

Welcome to the March Link

The sky is very blue, which is a bit of a turn up for the books this month, and I can see two larks high up there singing. I wonder if they are two males fighting for territory, I suppose they are. From down here they seem very civilised.

Talking of civilised, I always enjoy the newsletter of the Eden Valley Museum. Annual membership is £20 - for details see www.evmt.org.uk. The last edition has a fascinating article about prize fighting in Edenbridge - apparently the town was a well known centre, being close to "county lines" so that participants could escape the police. In the 19th century fights were bare knuckle and lasted for hours because a round only ended when one of the fighters fell or was knocked to the ground. The winner was declared when their opponent was unable to "come to the scratch" - which was the middle of the ring, hence the term "not up to scratch" - you learn something every day!

Next, a bit of bad news - don't let their cute looks distract you from the fact that squirrels (grey of course) are causing devastation. When they bark an oak by nibbling right round it, they kill the whole tree by stopping the

flow of nutrients and water or making the tree susceptible to infection. Round here you see many oak trees dying because of this. But to end with a couple of good news stories.... first that renewable energy is now greatest source of electricity in the UK, and second that scientists have found some ash trees fighting back against ash dieback and surviving. The disease is not the rout that was dutch elm disease, indeed the Woodland Trust's Tree of the Year 2025 is an ash in Glasgow, 170 years old and going strong (and probably blocking out quite a bit of light for its custodians!). It is now competing for European tree of the year.

Hever churchyard - so many stories to record....

Your Link editors have a new project!

The graveyard at St Peter's, Hever, is full of fascinating graves but there is no map and little is known about many of those buried there. We plan to change that - but we need your help... if you can help us with biographies of people you knew, we would be delighted to hear from you.


One notable grave is that of Sir Derek Burdick Greenaway, 2nd Baronet Greenaway of Coombe, Surrey (1910-1994), businessman and High Sheriff of Kent and his wife Sheila (2013-2003). Sir Derek was the latest in a long line of Greenaways who, with his brother Alan, ran a high-end printing business in the City. It was founded by Daniel Greenaway in 1859 and Sir Derek's father, Sir Percy, was Lord Mayor of London in 1932/3 and was created a hereditary baronet as a result. A former employee recalled that Sir Derek was always seen smoking a cigar - if he used the ashtray on your desk you



didn't empty it so that colleagues could see he had visited you! The Greenaways with their children Ann and John moved to Dunure, Four Elms, opposite what is now the garden centre/café in 1945. It was in a bad way having been an officers' mess during the war and before that a rest home for clergy set up by Theresa, daughter of John Williams of Boons Park. She lived in a house of the same name in Leamington Spa (see the April 2025 Link on hever.org for our article on Boons). They changed the name to "Dunmore". They also extended the garden and bought Four Elms Farm.



I talked to local Mick George, their former chauffeur, about the Greenaways and his own long connection with Four Elms. Mick's father was born in Little Blackmoor on Bull Lane and Mick too grew up in Four Elms. For national service he joined the army to see the world and was disappointed only to get as far as Germany (he nearly made it to Suez and spent hours painting all the army cars yellow to blend in with the

that directors of Greenaways were not allowed to spend more than £4,000 on a car.

Outside work, Sir Derek was High Sheriff of Kent, in which capacity he met many notable people including the Duke of Edinburgh and Master of the Stationers' Company. He was a keen horseman and Master of the Old Surrey and Burstow Hunt (he suffered a head injury after being thrown from his

sand). Already car-mad he was consoled by work driving a brigadier and this, together with the fact that his father was one of Sir Derek's gardeners, was his credential for the post of chauffeur to Sir Derek, starting in 1959. Dressed in a grey suit and a peaked cap, his job was to drive his boss every day to and from the company's office at Old Broad Street (until it moved into the factory at 132 Commercial Road), the drive took an hour and was often repeated in the evening for social engagements, and there were diversions for shopping at Harrods or to deliver parcels. Sir Derek had just bought a Bentley from the Mill Hill garage in Edenbridge for £7,500 and Mick was sent to the Bentley school of motoring to learn how to service and maintain it. Meanwhile Sir Derek, who was not keen on Mick taking holidays, had to extend the garage to house his pride and joy. After six years the Bentley was approaching 100,000 miles so it was sold and replaced by a Mercedes. Eventually Sir Derek had to content himself with a Humber Imperial as a rule was introduced

horse but recovered) and the Greenaways were enthusiastic hosts, including to Princess Hilda of Bavaria who had been imprisoned in Auschwitz during the war. Locally he was a generous benefactor. He gave land for the Four Elms graveyard extension to the village (we wonder why he ended up being buried in Hever) and paid for mains water to be connected to the cricket club.

