Welcome to the May Link

"Nay cast a clout 'til May is out" - which I'm reliably informed means "don't plant outside until the May/hawthorn blossom is in bloom" (which will be soon) - NOT that we should wait until the end of May. So off we go - the Hort plant sale at Hever Village Hall well timed for 9 May.

As I write in mid April (refraining from casting clouts and whilst walking the dogs and trying not to fall into any holes) I am enjoying a sparkling green ocean of wide bladed grass, the greens darkening as they become more distant, just as the blue sea goes grey. And the green 5 o'clock shadow on the trees is now burgeoning into stubble. The willows were the first to come into bright yellow leaf, here they are surrounding the Japanese tea house on Hever Castle lake.

Hever Castle has distinguished itself in two respects, first by being the third most visited of Historic Houses (houses owned independently from the National Trust) and, second, by inspiring a new variety of daffodil, the "Hever Castle". Caterpillars don't seem to have much truck with daffodils and we are told we must learn to love them and not exterminate them as they munch their way through the nasturtiums - because of course therein lie the butterflies. The UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme has witnessed a worrying decline in numbers of many species but a rise in Red Admirals

which are benefitting from climate change by avoiding the need to undertake the incredible journey to North Africa over the winter. What is more, the rewilding at Knepp has resulted in triumphant numbers of Purple Emperors, the UK's second largest butterfly.

Back to yellow... on another walk I met a couple collecting dandelions for dandelion jam, not something I had heard of before. Apparently it is known as "the poor man's honey" with a delicate, floral taste. The down sides: you need 2.5 cups of *petals* (not whole flowers) to make three small jars and you are depriving the bees, which make actual honey, of forage.

what I do

The dream of making your West End debut is common amongst actors and I was lucky enough that it came true last June.

I'm Ed Shamwana and I'm currently an understudy in 'The Play that Goes Wrong' at the Duchess Theatre.

The show has been running for over eleven years now and has become beloved in the industry.

Growing up in rural Chiddingstone, it's unsurprising that there was no obvious route to acting for me. For a long time, it was a prospect that felt just too unattainable to consider seriously. The big change came as I reached the end of secondary school and realised that I hadn't considered the idea of doing anything else! Drama Schools in the UK are daunting places and getting a spot at a conservatoire is almost as competitive as getting a job at the other end. Blissfully ignorant of this, I pressed on and after re-auditioning I secured a place on the BA in Acting at the Guildford School of Acting, graduating in 2023. For actors, there are very few West End jobs in long running non-musical shows like 'The Mousetrap' and Mischief Theatre's flagship, 'The Play That Goes Wrong'. Because of this, I was taken aback and excited when I was asked to audition for the latter, especially as it had always been a dream to be a part of that company - so when I got

offered the role of understudy I was over the moon. I attend the theatre every day to cover five principal roles and have done more than 140 performances, sometimes with little or no notice.

My year at the Duchess Theatre finishes



this month and I've been surprised by the things which have stuck with me. 'Showbiz' has a certain reputation: for facades, two-facedness, opulence and perhaps even skullduggery. Whilst I'm sure much of this is true, the experience I've had is of camaraderie and trust. But most rewarding is feeling able in some small way, to pay back all the trust and faith others have placed in me along my journey to the stage: the understanding of my friends when I miss the 100th social

gathering in a row because I have to work and the support both from my parents whilst I pursued the most uncertain of industries and, most importantly, from the people who've watched me grow. As I get ready to leave the Duchess the prospect of starting the job hunt all over again ignites a certain pang in the stomach, but the great possibility of the unknown is too exciting miss!

You may have seen Nick and Helen Hoggins with their black Dexter cattle at the Hever School fete or dressed in crisp white coats showing them at the Oxted and Edenbridge show. Their Newlands herd has won many prizes at that show and nationally as their prize board shows.



