Welcome to the July Link

We have had a good showing of cuckoos so far this year which is excellent news given how endangered they. They need you to keep your garden a bit untidv as caterpillars and other insects such as beetles and ants form the major part of the cuckoo's diet. Many of the caterpillars are the hairy, brightly coloured and poisonous, but their digestive system is specially adapted to cope with the hairs and toxins. After a brief spell in the UK, many have said "goodbye in July" and started their precarious trip back to the Congo to over-winter. Talking of biodiversity, we welcome a new Bore Place/ Sutton & East Surrey partnership at Bough Beech reservoir. With the help of volunteers, they will carry out conservation work whilst ensuring greater public access to the reservoir and the reopening of a restored Oast House.

The Link has more information from the Practice Manger at the surgery about the problems patients are having getting appointments. She confirms that you cannot get appointments by telephoning or in person, the only approach is to fill out the online form (https://florey.accurx.com/p/ G82019 this link can be found if you google Edenbridge Medical Practice). That way, a doctor can review the request and decide what sort of appointment to offer and how urgently. The appointment is issued electronically.

Many are not confident online and are still telephoning for appointments - for them the receptionist will fill out a form which will be passed to the doctor and once an appointment has been allocated the patient will be contacted by telephone. The shock of suddenly having to work online has been unwelcome but the good news is that appointments are efficiently allocated using this system. There is no other way!

Finally, more good news (we hope!) - in a break with tradition The Link will print an August edition and, instead of the summer break, we will produce a combined December/January magazine.

to peel or not to peel

Imagine life without a potato peeler!

Quite a few contributors to our regular Desert Island Whisks column cannot, though they will argue ferociously about which type of peeler is "the one". Perhaps not quite as radical in improving the lives of burdened housewives as the washing machine and the refrigerator, this surprisingly recent labour-saving discovery has nonetheless played its part.

There are basically two types of peeler, each with their own ardent supporters. First, according to a rather earnest Wikipedia article (I am clearly not the only person with a strange interest in peelers),

there's the straight one



resembling a knife. The Lancashire (which often has a round wooden handle wrapped in string) and the French *Econome* designs contain a fixed blade. The *Econome*, invented in 1928 by Victor Pouzet, entails a unique blade design that features two slits. Then there's the Y-shaped one with a wobbly blade. Switzerland produced not only Nescafé

and velcro but also a particularly famous example of a Y potato

peeler called the



Zena Rex. It was invented in 1947 by Alfred Neweczerzal from Davos. With its razor- sharp wobbly blade and recognisable red handle it is considered an icon of Swiss design and was



featured on a 2004 Swiss postage stamp.

Across the Atlantic, the stainless steel handled variant, the Zena Star peeler, was the model popularized by legendary New York City street hawker Joe Ades. Through selling his \$5 peelers, Joe managed to live through multiple divorces, go to work in \$1,000 suits and live on Park Avenue; he was even featured in Vanity Fair.

We have yet to hear from anyone who either loves their electric peeler (see Amazon, £20) or indeed makes do with a paring knife, but do let us know which implement you would save from the waves!

what I do

"I don't do weeds" my neighbour remarked one day as she walked past me in my front garden. At the time I was scrabbling around on my hands and knees, yanking out the latest shoots that had somehow made it through the supposedly weed-proof liner. "I wish I didn't either!" I thought to myself, resenting this as yet another chore to tick off the endless list.

That was quite a few years ago now. Looking back at that time, I see a stressed out thirty-something working mother of two boys, constantly on the go, never believing I had the time to pause and 'smell the flowers'. Eventually I engaged with counselling, which helped me to realise that I had a choice in how I lived my life. Within five years I had moved from a built-up estate near Maidstone to leafy Hartfield, married the love of my life and gone back into education, gaining a Post Graduate Diploma in Counselling.



My love of the outdoors and people led me to a Steiner based organisation where I worked as a gardener and mental health support worker. It was here that I learned about biodynamic gardening, which is a way of utilising all the natural resources available within our immediate environment to cultivate healthy, colourful and bountiful plants and crops. I discovered that those persistent weeds I used to dread had a vital role to play on the bio-dynamic compost heaps I built and tended which would ultimately nourish the plants, protect wildlife and encourage sustainability. Inspired by what I have learned about plants and people, I decided to set up my own gardening business. The Holistic Gardener. Being self employed means that I have the power of choice in terms of managing my time and workload. As such my life has balance and is no longer a stressfest of impossibly long 'to-do' lists.

Working holistically means that I consider all aspects of your garden, treating it with no chemicals, just focus, creativity and a good deal of elbow grease. I follow your wishes, keeping your garden's growth sustainably managed and implementing any changes you desire so that your garden sings all year round. I also work alongside my husband Paul who is a National Trust gualified Ranger. Together, we undertake ecologically focused landscaping jobs including tree work, pond installation and cultivation, bespoke gates, fencing, planters and other garden furniture commissions.

