Welcome to the May Link

I was very pleased to hear on Radio 4 that robins, newly re-classified as "old world flycatchers" are now known to be closely related to nightingales, indeed some call them "the nightingale of the north". Robins may be common but they are real life enhancers and I for one prefer them to the painfully shy nightingale. These bright little birds don't migrate so they're always with us in our gardens, chirping into the darkness of the evening, defending their territory against rivals with song - perhaps the famous nightingale which sang in Berkeley Square was actually a robin?

By May most migrating birds will have arrived, the last to come are swifts, spotted flycatchers and nightjars. The first to go are cuckoos who, as the rhyme says, say goodbye in July, and then nearly all the other african adventurers start their commute in August.

On a less peaceful note, thinking of the uproar that the building of new estates causes, I was surprised to learn that a third of all the houses existing in England and Wales today were built in the 21 years between 1918 and 1939. The neighbours of the nation must have been in a permanent state of apoplexy!

And so to injuries... the good news is that due to the decline in the use of cash, ENT doctors report a 29% decrease in children undergoing surgery since 2012 because fewer are swallowing or snorting them! Pets remain dangerous though. I broke my arm in March after getting tangled up with my dog and falling badly. In A&E they said that this was an all too common cause although

the majority of fractures come from skiing, football and rugby, none of which I ever intend to indulge in. In America, women are 2.1 times more likely to be the victim of a pet-related accident; it is interesting to speculate as to why that may be.

And finally, it is increasingly important to love and nurture the nettles in your garden for the benefit of fast declining butterflies - if you do have to pull some up, you can put them to good use by making soup - nettle and wild garlic is particularly delicious.

I hated primary school. At that time, if anyone had told me that I would end up teaching for 35 years, I would not have believed them. I worked my way through the local Secondary Modern school in Dartford, a Grammar School, and then on to University - twice.

My first post was in a large comprehensive school in Southwark, teaching mainly African-Caribbean boys (boys were predominant as the girls tended to go to single sex schools where traditionally they performed better). It was hard work, but I loved it. I taught textiles at first: we made weaving, puppets, appliquéd treasure island maps and board games, baseball hats, sports shorts and tracksuits.

Over the years I taught a range of Design Technology subjects: food, wood, plastics, graphics plus Art, Child Development, IT, and Science. One student I remember, Lolu, whose mother, a working single parent, never done with the become child become chi

came to Parents' Evenings. In Year 11, she came and was shocked by the negative feedback about her muchloved boy, who looked very sheepish. She said he was 'lazy, disrespectful, and ill behaved' and gave me permission to beat him. I explained that this wasn't allowed. She said she'd write me a letter giving me permission. I said that this was still against the law. She said 'write me a letter, and I will beat him!' But after that meeting he was a different boy - knowing his mother had rumbled him no punishment was necessary!

Eighteen years later I moved to a small high school in Kent which had a language unit specialising in teaching autistic children and students worked together with mainstreamers. The work was very rewarding.

I felt it was okay to join Facebook after I retired and received invitations from exstudents. It has been lovely to hear their news and see what they have done with their lives. Some have become chefs and teachers: others

have gone on to study degrees in Food Science, and another a PHD in Astrophysics, proving that many of us who were written off at eleven went on to do just fine.

I now fill my days with gardening and I'm the show secretary for the Hever Rose and Horticultural Society.
Our next show is on 7th June - why not come along?

Easter in Nigeria

Nigeria is a huge country, stretching from the rainforest in the south to the semi desert of the north, with a climate ranging from hot and very humid to baking hot and exceedingly dry. The landscape is similarly varied but one must travel long distances before noticing any appreciable difference in the surroundings. It is the country in which I spent 25 happy years, where I met my husband, who was in business there, raised our family and pursued my career as a teacher in schools, all of which resembled a mini United Nations.

We wanted our children to see as much of the country as possible, beyond the busy cities of Lagos and Kano. For one Easter we decided to travel to the far south east of the country, where we had heard of a Guest House on a cattle ranch, in the hills near the Cameroon border. Reports of the beauty of the area, just like Scotland, apparently, with fat cattle grazing on lush grass, had long held an appeal, and, joining up with another family, we prepared for the

journey: two air conditioned cars, industrial quantities of non perishable food, water, mosquito spray and bed sheets! (Sometimes, wherever you are, things don't always go to plan). How good it would be to exchange hot, sticky, pre rainy season Lagos for cool, fresh air and maybe even fresh milk!

