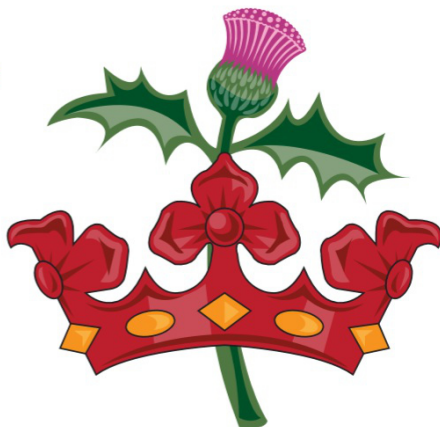

Whilst not being sure what Eliot means most of the time, I have always loved the music of these words and the idea of "midwinter spring". And, my goodness, didn't we have one in early January? Crisp days with frost as bright as blossom.... I was excited to find this dandelion glittering in the sun. By the end of February we will be heading for the true spring with an extra hour of daylight accumulated over the 28 days, the pace speeding up daily. Maybe I'm being a bit of an optimist as many people hate March, but things can only get better!! Hever Castle reopens on 11 February and you can start to enjoy its wonders, officially recognised by a fistful of "South and South East England in Bloom" awards - a gold for the umpteenth year running, Heritage Park/Garden of the year AND the chairman's award for the newly restored Church Gill which is apparently a horticulturalist's dream.

And it isn't only horticulturalists who should be celebrating - after decades of campaigning by the RSPB and other conservation organisations, the UK Government has announced new restrictions on lead ammunition. This will help prevent toxic lead from contaminating habitats and save tens of thousands of birds – including swans, ducks and birds of prey – from

lead poisoning.
And bees are happy too, neonicotinoid pesticides are deadly for pollinators – with a single

teaspoon capable of killing an astonishing 1.25 billion bees. They've been banned since 2018, yet the UK Government repeatedly granted permission for farmers to use them on sugar beet crops.... until this year when a full ban has been sanctioned alongside a commitment to support farmers to switch to bee-friendly alternatives because sugar beet is an important food for many animals.

So enjoy the not-quite-spring, and this edition of the Link too we hope!

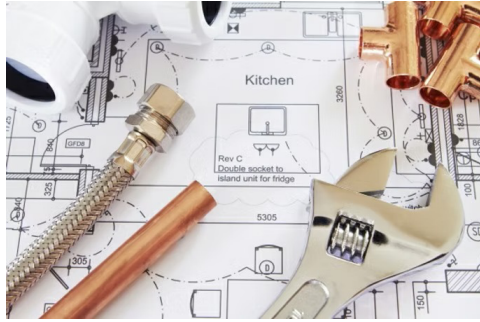
THE LINK

what I do

When I left Eden Valley School in 1985 (the secondary school in Edenbridge which closed in 2002), I found it difficult to get a carpentry apprenticeship so I ended up on a year's general building course at West Kent College. By the end, while I still loved working with wood I discovered I preferred joinery to carpentry as I really liked the challenge of designing projects, producing technical drawings, and then manufacturing the work from nothing but a piece of sawn timber.

Following this course, I was fortunate enough to finally get my apprenticeship with Causeway Joinery when Albert Ellis was the director. The company based in Chiddingstone Causeway at that time, opposite what was the old cricket ball factory. I really enjoyed learning my trade from Bert and the team there. The good thing about working for a company like ours is that we cover an extremely broad range of work. Your last job may have been sliding sash windows, your current job a bespoke staircase and your next job a bespoke kitchen or fitted wardrobe fitments. That is

what really sets us apart from other companies. We are a one stop shop for all joinery or cabinetry needs, sometimes running through a complete renovation project with our customers, from upgrading their



windows & doors to completing their vision of the interior fitments. I took over from Bert in 2000 when he retired and we now have a team of



5 Joiners, some of whom have now been with the company for more than 20 years.

With interiors, we use computer aided design software which enables us to



sit with the customer and design their kitchen, bedroom or bathroom fitments from scratch, and then render it in high definition to really get a feel for the room, the cabinet design and the colours. It really is a wonderful feeling when you are standing there at the end of a project photographing it and comparing it back to the original concept renders. We

manufacture staircases, anything from floating staircases that incorporate steel structures within the design and glass handless balustrades to traditional staircases where we turn our own bespoke patterns to the spindles and newel posts. And then there are the bespoke windows & doors, which these days are factory finished either in a



spray or hand applied finish, colour matched to any colour of the customer's choice.

