# Welcome to the June Link

Today's walk saw three red kites, behaving just like, well, kites wheeling through the air effortlessly frightening a passing crow. And more kites - "greenwashing" logo of the month is "prevented ocean plastic" - indicating that this plastic has been recycled from an area near the sea which MIGHT otherwise have ended up in the ocean. Hmmmm ..... But having mocked slightly I recognise how important it is that more than the current 10% of the 142 million tonnes of plastic packaging produced every year is effectively recycled, not least because over 20 million informal workers are involved in waste recycling and collection worldwide, often in very unsafe conditions - and so much does end up in the ocean.

Most of us received rather smart orange-topped food recycling bins in April to allow us to recycle food waste - no more holes in bin bags caused by magpies and foxes, but you must remember to lock the new bins. Of course there is a price - a move to big wheelie bins for household waste and recycling with collections on alternate weeks from October. This is in line with national legislation.

A few random observations from me - world bee day on 20 May celebrated how much honey production round the world can benefit poor communities and stingless bees in the Amazon have become the first insects in the world to be granted the legal right to protection - they are responsible for the reproduction of up

to 80% of the rainforest's flora and produce honey which acts as a natural antibiotic.

And look out for our cuckoos calling all down the valley - the male call is rather prosaic but do listen out for the bubbling call of the female, described as "like water gurgling down a plug hole". They are laying their eggs, up to 20 per season, in other birds's nests and will soon be ready to migrate. By the time the chicks fly off towards Africa their parents will be long gone, they will have no one to follow and yet many (sadly not all) make it to overwinter in the Congo.

## what I do - towards a greener economy

**Hello I'm Marie Henniges, my husband Michael Higgs and I are frequent visitors to Hever to see his father Tim and wider family.** We live in London where I work for a big insurance brokerage, specialising in helping clients minimise their risks from environmental factors such as global warming and greenhouse gas emissions because, as I will explain, this makes business sense as well as being the right thing to do.



Working in insurance was not on my bingo card when I left university with a degree in plant biology and environmental sciences, but in this job I can make a positive difference which is important to me. The work can take many forms, companies contact me for support and solutions to specific sustainability-related questions. Some ask us to identify the risks that climate change and nature loss poses to their businesses: from floods damaging their property, droughts devastating their harvest, to the risk of legal action and loss of customers for misrepresenting how “green” their business is. Last year, California’s wildfires destroyed thousands of buildings causing the insurance sector losses in the billions of dollars. This is part of a trend of more frequent (from 3 severe events per year in the 1980s to 27 in 2024) and more expensive climate disasters (from \$22bn per year in the 1980s to nearly \$200bn in 2024). Increasingly insurers refuse cover to properties in wildfire-prone areas. The same pattern holds true for losses associated with flooding, storm

damage, and crop losses, to name just a few. Governments are trying to help, but with the frequency and severity of such events only expected to increase, traditional financial security nets alone will soon become insufficient and more fundamental changes are needed.

The two key principles of the insurance sector are accurate assessment of risk and reasonable caution. Insurers are increasingly asking their clients about resilience: using fire retardant materials and allowing for defensible space around buildings to avert building damage during wildfires; well-constructed dams, drainage areas and natural defences such as salt marshes to protect against floods; creating healthy agricultural soils to protect crops from the impact of drought. Sustainability experts work to build that resilience where possible and find affordable insurance solutions for the remaining risks, reducing financial burdens and the chance and severity of catastrophic losses.

Just as importantly, insurance acts as an incubator for innovative projects. Many

solutions to climate change tread novel ground and carry significant risks. New technologies to remove CO<sub>2</sub> from the air, improve energy efficiency or stop emissions altogether may underperform or fail outright; forests planted to sequester CO<sub>2</sub> may burn down. If such risks cannot be insured, few investors would be willing to provide the needed financial backing, hence the need to collaborate with insurers.

I am optimistic by nature, but I can't deny that things are not looking good at the moment. We are unlikely to maintain global warming below 1.5 degrees celsius; catastrophic events linked to this change are already piling up in severity and frequency. Biodiversity is declining rapidly and thus eroding many of the buffers that historically offered protection from severe weather events. At the same

time, climate change and sustainability have been politicised - activists depressing some and annoying others, and some world leaders dismissing climate change as the "greatest con job ever perpetrated". But climate change and nature loss are not up for debate - they are escalating and causing tangible damage not only to the environment, but to people and the economy. Does that mean we are doomed? Not quite. Businesses around the world, including the insurance sector, have recognised that ultimately, climate and nature risks are business risks which must be addressed. You may not always see what we are doing - but rest assured, we are here, learning together and planning, working towards a greener future for our economy. The only question is whether we will be fast enough.

