#### What I do at RAF Biggin Hill Museum & Chapel

"It's not about the medals, it's not about the thank yous ... but it's nice to be remembered ...". So said Squadron Leader Geoffrey Wellum, one of the youngest RAF fighter pilots in the Battle of Britain, when Britain fought alone against Nazi invasion.

I'm a volunteer at RAF Biggin Hill Museum & Chapel, on the site of the famous airfield, where we share the many stories of those who fought, worked and lived locally, and remember closedown in 1992. If you visit the museum on a Thursday, you'll probably find me there, welcoming you at the reception desk, and giving an entertaining talk. These shine a spotlight on various people and groups, including the brave pilots who defended our country, the squadrons who served there, and the local people who had extraordinary experiences and displayed extraordinary courage in the most awful of circumstances. These include the fighter ace with nine lives, the always-



hungry Air Commodore William de Goat, the daily life of a squadron viewed through the lens of its wartime diary, and

those who gave their lives in the conflict. My father worked in the aircraft industry, and I've always been interested in WW2. so this was a natural volunteering activity for me when I retired. Biggin Hill was the foremost of those fighter stations who defended Britain against Luftwaffe bombing raids. It earned its iconic status by being located under the "Kent bombers corridor" en route to London: scrambled into combat several times a day, it was the most bombed airfield in the battle. Our stories span the lifetime of the airfield, from its beginnings in WW1 as a site for testing the new technology of wireless radio, through its starring role in WW2, to the post war jet age and its eventual

the young WAAF (Women's Auxiliary Air Force) officer who planted flags in the ground marking the position of unexploded bombs - in the middle of a bombing raid! Those who just lived locally were also on the front line, including the six year old boy with free access to the airfield, and the young mother who carried unexploded bombs in her bicycle basket for disposal.

He loved to please and, although not the most talented of horses, he would try his absolute best in anything

you asked of him. Like me, he found dressage rather boring but muddled through. Showjumping was much more fun, but crosscountry was his (and my) absolute favourite thing.

In middle-age, Sparky had problems with one of his eyes and eventually had to have it removed. It didn't affect his activities, though and somehow made him even more endearing! Later in his life, a series of minor leg injuries meant that he could no longer go jumping. For a while we just went for little rides from home but we both soon got bored with that, so I decided to give endurance riding a go. We

thoroughly enjoyed the new challenge of completing 10-20 mile competitive rides – mostly on the glorious South Downs, the challenge being to match your speed and pace with the fitness of your horse and finish the ride within a set time with a happy horse still eager for more. We loved it!

For the past few years, Sparky has been retired with his best friend, Max (aged 31). I am very lucky to have him at home – his paddocks are at the bottom of my garden. He still enjoys a bit of light hacking and we are lucky enough to have permission to ride on the farm adjacent to us rather than on the busy roads. Life has taken a much more leisurely pace for us both now.

#### trillions of triathletes

# Around 560 locals joined a throng of 7,000 athletes and their supporters at the Hever Castle triathlon at the end of September.

There were races for great and small, young and older and fast and slightly slower... The weekend started with a sprint triathlon which is basically relatively short and ramped up via the Olympic standard to the Gauntlet (half the Iron distance) of a 1.9k swim round the castle lake, a bike ride of 90k and a run of

21.1k. There were runners and riders seething everywhere on the roads and footpaths, returning to cheers and live entertainment in the castle grounds. 80 competed for the Alzheimer's Society and raised £4.000.

Local Brian Adcock, Race Director for the 17th year, has kept up interest in this



event by expanding the number of challenges people can take on as well as emphasising the health benefits of taking part. There are various lengths of triathlon, a duathlon, aquathlon and a marathon..... supported events for disabled people, not to mention races for children. Almost anyone who likes lycra and wearing a number on their

back can find a race to fit.....

And then in October there followed the Commando events, racing and sliding through the castle woods covered in mud - it takes all sorts! I hazard to say that whilst locals are regularly frustrated by the cyclists, they have come to know, if not love, the triathlons and their buzz .. .. maybe?


#### St. Peter's Church Accessibility Project

Hever PCC has been looking into improving the facilities and welcome to our Church can give to worshippers and visitors for nearly four years. Alternatives were presented the 2024 Annual Parochial Church meetings by our church architect, Paul Sharrock. These included extending the church to the west of the vestry or creating inside toilet facilities. In

the light of increased building costs the idea of an extension was ruled out and a simplified plan is now in place.

The plan improves the disabled access by providing a ramped entrance through the south porch and handrails on the Chancel steps. The area at the rear of the north aisle would be redesigned, to allow for a servery and an area for the congregation to circulate, by removing a few of the rear pews. The area would be ramped to allow wheelchair users to sit in the main aisle by replacing the long pews with the shorter pews from the north aisle. An eco-friendly Kazuba accessible toilet would be installed in the churchyard with a path leading to it.