Looking to the future, I hope that one of our apprentices would like to follow in my footsteps and take the company forwards through the next 50 years, adding their own twist on things. We are all immensely proud of the reputation that we have built over the years in our trade.

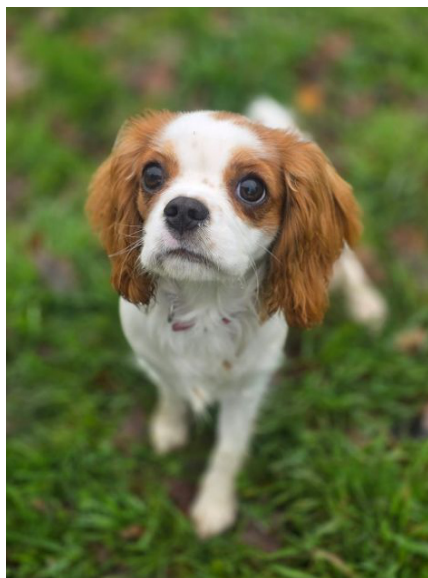
pet of the month

Wendy Izod - a tribute

Wendy Izod, who died on 21st December, was a much-loved and indefatigable presence in the parish which she served as a priest for many years.

Wendy was born in 1947 near Warrington; her father was the accountant at RAF Padgate. The family moved south to RAF Medmenham in

Buckinghamshire when she was 11. She remembered asking him “shall I be a physiotherapist?” and he recommending that she go into HR instead so Wendy wrote to Mars, a big local employer, who agreed to take her on as a trainee if she got a degree. Off she went to Sheffield where she studied politics under the famous Bernard Crick. The mid 60s were exciting times, there were noticeably fewer women students than men but she never felt a victim of discrimination, instead being happy about the opportunities which were opening up.

Wendy duly went back to Mars where part of the training was to work on the production line - and she soon became the Maltesers supervisor. She did so well that she was promoted to “special packs” until, in a race to get the largest weight of chocolate into the delivery area, her forklift driver Ron’s equipment

tangled in the sprinkler system and drowned the factory. After that she was sent off to the HR desk where, in one factory, her office was known as “the Wendy House.” Then came Black & Decker in Maidenhead where she was “Personnel officer for women”. In those days men and women were paid

differently (guess who got paid less?) and very often worked in segregated roles. In Black & Decker the women worked only on the domestic appliances.

Wendy met her husband Andrew in London. He and a friend came to supper and she daringly served spaghetti bolognese after which love flourished and they married in October 1973. A few years

later, they moved to Chittenden Cottages in Four Elms as Andrew had known the area from childhood. After their daughters Caroline and Elizabeth were born Wendy quickly went back to work, there was no maternity pay in those days! The family moved to Stick Hill in 1985. Wendy became actively engaged in the church at Four Elms after Caroline was born and she was soon confirmed. She then started helping with the Four Elms parish magazine, typing it on her kitchen table



on a cyclostyle stencil which Andrew then took to TopFoto to run off. She remembered their joy at the delivery of a long-armed stapler! When the Benefice united, the separate village magazines joined together and became The Link with Wendy as editor, a role she held for 14 years.

She was already a churchwarden and working full time when she started to train as a lay reader. She was licenced in 1994 and well remembered her terror before her giving first sermon and how her fellow warden said "look at me and I will smile at you" - which got her through. Wendy then trained part time for the ministry and was ordained deacon in 2000. These were early days for women priests who, from 1998, were permitted to be ordained, but only as deacons. She became a non-stipendiary priest in 2001 when the rules changed and was a proud part of the tradition of "worker priests" with a ministry at work as well as in the Benefice.

