### Welcome to the June Link

The lark descending.... the skylark's dive is said to have inspired the design of German dive bombers - namely the Stuka, used during WW2 in the Battle of Britain. It would dive screaming from on high, and its aerodynamics were very similar to those of the little brown bird. The tuneful ascent is also very celebrated of course, appropriated by Vaughan Williams rather than by German engineers, and it is sad that the species is so endangered, not entirely surprising given that, perversely, they nest on the around.

Turning to humans, The Link asked the Edenbridge Medical Practice about rumours that it was impossible to get an appointment. The response was useful: Kent Online has rated Edenbridge the 9th best surgery out of 6,000 in Kent for availability of appointments. The report said that just 3.8% of patients waited over 22 days for an appointment in February. Additionally, a whopping

79.3% per cent of patients were able to secure an appointment on the same day. The best way to book is via the Edenbridge Medical Practice website. Those who cannot do so can telephone and the reception staff will complete a booking form on their behalf - it is said that getting through is very hard. Two other concerns are that the minor injuries unit is often

closed and that half of the building is empty. The practice says that unit operates during surgery opening times only - from 8.30 - 6.30, Monday to Friday and it has only been closed twice during those hours.

It is true that some of the building is currently empty; this is the part owned not by the practice but by Kent Community Health NHS Foundation Trust. They currently have clinics for minor surgery, podiatry and midwifery and are looking to have an ultrasound department and more.

### what I do

I left my London career in 2017 and have subsequently focused on hobbies that interest me. I always had a desire to create things so taught myself woodcraft. I built myself a workshop and kitted it out with high spec machinery. Over the years I have developed strong relationships with local tree surgeons and woodyards to source good quality wood. I'm always on the lookout for rare or unusual species.

I focus on making tables & bowls and have also carved a few sculptures. I believe that a spectacular piece of wood can create a fine quality item, as a craftsman, I merely bring to the fore the characteristics of that wood. It is common for me to make mistakes and some creations have ended up as firewood. I like to make big items - the heaviest bowl I made weighed 24kg, the largest table was fourteen feet long and the biggest sculpture was 12 tonnes.



My latest project is to make an effigy of a badger for Network Rail. It will be located. next to the footpath, near the railway engineering works that have recently taken place



to shore-up the embankment between Penshurst and Edenbridge stations. Dyer and Butler, the construction firm undertaking the work, approached me with this unusual request as their environmental survey had discovered a badger set nearby and they wanted a symbolic reminder of the location. The badger will be sculpted from a large Oak tree that was growing on the verge of the railway-line that had to be felled to make way for the engineering. They requested that two bee houses be built into the sculpture as a nod to insect preservation. On completion, a QR code will be attached to the base of the carving that will give details of the engineering work undertaken to the public. Unfortunately, at the time of writing, project Badger has not been completed so no badger picture, but you will soon be able to see it in situ, once installed.

### d-day remembered

On a recent visit to Bletchley Park I learned of the crucial role played by the cryptologists in the run up to D-Day. The code breakers worked out much of what the Germans expected of the coming invasion having cracked a cipher called Lorenz, code named Fish, keeping themselves amused by giving each of its links a pescatarian name -Berlin's traffic with Rome was "bream" and Paris's "jellyfish".



Thanks to the Eden Valley museum for Helen Long's book of local reminiscences "Westerham and Crockham Hill in the War". As 6 June 1944 approached Kent had been full of troops but Felicity Gladstone recalled that "what was so amazing about D-Day was that everybody disappeared. They positively disappeared. And then we heard that they had all been ordered to go up north. Not in convoy but separately. They were there all to scatter and to make their way down separately, to rendezvous in the south, clearly in the Portsmouth/Southampton area. They weren't allowed to travel in convoy in

case they should be spotted from the air heading for the ports of departure."

Jane Rosam's great aunt who lived on the south coast secured large consignments of cigarettes from her spivvy boyfriend and cycled up the convoys waiting to embark, throwing them into the trucks.