We reached the bridge over the mighty River Niger by early afternoon, as did several hundred buses, taxis, lorries. mammy wagons and family cars, all carrying people home for the Easter break. We had forgotten that traditionally on Maundy Thursday, Igbos working in the West travel to their family homes in the East, while the Yorubas in the East do the reverse. Now, orderly queuing has its own variation here. Where there is space, rather than draw in behind the vehicle in front, it is customary to start another queue, the result being a row of queues on both side of the bridge and no one able to cross. We sat there for EIGHT hours! Night falls early in the tropics and with it come the mosquitoes. With the heat and humidity (we had to turn off the car engines, so no aircon)



the fumes from the buses which kept theirs on, the increasing irritability of frustrated travellers and six fretful children, we were not happy holidaymakers! We were wedged in so couldn't turn back and Lagos was much further away than Enugu where we were to stay the night in our Company Rest House. When we did eventually get across and reached the Rest House, we found the cook and steward frantic with worry, convinced we had become the latest victims of a highway robbery. However. after a hot meal, showers and a good night's sleep we set off once more. As we neared our destination, not only was the weather becoming cooler but the road surface had improved considerably. In fact it looked new. A new road meant either some new development was planned* or someone important was going to be using it. Both turned out to be true. When we reached Obodu Ranch, we found guards blocking the entrance and we could not pass. The President of Nigeria had taken over the whole complex. Our bookings were cancelled.

What to do? It was now mid afternoon and no Travelodge or equivalent is to be found in that remote part of West Africa. Fortunately our fellow travellers knew of a convent down in the valley and the nuns were able to direct us to a camp, recently vacated by the builders of that splendid new road. We were given permission to stay, the bungalows were clean and air conditioned, so out came our



provisions, including the bedsheets, and with a swimming pool and tennis court on the complex, we had an enjoyable weekend. But, sadly, no fresh milk

Though we left in 1988, lan and I still meet up with friends we made in Nigeria. As expats and far from our families for long periods of time, we valued these friends who were from all over the world. We also entertained Nigerian friends in our home in Scotland, and it was a particular pleasure to be able to repay some of the warm hospitality extended to us in our "adopted" country.

Chloe Wright is the new landlady of the Henry. She has taken to her new role, well, just as Henry VIII took to a new wife - and there the similarities end! With a committed staff team around her, Chloe has started to build on David's good work, bringing Larkins beer to the bar (the loyalty card gives the 11th beer free) and a new menu with some lower food prices to the tables. She has also introduced a booking system - currently available via Instagram but there will be a website shortly.

Growing up in Dunton Green, Chloe worked in the travel industry until Covid pulled the rug from under her. As lockdown ended, she heard that the Henry was looking for staff, went in to do a few shifts, and loved it! She says that it was a joy to be freed from behind a desk and allowed to chat to people for a living! As the years passed, she was promoted to manager and then the

opportunity to apply to be licensee arrived when, after 15 years, David decided to open a new chapter and go travelling in Asia. Now her role involves a great deal more than pulling pints and chatting: managing the 20 regular staff plus cleaners and maintenance folk, stock control, budgets and finance, choosing wine, keeping the cellar in good condition and learning how to run the kitchen including how to make the perfect Henry

burger (they have the top rating from environmental health). The Henry serves about 70 meals a day, more at weekends and they pride themselves on speedy service.

Other plans include expanding the garden dining area round the pond and opening an outside bar for the summer. The team regularly welcomes visitors from all over the world who have come to see the castle, but Chloe very much wants this to be a pub where locals feel at home, and in particular their dogs!

So farewell to David, we are grateful for his contribution to the village, hosting mulled wine and mince pies at Christmas, donating Henry meals as raffle prizes and keeping us going, almost single-handedly, with fish and chips sold from the door during lockdown.



stamps stamped out?

Graham Barker uses his expertise to assess and sell stamps and coins donated to the Hospice in the Weald. I recently had the pleasure of meeting him when I called by with both my old album and Jan Tolfree's too. The disappointment was that mine turns out to be worth only £5 and Jan's around £10 (because the stamps are older)! Graham politely leafed through the precious pages of my 13year-old album, not stopping at countries which no longer exist such as South Rhodesia which he said were not collectable, indeed stamps from the former French colonies are the least valuable of all because there are so many around. Then my second disappointment: my lovely first day covers are worthless, the market is flooded by them and I'd have done better to use the stamps when I bought them!

The next blow - the stamps had been stuck into the album. Stamp hinges were de riqueur, but actually the real value lies in stamps with a provenance derived from remaining on their envelopes. As we know the Penny Black was the first ever stamp and one in good condition on a postmarked envelope which recently crossed Graham's desk reached £160: otherwise they are worth £40-50. Graham is a keen collector and I felt that if he saw something, anything, that tickled his fancy he'd spot it. However, the final blow, even he thinks that stamp collecting is soon to be a thing of the past. As the use of stamps declines, so does the interest in



collecting them. The 1840 Penny Black was an innovation which meant that suddenly most people could afford to use the post and communicate with friends and family, but now we have emails, and stamps may well be gone by 2040.

