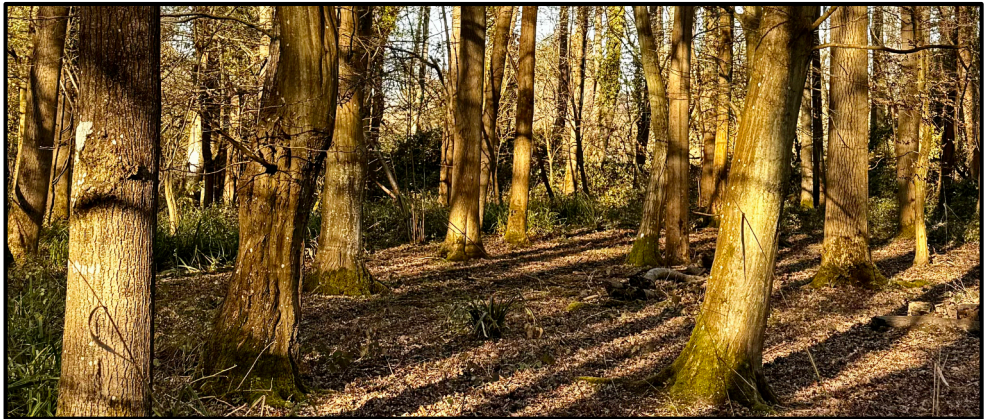

Hever Parish Council are assisting the Rural and Community Housing Enabling service (RACE), and Sevenoaks District Council, to establish whether there is a local need for affordable housing and the type required. This could include housing for older residents who wish to downsize and stay in the area, or for local people to enable them to stay close to their work, education or family. In order to do this, shortly each household will receive a postcard with details on how to complete the survey should they have a need for affordable housing. It is widely recognised that people living on low or even average incomes can face real difficulties trying to find a secure and affordable home in the area where they live and/or work. The survey is designed to see if such housing is needed in the parish for people with strong local connections.

The findings of the survey will be produced in a report by RACE and published on the Hever Parish Council website: www.hever.org. If the need for affordable housing in the parish is established, a call for potential sites would be made followed by a formal planning application which would be subject to the usual consultation, enabling anyone who wishes to state their view to do so.

The Bulk Refuse freighter that came last month was well used, even if it was behind schedule and arrived late

for some of you. I understand the staff were helpful with loading items which was appreciated. The next visit is scheduled for Saturday 22nd June 2024.

This year sees the commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings on the five Beaches in Normandy, France, which took place on 6th June 1944. There will be a series of events and celebrations across the UK, and within the Parish an event is being planned, so watch this space!

Our community Litter Pick is on Saturday 23rd March so save the date!