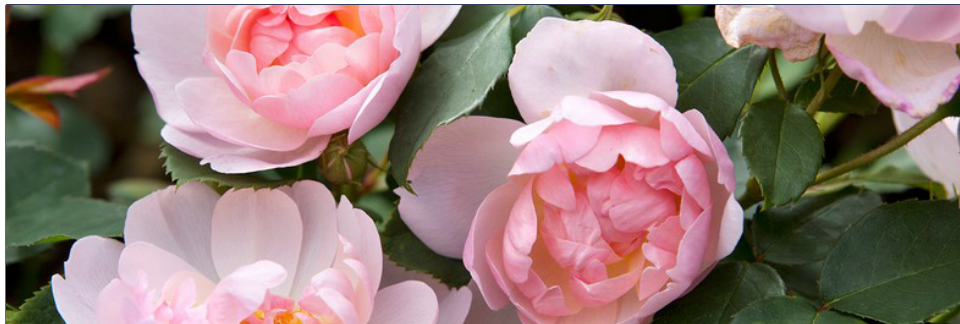

## festival theatre at hever castle

The Festival Theatre at Hever Castle, now in its 45<sup>th</sup> season, remains one of Kent's most distinctive summer arts destinations, where live performance and historic landscape combine to striking effect. Set within the purpose-built Two Sisters' Theatre, the 2026 programme offers a lively and accessible mix of music, drama and family entertainment, drawing audiences back for long evenings under open skies.

Highlights include the exuberant *Motown & More with Natalie Williams' Soul Family*, a high-energy celebration of classic soul, alongside *The Ed Sheeran Experience*, a tribute to one of Britain's most recognisable contemporary songbooks. Gilbert & Sullivan's *Iolanthe* adds a welcome touch of comic operetta, while *Treasure Island* brings a swashbuckling family adventure capturing the festival's cross-generational appeal. More playful fare such as *The Dusty Show* and *General*

*Medical Emergency Ward 10* further broadens the season's range, blending nostalgia, humour and musical theatre.

What continues to set the Festival Theatre apart is not only its programming, but the experience itself: picnics on the lawn, the glow of the castle at dusk, and the shared anticipation of live performance in an open-air setting. It remains less a conventional theatre season than a cherished summer ritual.

## a history of hever village hall

growing population needed access to a church. As far

I had always assumed in a vague sort of way that village halls had been



as we know this one was bought by the Astors not as a place of worship but for use by the 1,600 navvies who were

**part of village life from the beginnings of time - the time of moot halls and maypoles on the village green.** But no. The vast majority are the product of the First World War and a new consciousness about the need for community and education amongst rural people. This was led by the newly created National Council of Social Service (NCSS - now NCVO). At the same time people wanted to make donations in memory of the fallen, often to build memorial halls - this ignited a great outbreak in construction, including Four Elms village hall which displays a list of all those who fought (not just those who died). There are now about 11,000 village halls nationwide of which about 10% are memorial halls.

Hever did not build a memorial hall; theirs came from the Astor family very much at the same time. The hall is what is known as a "tin tabernacle" - a prefab building designed to be erected in areas where the

brought to Hever between 1903 and 1908 to build the Tudor village and pleasure gardens and dig the lake. Some may have slept in it, although given their numbers it seems too small; if they did, a thick rope was stretched down the length of the hall at night serving as a collective pillow. There is an example of a tin tabernacle in the Weald and Downland Museum. We will never know more about how the Astors used the hall as all records were in the castle basement and lost in the two big floods of 1958 and 1968.

Once work on the Castle was complete, the tabernacle probably lay empty years until Lord William Waldorf Astor died in 1919 and his son John Jacob and his wife Lady Violet inherited. John Jacob had seen active service in the war,



indeed he had lost a leg, and he was well known for his kindness toward the castle staff, particularly ex-servicemen. It was not surprising therefore that his philanthropy extended to the

village with the gift of the old tabernacle in 1920. The building was moved to its current site as a "Men's Reading Room" - although many women had just been given the vote it seems that the focus was still on improving the men folk, maybe their need was more urgent! The donors of the land were in fact the Meade Waldo family of Stonewall Park who had sold the Castle to the Astors and still owned quite a bit of land locally. The premises comprised a large room, a smaller meeting room and a kitchen. The 'necessarium' was outside, and consisted only of buckets in a lean-to shed! It is extraordinary that what was essentially a disused pre-fab survived the move. By the 1930s the improvement of the men folk must have stalled because the ladies of the W. I. took it over as the Hever Bullen Women's Institute. They eventually found the financial burden too heavy so in 1947, following a public meeting held in the school, it became, for the first time, Hever Village Hall. What this meant was that it belonged to the village, and was administered by a Board of Trustees. In 1984 it became a registered charity.