They also have sheep and have been running lambing weekends from the farm for the last few years. Six hundred people visited over an April weekend to see around 60 lambs and their mothers gamboling around, with plenty of opportunity for cuddles in the big straw filled barn. The event is organised so that the sheep don't get stressed by too many visitors at a time and other attractions include a rescue feral cat brought in from Battersea to keep vermin under control and two impeccably trained collies - Meg who herds sheep and Rufus who specialises in cattle. The event raises money for the Edenbridge Piranhas swimming club too



Local sheep owners, including us, are grateful to Nick for being the collection point for wool after shearing - it is still a statutory requirement of the British Wool Board that fleeces are collected and sold to them though sadly the price paid is lower than the cost of shearing the sheep!

our mum - Kath Pocock

How can we possibly condense 99 and a half years of a well lived life into a few words?

Mum was born on 31st August 1926 and grew up in Crowborough. She left school at 14 -

that was usual back then - and worked as a housemaid for a few years - a job she never enjoyed much. Her brother Peter was adopted at 15 months old, a homeless child who Mum always regarded as a true brother. She married Dad, John Pocock in 1950, when she was 23.

Dad was a wireless operator in the Royal Navy and they met in a pub. He came from a big family so her's suddenly got much bigger. After seven years Geraldine arrived on the scene and then Michael 3 1/2 years later. Life ticked along with Dad working at a garage, then as a security officer at The Diplomatic Wireless Service at Kingstanding on Ashdown Forest. Mum was then a full time Mum. In 1968, we moved from Crowborough to Bough Beech when Dad went into partnership and bought Chequers Garage. Mum must have served thousands of gallons of petrol over the next few years and became very well known to both locals and the workmen constructing Bough Beech reservoir. She loved being involved in the local community. She



was one of the founder members of the Chiddingstone WI and enjoyed seeing all her friends there and at the over 60s club - in fact she was more than 30 years over 60!! Thanks go to all her many friends - you know who you are.

Vincent motorbikes played a huge part in Mum's life. Mum loved motorbikes and was always on the back of one - from the ages of about 5 to 90. She watched Michael compete at scrambling and motocross for many years. Annual rallies for the Vincent Owners Club and The Bexley Gropers Motorcycle Club took place over 45 years, first at Chequers and then at Brasted Lands and continue to this day - albeit on a much reduced scale. Mum,

Dad and the Vincents also went overseas with the club to rallies in Canada, Holland and Germany. There were also trips to Scotland and of course the motorbike mecca of the Isle of Man.

In 1978 we moved just a mile up the road to Brasted Lands Farm in Hever. We all still live there to this day. Sadly, we lost Dad very suddenly and unexpectedly in 1983, hugely devastating to us all. It's hard to believe that it was such a long time ago - 43 years. Mum decided she wanted to see

a bit more of the world and travelled with her friend, Joan Collins, to Australia via India and Thailand, very adventurous at the time. At the age of about 50 she decided she wanted to get an O level so she studied and took the exam in English. She passed and was so happy with her achievement. In 1994 Mum became a grandmother for the first time - as soon as Samuel could ride and was old enough to compete at motocross, Mum would be there, travelling miles in the van to support him. She was so proud when he started winning races - but even if he hadn't won, he would still be the best in her eyes. Jack was born in 1995. Mum had had plenty of practice and was a fully fledged granny by then - when he started motocross she had double worries, nervously watching both and fearing for their safety. Mum would be so happy to know that Jack and his fiancée have

adopted her cat Willow who is gradually settling into her new home. Then in 1997, a granddaughter - Tiffany, her first grandchild to get married - Mum was up on the dance floor celebrating with everyone else right to the very end of the evening. One of Mum's last knitting projects was a little pink cardigan for her great granddaughter - Lola. A particularly happy period of her life was teaching knitting and sewing to the children at Chiddingstone School for 20 years. Her title was "School Granny" and when we were out and about children would run up and chat to "Granny Pocock". Mum never put herself first. She was always there when we needed her - baby sitting, pet sitting, mending and washing - she loved being wanted. She hated becoming frail and dependent and not having the strength to enjoy her walks round the field to pick blackberries and see the sheep. We are

so proud of our Mum for being so independent for so long and at such a grand age.