Bridget Harris's father John, who many remember as a Sevenoaks District councillor, was directly involved in

Operation Overlord. She says: "My father returned from the Middle East in January 1944 to get ready for D-Day. His armoured car regiment, 2nd Derbyshire Yeomanry (2DY) were to become the reconnaissance unit to the 51st Highland Division. They travelled to Tilbury on the morning of 6 June and having crossed the channel on D+4 waited two days off the coast. They were among a mass of shipping; as far as the eye could see, ships of all sorts and sizes, were at anchor as if gathered for the biggest regatta of all time.

Eventually and presumably much relieved, they drove ashore from their "Landing Ship Tanks" in fairly shallow water (ages had been spent in waterproofing the vehicles) without loss or opposition. But they were on the wrong beach and it was to the eternal credit of my father's navigator that they managed to proceed to a map reference rendezvous in the Normandy countryside.

Next morning, by astonishing coincidence, Dad's brother Mike, a Gunner Major in 11th Armoured Division,

apparently heard that Dad was in the area and joined him for a drink. Things seemed cushy - till teatime when orders

arrived to cross Pegasus
Bridge over the Orne and
relieve troops holding Escoville,
one of several key villages on
the perimeter of the
bridgehead. This bridgehead
was considered vital by high
command and the orders were
quite clear: "You must hold
Escoville at all costs."

The Germans were shelling from positions in the lush six foot tall corn and then creeping forward to attack. My father's troop held the village, enduring continuous shelling and close quarter battle for 2 days and 3 nights and several of the officers and men, including Dad were awarded for their bravery. 2DY had landed in France some 700 all ranks strong: by the end of August when they were finally able to break out of the bridgehead and proceed towards Holland, their casualties were 190 killed, wounded and missing."

For Kent, the aftermath of D-Day was harsh. Just a week later the first of 3,000 doodle bugs crossed the channel and headed for London. They were also known as the V1 which stood for "vergeltungswaffe 1" or "vengeance weapon 1". Una Higgs, who was 23, remembers jumping off her bike into a ditch when she heard a doodlebug overhead. When was the engine going to cut out so that it fell and exploded? She was taking no chances.

The defensive forces leapt into action but disaster struck when the anti-aircraft battery at Four Elms triumphantly shot



down a V1, only to find that it had crashed into Weald House, a children's home at Crockham Hill. Twenty-two of the 30 children there, all aged under five, and eight of the 11 nurses were killed. This was Kent's most tragic incident of the war.

All this was a year before WW2 actually ended but it was the major turning point for the allies and there was hope at last. Maureen Burdock was only a child but remembers thinking "my Daddy will be home, he will stick up for me! This was because for most of the war I was the eldest of between 8 and 10 children in our house. My mother and siblings were evacuated from London and over the the years we were joined by various cousins and evacuees, so you can imagine whose fault it was when things went wrong. Hence my delight at the thought of his return!"

Footpaths - A number of concerns have been raised over footpaths in the area. One of these is the path leading to Hever Station (across the bridge) that is extremely muddy and slippery. Some fencing is also broken. I have managed to track down who is responsible and they are now looking into the repairs that are required. Another path that is need of repair is the SR575 footpath that runs past Chippens Bank. The Public Rights of Way team have been contacted again and quotes for the repairs are being sought. Whilst public footpaths are not the responsibility of Hever Parish Council, where possible we will help facilitate repairs and escalate reported issues to keep the network of paths in the Parish useable.

The Bulk Refuse freighter is next in the parish on Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> June see the Diary on the back for details.

#### **Maintenance**

In addition to the usual maintenance, I am delighted to confirm there is a flurry of activity taking place around the Parish including:

- •War Memorials at both St Peter's Church, Hever, and St Paul's, Four Elms, are having their long awaited clean.
- •The annual safety inspection of the play equipment at Four Elms playground and the fitness equipment on Hever Field will take place over the summer.
- •New fencing will be installed on the boundary of the Four Elms Field and the Cricket Club. The gates to the

playground and the field entrance will also be replaced.