After Sir Derek died Mick stopped chauffeuring and worked in the garden for Sir Derek's son. But he still loved cars and built up quite a collection of veteran cars which he restored and generously showed every year at the

Four Elms Fete. He met Barbara, his wife of 65 years, at a dance in Four Elms village hall and courted her by giving her lifts to work in his first car, a Rover 14 sports saloon (*with* a sun roof!!). Mick and Barbara have always lived in the village but escaped regularly in various cars which he restored - the picture is taken in their 1947 Triumph roadster on the way to Italy. What style!

drink-a-pinta-milk-a-day!

11th January was National Milk Day. It celebrates the first time milk was sold in a sterilised bottle with a wax seal in 1878, thus making it far more hygienic and transportable. The milk was raw at that time which meant there was a danger of drink being infected by tuberculosis and though Louis Pasteur invented the pasteurisation process in the 1860s, pasteurised milk was not widely sold in the UK until 1922.

Recently, raw milk has become popular again, and given how strictly cattle are monitored infection risk is very low. It can be found locally at Park Farm, just off the A25 between Brasted and Westerham. There is a coin-operated vending machine there and they also sell pasturised milk and excellent ice cream. Raw milk is very popular with Muslim communities because it is believed that the Quran stipulates that milk should be pure, fresh and unprocessed.

It is only lawful to sell raw milk direct from a farm, companies which deliver




must pasteurise it. Our local Chiddingstone Dairy (see The Link June 2025) delivers as do Milk and More, currently owned by a national dairy business called Freshways. Sadly at the moment Bore Place are not producing milk.

eminent victorians

The composer Sir Hubert Parry (1848-1918) is an excellent example of why we should not judge a book by its cover. Here he is, apparently a typically fusty Victorian gentleman who came from a wealthy and conventional background - BUT he did remarkable and unconventional things, as I've discovered when starting to practice his "Songs of Farewell" for the East Grinstead Choral Society's next concert.



Whilst being famous for writing music for the church, such as the tune for "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind", he was a humanist and against organised religion. He also supported women's suffrage and was delighted to allow his most famous work, the tune to "Jerusalem", originally written in 1916 in support of the war, to be used as the movement's anthem. It later transferred to the Women's Institute.

His other achievement was to nurture a specifically English style of classical music which was sorely lacking before he came on the scene. He was a founder member of the Royal College of Music and mentor to Elgar, Vaughan-Williams and Holst amongst others. Another of the works we are singing is Fauré's Requiem, a beautiful work but very much in the European classical style.

So do come along and meet Sir Hubert in all his glory - the concert is on Saturday 21st March in East Grinstead, you can buy tickets from the website EGCS.co.uk.

The government has launched consultation on its draft National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). The NPPF guides what gets built and where. There are concerns over weakened Green Belt protections and also potential development eating into our countryside. Consultation is the chance to collectively influence national planning policy so do have your say. Details can be found at: [National Planning Policy Framework: proposed reforms and other changes to the planning system - GOV.UK](#).

Campaign to Protect Rural England has some information and advice on their website too. Consultation is open until 10th March 2026.

There will be a community Litter Pick for anyone to come and join. These will be held on: Saturday 28th March – 9.00 am Four Elms, 9.30 am Hever and 1.00 pm Markbeeceh. The Litter Picks are run by your Councillors. The litter picks are a great opportunity to meet some of your neighbours, get some fresh air and help the environment too.

Unfortunately there have been several fly-tipping incidents in the area, on public highways and also on private property. The impact of this illegal offence, on individuals, wildlife, the environment and road users as well as the financial cost is wholly unacceptable. Please do be vigilant and if you witness a fly-tip in progress call the Police on 101. If you discover a fly-tip, please report it promptly to Sevenoaks District Council (SDC). This can be done via the website. They will

clear it if it is on public highway, footways, verges and laybys. If it is on a private road or private land then the land owner is left to clear it up. There are covert mobile cameras installed in the parish so we are hoping they will be able to aid the police with potential prosecution of offenders. At this time there is no news on whether the Saturday Bulk Refuse Freighter service will be reinstated. HPC will continue to enquire and hope it returns at some point!

SDC will be implementing the new weekly food waste collection service for most households from 27th April 2026. Households will soon be provided with a small indoor food waste caddy and a larger caddy for outdoors. These will be delivered with a leaflet explaining how to use the new service. See the SDC site for more information.

Finally, the next Hever Parish Council meetings will be held on Tuesday 24th March in Four Elms Village Hall, Wednesday 6th May in Markbeeceh Village Hall and Monday 18th May for the Parish Assembly in Four Elms Village Hall. I am writing this during Children's Mental Health Week, which was started in 2015 to give a voice to all children and young people and raise awareness of their mental health. Our

staff team at Hever have accessed a range of training to enable us to support children's mental health and well-being and to build a mentally healthy culture within our school. This

year's theme 'This is My Place', aims to support the systems around children and young people to help them feel they belong; this means feeling accepted, feeling included, feeling like your voice matters and feeling you belong even when you're different.

