Welcome to the July Link

As my cotoneaster came into bloom, I heard a deep hum every time I passed it. Peering in, I saw that it was alive with small bees; not robust bumblebees, not honeybees but small bumblebees enjoying the nectar in the tight buds. These are short tongued bees called the tree bumblebee, one of the eight most common type types of bumblebee and they love cotoneaster when other forage is short, as it was during this dry spring.



On world bee day in May the bees were celebrating - not only were they grateful to the gardeners who observed "No Mow May" but also the government has just, finally, banned the use of pesticide containing neonicotinoids. This powerful stuff was deeply destructive to pollinators, just one teaspoon was enough to kill a staggering 1.25 billion honeybees according to research for the Soil Association. The Association points out that protecting bees is not just an environmental benefit, the business case is that bee pollination saves British farmers around £1.8 billion a year in crop production. Sadly, it is not all good news, the bumblebee population dropped by

nearly a quarter in 2024 and other chemical pest and weed killers are doing great harm. In built-up areas, there has been a 62% reduction in the number of visits to flowers by nocturnal pollinators as a result of artificial street lighting.

Still thinking of flying things, I am watching jackdaws ravaging one of my birdfeeders. They are also powering their way through the food I put out for the hens. The RSPB has advised that we should consider giving up filling bird feeders for the summer as birds can rely on seeds produced by plants. Not only is there the constant risk that a dirty feeder can spread infection, too much feeding artificially boosts the growth of some breeds potentially at the expense of

others.

So we hope that all your summer plans are progressing - the adverts in this magazine tell you that so much is happening locally over the next few months..... I feel spoilt for choice!



world challenge trip to malaysia

Hello, this is Heidi! I live in Four Elms and I'm busy getting ready for a once-ina-lifetime opportunity to take part in a three-week expedition to Malaysia with Weald of Kent Grammar school. I'll be travelling with 20 other students from my school, and as well as working on a marine conservation project, we'll also be trekking in the jungle. After arriving in Kuala Lumpa, we'll head off to the Cameron Highlands, a mountainous area in the centre of Peninsula Malaysia. We'll explore this region, including its unique I'll look forward to telling you all about 'Mossy Forest' via a number of short the trip when I get home! mountain treks.

We'll then travel to Kapas Island, off the East Coast of Malaysia, where, for the highlight of the trip, we'll work with the local community on a coastal habitat restoration project to aid and protect the Green Sea Turtle population that use the island's beaches to lay their eggs. We'll then embark on a five-day jungle trek during which we'll learn how to make a trap and a fire and use a blowpipe. This trek will be through dense, undisturbed jungle in 35-degree heat! After a short opportunity for some sightseeing in Kuala Lumpa, we'll then head home.

An important feature of the expedition is that we (the students) raise as much towards the cost of the trip ourselves. Over the past year, I've been earning money from a weekend job, and my mum and I have been growing and offering cut flowers in exchange for small donations to the fundraising. I've nearly reached my fundraising target, but still have a little way to go to. So, as well as organising my kit and visiting various clinics for the

many vaccinations required, we've been busy sowing flower seeds, potting on, planting out and collecting jam jars. what I do... the Hever hotshot

Not many people know the Edenbridge and District Rifle Club in Hever although visitors to the village hall often wonder about the phuts and pings coming from the other side of the hedge. The shooting range is central Hever's best kept secret. The range, originally with garages in front, was built for the Hon JJ Astor in 1922. He had fought in the first world war and wanted some facilities for himself and his many ex-military estate workers. The architect was CW Baker, known for his work for London Underground.



The club was founded after the second war by former members of the Home Guard and at first they rented the range from the Astor family. When the Hever estate went up for sale in 1983, they wanted to buy but the notorious armed robber George Davis, who was purchasing the pub, made a higher bid as he wanted his London mates to hone their skills. Happily that prospect triggered a quick sale to the club at an affordable price! Since then it has been going strong - they have over 50

members (mainly men, a few women) aged from 16 to 80 who

regularly practice on the four week nights when the club is open. Their guns have changed to air pistols and air rifles because cartridge pistols with live ammunition have been banned, but the level of skill needed is just the same. Of course, members need a firearms certificate which is apparently pretty hard to obtain and the club only admits those who they consider responsible and safe, it is tea and coffee only in the club house.