Local farmer David Woollett was the Chairman and leading light for most of the post war years. He did a huge amount of work for the hall, including (with the help of Antony Penman and others) laying the floor and keeping it in good repair. It was famously painted red and

green because there was spare tractor paint available at the time, red is the Massey Ferguson colour and green John Deere. The paddock at the rear was acquired in 1983 when, after 80 years of occupation, the Astors sold the Castle and Estate, and moved away. Gerry Ryan took over from David in 2000 with his wife Jan as treasurer and bookings secretary and they were also massively hard working in its interests. For those who wonder about the splendid art deco wall lights, these were donated and installed some years ago by the then Vice-Chair Geoff Vodden. Mandy Yarnold became Chair in 2021 and I took over this year.

The many who have worked hard to maintain our hall deserve much gratitude, but as with all pre-fabs it's time is sadly up. Now that a new hall is being planned, the support of the community is needed as never before. **Do come to the hall on Saturday 13 June to look at a model, give us your comments and ideas and enjoy cake and plenty of side-shows!**

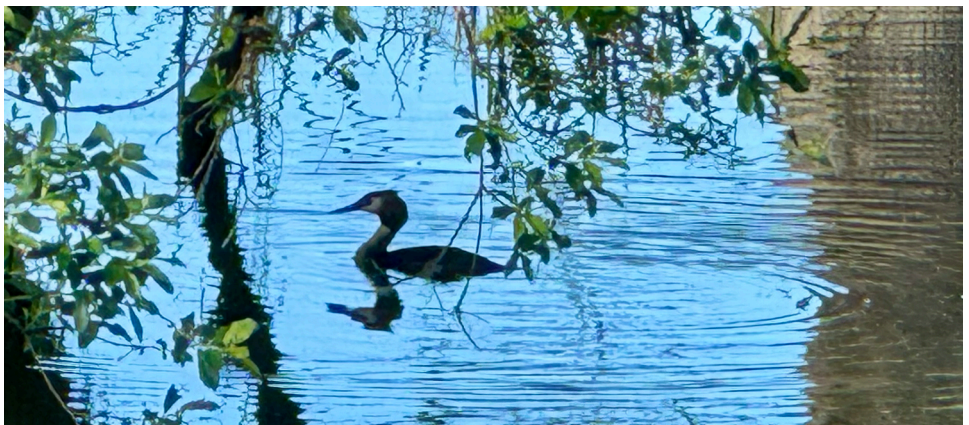

**It has been another incredibly busy and exciting few weeks at Four Elms Primary School, with a real buzz for learning across the whole school.**

Our youngest learners in Class 1 have had a truly memorable start to their new topic. They began by releasing their butterflies and watching them soar into the sky – a magical experience that brought their learning about life cycles to life. They have also been enjoying their Drawing Club sessions, exploring *Hansel and Gretel* and sharing wonderfully imaginative ideas for tricks and treats to add to the witch's pot.

In Class 2, the children have been fully engaged in their learning. They have been exploring measurement using non-standard units and have particularly enjoyed taking their maths outdoors, investigating length and height in practical and fun ways. Their experience learning on the Titanic has captured their interest and they had a great Titanic Day to launch their learning.

Class 3 have had an exceptionally busy few weeks. In the classroom, they have been delving into Tudor history, learning about Henry VIII and comparing the lifestyles of the rich and poor. Beyond the classroom, they put on a fantastic performance at The Stag Theatre – their confidence and enthusiasm on stage made us incredibly proud. They also enjoyed a wonderful trip to Hever Castle, bringing their historical learning to life.

Our Class 4 pupils have been working extremely hard on their writing, producing thoughtful and engaging negative reviews of *High School Musical*, focusing on how to effectively convey mood and emotion. Alongside this, they have been developing their spelling skills in creative ways, even using their bodies to form silent letters.

Across the school, children have benefited from a range of enrichment opportunities. Some pupils attended a poetry workshop at Radnor House, returning full of pride and enthusiasm. We were also delighted to welcome Russell Kane, who shared his new story with us – a lively and entertaining visit that the children thoroughly enjoyed. In addition, *Young Carers* led an assembly to raise awareness of the vital roles young carers play and we were pleased to welcome NEDRA back to present books and celebrate the winners of our recent poster competition. Our choir had a fantastic opportunity to perform at Sevenoaks School, impressing the audience with their enthusiasm and beautiful singing. We are also incredibly proud of our Young Enterprise group, who raised an impressive £184.50 this week – a wonderful achievement.

Another fantastic few weeks at Four Elms – we are very proud of all our children and the enthusiasm they show for their learning every day.