Andrew takes up the narrative: "Wendy served as curate to three Rectors of Hever and during three interregna, when she became the pastoral glue that held the benefice together. When the living became vacant in 2015, many in the parishes asked why Wendy couldn't become Rector. She was more than capable of undertaking the role, but was restricted by the age at which clergy were expected to retire (70). Nevertheless, there was provision for the Bishop to appoint a priest to a full-time stipendiary role for three years and so Wendy became Priest-in-Charge of

the Benefice of Hever, Four Elms and Markbeech in 2016. Parishioners became used to the sight of her popping about her parishes in her Popemobile (Fiat Panda Cross) tending her flock for its spiritual needs, be it baptismal, marital or funereal and more besides - school governor or fete opener!

She retired in November 2019 and was looking forward to travelling to New Zealand but in 2020 developed double vision which curtailed her driving and lasted for two and a half years until being corrected. This put paid to her post-retirement continuation training and may have been a precursor to PSP (Progressive Supranuclear Palsy) that was diagnosed over the course of 2023. Wendy had to endure the purgatory of this frightful condition for two years until she was finally released, to the great relief of herself and those about her who had witnessed her suffering. She will be best remembered as the smiling, laughing, hugely competent, compassionate and supportive woman of faith that she was."

Friday 13 February - Big Night

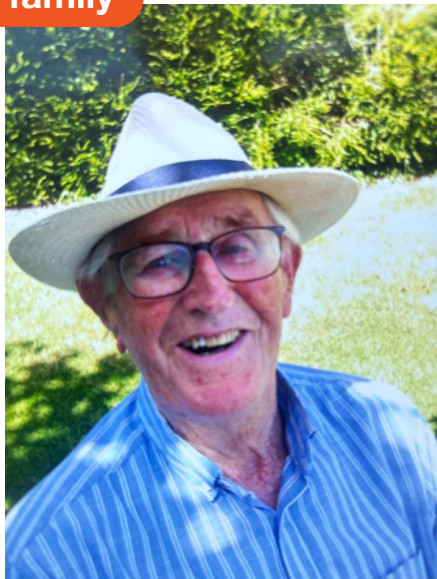

John Green - a tribute by his family

John, who died on 25th November 2025, was born in Twickenham in 1934 and grew up in Southport and then at Bushwood in Longfield, Kent. This upbringing was due to the fact that his father was a hydrographic surveyor and worked for the Port of London Authority. John was proud to be descended from a long line of seafarers and of his father's achievements in charge of a mine sweeper during the war. John was one of 4 children. He had an older sister Freda known as Bunty, and two brothers Peter and Falcon. He attended Gravesend Grammar School and particularly enjoyed his National Service at RAF Sapley in Hampshire.



John was always a hard worker and qualified as a Chartered Quantity Surveyor after time at Regent Street Polytechnic and on a correspondence course. He joined Smith & Ruddle in 1963 which became Baker Wilkins & Smith and he rose to be Senior Partner retiring in 2003.

Wendy was at school with John's brother Peter and she met John, who was a few years older, in Longfield. However, she had plans to travel. Wendy spent 3 years travelling around Canada and America and during this time she and John wrote letters to each other. Apparently, John really looked forward to receiving her letters. After she came back they started dating and they were married in 1966. They enjoyed dances at Hartley Country Club and sailing and playing tennis together. They converted some offices on the Hemsley family farm in Hartley to a bungalow where their sons Mark, Jason and Damian were able

to spend the first few years of their lives playing with their Hemsley cousins.

In 1977 John and Wendy moved across the county to Buckhurst Farm, in Mark Beech just in time to enjoy the village party outside the Kentish Horse to celebrate the Queen's Silver Jubilee. John and Wendy threw themselves into village life and made lifelong friends. As treasurer of the Village Hall Committee John supported Robin Denison Pender as Chairman until he was persuaded to take over the role which he really enjoyed for many years. During this time work took John to Saudi Arabia, Bahrain and Oman amongst other countries growing the Baker Wilkins & Smith business. He developed strong business relationships some of which lasted long into retirement.

Family life at Buckhurst Farm was busy and often noisy with friends and family welcomed with hearty food, wise advice

and a bed for the night when needed. John and Wendy spent a lot of time in the car with, at one point, one son at school in Tunbridge Wells, one in Tonbridge and one in Sevenoaks. John fitted some of these lifts into his daily commute to London and once the boys were driving had the occasional late-night trip to pull them or friends out of a ditch or a muddy field.

