The yellow rape fields have turned to bluey green as the wheat starts to erupt and the sheep have been shorn, much to their relief, emerging from their heavy fleeces like Michelangelo's prisoners. Ours take a while to recognise one another so there is a bit of head butting until the penny drops (I would like to say that they are in many other ways more intelligent than their reputation allows). Unfortunately, the cost of shearing is still higher than the price paid by the Wool Board for each fleece, not their fault, the market is still very low despite heroic efforts by many to expand the use of wool into home insulation et cetera.

The 80th anniversary of VE day was marked with beacon lighting in Hever, the church bells rang and the parish lunch had a VE theme, always remembering the relief that peace brought on that day. It was poignant that Jacob Tisdall, a pupil at the School and several generations away from the war lit the beacon.

This year is also the anniversary of the chocolate digestive biscuit (regularly top

of Britain's favourite biscuit list). It has been made by McVitie since 1925 as a follow-up to the plain digestive first manufactured in 1892. It was "discovered" by two Scottish doctors who believed that its sodium bicarbonate would help the digestion. what I do - chiddingstone dairy

I had forgotten how delicious whole milk is, thinking that semi skimmed was now the way. I was so wrong and I'm now a regular "subscriber" to the dairy. I like their user-friendly website which lets you order all sorts as well as milk but, crucially, cancel so you can live your life without pressure to make rice puddings when a glut appears. I enjoyed speaking to Paul Vicary and he's written us this piece about his work.



"What I do as co-founder of Chiddingstone Dairy, is more than just farming. My family has farmed in this area for four generations, working land in Cowden, Hever, Four Elms, and Chiddingstone. That deep-rooted history gives us a strong foundation, but since creating the dairy, I've come to see our role differently. We are not just farmers — we are providing our community with exceptional fresh and high-welfare food whilst rebuilding the connection with the farmer who produces it. And I'm immensely proud of that.

We started the dairy with just 20 doorstep deliveries. Today, we are

delivering over 1,250 times a week. That growth reflects a hunger for something better—milk that's creamy and fresh, not bland and watery like supermarket alternatives. And our meats? They speak for themselves. Gone are the days of dry, tasteless pork that needed ketchup or apple sauce just to make it edible. Our farm-reared meat is full of real flavour because it's raised with care, attention, and respect.

What I enjoy most, though, is the relationship with our customers. We regularly host farm events —welcoming families and showing people the real work behind the food they eat. That connection is powerful. It's changed both how people see farming, and how I see what we do.

People are often surprised that when they call the dairy, it is me who picks up. I genuinely love that, there's something special about being able to speak to your farmer—to ask about your milk or even just how the cows are doing. And if you'd like to meet us in person, we'll be at the Four Elms Fete—so come and say hi, grab a milkshake, or pick up a pack of our creamy, handmade butter! 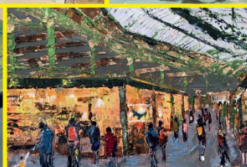

remembering a remarkable rector

As you enter the St Peter's through the south porch have you noticed the brass plaque commemorating its replacement and the refurbishment of our church? It proudly bears the name of Revd R.C. Lathom Browne and his team of churchwardens. But who was this gentleman who clearly left such a lasting mark on our parish? Let's take a step back in time and discover more about him.

Born Robert Charles Browne in London in October 1845, he came from a distinguished family. His father was the Venerable Robert William Browne, the Archdeacon of Bath, and his

mother was Caroline Bird. Young Robert was educated at Downing College, Cambridge, where he earned his BA in 1869 and later his MA. Interestingly, during his time at university, he also developed a passion for the rather unique sport of real tennis!

Before arriving in Hever, Revd Lathom Browne served in various roles after being ordained in the Diocese of Bath and Wells. He was a curate in Weston-Super-Mare, then ministered at Grosvenor Chapel before becoming the Vicar of North Curry in Somerset for thirteen years. It was during his time in North Curry that a significant family connection unfolded. He married



Florence Lathom Chard in October 1879. It would appear that the newlyweds joined her middle name with his surname and they became the Lathom Brownes. Florence had a rather famous brother – Major John Rouse Merriott Chard VC, the hero of Rourke's Drift. In fact, Revd Lathom Browne was heavily involved in the welcoming celebrations when Major Chard returned to North Curry. It must have been a whirlwind week for both

families, culminating in the wedding just five days later. They went on to have two children, Millicent and Hardinge.