**Earlier in the year, we shared our beautiful mosaic which linked to the work we have been doing on strengthening and embedding a whole school approach to resilience and emotional wellbeing.** I am pleased to say that this focus has resulted in Hever receiving the Kent Award for Resilience and Wellbeing. Feedback from the awarding panel was that we ‘presented a very impressive application, identifying the wonderful practice that is currently taking place at Hever Primary School.’ They went on to say that there were many outstanding features including: supportive and informative engagement opportunities with parents and carers; effective partnership collaborations with multiple agencies; strategic, varied and far-reaching targeted support and interventions with wide ranging programmes to provide support for identified areas of need. This work is at the heart of our commitment to provide a learning environment where wellbeing and high standards of academic

achievement go hand in hand, enabling every child to build the confidence and resilience to flourish.

We have certainly seen great examples of confidence and resilience from our Year 6 pupils this week as they approached their end of key stage two statutory assessments (SATs) with maturity and diligence. We are proud of the effort they have put in, and of their support for one another, as they move into their final term at Hever.

At the opposite end of the school, we enjoyed very positive feedback on our Early Years provision from the Local Authority School Improvement Advisor this week. As a current Ofsted Inspector, trained under the revised Ofsted framework, it was good to receive this validation, including recognition of the impact of our focused work on children’s communication and language development. Amongst other positives, the report noted adults engaging children in sustained, high-quality talk, acting as strong language role models and extending children’s thinking through purposeful questioning and commentary.



Whilst we are full for this September, we know that parents and carers will be starting to think about looking at schools for the following year and hope you will consider coming to see all that Hever Primary has to offer.

## our rector's thoughts

As I write following the May local elections, there are calls for the Prime Minister to resign. But I make no apology for talking about money, possessions and anxiety because Jesus did so: eleven of his thirty nine parables are on the subject!

I also continue to see wonderful examples of generosity across our community and as a church treasurer myself many years ago I was humbled by the amazing generosity particularly from people of modest means. Just to be clear, local churches like ours get no special state or central church funding. We are entirely reliant on the generosity of our congregations and communities together with fundraising activities. Sadly, regular giving in our churches has been in slow decline as many faithful givers have moved away or died. We manage to 'wash our face' financially partly because I have been in the fortunate position of offering my ministry on a voluntary basis. But with my retirement at Easter next year, we will need to

increase our income if we are to afford to even pay for a part time Rector. Happily, there are increasing numbers attending our family services. If that includes you, please consider giving regularly by standing order. Of course, this applies to everyone including those who may not attend regularly but appreciate the continuity of the churches in our community. See <https://threespires.wordpress.com/giving/> for details of how to give.

Most importantly though, generosity and giving is good for us. Jesus said: *'it is more blessed to give than to receive'* (Acts 20:35). Giving helps us to break the power of money on our lives. Jesus also said: *Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you* (Luke 6:38). So please think and pray about what God might be calling you to do with your treasure, time and talents whether you are a regular church goer or not. The prophet Malachi declared.... *Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse... Test me in this," says the LORD "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing..."*

Go on, put God to the test!

## gardening

**It's all coming up roses....** If you pruned your roses in January/ February, mulched in March, fed in April and watered in May (simple, of course you did!!) the bushes should be full of leaf and the buds beginning to burst - all ready for the Hever Rose and Horticultural Society Rose Show on 6 June. It is always worth entering a lovely rose - there are so many classes yours is bound to fit one - but you do need to join the Society first (see [hever.org](http://hever.org) for details). If you don't want to exhibit just come to the hall to inhale the scent and eat cake! There is a photography competition too.

The name David Austin is pretty synonymous with roses. From his farm in Shropshire David Austin senior started breeding roses and launched his first, the mid pink fragrant climber Constance Spry, for sale in 1961. Having bred more than 200 new roses he passed his secateurs to his son, also David, in 1979. Since then the firm has filled its catalogues with hundreds of new breeds, releasing new ones every year. The annual process of creation entails the staff cross-pollinating around 40,000 roses by hand, extracting seeds from the resulting hips and waiting for the



seedlings to sprout in the spring. Around 150,000 are selected for further trialling and from them 10 bushes are garden trialled for about five years, disease resistance being an important factor as well as scent and look. And finally just three or four are marketed each year. The rose garden at Hever Castle is well worth a visit in the next few months - and you will notice that, as with all traditional rose gardens, there is no ground cover in the beds. Sometimes this makes a rose garden look rather arid but the reasons for this style are to ensure air circulation to avoid black spot, to enable thorough watering at their roots and to avoid competition for nutrients.

Jan Tolfree's current top picks are a floribunda bush rose called Rosa Hot Chocolate, a dark red beauty which can be delivered to your door by Waitrose or RHS plants. She also loves the Leonardo da Vinci, a vigorous vivid pink and prolific bush. So as June passes it is time to deadhead. The marvel of hybrid tea roses is that if you prune, they bloom - again and again.....