John and Wendy enjoyed family gatherings and entertaining and there were many dinner parties, Burns Nights and Conservative Party events. John was also a great one for making a speech! They also enjoyed playing golf together and played on some beautiful

courses all over the world. They enjoyed welcoming and getting to know their daughters in law Celia, Georgina and Sophie and had a great relationship with their parents always finding something in

common to chat about. When grandchildren came along John insisted on being called Grandpa Green and being photographed meeting them in his famous white Aran jumper! They have 11 grandchildren.



After 40 years of life in Mark Beech John and Wendy moved to Edenbridge where they continued to welcome friends and family.



mooning around

Full, half, crescent and harvest moons are phases we are all aware of. But

who has heard of a gibbous moon, even though we get two every lunar month?

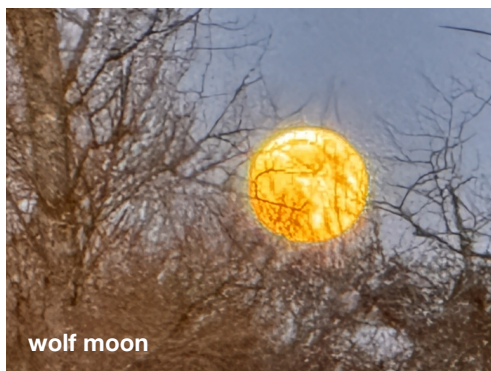
When the moon is looking a bit raggedy we tend to ignore it..... But this phase

has a name - a gibbous moon - a moon on the wax or the wane, half way up or down between a full and a half moon.

The Latin "gibbus" means "hump" and in English the word is used to mean convex or protuberant. When you look at it, the shape is indeed a bit bulgy and it isn't nearly as clearly geometric as the other phases. I'm not sure it is the most exciting phase of the moon, and I don't think the romantic poets wrote about it, but according to the website

["positiveprints.com"](http://positiveprints.com): "Waxing gibbous birthdays are just shy of the full moon and its peak energy. Those born under this moon are likely nurturing, caring people who naturally guide others."

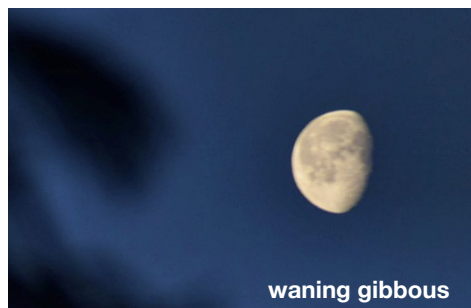
Which is a nice thing to be.



More celebrated is the wolf super moon – which we first enjoyed in early January – a breathtaking golden disc hanging in the sky and dazzling us all the way round to dawn. Super moons appear about three times a year and although of course the moon doesn't swell in size it appears 14% larger and 30% brighter than normal. This is because the moon is full just as it comes closest to the earth in its elliptical circuit – it is 360,000 kilometres away from us as opposed to 400,000.

The moon is called a wolf moon because it was believed that wolves howled more at this time – it was also believed that eruptions and other natural disasters happened, but both theories are untrue although we do get higher tides. At the distant end of the orbit we get a "micromoon" – keep looking up, keep wondering what you might see once in a blue moon....

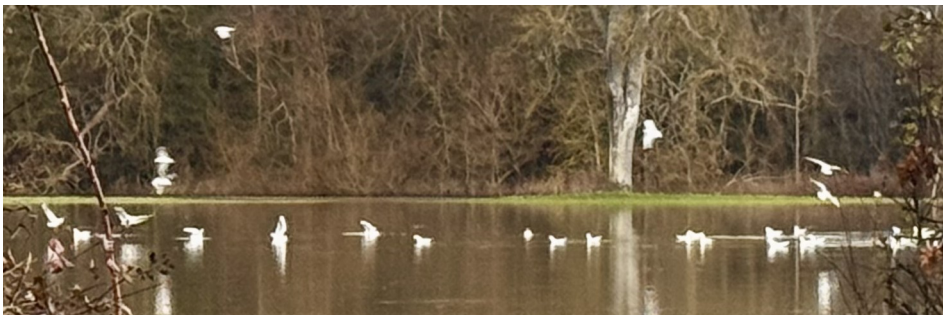

our rectors thoughts

21st December 2025 marked the sad loss of my predecessor Revd. Wendy Izod. Her funeral was in St.Peter's Hever on 17th January. A very full tribute is in this copy of the Link. I would like to express my gratitude for her welcome when I arrived in 2019 and her legacy following a life of care and service to God, the church and the community.