We are so thankful that we had you, Mum, for nearly all our lives. We hope that you are now with all your family and friends from your long life. Love you Mum - that was the last thing we said to you - and we mean it from the bottom of our hearts.

a tribute to Tim Boyle

Tim Boyle, with his wife Mary a resident of Markbeech for 55 years, died in March aged 90.

He was born in Lancashire and in his Link article about his war memories he recalled "at the time I was living in a mill town where my father was a police constable. Darwen had suffered badly during the depression in the cotton industry of the 1930s and the joke became that the German bombers flew over without dropping bombs because they judged that 'someone had visited there already'." The family moved to East Anglia when Tim was 12, and at a joint school event with Mary's London school, she picked Tim's name out of a hat to partner her at table tennis. They did not get on so she was surprised when he turned up in London with a box of After Eights! After that they became close, Tim paying six shillings and sixpence to travel from Colchester to London, once to take Mary to the Proms which she loved. Tim left school in 1954 and did national service in the navy, visiting every country in the Mediterranean except Albania and Israel. He then studied history at University College London followed by an MA in Cambridge.

The Boyles married in 1961 and set up home first in north London, but with Tim teaching at Goldsmiths College in south London, they decided to move south with their two sons. House hunting brought them to

Markbeech and a two-up, two-down cowman's cottage which they named "Jersey Cottage", later expanding it considerably. They soon made friends and threw themselves into local activities, Mary was parish clerk for eight years and Tim sat on both the parish council and the village hall committee and wrote a definitive history of Markbeech for the millennium. They also travelled all over the world and kept up their shared love of music. Tim retired from Goldsmiths in 2001 after a distinguished 35 year career specialising in British foreign policy in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Both their children live quite nearby, Nick a surgeon and Robert a lawyer and Tim and Mary left Markbeech in 2023 to live near Nick in Withyham. Tim was very proud of his family and their seven grandchildren. Do look at the back copies of The Link on Hever.org, Tim's war stories in May 2020 (Mary's in June), his potted history of Markbeech in September and October 2020 and a celebration of Tim and Mary's 60th wedding anniversary in December 2021.

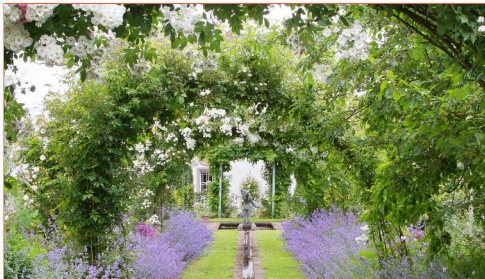

don't feed the birds

Mary Poppins would be shocked to hear this exhortation from the RSPB.... Justin Rowlett, the BBC's climate editor, was not victim to an April fool when he reported that putting up birdfeeders could be exposing some species to serious risk. The RSPB advises us to avoid feeding seeds and peanuts between 1 May and 31st October because feeders can become disease hot spots for the serious disease trichomonosis which has caused a sharp decline in birds such as greenfinches and chaffinches. The greenfinch population has dropped from a ranking of seven in 1979, when the Great British Birdwatch began, to 18th in 2025 and they are now on the red list of endangered species. Chaffinch numbers have dropped by 30-49% in a decade.



Trichomonosis is caused by a parasite that affects the mouth, throat and upper digestive tracts of birds and can make it hard for them to eat, drink or breathe. Infected birds shed the parasite in their saliva and poo, contaminating food sources when they feed. It can also be passed directly to chicks when adults regurgitate food. So think about being cruel to be kind.. or at the very least disinfecting your feeders regularly.

Our classes have enjoyed more fantastic trips to Bore Place and Seal Farm, where the children have been deepening their understanding of nature, farming and sustainability. A particularly special moment was getting to meet the newborn lambs, which caused great excitement across the groups! Back at school, we were treated to an incredible Rock Steady concert. The children have been working hard this term learning guitar, drums, keyboard and vocals, and they proudly performed in their very own rock bands. Their confidence, teamwork and musical talent shone on stage – a brilliant celebration of their hard work.