There is a lot of overlap between our focus on promoting children's emotional health and well-being and our work on developing a spiritually supportive school. At its heart, spirituality is about flourishing – as individuals and as a community – through

awareness, connection, reflection, and the courage to explore the depths of our own experiences and those of the world around us. This work recently inspired a wonderful whole-school project, working with The Mosaic Studio to create a stunning mosaic for our school hall. Our brief was to create something that embodies our school

community and that reflects spirituality in its broadest sense, including elements of faith and of nature within our community. The project created a real buzz of excitement but at the same time a sense of calm and focus, as the children worked on the mosaic. We learned about how the position and the direction of the tiles can be used, for example, to draw the eye to create

movement and the older children learned the techniques of cutting the tiles and working with glass. The completed mosaic will be installed during half term, so there will be great excitement returning to school for the unveiling!

It promises to be a busy start to Term 4, as we are also looking forward to taking our Year 5 and Year 6 children to the O2, to participate alongside thousands of other school children in the 30th anniversary of Young Voices. We could not access these amazing opportunities

without the help of our wider community and are very grateful to everyone who supports us, both practically and financially, to provide these wonderful experiences to enhance our children's learning and personal development.

our rector's thoughts

One of the signs that Spring is on the way is the early morning birdsong. It's lovely but I struggle to identify birds other than the most obvious like a cuckoo. My wife has an app on her phone called 'ChirpOmatic' where you can record the birdsong and it will give you an instant analysis. There is a similarity between listening to birdsong and hearing God's voice because both seem difficult but can be learned. Many will say that claiming to hear God's voice is a sign of madness. But I make that claim, as do millions of Christians today and throughout history. The Bible is full of God speaking. In St.Peter's Hever we have the beautiful Good Shepherd window. In the Bible passage from which this comes, Jesus says: *'My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me...'* John 10:27. I took an act of worship at Hever school just over a year ago on this passage and afterwards a six-year-old told me she had heard God speaking!

So how can one learn to hear God's voice? In the Old Testament there is a beautiful story of the prophet Samuel, who as a boy, hears a gentle voice in the temple and thinks it is the priest Eli speaking. Eli realises it is God and tells Samuel to say *'Speak Lord, your servant is listening'*, which he does and thus begins his prophetic ministry (1 Samuel 3:7-11). So the starting point is prayer, which is far more than bringing God our latest shopping list. A key part of prayer is seeking and asking God to

speak and then being silent and listening.

God then speaks in many ways: a strong sense or feeling; a picture in our imagination; dreams (I've had a few!) and reading Christian books and most importantly the Bible. The ancient monastic practice of Lectio Divina is all about listening to what God is saying through scripture and there is an app <https://lectio365.com/> that can help you do this. And, of course, there is worship and even listening to sermons!

There's a story about a country visitor to the city, who walks down a busy street with her city dwelling friend. She remarks on the birdsong she can hear and her friend dismisses it as unheard in the urban noise. Just then the visitor drops a coin onto the pavement and people spin round to look as they hear it hit the ground. The visitor says: 'the trouble is, you're listening to the wrong tune'! So which tune are you listening to; why not try tuning in to God this Spring?

gardening

As we enter March, we have seen one of the wettest starts to a year ever! Not the most conducive weather to be out in the garden. Hopefully, we'll see the sun in a month that usually sees the start of the gardening season in earnest.

March is a busy month at the nursery with plenty of potting up of bare root perennials, roses and shrubs. We also receive summer patio plant plugs that we like to pot up early, Dahlia tubers and summer flowering bulbs. It's also a great time for us to sow perennial and annual seeds. This will keep our workforce busy, now bolstered to 26 after another three new staff joined us recently. We'll be full steam ahead with our Chelsea growing. We are growing for three gardens this year: 'A Garden for Every Parkinson's Journey' (main avenue), designed by BBC presenter Arit Anderson. 'The Plant Heritage Missing Collector Garden' designed by the Planting Design Collective and 'Young Minds Garden' designed by Charlie Chase.

From a business perspective, March is (hopefully!) the start of our busy spring sales season. Here are some plants that we are growing that are great for March interest:

Narcissus bulbocodium 'Arctic Bells' – A recent miniature Daffodil introduction, with a profusion of bell-shaped cream-yellow flowers, maturing to ivory-white. Plant in the border or container. Stunning!

Fritillaria persica 'Ivory Bells' – a dramatic, architectural spring bulb – one of the tallest fritillaries > 1m. Ivory-

white, pendulous blooms that are great as a cut flower. Try the straight species *Fritillaria persica* with it's brooding plum-coloured blooms.

Pulmonaria 'Shrimps on the Barbie' – a crazily named new cultivar, but a great addition to the spring border. A clump forming perennial with clusters of shrimp-pink flowers over heavily spotted foliage.

Brunnera macrophylla 'Silver Spear' – a fabulous new perennial Forget-Me-Not. Similar to the popular 'Jack Frost' variety, but more vigorous and reliable with elongated silver foliage. Sprays of beautiful blue flowers for weeks. Plant in part shade.