Life changes and things don't go on for ever. This month, the churches are meeting the Ven.Nick Cornell, Archdeacon of Tonbridge, to discuss succession following my retirement which will be immediately after Easter 2027. The meeting is in Markbeech Village Hall at 8pm on Monday 2nd February, so if you're reading this before that date please come along.

Ash Wednesday on 18th February marks the start of Lent. At the service people come forward to be marked with the sign of the cross in ash often made from burning of palm crosses from the previous year. These words are said: *God our Father; you created us from the dust of the earth: grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our penitence & a symbol of our mortality; for it is by your grace alone that we receive eternal life in Jesus Christ our Saviour.... Remember that you are dust, and*

to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

Both Ash Wednesday and attending funerals remind us that we are mortal. The funeral service includes these words: *Our days are like grass; we flourish like a flower of the field; when the wind goes over it, it is gone and its place will know it no more.* Life is temporal and time seems to pass ever more quickly as we get older. Death is the big unknown, which we must all face one day. The Christian gospel proclaims that Jesus has gone ahead of us through the gates of death so that we don't need to fear. The funeral service includes the Christian Easter hope *'in sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life through our Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our frail bodies that they may be conformed to his glorious body, who died, was buried, and rose again for us.'*

The cosmologist, Stephen Hawking, famously described belief in an afterlife as *'a fairy story for people afraid of the dark.'* Mathematician and scientist John Lennox countered that *'atheism is for people afraid of the light'* This is life's big question. In 2026, please give it some thought and join us as we seek to walk in the light of life, which is Christ.

Imagine the scene; Queen Victoria had died on 22nd January, 1901. Just six months into the new Edwardian era on 6th August, Mr John Eastman chaired a meeting in the reading room of Hever Castle. Six other local people were in attendance and the main agenda item was the formation of a society to be known as 'The Hever Gardening Society', whose purpose was to promote gardening in the area. I wonder if Mr. Eastman and his committee thought that 125 years later, the offspring of that first incarnation the 'Hever Hort', would still be going.

At the AGM, Jan Tolfree became our new President, in place of the gravely ill Wendy Izod who sadly died in December. Jan's first task was to present the President's trophy, won by Pauline Radford, after a winning streak by Jane Rosam. To celebrate this special year we have a full committee, ready to provide an interesting season of horticultural events, but we are always ready to welcome new blood to take the Society forward (not necessarily for another 125 years!). So, if you would like to be involved, please contact me, or any committee member.

As well as the usual events, there will be a visit to the Himalayan gardens at Riverhill and Tom Hart Dyke will talk about his adventures and the World Garden at Lullingstone Castle. For our first event, Nigel Gibson will give a talk

on **late flowering grasses and perennials, on 18th February, 8pm, Hever Village Hall.** Everybody is welcome. The Schedule and Programme can be found on the hever.org website.

gardening

As 2025 morphed into 2026 a couple of intrepid camelias in our garden braved the freezing weather to welcome in the new year. I have always regarded camelias as spring flowers (and they do feature in the Hever Hort



Spring Show) but there are over 230 species and more than 20,000 named cultivars or varieties, so it is not surprising that there are some which will blossom in the winter months, including the white camelia nobilissima, the variety

which has flowered in our garden. February is the last of the winter months, and there are plenty of jobs to be done before plants start their rapid take off in spring. These include cleaning bird feeders for the nesting season and tidying up greenhouses. Also, pruning apple and pear trees, if not already done, to create a canopy, although I tend to leave our large Bramley until March. Finally, for an earlier crop of rhubarb, cover crowns with a light proof container, to help force them.

Have a happy horticultural year.