This would be available to the congregation whilst services and events are taking place but locked at other times, as we do currently. In the same area, a wooden shed, designed by Scott Timbers, would be erected to store items not needed on a daily basis such as the contents of the flower cupboard, fold up chairs and tables.

The Diocesan Advisory Committee members visited the church in the summer and were full of praise for the proposed improvements. The formal Faculty application for the internal reordering will be submitted to Rochester for their December meeting and a planning application will be submitted to the Sevenoaks District Council for the outside items. The Three Spires website will have details of the project and fundraising information as it becomes available. There will be a further presentation at the 2026 APCM once the Faculty and planning permissions have been granted.

The next stage of the Sevenoaks Local Plan consultation will soon be upon us. It will reveal plans for a significant number of additional homes in the district, including some within our parish. Many of these planned homes will be on 'grey belt' land. CPRE, the countryside charity, has raised concern that the new grey belt policy will have a huge impact on our green belt countryside as much of our green belt will now be classified as grey belt and could be lost to development. #### our rector's thoughts

November is the season of remembering: we have our All Souls service on 2<sup>nd</sup> November when we remember those we love but see no longer: there's 'remember, remember the fifth of November' and then Remembrance Day. Remembering is at the heart of Christian worship in the Holy Communion when we gather to 'do this in remembrance of me' as we re-enact the events of the Last Supper. We also long to be remembered. One of the thieves on the cross says to Jesus: '...remember me when you come into your kingdom' (Luke 23:42) and I'm always struck by military graves where the fallen are not known but have the inscription: 'A soldier...known unto God'.

November 2<sup>nd</sup> is also the International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church. Christians are still the most persecuted religious group in the world and there are countries where it is dangerous to convert or even be known as a follower of Christ. For example, in China, official government policy prohibits children from attending a Sunday school! Personally, I pray regularly for three Christians who are imprisoned for their faith in China, Iran and Nigeria. It is a way of remembering that they are not forgotten. For more details see https://www.opendoorsuk. org/persecution/world-watch-list/ St.Paul too was imprisoned and some of his letters that make up the New Testament were written from a prison

cell.

Of course, it isn't just Christians who are imprisoned unjustly. As I write, we have just had the Gaza ceasefire and the start of the return of the hostages. Please God, bring peace to the Middle East and healing of this troubled land.

Central to the Old Testament story is the rescue of the people of Israel from Egypt under Moses and their eventual settling in 'the Promised land' described as a 'land flowing with milk and honey' (eg: Deuteronomy 6:9). It is then that God says to them: 'Do not deprive the foreigner or the fatherless of justice... Remember that you were slaves in Egypt and the LORD your God redeemed vou from there.' (Deuteronomy 24:17-18). Without getting into the political challenge of mass migration today, it's still a surprisingly contemporary reminder to remember our good fortune. Let's not forget that we have been born into a safe and secure country with all the benefits we enjoy, thanks, in part, to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice whom we remember each year at this time.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning

We will remember them.

#### gardening

Hever Castle garden is a mosaic of autumn colour, spun together with cobwebs, and Head Gardener Neil

Miller is loving it. Looking at the hostas turning from green to yellow, and the almost transparent "mops" on the hydrangeas, he says don't just treat these perennials as "over", they have their own beauty and left alone provide a good habitat for overwintering insects. The same goes for fallen leaves; in the right spot they are key

pieces in the mosaic and provide insulation for plants in the cold soil.

Ever mindful of the changing climate, he warns against pruning too early pruning before it gets really cold encourages new shoots which will then be damaged by the frost, letting in disease. An annual is just that, at the end of the year it is no good leaving it in the bed, it will start to rot and spread bugs and disease; it has a much better future as a vigorous component of compost. Now is the right time to be planting daffodils, snowdrops, narcissi and croci, but leave tulips until it is very cold. Planting in clumps helps when mowing as the leaves shouldn't be cut until they are fully dead. And so to

Neil's favourite - roses..... bushes should be gently pruned in early November, reducing their size by about a third, and ramblers should be cut back to the frame. Then in the

spring the Castle gardeners cut them down to about 15cms.

As for the grass....
bad news for bald
patches - the
ground is probably
already too cold to
germinate new seed
successfully, and it
is best to wait for
spring. The Castle
uses a ground
thermometer
(available in garden
centres) and when
the temperature
falls below 10

degrees they know not to try. The surviving grass just keeps on growing, gone are the days of the final cut in early November - Neil says keep on cutting as long as you can, then concentrate on doing the edges which make the whole lawn look neat.

And muddy lawns and beds are a sign to step back, literally. Walking on mud is no fun and can compact the soil which encourages moss and is bad for the plants struggling to break through in spring. It is also bad for us because, above all it is important to love what you are doing and enjoy the beauty.