The chair is Trevor Budgen, a keen and

successful sportsman and self-confessed competitor (to the extent that his wife will not even play him at cards!). Now in his late 70s, Trevor started life as a cyclist but his successful racing career was finally brought to an end by a car which ploughed into him and left him with only one leg, the other being a high tech artificial limb. He found himself full of competitive energy but unable to play

most sports, until one day a friend took him to a rifle club. Trevor decided the sport was not for him, making holes in paper targets seemed pretty pathetic compared to life in the cycle fast lane but, just as he was leaving to go home, two men arrived boasting that the were the best in the club. He asked them how often they practised and they said they didn't need to bother. "Right" thought Trevor - he stayed, he practised, and after a year he was the best in the club. Of course practice is always the key when paired with skill.



Since then he has shot for Britain and came second in the pistol world championships in 1994. He was also an early supporter of para sports and has competed with both pistols and rifles all over Europe and the South East. Trevor enjoys helping new members reach their potential - shooting is an ideal sport for disabled people and if you are shortsighted you can wear shooting specs. It teaches concentration and how to keep calm (it's no good having a nervous wobble), the fitter you are physically the better, but it's not a requirement. He has also learnt a thing or two about competing over the years: you need to be determined to reach perfection but able to face the risk of losing and to know when you are

outclassed. You should not be an overly triumphant winner or an angry loser. These life lessons apply to all sports. I was impressed by Trevor's thoughfulness and the way he turned an early disaster into a fulfilling way of life

New members are welcome, the club (edenbridgerifleclub.org.uk) has plenty of equipment for loan and the annual fee is £40 for seniors and £30 for juniors and OAPS. You pay £2 for an evening's session. There are four ranges, all indoors, where members learn to shoot to the international standard - ie a very long way!

what a fraud

Fraud makes up 42% of reported crimes and so Kent Police have started to focus on prevention, employing civilian Emily Jenner as a Fraud Prevention Officer whose job it is to spread the word - which she did very effectively at the recent Parish Assembly. Her main message: it is NOT your fault, don't be ashamed to report it.... there are at least 54 types of scam around at the moment which mainly involve an unsolicited contact from an apparently official source trying to worry and then push the victim into sending them money or bank details or both. There is smishing (scam

texts), phishing (emails) and vishing (phone calls). This fraud is a massive industry, for example 3.4 billion phishing emails are sent out every day worldwide. Luckily there's now quite a bit we can do to protect ourselves.

suspect text can be sent to 7726, together with your number, to ensure that the scamster is stopped in their tracks. And all fraud should be reported online to actionfraud.police.uk or 0300 123 2040.

The good news is that our mightily distressed friends got most of their money back from the bank under UK rules which protect victims unless they have been grossly negligent. They are now diligently using the "ABC method" with any suspicious contact:

A - never Assume

B - never Believe

C - always Confirm.



A really common

fraud in fashion today is "courier fraud" the criminal convinces the victim that
they are the police and to send them
their money whilst they investigate a
fraud at their bank. This sounds
improbable, but I have some very
switched-on friends who lost thousands
that way. The national body "Action
Fraud" has set up a system allowing us
to check the story directly and quickly
with the bank's fraud department - all we
need do is stop, hang up, ensure we
have a dialling tone and call "159". A

Locally, "My community voice", Kent police's revamped Neighbourhood Watch system will send out alerts about fashionable scams in the area, do sign up. So don't be too English, don't worry about being thought rude or hurting the fraudster's feelings - they are very bad and destructive people!