The water in the channel would have been very cold for all those soldiers jumping off the landing craft. The music was excellent and the Festival Theatre did us proud, staff and volunteers alike. Thanks to the Castle for welcoming in locals without charging for the venue, to the Scott Partnership for lighting the beacon, to the bell ringers - and to the Parish Council and Hever Residents Association for sponsoring the event.

The Festival is now in full swing and the lovely new roof is not only beautiful but protects all from the weather. Highlights include a Steely Dan tribute on 13 July, the Magic Flute on 3 August and Horrible Histories on 29th. In between, all things Tudor will be explored at the short history festival from 19-22nd August.

a little more d-day

Joyce Staplehurst's D-day memories and a letter home

Joyce Staplehurst's family had a very lively D-day. On the 6th June 1944, her father. Harry Edwards landed in France by Horsa glider. He was in the 6th Airborne Division and was picked to be part of the operation to capture Pegasus Bridge, flying in the second wave which landed in France at 9 p.m. The mission was immensely dangerous and whilst he was one of the lucky ones and came home to his family, he lost many of his comrades on that night and on the days that followed. The 6th Airborne Division was eventually withdrawn from battle on 27th August, having spent 82 days in the thick of the fighting in Normandy. Since landing on 6th June, the division had suffered 4.457 casualties, of which 821 were killed, 2,709 wounded and 927 missing.

The picture shows Harry, top right, in a plane which, as was traditional, carried the names of wives and children including Jovce's. She was only three when evacuated to Wales and when she saw her father again, she didn't know who he was, although she was pleased that he always came with a bar of chocolate or a balloon. Not surprisingly, Harry suffered from what was then called "shell shock" but despite the diagnosis he was not allowed to come home and spent the rest of the war as a driver, still in the battlefield. He never got better, and Joyce remembers that for many years she would be woken at night by her father's screams. She is very both proud of what he did and how he endured



The family moved to Four Elms when Jovce was 14 because her father got a job as farm manager at Crippenden Manor. Here she met her husband. Dudlev. most of whose family worked for the Castle. his father as a thatcher. Dudlev's two brothers Obadiah and Stanley who were in the RAF were also active on Dday in Lancaster bombers. Again, despite the peril, they came home safely. They are on the roll of honour in Hever Church.

Last month we mentioned Bridget's father who landed in Normandy on D+4.

We now have his letter written on 27th June to describe what had happened...

hran P.M. Kanie 2nd Derbiphine Jes BWE7 9 27 June 44 Danling mine, The just been list ening to the six o'clock news - what a headache Wither much be having ; Chentowed ones even earlier than we had hoped, the Russians advancing fait - not to mention our own port in France.

"... The ships off those beaches just had to be seen to be believed, almost touching as far as the eye could see. And the whole thing going on as though there were no enemy at all. I think we were three days in all on our boat, then over the side into landing craft and a short run into the coast. - we came in about 8pm on a lovely summer evening – the beaches were no longer under fire then and the moment one had dreamed of for so long was very quiet and uneventful.

We had a couple of quiet days to get organised. Then not nearly so quiet. None of the landing exactly what one expected – all much quieter and the greatest surprise of all the absence of German air. What a target those thousands of ships (let alone the areas we left from the other side!).

I haven't spent much money but I have bought a bit of quite good camembert cheese, some cream once or twice and butter and cabbages. The most difficult job an officer has - to make the chaps realise that spuds and cabbages etc growing in fields belong to the local inhabitants!! but really they're very good and from my limited experience I give the locals full marks for their behaviour towards it all.

Its gone ten o'clock now and the old sun is going down once more....and now it is a race against the daylight to finish and get to bed. I am sitting beside my vehicle under a shelter made by a tarpaulin - the other side I hear the cooker going which means one of the crew will shortly arrive with a final cup of tea (or chocolate - we get a bar a day in our rations at this stage and its very popular as a hot drink). I'll drink that and then into my bed - in a deep hole fully three feet down and so narrow that you can't turn round - still that doesn't matter for it is full protection against shells and mortar bombs. Its not often one can safely turn in guite as soon as this and full advantage must be taken of the nice long night we look like having "



Dozens of people – English and French – gathered in Edenbridge for a weekend of fun, food and friendship to mark the relaunch of the twinning association that connects the town to Mont St Aignan. Over three days in mid-May, more than 20 French people, from school-age children to senior citizens, stayed in the homes of members of Eden Twinning and visited Hever Castle, Titsey Place and a local pub while practising their English skills with their hosts.

Hever Parish Council

Thirty-six members of the public attended the recent Parish Assembly. Below is a summary of the Annual Report by Councillor Angela Haydon, Chair of Hever Parish Council:

Over the past year, HPC commented on 53 planning applications, 3 appeals and raised 3 enforcement issues. Comments were submitted on SDC's 2040 Local Plan and the School Bus survey, highlighting issues with overcrowding, timings, delays and reduction of services. HPC objected to the Gatwick Expansion application due to the significant damage and impact it will have on the Parish and beyond. People were encouraged to respond to the Gatwick Night Flight Consultation and to the proposed direct rail link between Tonbridge and Gatwick. The Housing Needs Survey was opened to establish the need for affordable housing. The results will be published once received. The year-end internal audit has been successfully completed, confirming appropriate controls and management are in place.