Meanwhile coins, handfuls of odd change forgotten in a drawer, are much more buoyant - though for how long as post-Covid their use has declined significantly too. Graham stresses that he is happy to look at anything he's given and will send them over to an auction house for sale. Every little counts for the marvellous hospice which he is more than happy to assist, but he says that if you find a child who might want to collect, try them first. You can donate albums and coins at the hospice shop in Edenbridge - you never know, your album may contain a hidden gem.

To improve safety on our roads, if you have trees or bushes or other foliage that






overhangs, or covers, road signage please can you trim it back so the sign is not obscured or hidden. Please also trim back any overhanging foliage that is obstructing or encroaching on a pavement or footpath. In some cases Kent County Council may have to write to residents to remind them to do this and if no action is taken then KCC may then undertake the work and charge the homeowner for the work.

With the approach of spring, we see more people reporting doorstep criminals targeting. One way you can help to keep you and your neighbours safe is to have a No Cold Callers sticker. These are available for free, and can be requested from Kent County Council via their website. our rector's thoughts

At the turn of the 20th Century, the US physician Duncan MacDougall tried an experiment to measure the mass of the soul. He did this by trying to detect the weight loss in a human being at the point of death, which he concluded was 21 grams! In 2003 this formed the basis of the Hollywood thriller also called 21 grams! Unsurprisingly, MacDougall's work was soon discredited - for one thing the sample size at only 6 people was way too small. But it does pose the question: what is the soul? Is it that part of us that continues after death? Is there such a thing as the soul? We use the word 'soul' in different ways. We have 'soul music'; we may talk of a dismal place as being 'soulless'; we think of someone being a 'soulmate'; and the distress call SOS means: 'save our souls'!

The soul is mentioned over 800 times in the Bible. When Jesus was asked which is the greatest commandment, he said: Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind (Matthew 22:37) thus distinguishing soul from our hearts and minds. One of Jesus' toughest sayings, often read in the lead up to Easter (Passiontide) also refers to the soul: Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their

cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it. What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? (Matthew 16:24-26).

Of course, you don't have to believe in God to believe you have a soul or live a soulful life. But I think it's hard to speak of soul without at least considering some connection with God; and of course this makes sense of Jesus' saying. The Franciscan writer Richard Rohr has a definition of soul which helps me to make sense of this: the soul is who I am in God and who God is in me. Maybe this is what St.Paul means when he says: this is the mystery, which is Christ in you, the hope of glory Colossians1:27

Ultimately, finding ourselves in Christ is the key to discovering ourselves and living a full, soulful life. So, as we move into May, do come along to church or get in touch and find out what this could mean for you.

gardening

What a Spring we have had so far. Everything has bloomed magnificently from the early Snowdrops through to the recent Magnolias that had beautiful blue skies as a backdrop. The good weather has been good for nursery sales and the designers & landscapers who use us have been busy creating wonderful new gardens & borders. Our potting crew are hard at work and the nursery is full to bursting with

wonderful perennials & grasses plus outsourced trees and shrubs.

We often get asked what plants we recommend for extremes of weather 'What plants can take 6 months of winter wet and 6 months of dry conditions?' The answer, is not a lot!

Just as you wouldn't use an expensive pot of paint on an untreated surface the same applies to the plant border. You can pay a lot of money for plants, but without the right soil preparations, the plants will struggle. Soil prep could mean fresh soil (well drained) or the addition of well rotted manure in Autumn/Winter and grit for drainage. This helps the plants get through the long, wet winters. We would then advise the use of irrigation systems, to efficiently get water directly to the roots. This can be expensive, but will save money in the long run by helping the plants through arid extremes. May

Geum 'Mai Tai

is a lovely time of year to be in the garden with much to do. The threat of penetrating frosts has normally gone later into the month, so the edible gardener can start to plant out in earnest. Tender salad crops can be planted or seeds directly sown (important to check the forecast). It's also a time to start thinking about your Summer annuals. We specialise in herbaceous perennials and there's plenty of exciting plants that take centre stage in May. None more so

than Geums. Two standout varieties are Geum 'Mai Tai' and Geum 'Scarlet Tempest'. Part of the Cocktail series, 'Mai Tai' produces gorgeous, pink-flushed apricot, semi-double flowers above lush foliage with dark red stems. Equally as good in a container as well as the border. Ht. 45cm

x Spr. 40cm. 'Scarlet Tempest is a sterile hybrid, meaning it cannot produce seed, so keeps on flowering for a much longer period than seed raised varieties. Large red, semi-double flowers in profusion appear from April and can go on to September. 'Scarlet Tempest' prefers moist, well-drained soil in part shade or full sun. Ht. 50cm x Spr. 45cm.

Look out for us at Chelsea this year - we are involved with three gardens and one trade stand - wish us luck!