Gardening

Maybe, as far as gardening is concerned, 2025 should be called the year of the rose! It has certainly been glorious for many. In our garden, last year was not good, with black spot particularly prevalent from early in the season, a feature of our changing weather patterns. This year is a lot better, as attested by the success of the Hever Hort Rose show, reported by Pauline. In a

happy coincidence, The RHS magazine, 'The Garden', has, in its June issue. a couple of major features on the future of the rose under changing climatic conditions. So I have picked out a few highlights from the articles. If vou would like to borrow the magazine, please let me know.

let me know.

One of the first messages is 'right plant, right place'. Different varieties require different growing conditions, so always check first. An example is 'Wedding Day', which has been sold in its millions but is totally unsuitable for most people's gardens. One recommendation for consideration is 'Rosa WB Yeats', which is known for its outstanding disease resistance and repeat flowering. Another group is the 'Rosa persica' hybrids. This is a group of around 30 suitable

varieties and has roots (literally!)

"Peace"

which originated in the middle east, so is potentially a rose for the future, adapted to drier, hotter summers.

Here are some top tips for making the most of your roses. Do not have dedicated rose beds, as this encourages the spread of disease. It is better to mix roses with other plants, to inhibit this spread. Break up the soil below to the depth of the roots, to encourage their growth, particularly to help them penetrate

> deeply. Mulch heavily but do not overfeed.

My mother's favourite rose was, probably like many people of her generation, 'Peace'. it has an interesting history, with cuttings sent from France to

Germany, Italy and America in 1939. The original hybridisation goes back to 1935, but it was in 1945 that Robert Pyle, a leading American horticulturalist, gave it the name by which it is now known and loved. He sent a bloom to each delegate at the inaugural meeting of the United Nations, as a gesture of hope for the future. It is a sentiment we could do with today.

The Hever Rose and Horticultural Society Rose Show

This Spring has been glorious, but heavy rain and winds the week before threatened our potential exhibits. The forecast for the day was for heavy rain with thunderstorms. Our hearts sank. Fortunately, the bad weather was late, and we just had a fine intermittent mizzle and our annual Rose Show was a success!

We had the highest number of entries ever for this show, a total of 209 class entries comprising: nine classes of roses; fifteen classes of flowers and plants including lilies, a fine display of allium, sweet peas (how does Doug manage to get them to bloom so early?), potted foliage, flowering plants and alpines. In the fruit and vegetable classes a range of strawberries, gooseberries, courgettes, potatoes and asparagus were tabled; floral arrangements in small containers on trays, roses in unusual containers, and my favourite, exhibits entitled "The Green Man". Domestic classes included iars of apple and mint ielly. rhubarb and custard cake, lemon meringue pie and challah. The

photographers competed in classes entitled 'A Bug's Life' and 'Wheels'.

People were offered a fine range of refreshments. Home made lemon drizzle cake, carrot



cake, coffee drizzle cake, Victoria sponge and chocolate muffins were washed down with freshly brewed cups of tea and coffee. And of course there was a raffle! At the end of the day the trophies were presented: the Astor Rose Bowl for the best rose exhibit. Perpetual Challenge Cup for sweet peas, Woollett Family Challenge Cup for the most points gained in the rose classes, Ridgewell Challenge Cup for the most points in the domestic classes and the Collins Perpetual Challenge Cup for the best pot plant in show.

A great time was had by all. We can't wait for the August Summer Show on 16 August. New members are always welcome, no entry too small or too embarrassing [ed: you should have seen my burnt offering which the judge kindly remarked was "slightly overdone!!]. The Parish Assembly, held on 20th May. was well attended and the Chair of Hever Parish Council, Councillor Angela Haydon, welcomed those present. Below is a summary of her report:

Key highlights over the year were:

- · Free Family Fun Day in August, enjoyed by children of all ages. The next Family Fun Day: 18th August on Four Elms Field.
- The two Community Litter Picks were well attended with 70 sacks of rubbish, old road signage, car parts and traffic cones collected. Thanks to the Councillors, the volunteers and to SDC for collecting it afterwards. Next Litter Pick: September.
- · Four Elms Pond Maintenance Day. Thanks to Councillor Roberts and the volunteers who cleared debris and leaves from the pond meaning the pond outlet could remain free flowing.
- Affordable Housing Survey identified the need in the parish for 8 units. RACE reported a proposal would not be moving forward at this stage as no suitable sites identified.
- Thanks were given to Willerby Landscapes for providing, installing and decorating the wonderful Christmas tree at Four Elms.
- HPC awarded grants of £3937.30 to local groups; Eden Valley Museum, **Edenbridge Community First** Responders, Hever and Four Elms Primary Schools, Hever Village Hall and We are Beams.
- Saturday Bulk Refuse Freighter 19th July and 22nd November - HPC continue to fund the four collections annually.
- Internal audit has taken place and was successfully completed.

- Planning HPC commented on 26 planning applications and 3 appeals. Also reported suspected planning breaches, resulting in Enforcement Notices being issued on Land West of Hever Road, HPC have met with residents who were concerned about the unauthorised development and have attended the subsequent Appeal Hearing.
- Highways. Again HPC have highlighted safety issues at Four Elms Crossroads and also through Hever. Please continue to report potholes and drainage issues on the KCC website.
- · Flytipping has been an issue in the Parish. Covert mobile CCTV cameras are now being used. Please report suspicious activity. Offenders caught will be prosecuted.
- Gatwick Expansion HPC submitted objections to the continued expansion plans.

Councillor Haydon gave sincere thanks to all Parish Councillors who give their time and commitment freely to help improve our local community. Thanks were also given to the Parish Clerk, Rachael, Refreshments and presentations from a variety of speakers followed. For minutes of the meeting please visit www.hever.org

our rector's thoughts

12th July is the Four Elms fete. which I consider the best village fete I've ever attended. I'm sure this one won't disappoint. The concept of a village fete as a community gathering with stalls and activities. likely evolved from fairs and celebrations dating back to the Middle Ages. By the 19th century, village fetes became more recognizable as what we see today. The word 'fete' comes from the French for party or feast. In the church calendar we have festival days on which great saints of the past are remembered. This includes St.Swithin's day on 15th July. He was an Anglo Saxon Bishop, but is most remembered for the tradition that if it rains on St.Swithin's day then we're in for forty days of rain well. we'll see!

Perhaps more important is the festival of Mary Magdalene on 22nd July. Mary Magdalene features in all four gospels and was a prominent follower of Jesus who was believed to have been healed by him. supported his ministry financially, and was present at his crucifixion and burial. In John 20 she is recorded as going to the tomb early on Easter morning and then encountering the risen Jesus, whom she first mistakes as the gardener. She then goes to tell Jesus' disciples and thus earns the title 'the apostle to the apostles'. In an age when the testimony of a woman was regarded as of little worth; for me, this is one of the facts that gives the whole

story the ring of truth. On the other hand, the Da Vinci Code suggests she was Jesus' wife, but mainstream historians and scholars overwhelmingly reject these ideas due to lack of historical evidence.

Another festival is that of Mary, Martha and Lazarus on 29th July. They were Jesus' friends. John 11 records Jesus hearing Lazarus is sick and seemingly delaying his arrival until after Lazarus has died. When he arrives, the gospel records the shortest verse in the Bible: 'Jesus wept'; but then Jesus goes on to raise Lazarus after Martha has uttered words of faith and Jesus has declared: 'I am the resurrection and the life..'

Yet another festival is for William Wilberforce, social reformer and slave trade abolitionist on 30th July.

There's value in learning from the past and reminding ourselves that the same God who empowered these great saints in the past can also inspire us today. We may be ordinary people, but we follow an extraordinary God. So do come to the fete: I plan to be on the 'bowl a pig' which was dear Richard Bennett's speciality, it will be great fun. Also consider coming to church and hearing again the stories of what God has done in the past and is doing in lives today.