Grant Applications - \pounds 4,453 was awarded to local groups; Eden Valley Museum, the Bridges Centre, We are Beams, Four Elms Parish Rooms, Hever Bell Ringers, Four Elms Cricket Club, Hever and Four Elms School and the Samaritans.

Bulk Refuse Freighter collections were well used and will be funded again by HPC. The free Family Fun Day last summer was a success and another one will be held in August. The Four Elms Pond working party in November had many leaves and debris cleared from the pond and the Monk. The Community Litter Pick took place in March with over 50 bags collected. A great effort from all those who volunteered. A further litter pick and pond tidy will be arranged later in the year. Thanks went to Willerby Landscapes for generously providing the wonderfully decorated Christmas tree at Four Elms and to Hever Countryside Services for kindly installing new lights on the oak tree at Hever, purchased jointly by HRA and HPC.

our rector's thoughts

The big event of July will be the General Election on 4th July. I do sense a weariness about the whole thing and it has been suggested that the turnout will be even worse than 2019 when about a third declined to vote.

The former conservative MP and Minister, Rory Stewart, who now co-hosts the podcast: 'the Rest is Politics' describes being Prime Minister as 'the most unpleasant job imaginable'. Public scandal and broken promises mean politicians seem to have the lowest reputation ever. I read that over 3,000 offensive online messages are sent to members of parliament each day! Yet people still step forward and campaign for our votes.

To vote is to have a say in the future. It is one of the ways we express our participation in society. When we pray 'Thy kingdom come' we are guided by what we understand to be God's purpose for our country and the world - and our vote is an expression of this. A few years ago I attended a Parliamentary Prayer Breakfast in the Houses of Parliament and was amazed to see representatives of the then three main parties joining each other to pray for our country. St.Paul writes: I urge ... that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and

holiness. (1 Timothy 2:1-3). Each week at our Zoom evening prayer we have the traditional prayer for the Royal family but always include prayers for our MP, the government and all in authority.

Whoever wins on 4th July – and if the polls are to be believed, we pretty much know who that will be - they will doubtless be elated. But there is no such thing as a perfect government and the years ahead will challenge the government about implementing the ideas in their manifesto, avoiding errors, developing policy and responding to unforeseen events. Unquestioning obedience is not due to any elected government. However, we do owe them respect. compassion and prayer. Our government will be led by real people with their own joys and struggles who offer their own gifts in public service.

Here's a traditional prayer for all those in authority which we could pray for all those elected to the House of Commons on 4th July: God grant to the living grace, to the departed rest, to the Church, the King, the Commonwealth and all people, unity, peace and concord, and to us and all God's servants, life everlasting. Amen.

gardening

WOW.. how fabulous the garden looks, so green and lush and the blossom and flowers are excelling this year. Think back to last year at this time we were praying for rain. How the years differ.

My vegetable plot is bulging but is needing continuous weeding. I continue to do sowings of lettuce - radish rocket - spring onion. I sow spinach swiss chard - swede - kale now and there's still time to do runner beans and carrot. In the flower department I sow my wallflowers, pansy and foxgloves now too and take soft wood cuttings of everything. I'm currently inundated with peas, mangetout, broccoli, watercress. lettuce, strawberries and slugs. Plenty of greenhouse jobs on the odd rainy day (haha) potting on peppers, chili, aubergine and it's a fulltime job tying in cucumbers and loofahs and pinching out the side shoots of tomatoes. Feed all with a high potash feed. IF we do get very hot days remember to damp down in there to stop red spider mite.

Who said June/July are restful months. Prune any shrubs that have finished flowering and continue to tie in climbers. Continually pick sweet peas and deadhead roses. Now is also the time for the Chelsea chop on geraniums and delphiniums. As penstemon flowers fade cut the flowering stem back for continuous flowering. You can prune plum and cherry trees and you can summer prune apples although I do this in winter. Remember to feed container grown fruits i.e. blueberries, lemon



trees. Strawberries are sending out lots of runners now so for more plants peg these down. Normally I would be pulling my garlic now but who knows this year. Keep hanging baskets fed and watered also and any new plantings as you can't assume showers will do it. Keep bird baths clean and topped up. Any plants in pots that are not performing check as vine weevil is active now.

Wildlife at Blunts. Some real highs and some low lows. First ever a pair of barn owls who have two owlets. Were three but they ate runty. Kestrel had five chicks, but dad disappeared, and when mum left them to hunt for food, magpie came in and one by one took them. But... kingfishers were successful 5 voung which I watched to fledging. Wonderful tearful moment. Now kestrel has a new partner and sitting on four eggs. Sadly, tawny owl continues to kill every stock dove nesting. Red spotted woodpecker had two young plus numerous robins, great tits, blue tits, coal tits, dunnocks, goldfinch, chaffinch, nuthatch and tree creepers. And endless pigeon nests....

I continue to be out in the garden from 6am until 9pm – my choice - my passion and definitely not a chore. Its such a short window so ENJOY. Jan Feb Mar Apr May Jun Jul Aug Sep Oct Nov Dec