A pivotal moment for our parish

came in 1873 when Revd Lathom Browne's father, the Archdeacon, purchased the living of Hever and, when the previous Rector passed away in 1890, he presented his son to Bishop Benson as the new Rector. Revd Lathom Browne arrived in Hever with a clear vision for improvement. He immediately turned his attention to the local school, adding a much-needed new classroom. When the old building was later deemed unsuitable, he spearheaded an energetic campaign to build a brand new school for the village children. But his dedication didn't stop there. He recognised the need to restore the church and embarked on a significant fundraising effort, successfully raising

well over £1,000 – a considerable sum in those days. By 1894, the church had been transformed with new oak pews and choir stalls, levelled and re-tiled aisles, renovated ceilings in the chancel and nave, a raised floor in the chancel and Bullen chapel, and a brand new font. A vestry was even created in the tower, complete with a mezzanine ringing chamber, and the church roof was re-tiled. Revd Lathom Browne's vision and hard work shaped the church as it looks today.

His commitment to the community spanned three decades. During his thirty years as Rector, he played a prominent role in marking significant national events, including Queen Victoria's jubilee and the coronations of King Edward VII and King George V. He also oversaw the erection of our War Memorial, a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made. Beyond his spiritual leadership, Revd Lathom Browne was deeply involved in village life in Hever. When Parish Councils were first established in 1894, he became the first Chairman, a role he held until his

retirement in 1920. He was clearly passionate about the well-being of the entire parish.

And his interests extended beyond the church and local government. He was the first president of the Hever Rose and Horticulture Society, demonstrating a love for the beauty of nature and a desire to foster community spirit through shared interests.

Upon retiring in 1920, Revd Lathom Browne and his wife Florence moved to Hove. There, his love for real tennis was rekindled, and he became very involved with the Princes Club in Brighton. Remarkably, for many years until his death at the age of 83 in 1928, he held the distinction of being the oldest active real tennis player in the country. His passion for the sport was such that he even donated a cup for novice players (known as "Jesters"), which is still keenly contested for at the Royal Tennis Court in Surrey.

So, the next time you see the brass plaque in the south porch, take a

moment to remember Revd Robert Charles Lathom Browne. He was a man of energy, vision, and deep commitment to our parish, leaving a legacy that continues to enrich the community today. His dedication to the church, the school, and the wider village truly makes him a remarkable Rector to remember.

desert island whisks - Bee and me

Well, imagine my amazement and delight when I opened the paper to read about a new book, a *whole* book, by the respected food writer Bee Wilson all about kitchen objects and their deeply personal meaning in our lives. When I had the idea for the Desert Island Whisks column in The Link I wondered if my deep attachments were a bit peculiar, but it turns out I might even have been a bit ahead of the curve! So now I will introduce one of my most loved treasures....

Orange was the colour of the 70s. Avocado was also popular, hence all those bathroom suites which had to be taken out in horror when the palette turned white. And so my mother had a rather bright orange mixing bowl..... which she teamed with her large orange Le Creuset casserole, bought after much lustful staring into the kitchen shop window. What bravado!

This melamine "Margrethe" bowl was made by the iconic Danish design company Rosti, now deemed to be "mid century vintage" and highly collectible, according to Google - making me feel rather old! As they say on the Antiques Roadshow "I'll never sell it" because not only do I think of my mother whenever I use it, but also it is deep, light, sleek, nonslip, resilient and altogether satisfying to use. My other ancestral bowl, a

cream coloured Mason Cash ceramic is cracked and heavy and I only use it when the orange one is otherwise engaged.

Melamine was first synthesized by a German chemist in 1834 but it was only in the 1930s that it flourished into tableware, laminate flooring, insulation, soundproofing and many other uses. It has had its scandals, notably in 2008 when it was found that companies had added it to baby milk to boost the apparent protein content.

So Bee and I are on the same page but she has added an excellent piece of advice - do treasure your objects but use them too. What is the point of keeping an heirloom (in the sense of significance rather than value) in the cupboard? Use it, enjoy it and if it breaks so be it. Of course I would say that wouldn't I because my chip-proof bowl is still going strong after over 50 years of weekly use.

There is a further opportunity for us all to comment on the Gatwick airport expansion proposals which we would encourage everyone to do. Send comments by email to:

gatwickairport@planninginspectorate.gov.uk. The deadline is 9th June. You should comment using your own words, but you might want to say some, or all, of the following:

- You don't support expansion of Gatwick Airport. There should not be a new runway and there is not a demonstrable need.
- Any approval should be subject to strict environmental, noise and other controls.
- The proposed noise limits, even as amended, do not achieve the policy requirements that there should be a balance between growth and noise reduction. The policy requirements can only be satisfied by further noise reductions or mandated alternative noise benefits, such as a ban on night flights.
- In any event any expansion should include a ban on night flights as mandated for Heathrow.
- Noise limits should apply throughout the year for departures and arrivals and ground and plant noise, not just the peak summer period.
- There should be a process for reducing noise limits over time.
- There should be no approval before 27th October as due process must be followed.
- Compensation – Residents should be assured of a robust DCO agreement that is legally binding, that can be appealed against should a resident feel inadequately compensated by the applicant for increase in noise and

devaluation of home.