This month also saw the children taking part in the NEDRA "Save Our Countryside" poster competition. Inspired by local environmental issues, they produced thoughtful, creative and expressive entries that showed real care for the world around them. our rector's thoughts

Last month Artemis II travelled beyond the moon and returned safely to earth. In a world filled with such troublesome news, it's refreshing to read something more positive. It reminded me of the excitement I felt as a teenager following the Apollo lunar landings between 1969 and 1972. It seems space travel can bring to mind considerations of transcendence and this has sometimes changed many astronauts' perspectives on the world. The sight of the Earth in its entirety, bright in the deep darkness of almost infinite space, inspires awe and prompts thoughts about the meaning of our existence. Astronaut Victor Glover, pilot of the Artemis II mission, is a Christian, who, moments before disappearing behind the moon, quoted Jesus' summary of the Law: *to love God and love your neighbour as yourself* (Matthew 22:37-40). He then shared the crew's message to the world, saying: *'We love you, from the moon... We will see you on the other side.'*

When the crew first viewed the Earth from above, commander Reid Wiseman, said: *"You can see the entire globe from pole to pole... It was the most spectacular moment and it paused all four of us in our tracks..."* What an incredible perspective - no wonder astronauts have spiritual experiences. Looking at the night sky reminds me of Psalm 8: *When I consider your heavens,*



...the moon and the stars,... what is humankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them? The Christian Gospel declares that God does indeed care for us all. So far just twelve men have walked on the moon and with the success of Artemis II there may be more. Charlie Duke was the tenth to do so with Apollo 16. He said that people expected him to say that it had changed his life, but he was so focused on the job in hand, it didn't. But twelve years after walking on the moon, Duke committed his life to Christ. He then spent the rest of his life seeking to introduce people not to the man who walked on the moon but to the God who walked on earth. Duke said *"walking on the moon was great, but the even better walk is walking with Jesus, and we can all do that."*

As we think of the wonders and vastness of creation, back on earth, why not come and walk with us on Rogation Sunday (10th May) following our morning service in Markbeech with our traditional short walk through the beautiful countryside. I hope to see you there and at our other services, especially Pentecost Sunday (24th May) at St.Paul's Four Elms, which will be led by the Bishop of Tonbridge.

The month of May is synonymous in the gardening calendar with the spectacle that is the Chelsea Flower Show. One of the first major shows of the season and arguably the most prestigious, not only in this country, but the world. It can be the pinnacle of an individual's career and attracts the top garden designers from all corners of the globe. How Green Nursery has grown for gardens at the show and this will be our fifteenth year and maybe our last. With the increasing extremes in weather, it is more and more difficult to set a level of expectation for the designers when the plants don't know if they are coming or going! We are growing plants for seven months of the year to look at their peak for one day – judging day! That's now an almost impossible challenge! We are certainly going out with a bang, with three gardens and the Saatchi Gallery art installation.

We're growing for the following show gardens:

Parkinson's UK – A Garden for every Parkinson's Journey designed by Arit Anderson (Gardeners' World presenter). A great cause, Arit is heavily invested in the garden and charity with a close family member being a Parkinson's sufferer. The garden sets out to create a place of harmony and comfort for people and pollinators alike with jewel-like planting and a central water feature to give movement and sound.

The Plant Heritage Missing Collector Garden designed by

the Planting Design Collective. The garden celebrates Plant Heritage's vital work in safeguarding cultivated plants and seeks to inspire the next generation of National Plant Collection Holders. Really tricky to grow for with lots of rare and hard to find plants!

The Young Minds Garden designed by Charlie Chase. A vibrant celebration of global botany to inspire young people and offer a restorative, purposeful community space. With many unusual and hard to find plants, focusing on yellow-flowered varieties, symbols of light and hope.

As I write, the extremes of weather are clear. We have not had any meaningful rain for six weeks now and this must be one of the driest Aprils on record. We've recently installed some giant water tanks for storage at the nursery to harvest rainwater from the glasshouses. Water is a valuable commodity and as amateur gardeners, you could do the same. Water butts are cost effective and mulching flower beds aids in moisture retention. We can all do our bit!