founded 1868



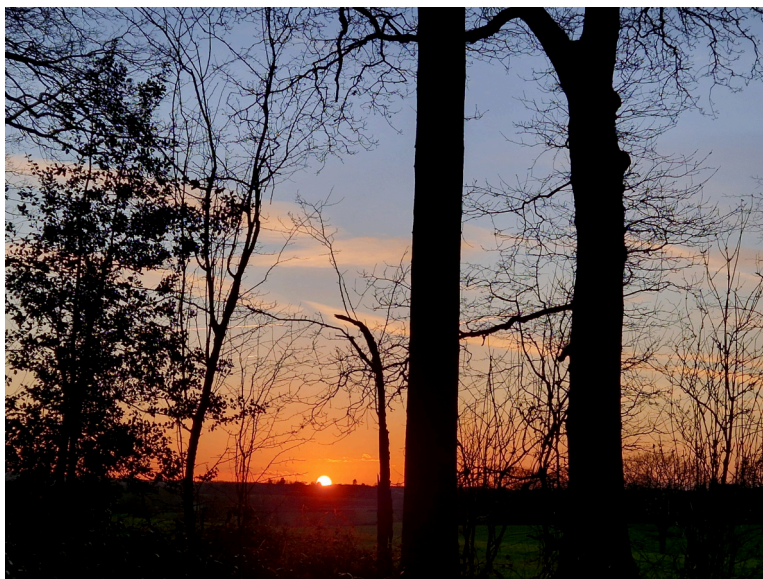

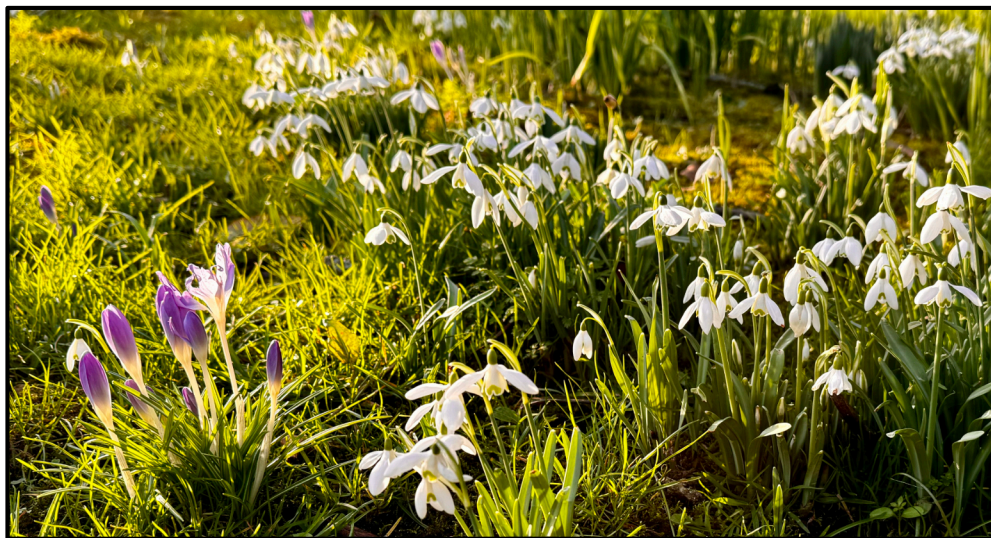

our rector's thoughts

This year is a year of elections across the globe with an estimate that nearly half the world's population will be voting. It includes the General Election in the UK and the presidential election in the USA. In that connection, I was listening to a podcast by Dr. David Owen, the former Labour Foreign Secretary and one of the SDP Gang of Four, based on his 2018 book: 'Hubris: the Road to Donald Trump – power, populism and narcissism'. Hubris is defined as over confidence. The Titanic is a symbol for hubris: the arrogance and pride that goes before a fall. It is said that the designer of the Titanic claimed, 'not even God can sink it'!

An early Christian hymn, recorded by St. Paul in his letter to the Philippians, talks of Jesus as *'being in the very nature God...but made himself nothing...And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death – even death on a cross!'*

Easter is early this year on 31st March – also the day the clocks go forward. On Good Friday (29th March), we celebrate the fact that God in Christ, humbled himself and, through dying a terrible death on a cross, opened up the way for us to share in a new relationship with Him. All we have to do is to be humble enough to acknowledge that we do not have it all sorted and that we need him in our lives.

The Christian gospel was extraordinarily radical when it first appeared in a Roman world that valued strength and honour. Maybe we've become immunised by familiarity into how radical it was and is even today with the contemporary focus on success, fame and popularity. The

modern martyr, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who died at the hands of the Nazis near the end of World War 2, said: 'The figure of the crucified invalidates all thought which takes success for its standard' – a warning to all of us, especially to those in a position of leadership. The Jesus paradox is that it is in laying our lives aside – and that may mean for us a host of small things – that true fullness of life and abundance is achieved.

The ancient hymn goes on, *'...Therefore God has exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow....'* Easter proclaims that Jesus overcame death, rose again and now invites us to join his risen life.

So why not take time this Easter to seek the one who *'has died, has risen and will come again'*?

I wish you all a very enjoyable Easter.

Four Elms

The Deanery Synod meeting on Saturday 3 March coincides with our Sunday Patronal Service. St Paul's church is aptly named after the saint as it was an outreach church in the late 19th century. As the community of Four Elms became more than just a farming "cross roads" village, with the introduction of railways and better roads it enabled more people to move from urban and suburban areas and the then curate of Hever, Rev Klamborowski, recognised the need for a church and a cemetery in the village. In 1881 the cornerstone of the church was installed and when built a year later Rev Klamborowski became the first Vicar of Four Elms. And where does St Paul and the Deanery Synod fit it? St. Paul was a Christian convert and made it his mission to spread the words of Jesus to everyone, Jews and Gentiles alike. The Deanery Synod address is a contemporary message, not just to convert but to go out to our own community and seek out our neighbours who may have needs.

On that note, we hope you feel our church is always open to you, whether a regular churchgoer or not. The building is open for quiet contemplation and, of course, the quiet garden offers a place to sit and enjoy the birdsong. And for those in need of spiritual care our Rector is available. Similarly, please come to "Enjoy a cuppa" on the second Tuesday morning of the month. We welcome everybody. Perhaps we aren't up to St Paul's lofty achievements but we are trying.

gardening

We, here at How Green, love the month of March, it really signifies the start of Spring! Lambs are bouncing around the fields, days are noticeably lengthening and our gardens are really starting to wake up.

It's a very busy month at the nursery with thousands of plants to pot up and growing starts in earnest for the Chelsea Flower Show. We're fully subscribed for 2024 and have three gardens confirmed. All of the gardens are in the relatively new category called 'All About the Plants'. As the title suggests, there's no hiding as far as the plant quality goes! The gardens themselves may not be massive, but the focus and stars of the show are the plants!

The three gardens we are growing for are:

- **The Sue Ryder Grief Kind Garden**

designed by Katherine Holland

- **The Panathlon Joy Garden** designed by Penelope Walker

- **The Pulp Friction Growing Skills Garden** designed by Will Dutch & Tin-Tin Azure Marxen

We often get asked for a sneaky insight into plant trends for Chelsea – we can categorically say the plant selection for all three gardens is noticeably different! This could be a good thing with variation the spice of life for a change!

March is a great time to sow seeds both for edibles and ornamentals. Sow tomatoes, sweet peppers, salad crops and winter brassicas under protection – they can be planted out later in Spring. Some vegetables such as carrots, swiss chard, spinach & spring onions can be sown direct outside. Ornamentals annuals such as Cosmos, Zinnia,

Nicotiana (to name a few) can be sown under protection. Hardy annuals such as Ammi majus, Orlaya grandiflora and Daucus carota can be direct sown outside.

There are plenty of hardy herbaceous perennials & shrubs that give fantastic interest in March. Here's some of our favourites:

- **Primula vulgaris** – The Common Primrose never fails to put a smile on your face!

- **Pulmonaria** – we recommend 'Raspberry Splash' & 'Trevi Fountain'

- **Dicentra** (Bleeding Heart) – lots to choose from – we rate 'Valentine', 'spectabilis Alba'

- **Brunnera macrophylla** – new cultivars such as 'Seaheart' & 'Mr Morse'

- **Epimedium** – Great groundcover plant – 'Pink Elf' & 'Niveum'

- **Narcissus** – Daffodils are a Spring favourite try 'Arctic Bells' & 'Rip Van Winkle'

- **Chaenomeles** (flowering Quince) – 'Jet Trail' & 'Geisha Girl'