- Improvements to roads and public transport to address the increase in passenger numbers should be paid for by the applicant, not the taxpayer. The potential decline in local air quality as a result of increased journeys is not acceptable.
- Local infrastructure; including schools, hospitals and GP surgeries, is already under pressure and would need to be reviewed and expanded to meet the additional demands that increased housing would bring to cater for the new jobs.

The annual meeting of the Parish Council was held earlier in May. I am pleased to confirm that Councillor Angela Haydon was re-elected as Chair and Councillor Stephen Lark as Vice Chair, the Planning Committee, with Councillor Nick Roberts as Chair, and the Finance Committee were also appointed. Following the internal audit the AGAR, the statutory reporting form, was signed off and sent to the external auditors for review. A copy of these forms, accounts and other documents for the Parish Council can be found on the website www.hever.org.

Inspire ACADEMY MOVEMENT

The Ofsted research review series describes how, through history, pupils come to understand their place in the world, and in the long story of human development. The study of history challenges pupils to make sense of the striking similarities and vast differences in human experiences across time and place. This week, we have celebrated the 80th anniversary of VE day, a time for remembrance and celebration, honouring the sacrifices and service of those who fought in the war. Thankfully, for our children, this falls into the 'vast differences in human experience across time and place' but we have a duty to ensure that they come to understand how these events have shaped the world they live in today.

We are fortunate to live and to learn in an area steeped in history, with Hever Castle and St Peter's Church (dating back to the 14th and 12th century respectively) on our doorstep. Both of these striking and historic buildings provide exceptional opportunities to support children to understand their place in the world.

This term the children have also had the opportunity to learn about the history of our school first hand, from Kevin Agate. Kevin is a local resident who attended Hever School back in 1959 and fascinated the children with stories about the caretaker coming in each morning to light the stoves and the pupils having to write lines if they misbehaved! The school has grown from three classes then – two in the hall and one in the Bell Room - to seven classes today. The children went on to connect this information to historical sources, exploring the school archives and local newspaper cuttings. They were particularly surprised to discover that the school uniform used to be red!

Amidst a full curriculum, and a wealth of enhancement activities, it is important that we continue to provide appropriate opportunities for our children to understand their place in the world, developing their understanding of the past as they anticipate all that the future holds.

our rector's thoughts

8th June this year is Pentecost: traditionally the birthday of the church. On this day, fifty days after Easter, the Holy Spirit came upon Jesus' followers as he had promised. They were filled with a new power and that day 3,000 people turned to Christ. Despite persecution, the church then spread rapidly through a radically different lifestyle and preaching the gospel such that within three centuries even the mighty Roman Empire had adopted Christianity. The rest, as they say, is history.

Today in the UK and the West we've got used to being told Christianity is in inevitable decline. But it was ever thus; for example, the French writer, Voltaire, at the time of the Enlightenment in the 18th Century, predicted that religion would die in fifty years. In the Three Spires, we've just done our six yearly reissue of our Electoral rolls ie. everyone was asked to sign up afresh. Despite some deaths, people moving away and lapses, we're pretty much holding our own with quite a number of new people especially, but not exclusively, amongst young families, who have been attending our family services.

Nationally there have been reports in the Christian and secular press of a 'Quiet Revival' based on a survey and report by the Bible Society. This looked particularly at 18-24 years olds, known as Generation Z. It reported that

church attendance by this group has risen by 50%! Amazingly the largest increase was amongst young men. This follows what seemed like a death-knell after Covid and the 2021 census in which the number ticking the 'Christian' box fell below 50% for the first time. But now even sales of the Bible are up. For details see <https://www.biblesociety.org.uk/research/quiet-revival>. I'm not sure whether this has impacted us. But it is true that our last Christmas and Easter congregations were the largest I have seen since my arrival. I am also aware that the secondary schools in the area are experiencing something of this with the recent Alpha course at Bennett Memorial school leading to about sixty teenagers becoming Christians!

So what might this mean for us in the Three Spires? If you're a Christian then do come along and see how you might be part of this 'Quiet Revival'. After all Jesus said: *The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.* (Matthew 9:37-38). If you're not sure, then ask yourself, what might be behind this change? Then come along and find out.