There is a campaign being run by Tom Tugendhat, MP, for a direct rail link to Gatwick Airport from Tonbridge, calling at Leigh, Penshurst and Edenbridge stations. The rail link would open up new opportunities to reach Surrey and Sussex more easily and reduce road usage. Building confidence through our Key Stage 2 Residential Programme at Four Elms Primary School, we believe in nurturing not just academic excellence but also character development too. One of the ways we achieve this is through our Key Stage 2 Residential Programme, designed to instil confidence and resilience in our students as they embark on exciting adventures away from home. Terms 4, 5 and 6 are always busy with these opportunities.



In year 3, we ease the children into the experience of a sleepover right here at school. This took place last week and we had a great time playing games outside until late and enjoying a film in the school hall. They found it quite a novelty going to sleep next door to their exercise books!

Year 4 spend the night away in an unfamiliar setting, which this year was a soft play centre. This opportunity enables the children to adapt to new surroundings and build independence. The children spent the evening playing before settling down next to the ball pit to sleep.

In year 5, the children spend two nights away at Carroty Wood, an activity centre in the woods. This trip took place this month and our students immersed themselves in outdoor activities like abseiling, archery, pedal karting, and a high ropes course. It was a chance for them to challenge themselves, conquer fears, and discover the joys of the great outdoors.

### our rector's thoughts

The dictionary definition of HOPE is to want something to happen or to be true. We say: 'hope for the best' and refer to situations as 'hopeless' or 'losing hope' – such as when facing a chronic illness.

In the Old Testament prophets often spoke words of hope: For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future' (Jeremiah 29:11). The New Testament speaks of 'a sure and certain hope' resulting from the coming of Christ, his death and resurrection

Christians believe that the coming of Christ marked the start of a New Age – the Kingdom of God. The trouble is that as we look at ourselves, the state of the world and even the state of the church we're seeking to build, it's easy to lose hope.

6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the D Day landings in Normandy. Many events are planned including the anniversary picnic in Hever Castle. D Day is a wonderful picture of hope and the courage of those who went ashore, establishing a bridgehead against amazing odds. Although it was probably hard to see it at the time, the success of the D Day landings from the Western Allies point of view, marked the deciding factor in achieving victory in Europe. However, in June 1944 there still remained nearly a year of fierce fighting with many casualties before the war in Europe ended on May 7th 1945.

Theologians have used D Day and the Second World War as an analogy of the in-between nature of the age in which we live following the coming of Christ but before the end of time. The victory has been won over evil by Jesus' death and resurrection but there are many struggles before the final coming of the Kingdom in all its fulness. It's a hard concept to grasp but I think Eugene Peterson's paraphrase puts it well: All around us we observe a pregnant creation. The difficult times of pain throughout the world are simply birth pangs. But it's not only around us; it's within us. The Spirit of God is arousing us within. We're also feeling the birth pangs. These sterile and barren bodies of ours are yearning for full deliverance. That is why waiting does not diminish us, any more than waiting diminishes a pregnant mother. We are enlarged in the waiting. We, of course, don't see what is enlarging us. But the longer we wait, the larger we become, and the more joyful our expectancy. (Romans 8:22-25)

God bless you all and I hope we all enjoy the summer!

### gardening

"Roses are red ......" Not only red, which is a special colour for a rose as it can depict that 'special moment', but many other hues with varying tinges. Several of these special flowers will be seen at the Hever Rose and Horticultural Society's Rose show on Saturday 8th June in the Hever Village Hall. Every year, the array of roses, all shapes and sizes, and of course scent, are grown by members. These and all the other exhibits can be viewed at the show between 2 and 4pm and are judged by a professional judge to award the several cups to the growers of the year. Roses are known to have originated in China and then spread over the whole of the northern hemisphere between 60 to 70 million years ago. Nothing defines an English garden like a rose. In surveys, it always tops the charts as the most popular plant to grow and

they are the largest group of plants available to gardeners.

A couple of years ago I treated myself to a rose called 'Janet'. I bought it purely for the name, not knowing what a beautiful large pink bloom it would produce. In other respects, it lives up to its name! Unruly, scratchy thorns, spreads where she wants to with no respect for the other plants nearby, but the pale pink and large blooms are a delight to see. My 'Janet' now has a large metal frame to climb onto so I am hoping she will look spectacular when in bloom.


